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1 HEARING OFFICER HUMPHREYS: Good
2 evening. My name is Jerry Humphreys. I am an
3 engineer in the Bureau of Nuclear Engineering in the
4 Bureau of Nuclear Engineering within the New Jersey
5 Department of Environmental Protection. I will be
6 the Hearing Officer this evening.

7 The purpose of this hearing is to
8 receive testimony, comments, and questions regarding
9 the adequacy and effectiveness of the New Jersey
10 Radiological Emergency Response Plan for Nuclear
11 Power Plants. In order may be properly documented,
12 these proceedings are being recording by a certified
13 shorthand reporter.

14 Everyone attending this meeting is
15 asked to sign the attendance sheet before leaving.
16 The attendance sheets for these hearings are used to
17 update the Bureau of Nuclear Engineering public
18 hearing mailing list.

19 Public notice of have hearing was
20 published in the New Jersey Register on June 5th,
21 June 19th, July 3rd, and July 19th, 2017. In
22 addition, public notice was published in the South
23 Jersey Times from July 4th through July 18, 2017.
24 Copies of the public notice for the hearings were
25 mailed to all people who attended last year's

1 hearings.

2 This hearing will proceed as follows:
3 I'll provide a brief background on why we are
4 conducting this hearing. Then I will introduce the
5 Panel members and ask them to briefly describe the
6 role of their organization in nuclear emergency
7 preparedness and response. Finally, I will open the
8 hearing for comments and questions from the public.

9 The New Jersey Radiation Accident
10 Response Act requires the Department of
11 Environmental Protection, in cooperate with the New
12 Jersey Division of State Police, to conduct public
13 hearings to take comment and to address questions
14 relevant to the adequacy and effectiveness of the
15 New Jersey Radiological Emergency Response Plan for
16 Nuclear Power Plants.

17 These public hearings are held
18 annually in each of the three counties affected by
19 the plant: Ocean County for the Oyster Creek
20 Nuclear Generating Station, and Salem and Cumberland
21 Counties for the Salem Unit 1, Salem Unit 2, and
22 Hope Creek Nuclear Generating Stations. We are here
23 tonight to listen to your questions and comments on
24 New Jersey's Nuclear Emergency Response Plan.
25 Comments on more general nuclear power issues or

1 issues that relate to licensing and regulatory
2 matters at nuclear power plants are not within purview
3 of this meeting and, hence, are not appropriate and
4 will not be addressed.

5 The purpose of the plan is to
6 coordinate and implement an immediate and
7 comprehensive response at the state, county, and
8 municipal levels to a radiological emergency
9 associated with any nuclear plant affecting the
10 State of New Jersey. Copies of the plan are
11 available for public inspection at the Salem County
12 Emergency Management Office in Mannington Township,
13 the Cumberland Office of Emergency Management in
14 Bridgeton, and Ocean County Office of Emergency
15 Management in Berkeley Township, and the New Jersey
16 Office of Emergency Management in West Trenton.

17 Now I'd like to introduce the members
18 of the Panel. Mr. Allen Smith is representing the
19 New Jersey Division of State Police. Mr. Smith is
20 the Unit Head of the Radiological Emergency Response
21 Planning and technical Unit the Office of Emergency
22 Management. Mr. Patrick Mulligan is represent the
23 New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection.
24 Mr. Mulligan is the manager of the DEP's Bureau of
25 Nuclear Engineering.

1 I'll ask Mr. Smith to briefly describe
2 the role of the State Police in the plan.

3 MR. SMITH: Good evening. My name is
4 Allen Smith. I am the Unit Head for Radiologic
5 Emergency Response Planning and Technical Unit, and
6 I am representing the State Office of Emergency
7 Management within the Division of State Police.

8 Our office has the responsibility for
9 administering and implementing the Radiological
10 Emergency Response Plan for incidents at nuclear
11 power plants in New Jersey. In addition to the
12 preparation of the radiologic emergency plans, the
13 New Jersey State Police is the lead agency in
14 following the functional areas: Notification and
15 communication, command and coordination, protective
16 actions, which include evacuation, shelter-in-place,
17 monitor and prepare, access control, food, water and
18 milk control. Parallel actions also include traffic
19 control, decontamination, exposure control, mass
20 care, law enforcement, fire control, public health,
21 and reentry, return, and recovery.

22 Thank you very much.

23 HEARING OFFICER HUMPHREYS: Now I'll
24 ask Mr. Mulligan to briefly describe the role of the
25 Department of Environmental Protection in the plan.

1 MR. MULLIGAN: Thank you, Jerry.

2 Good evening. My name is Patrick
3 Mulligan. I am the Manager of the Bureau of Nuclear
4 Engineering. I will briefly discuss the role of the
5 Department of Environmental Protection in New
6 Jersey's Radiological Emergency Response Plan.

