2010 FFA Landscape Design Career Development Event Supplemental Information

- 1. Type of House: This home is being built by Habitat for Humanity and is a four bedroom, one floor modified ranch style.
- 2. Lot: The property measures 75 feet across and 150 feet from front to back but is an irregular shape. It is nearly level. The house is on a corner lot on the corner of Blue Road and Gold Way. There is also a detached one car garage. The front of the home faces south.
- 3. Family: The family who will reside in this home consists of a mother, Mrs. Chase, who works fulltime, an 11 year old son and a 9 year old daughter. In addition Mrs. Chase's mother, Mrs. Fox, will also live in this house. There is no current landscaping other than a lawn. The floor plan is shown on page 7 of this document.
 - Habitat for Humanity has received a donation of \$20,000 to apply to the landscaping and all the installation will be done using volunteers.
 - Habitat for Humanity wants to encourage a "green" life style and for the landscape they prefer to incorporate native plants (except for plants used in the vegetable garden) as much as possible and are sensitive to environmental issues and water conservation. Invasive plants must not be used.

4. Scope of the work:

- A. The homeowners are interested in creating areas within the backyard which could be used for different purposes and are especially interested in a vegetable garden to help them save some money by growing some of their own produce. Plants should be selected which are low maintenance and drought tolerant. As much as possible an effort should be made to use deer resistant plants. See the included list of suggested deer resistant plants for plant suggestions. Note that the deer problem can also be managed by the use of repellants or fencing if specified as part of the plan. Walkways from the driveway and garage to the house are also needed and it would be nice to have some outdoor entertaining space.
- B. The soil is mostly a sandy loam.
- C. Topsoil is about 6 inches deep with a pH of 6.
- D. The entire lot should be considered when preparing this design, including the front yard, side yards, backyard, and perimeter of the property.
- 5. Project Requirements:

Finished projects may be hand rendered or developed using a CAD program but all projects must meet the following criteria:

- A. All drawings should be submitted on 24" by 36" sheets of good quality tracing paper or vellum. Plan view drawing of the finished project is required. Color, Imaging, or Elevation drawings will not be judged.
- **B.** The finished scale should be 1" equals 8'. (note this is a change from previous years)

- Students are required to use standard, commonly recognized symbols for plants
- All students are required to submit a list of wholesale costs (see page 4 for instructions). Wholesale costs must not exceed \$20,000 (see #3 above)
- E. Symbols used should be representative of accepted professional drawing practices.
 - Plant symbols should be drawn representing plants in scale at reasonable mature sizes. It is recommended that a reference such as The Manual of Woody Plants, Michael Dirr be used in determining plant spread (width). Nursery wholesale price books may also contain helpful size information. For example, in the Manual of Woody Plants, Cornus kousa is shown at a spread equal to its height of 20 30 feet. A reasonable mature size to represent this tree would be 10 to 15 feet or approximately one-half to two-thirds the spread listed. A shrub which grows quickly would be more accurately represented at 2/3 of its mature spread, while a slow growing tree or shrub could be represented at ½ it's mature spread. It is recognized that site conditions will affect the size plants ultimately achieve.










Student must locate title block in lower right hand corner of the final drawing. The location of the plant materials list should be chosen to make it easy to read while viewing the design.



LANDSCAPE COSTS FORMAT

NOTE: The student must include an estimate of wholesale costs with their landscape design. The Estimate of Wholesale Costs will be worth 10 points as part of the design review component on the Landscape Design CDE. Students must include the unit costs and total costs for all plant material. Lawn areas may be priced out on the basis of square feet, hardscape areas such as patios and walkways should be priced out in square feet AND total cost. No labor, equipment or overhead costs are to be included. The source for all costs must be shown. The table below shows the preferred format for the wholesale cost estimate.

Landscape Plants Rated by Deer Resistance

The following is a list of landscape plants rated according to their resistance to deer damage. The list was compiled with input from nursery and landscape professionals, Cooperative Extension personnel, and Master Gardeners in Northern N.J. Realizing that no plant is deer proof, plants in the Rarely Damaged, and Seldom Rarely Damaged categories would be best for landscapes prone to deer damage. Plants Occasionally Severely Damaged and Frequently Severely Damaged are often preferred by deer and should only be planted with additional protection such as the use of fencing, repellents, etc. Success of any of these plants in the landscape will depend on local deer populations and weather conditions.
