

**Summary of revisions to NJ Wildlife Action Plan**

**VERSION DATED JANUARY 23, 2008**

The remaining three of the five region-based stakeholders’ meetings were held between March, 2007, and September, 2007. As such, the Wildlife Action Plan (Plan) has been reviewed, discussed, and revised for refinement and clarification over the course of the past two years by both state-level and region-focused stakeholders’ and conservation partners.

Throughout the Plan, numerous revisions have been made to refine and further clarify conservation goals and strategies (actions). The overall focus of these goals and actions, excluding those listed below, maintained the overarching objective and focus described in previous versions of the Plan and therefore, were not identified as being “substantive revisions” or considered “noteworthy.” Interested parties can review the stakeholders’ implementation meetings’ reports (Attachments F, G, H, I, and J) to review many of these edits.
