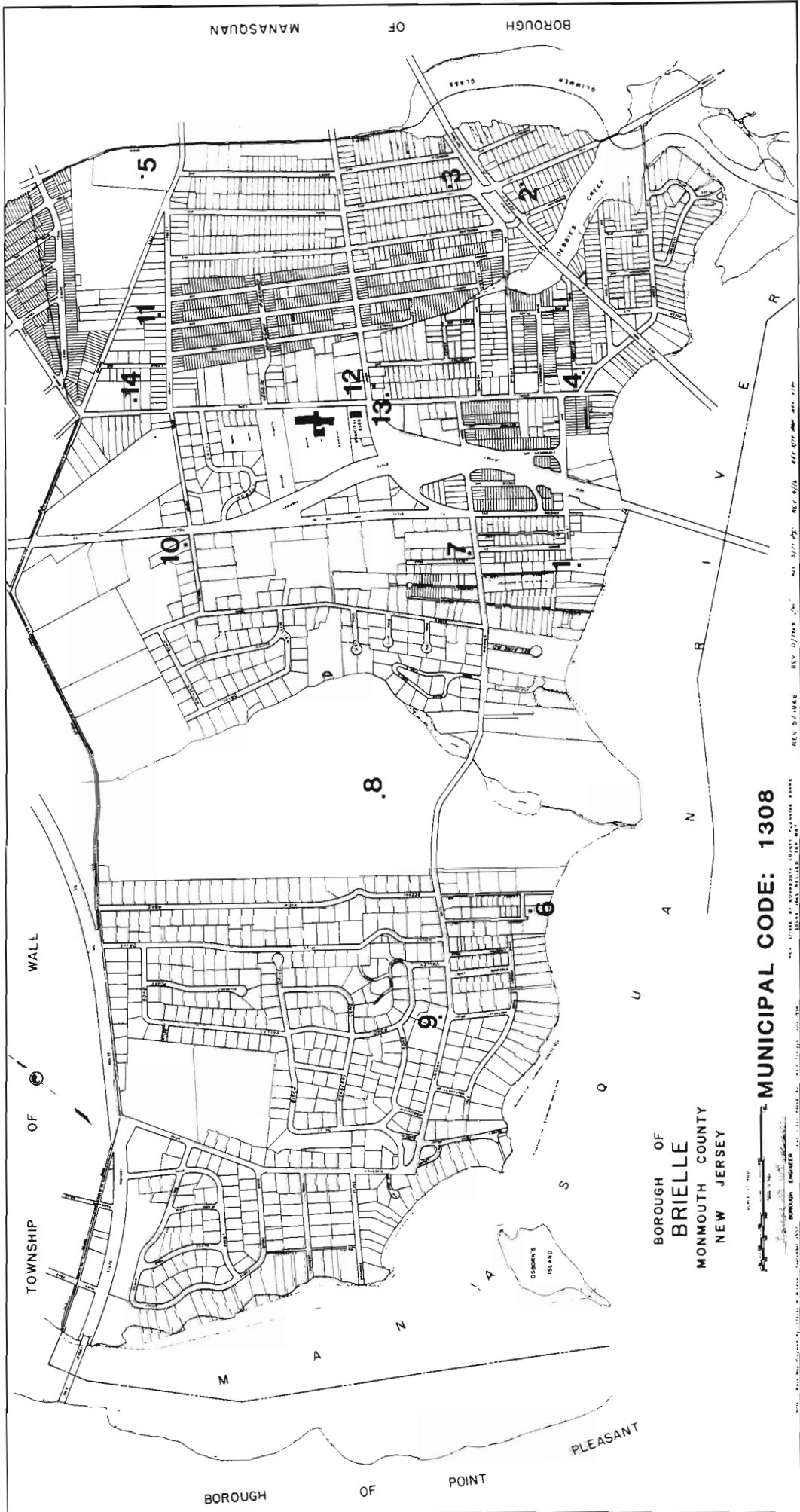

Sites which are located within eligible districts but which are also individually eligible are labeled "Y" instead of "D". The "Possible" category is limited to those properties which require additional research on construction date, quality of the interior (interiors generally were not examined), ownership history, and/or degree of alteration in order to determine eligibility.

