



Yellow Perch

Perca flavescens



Description:

- ◆ deep, compressed body
- ◆ forked caudal fin
- ◆ green above
- ◆ yellow sides with 6 to 9 olive brown saddles
- ◆ black blotch at rear of first dorsal fin
- ◆ yellow to red paired fins

Facts:

- ◆ most common in well vegetated clear water
- ◆ spawn April through early May
- ◆ female lays an average of 23,000 eggs
- ◆ eggs hatch in 8 to 10 days
- ◆ fairly poor swimmers
- ◆ economically important fish as food source and for recreation in Great Lakes

Size:

- ◆ up to 16 inches

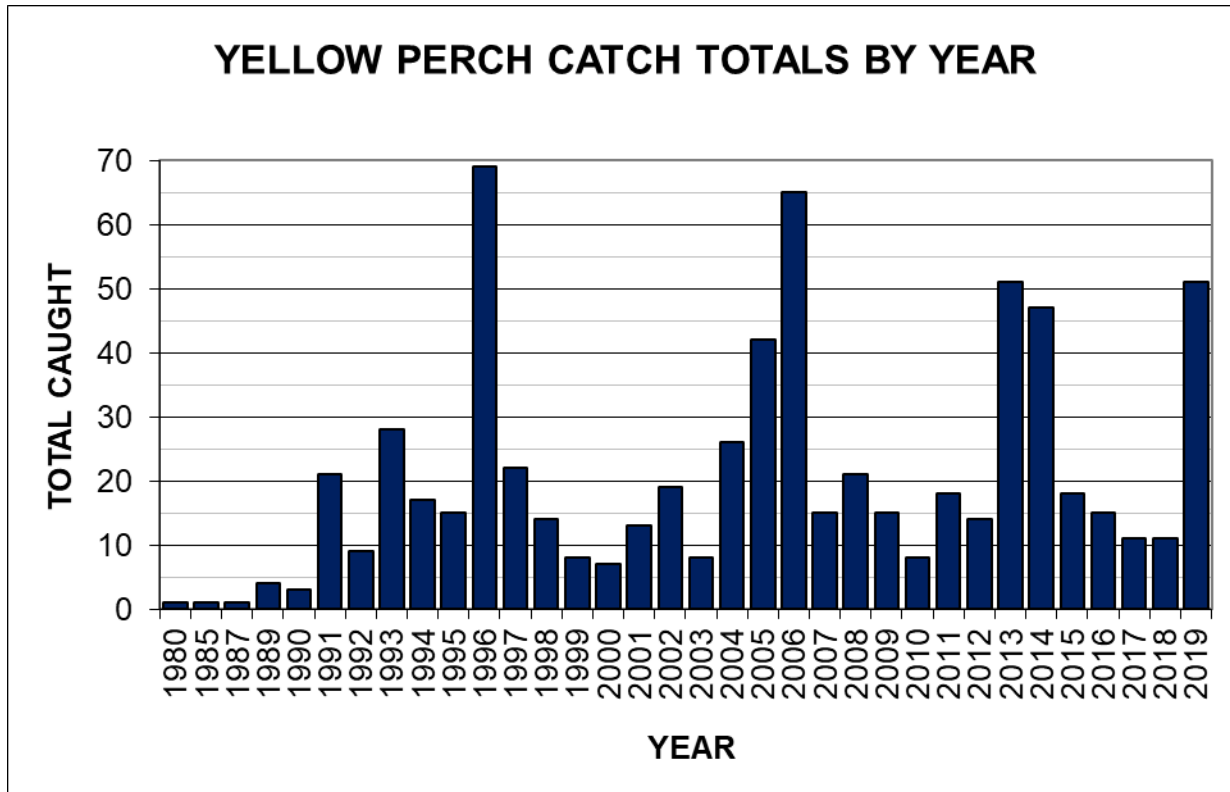
Range:

- ◆ Native to Atlantic, Arctic, Great Lakes and Mississippi River basins from Nova Scotia and Quebec west to Great Slave Lake, Northwest Territories and south to Ohio, Illinois and Nebraska; south in Atlantic drainages to Santee River, South Carolina
