


Actionable projects meet *Eligibility Screening*

- County must have an approved and adopted All Hazard Mitigation Plan.
- Municipality/applicant must have participated and adopted the approved county plan.
- Requested project funding must have been identified as a mitigation activity in the county plan
- Project must meet the FEMA, State, and local municipal strategies

Participation and Adoption

- How does FEMA define participation?
 - Go beyond minimal requirements
 - Evaluate Risk, Assess Capabilities, Develop Strategies
 - Municipal Authorities no longer covered by their municipality
- Do you have your adoption resolution and FEMA approval memo?
- Did you identify specific mitigation actions that address hazards in your community?



Hazard Mitigation Project Ranking / Prioritization

- Does it address hazards and problem statements identified in the County Plan?
- Does it support FEMA priorities?
 - Climate Change Adaptation
 - Vulnerable Populations and Underserved Communities


Does your project fit?


Climate Change Adaptation

- All HMPs must address Climate Change Adaptation
- Your mitigation strategy and your proposed project should discuss how they will mitigate the effects of climate change
- Environmental Systems Protection will always rank higher than structural projects

 - Data available by **Census Tract** and County Crosswalk to **zip codes** (not supported by CDC)






Develop SOW and identify/ pursue funding for next Plan **Update**

PA Requirement....not 44 CFR

- Standard operating procedures for hazard mitigation planning in PA
- Captures FEMA requirements
- Clarifies and combines existing guidance

Plan Adoption, Maintenance, and Implementation

Plan Adoption

You must adopt the approved HMP to be eligible for certain kinds of nonemergency assistance from FEMA:

- 1. Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) project grant
- HMGP Post Fire
- 3. BRIC project grant
- 4. FMA project grant
- 5. Rehabilitation of High Hazard Potential Dams (HHPD)



Plan Adoption, Maintenance, and Implementation

Plan Integration and Maintenance

Integrate plan data, goals, and actions into other planning mechanisms

- These mechanisms can include building codes and land use ordinances
- Progress in aligning other planning mechanisms with the hazard mitigation plan should be documented.

Conduct annual plan reviews to connect with project champions and incorporate new risk data and project opportunities





Funding Opportunities

Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC)

- \$1.0 billion of funding is available
- FY 2023 priorities include:
 - Incentivize natural hazard risk reduction activities that mitigate risk to public infrastructure
 - Incorporate nature-based solutions including those designed to reduce carbon emissions
 - Enhance climate resilience and adaptation
 - Promote equity and prioritize disadvantaged communities as referenced in Executive Order (EO) 14008
 - Increase funding to applicants that facilitate the adoption and enforcement of the latest published editions of building codes





Funding Opportunities

Flood Mitigation Assistance (FMA)

- \$800 million of funding is available
- Projects must reduce flood risk to structures insured by the NFIP
- FY 2023 priorities include:
 - Mitigate risk to public infrastructure and disadvantaged communities
 - Incorporated nature-based solutions
 - Enhance climate resilience
 - Address Repetitive Loss and Severe Repetitive Loss properties






