

Green Sunfish

Lepomis cyanellus



Description:

- blue-green back and sides
- white to yellow belly
- often wavy lines on cheek and opercle
- short black ear flaps with a white to yellow edge
- yellow or orange edge on second dorsal, caudal and anal fins
- upper jaw extends beneath the pupil of the eye
- wider body then most sunfish
- ♦ 13-14 pectoral rays
- ♦ 9 anal rays

Size:

• average length is 5-6 inches

Range:

- Great Lakes, Hudson Bay and Mississippi River basins from New York and Ontario to
- Minnesota and South Dakota and south to the Gulf of Mexico; Gulf of Mexico slope
- Drainages from Escambia River, Florida and Mobile Bay, Georgia and Alabama to Rio Grande in Texas


Facts:

- usually live 4-6 years in the wild
- males build nests with gravel and guard for 5-7 days after eggs hatch
- eat small fish, fish eggs, insects and crayfish
- tolerant to poor water quality
- readily hybridize with other species of sunfish
- like to hide around rocks, logs, or brush piles