The survey project followed federal standards for National Register eligibility which are set forth in "How to Apply the National Register Criteria for Evaluation" (National Park Service, Department of the Interior, 1982). National Register eligibility is subject to review and final approval by the Office of New Jersey Heritage and the New Jersey State Review Board of Historic Sites. Eligibility may change due to building alterations made subsequent to this survey. Since the initial field work for this project was completed during 1980-1982, determinations of eligibility on the survey forms are superceded by those on the below updated lists.

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\*\*The National Register is the official list of properties significant in American history, architecture, archeology, engineering, and culture. The National Register was established by the Historic Sites Act of 1935 and the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended. It is maintained and expanded by the National Park Service on behalf of the Secretary of the Interior. Properties listed on the National Register receive a limited form of protection and certain benefits. 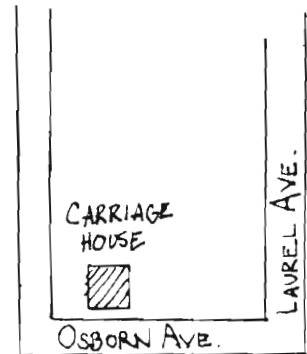

Additional Architectural Description:

The house was built in several sections, and according to the owner, portions of the house may date from as early as the 1840's, though later remodeling has obscured the precise chronology of construction. The roof has wide overhanging eaves, with a sawtooth molding in the cornice, which is repeated in the porch roof. Windows are of a variety of shapes, sizes, and sash types. Most have 2/2 sash, though there are several modern 6/6 sash windows as well. A round headed window is in the front gable and full length windows are on the first floor. The doorway is flanked by slender sidelights and surmounted by a broad two-light transom. The porch covers two sides of the house. The one-story section in the rear of the house was recently added.

The house is located on a riverfront lot, and faces south-east toward the Manasquan River. The lot is well landscaped, having a variety of scattered trees in the yard, and low shrubs around the house. A 1½ story frame carriage house (see photo) is on the other side of the street from the house, and was built in the late 19th century.

**SIGNIFICANCE:**

This is a good example of the late 19th century summer cottages built along the Manasquan River, and along the other wide tidal rivers of the county, such as the Navesink, Shrewsbury, and Shark Rivers. The house was originally constructed for summer use only, possibly by members of the Osborn Family, who owned two of the early houses on Riverview Dr. (1308-8, 1308-9) and most of the land along this section of the river. The house is well preserved and maintained and retains much of its late 19th century detailing. The 19th century carriage house across the street enhances the site, in spite of the addition of garage doors. The house appears to have been owned by H.K. Thurber in 1889.

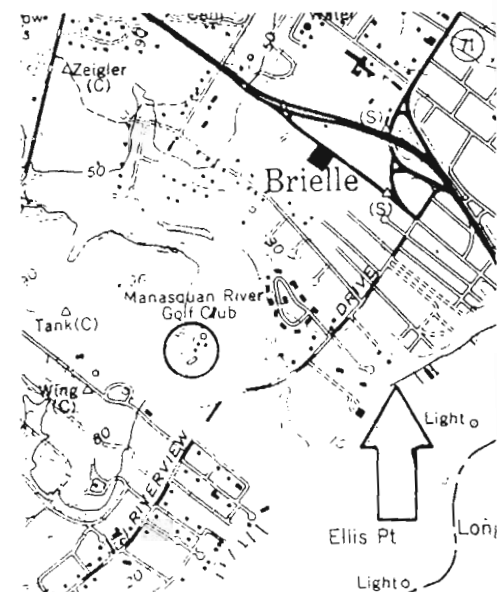
The original section of this building is a 5 bay, brick, former residence. It has a moderately pitched roof with a simple box cornice and eaves that are flush with the end walls. Windows have 6/6 sash; the central window on the front facade has 4-light vertical casements, an unusual feature. The doorway is obscured by the later additions to the house. These additions were added by the Manasquan River Golf Club in the mid-20th century. They are extensive, unsympathetic and obscure much of the original structure.

