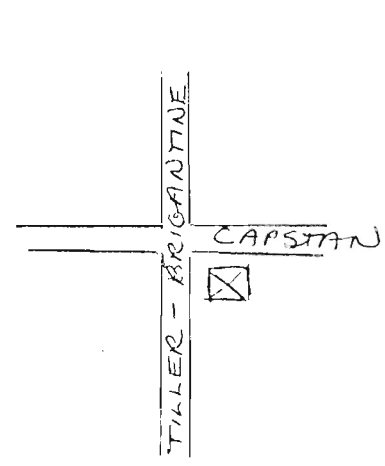
Roof/Chimneys: hipped roof with flaring eaves and exposed rafter tails / exterior brick chimney to the east

Additional Architectural Description:

The central door is flanked by highly symmetrical window groups, and opens onto a partially latticed front porch area. There is a spacious roof cupola with 9-light windows in a continuous band.

SITING, BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION, AND RELATED STRUCTURES:

The structure is located on the southeast corner of Tiller Avenue and Capstan Boulevard. It has a diagonal orientation to the corner. A garage is located to the rear of the structure, and a cast cement block wall, with large intermittent posts, is located along both the streets.

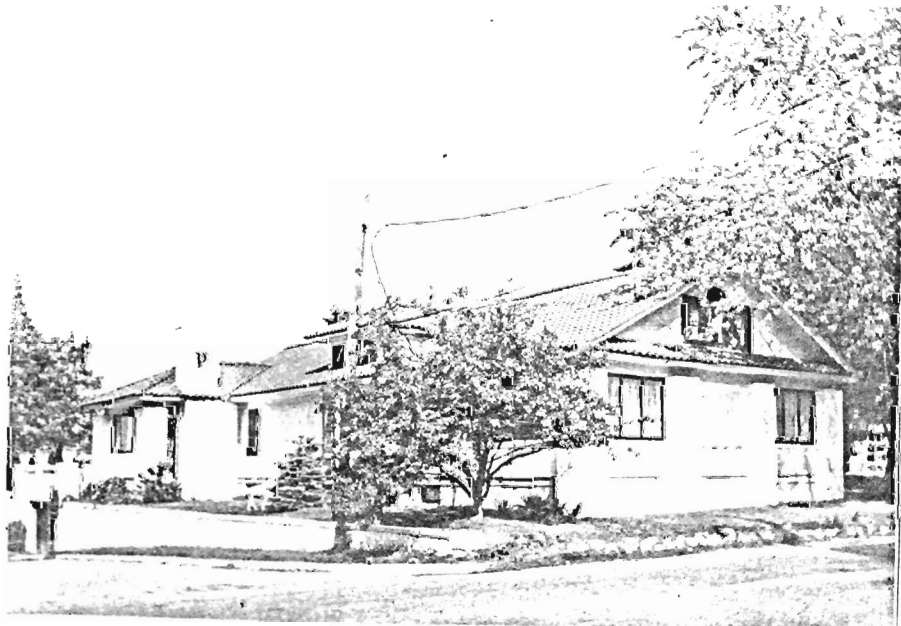

Beachwood Borough Hall / Police and Firehouse / 315 Atlantic City Boulevard

2 story, 4 bay, cast cement block, hipped roof with exposed rafter tails, 2/2 windows and 2 large industrial doors. This structure has continued to house many Borough offices.

1504-L2



601 Bayside Avenue

1½ story, 3 bay, stucco, Spanish tile gable roof with full return, vernacular bungalow residence, c.1930. Windows are 1/1 and occur in triple groups. There is a Padian attic window to the street and a pavilion element to the east with hipped roof. A rusticated wall and patio overlook the riverside.

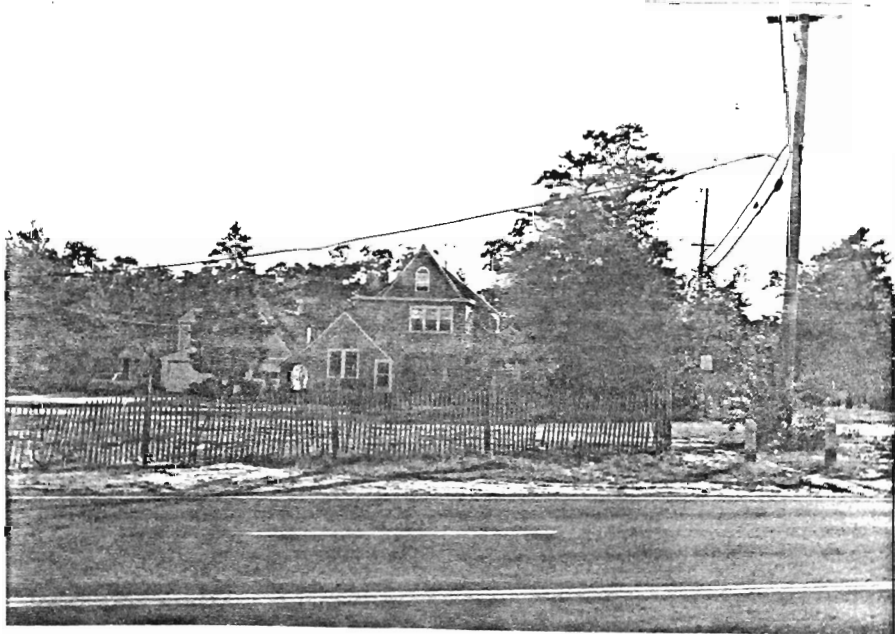

148 Beachwood Boulevard

2½ story, 5 bay, asbestos shingle siding, gable roof with exposed rafter tails, c.1920. Central entrance with door hood and shed dormer above in main element; 1/1 windows. There is a 2-story, 1 bay extension to the south with 3/1 windows and double entrance.

201 Beachwood Boulevard

2½ story, natural shingle siding, sloping gable roof parallel to street, internal screened front porch, arched attic window to the north with radiating fanlight above; triple groups of 6/1 windows throughout, early twentieth century. There is an entrance through an arcuated porte-cochere to the north; and front shed dormer with casement windows; 1 interior corbelled brick chimney.

Beachwood Library / 126 Beachwood Boulevard

1½ story, 3 bay, asbestos shingle siding with staggered butt shingle and vertical board; gable roof to street, c.1930. Central entrance with projecting shop windows and transom above; 9-light window in gable peak.
