

Channel Catfish

Ictalurus punctatus



Description:

- deeply forked caudal fin
- upper jaw projects beyond lower
- white to dusky chin barbels
- olive to pale blue on back and sides with silvery white belly
- numerous small dark spots on back and sides: absent on young and less obvious on large adults

Size:

up to 50 inches

Range:

- Native to North America, east of Rockies from south Canada, south into northeast
- Mexico and east of the Appalachians; absent through much of the coastal plains
- north of Florida; introduced over much of the U.S.


Facts:

- spawn in late spring or early summer
- males select dark, secluded nest sites
- golden yellow gelatinous egg mass deposited by female in bottom of nest and guarded by male
- eggs hatch in a week, if not eaten by male
- fry remain in nest with male for another week