The original front facade of the house faces southeast towards the Manasquan River. The building is part of the Manasquan River Golf Course; a 140 acre lot that extends to the river. The building is set well back from Riverview Dr. on a winding road.

**SIGNIFICANCE:**

This building is significant as one of the earlier brick houses in Monmouth County. The bricks are believed to have been made in Brick Township, across the Manasquan River "Middle Bridge". The house is also important as one of several Osborn houses in the area; the Osborns were an early family in southern Monmouth County. The building has a plaque that gives a construction date of 1770, but both written and physical evidence would indicate a construction date of 1822-3. Col. Abraham Osborn (1784-1868), the original owner, was the fourth generation Osborn to own that tract of land, dating back to Samuel Osborn (1679-1754). The property continued in the family for two more generations, until the mid-20th century when it was acquired by the Golf Club. During the 19th century it was a large and extensive farm (see 1878 view on continuation sheet). An important feature of the farm, visible in the 1878 view, but no longer standing, is the hay barrack (visible between the two large barns), a structure having Dutch antecedents; it is further evidence of the mixing of Dutch and English building traditions in Monmouth County. Col. Abraham Osborn's father, Lt. Abraham Osborn (1752-1836) may have been the original owner of the house at 915 Riverview Ave. (1308-9). Col. Abraham Osborn's son S. Forman Osborn (1806-1889) built the house at 412 Sussex Ave. in Spring Lake. The summer cottage at 400 Osborne Ave. may have also been built by the Osborn's.

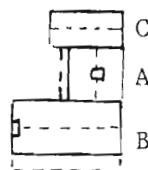

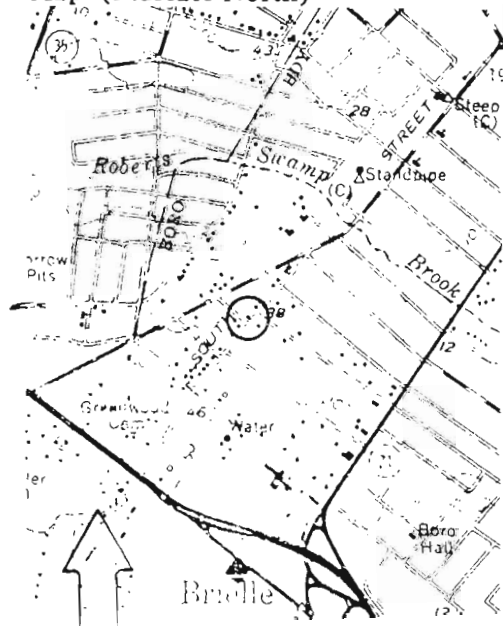
Additional Architectural Description:

The house comprises three major sections. Section A is probably the earliest, dating from the late 18th or early 19th century. It is a 1½ story cottage, typical of many found in the county, often as the kitchen wing on larger houses. It is similar in form to the Derek Longstreet House (1308-13). It is 3-bays and faces southwest, 90 degrees to the remainder of the house. The Italianate main block B dates from the third quarter of the 19th century. It has a low pitched roof with paired brackets in the eaves. Windows have 6/6 sash, the 1st floor windows on the front are full length. The double front door is surmounted by a 3-light transom. The three bay porch has arching fretwork vergeboard, and is supported by turned posts. The rear section C is oriented parallel with the main block B and is of indeterminate age.

The house is located on a long and narrow lot that extends back to Old Bridge Rd. The house faces southeast toward the road set back a short distance. A small, 1 story, frame shed/garage is in the rear of the lot.

**SIGNIFICANCE:**

This house combines two common traditional Monmouth County house forms; the 1½ story 18th century cottage, and the 3 bay, 2 story, I-house, a 19th century form. Both sections of the house appear to be well preserved, retaining integrity of form and design. The house appears to have been owned by T. Chadwick in 1851 and 1860. Capt. Benjamin Lyman, who worked in the costal trade, was the owner in 1873 and 1889.

