

**EARLY NOTICE AND PUBLIC REVIEW OF A PROPOSED  
ACTIVITY IN A 100-YEAR FLOODPLAIN**

January 29, 2016

To: All Interested Agencies, Groups & Individuals

This Notice is related to Federal assistance provided in response to the Presidentially-declared disaster, Superstorm Sandy. This is to give notice that the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs (DCA) has determined that the following proposed action under the Reconstruction, Rehabilitation, Elevation, and Mitigation (RREM) Program, developed by the state to rehabilitate or reconstruct properties damaged by Superstorm Sandy, is located in the 100-year floodplain. DCA will be identifying and evaluating practicable alternatives to locating the action in the floodplain and analyzing the potential impacts on the floodplain from the proposed action, as required by Executive Order 11988, in accordance with HUD regulations at 24 CFR 55.20 Subpart C, Procedures for Making Determinations on Floodplain Management and Protection of Wetlands.

**Project Description**

The proposed project is located at: 18 W. Marion Street, Brick, Ocean County, New Jersey 08738. The project will consist of the reconstruction and elevation of the previously-demolished home. The building is a single-unit (detached) residence within a 13-unit community. None of the other residences are part of this application. According to tax records, the property is approximately 0.0343 acres, which is entirely located within the AE (Base Flood Elevations determined) Flood Zone, as indicated on Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) Panel 218 of 611 no. 34029C0218F, revised September 29, 2006. The reconstructed home will be elevated above the floodplain and within the previous footprint of the residence; therefore, no adverse impacts to the floodplain are anticipated.

There are three primary purposes for this notice. First, people who may be affected by activities in floodplains and those who have an interest in the protection of the natural environment should be given an opportunity to express their concerns and provide information about these areas. Second, an adequate public notice program can be an important public education tool. Commenters are encouraged to offer alternative methods to serve the same project purpose, and methods to minimize and mitigate impacts. The dissemination of information and request for public comment about floodplains can facilitate and enhance Federal efforts to reduce the risks associated with the occupancy and modification of these special areas. Third, as a matter of fairness, when the Federal government determines it will participate in actions taking place in floodplains, it must inform those who may be put at greater or continued risk.

Written comments must be received by DCA on or before February 15, 2016, or fifteen (15) days from the actual date of publication, whichever is later.
