

Largemouth Bass

Micropterus salmoides



Description:

- first dorsal fin spiny
- second dorsal fin soft
- nearly separate dorsal fins
- large mouth
- upper jaw extends past eye
- brassy green above fading to off white belly
- broad black stripe, broken into oval shapes along side and onto snout

Size:

up to 38 inches

Range:

- Native to St. Lawrence- Great Lakes, Hudson Bay and Mississippi River basins from south Quebec to Minnesota and south to Gulf; Atlantic drainages from North Carolina to Florida
- Gulf drainages from south Florida into northern Mexico; introduced over much of U.S. and extreme southern Canada


Facts:

- prefer quiet, clear, well-vegetated waters
- males build nests in shallow water
- females lay eggs in nest
- ♦ larvae hatch within 3 to 4 days
- average 3000 fry per nest, as many as 6000 observed
- fry remain close to male for a month at most
- average lifespan in wild is 15 years; oldest known wild fish is 23 years
- average lifespan in captivity is 6 years; oldest known captive fish is 11 years
- food of choice for adults is sunfish