7 The New Jersey Radiological Emergency
8 Response Plan identifies all responsible state
9 agencies and outlines their specific roles in the
10 event of a nuclear emergency. The Plan includes
11 Standard Operating Procedures which contain detailed
12 instructions and guidelines used by each agency when
13 performing their specific duties. The Standard
14 Operating Procedures are reviewed and tested
15 annually through drills and exercises. The
16 procedures are then revised as necessary in order to
17 enhance emergency response.

18 Under the New Jersey Radiation
19 Accident Response Act, the Department of
20 Environmental Protection has the lead role in
21 accident assessment and control of food, water, and
22 milk following an incident. Accident assessment
23 involves two separate analyses, an engineering
24 analysis of the event at the plant as it unfolds and
25 an analysis of the amount of radiation to which the

1 public may be exposed in the event of a release.

2 Depending upon the severity of the
3 event, the Department provides Protective Action
4 Recommendations to the Governor, who will make a
5 final decision on actions to be implemented to
6 protect public health and safety. Protective Action
7 Recommendations for the public may include the
8 administration of potassium iodide, evacuation,
9 sheltering and access control within the affected,
10 or potentially affected, area.

11 The Act also specifies that the
12 Department develop and implement a comprehensive
13 monitoring strategy that includes the daily
14 monitoring of levels of radioactivity in the
15 environment. The Department provides public health,
16 safety, and technical guidance with respect to the
17 preparation and implementation of the Plan. The
18 Department's final responsibility under the Act is
19 to conduct, in cooperation with the State Police,
20 public hearings annually in each designated county
21 to determine the adequacy and effectiveness of the
22 plan.

23 Members of my staff are here from
24 Department of Environmental Protection are Mr. Atul
25 Vaid from Emergency Preparedness Section, Mr. Elliot

1 Rosenfeld from the Engineering Section, and a
2 nuclear engineer from the Environmental Monitoring
3 Section, Jay Voulitois, and finally just walking in
4 from the Emergency Preparedness Section is Sahar
5 Azmat.

6 Thank you.

7 HEARING OFFICER HUMPHREYS: We'll now
8 proceed with the public questions and comments.
9 Those individuals who wish to speak should complete
10 the speaker registration card and hand it to one of
11 the staff. I will call the speakers' names in the
12 same order as I receive the registration cards.
13 Please be certain to clearly print your name and
14 address on the registration card so that we may
15 contact you if we need to respond to your comments
16 and questions more fully in writing. When I call
17 your name, come forward to the microphone, face the
18 panel, and make yourself comfortable. Before you
19 begin your comments, please state and spell your
20 name for the reporter. Speakers will be limited to
21 five minutes each. If time still remains after
22 everyone has had a chance to speak, I will invite
23 additional comments from those individuals who have
24 already spoken. In fairness to the speaker and in
25 order that we all can make the best use of this

1 time, I ask the cooperation of the audience in
2 refraining from calling out. Comments from the
3 audience will only delay the proceedings and will
4 disrupt our ability to hear and accurately record
5 the speaker statement.

6 Again, I'd like to emphasize that we
7 are here tonight to listen to your questions and
8 comments on New Jersey's Nuclear Emergency Response
9 Plan. Comments on more general nuclear power issues
10 or issues that relate to licensing and regulatory
11 matters at nuclear power plants are not within the
12 purview of this meeting and, hence, are not
13 appropriate and will not be addressed.

14 I don't see anyone from the public and
15 we don't have any questions, so what I'd like to do
16 is take a recess go off the record until 6:30 and
17 then reconvene just in case there are people who are
18 trying to get here.

19 Does anyone here have questions. No
20 questions.

21 (Recess taken.)

22 HEARING OFFICER HUMPHREYS: It's now
23 6:30, so we will reconvene the hearing.

24 No additional people from public have
25 come. So once again, I'll ask are there any

1 questions from the people who are here?

2 MR. BRADLEY: A statement?

3 HEARING OFFICER HUMPHREYS: Sure.

4 MR. BRADLEY: My wife is going to kill
5 me. She's the court stenographer.

6 My name is Kenneth J. Bradley. I'm a
7 school board member somewhere in New Jersey; I won't
8 mention the name. I'm a retired law enforcement
9 officer.

10 I just want to applaud you and the
11 Committee that your Standard Operating Procedures
12 and how you conduct the meeting well done. It was
13 very informative. And I ask you to continue to keep
14 our county, our state safe. And I applaud you for
15 your efforts.

16 HEARING OFFICER HUMPHREYS: Thank you,
17 sir.

18 If there are no other comments or
19 questions, we'll adjourn the hearing.

20 Thank you for coming.
