Unregulated Heating Oil Tank Program



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New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection

Program Scope

- Underground storage tanks containing heating oil for on-site consumption in a residential building, or Tanks with a capacity of 2,000 gallons or less for on-site consumption in a nonresidential building
- Above ground storage tanks containing oil for on-site consumption in a residential building, or Tanks with a capacity of 2,000 gallons or less for on-site consumption in a nonresidential building

Program Scope

- Utilizes the Certification Program under The Underground Storage of Hazardous Substances Act, and LSRPs as Environmental professionals to perform remediation activities
- Mandatory time frames DO NOT apply
- New UHOT Rules are under development
- DEP will issue NFA letters whether remediation is conducted by a subsurface evaluator or LSRP

Program Objectives

- Allow Certified Subsurface Evaluators to investigate/remediate low-risk unregulated heating oil tank cases with limited DEP oversight
- Accelerate the DEP review process
- Allow real estate transactions to proceed more quickly
- Allow DEP case managers to focus on high risk sites
- Improve the environmental consulting profession

NJDEP Review

To obtain an NFA, the following shall be submitted to DEP when remediation is complete:

- 1. A copy of all appropriate Remediation Documents prepared in accordance with the reporting requirements contained in N.J.A.C. 7:26E;
- 2. A completed Unregulated Heating Oil Tank Program Questionnaire;
- 3. A "Certification Statement," signed by the remediating party and the pre-qualified environmental professional; and
- 4. A non-refundable certified check for \$400

Audits

- Ensure compliance with DEP regulations and standards
- Triggered by anomalies in the questionnaire, or randomly, at DEP's discretion
- Desk Audits: review of remediation documents
- Field Audits: on-site inspections, independent sampling and analysis

UHOT Rule Adoption Process

- N.J.A.C. 7:26F, Unique set of rules that will only apply to unregulated heating oil tanks.
- Anticipated dates for Rule:
 - Proposal August 2011
 - Adoption May 2012
- New rules that will remain prescriptive
 - Ensure consistency and efficiency
 - Enable environmental professionals to perform better work
 - Protect homeowners
- Adopt enforcement criteria for Environmental Professionals performing remediation activities for UHOTs

Consumer Protection

N.J.A.C. 7:14B-16.10 - Professional Business Practices

Written contract with the client containing:


- Clear and detailed descriptions of the work activities;
- Lists of all materials, equipment, tools and other incidentals necessary;
- Lists of the number and types of personnel necessary
- The maximum contract price that cannot be exceeded without written amendments to the contract;
- Estimated time frames for the completion of the work activities listed in the contract.

Consumer Protection

DEP's Enforcement of Certification Program

- Building permit obtained prior to January 10, 2010 – No requirement for certification
- Building permit obtained on/or after to January 10, 2010 – Contractor must be certified in the category of work being performed

- Will not be reviewed or processed at this time due to insufficient funds
- Will be date stamped and held
- Includes home heating oil tanks

Applications submitted before May 3, 2011:

 New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) reviewed, and <u>have been</u>
 Transmitted to the New Jersey Economic Development Authority (NJEDA)

Projected to be funded sometime after July 2011.

The Petroleum Underground Storage Tank Remediation, Upgrade And Closure Fund

Applications submitted before May 3, 2011:

 Currently under New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) review; and have <u>not yet</u> been transmitted to the New Jersey Economic Development Authority (NJEDA)

Projected to be funded sometime after July 2012.

The Petroleum Underground Storage Tank Remediation, Upgrade And Closure Fund

- Applications received on or after May 3, 2011 will not be funded until at least sometime after July of 2014.
- Supplemental Funding Requests will continue to be accepted, reviewed and processed provided sufficient funding is available.
- Cases where the discharge poses a threat to a drinking water source, to human health, or to a sensitive or significant ecological area will be prioritized above all others