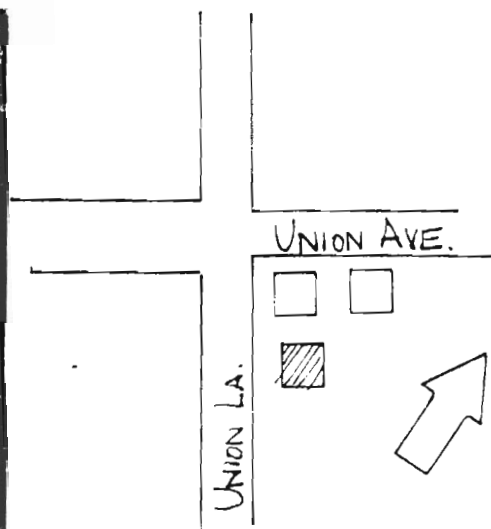
Additional Architectural Description:

This is a small, 2 story residence that is largely free of ornamentation. The simple pitched roof has eaves flush with the end walls. First floor windows have 6/6 sash, the 2nd floor window has 6 light casements. All of the windows have single leaf shutters. The doorway is flanked by half round pilasters, and has an early 20th century door. Local tradition has this building as the only one standing following the burning of the town by the British in April 1778; but physical evidence would allow a construction date as late as the 1830's.

The house faces toward the road, but is obscured from view by high boxwood hedges. The mature trees throughout the lot are the domina feature. A small frame shed is near the east corner of the house.

**SIGNIFICANCE:**

This house utilizes a form that was common in Monmouth County from the 18th century to the mid-19th century. It is unusual in it never became part of a larger house, a common building evolution pattern in the county. The building may have been built by Derek Longstreet in the third quarter of the 18th century (see description). It was owned by members of the Longstreet Family throughout the 19th century.



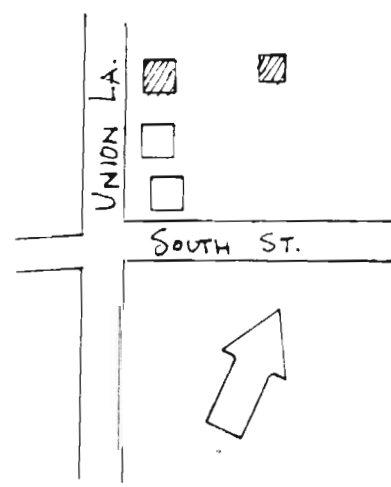

**Additional Architectural Description:**

This house was built in several sections. Sections A and B are the earliest; both probably date from before 1850, with Section A being the earlier of the two. A is a 2 bay, 1½ story structure similar to the Derek Longstreet House (1308-13) and the ell on 405 South St. (1308-11). It has been expanded by the enclosure of the porch in front of it. The roof on both sections A and B has wide eaves, probably a later alteration. Windows have 6/6 sash with the exception of the 2 light casements on the 2nd floor of section A. Section B is a full two stories and 3 bays, and has been expanded on the second floor under the cross gable. The doorway is in Section B, and has a simple surround. The full front porch is supported by squared classical columns and is partially enclosed. A "Dutch" type door is in the basement. Ships timbers were reportedly used in the construction of the house. Section C is a modern 2 story addition on a concrete foundation.

The house faces southeast, 90 degrees to the road. It is located on a irregular lot with mature yard trees, a notable feature. A small board and batten barn is in the rear of the lot, and probably dates from the late 19th century.

**SIGNIFICANCE:**

This house illustrates the use of two traditional Monmouth County house types in its 1½ and 2 story sections. The variety of subsequent additions gives it a Picturesque quality that is complemented by the mature yard trees on the lot. The original owner of the house was Capt. Shem Pearse, who occupied it as late as 1889. He was one of several ship's captains living in Brielle, or Union Landing as it was known at the time, during the 19th century.

The shed roof porch is supported by squared columns, and has latticework beneath the side eaves. The foundation is concrete, possibly over brick. The house appears to have been owned by R.W. Hance in 1889.
