

What Is Comprehensive Cancer Control?

The purpose of comprehensive cancer control is to develop an integrated and coordinated approach to reduce the incidence, morbidity, and mortality of cancer through prevention, early detection, treatment, rehabilitation, and palliation.

It is the mission of the Task Force on Cancer Prevention, Early Detection and Treatment in NJ to develop, recommend, advocate, and promote an integrated, collaborative, and multi-disciplinary approach to reducing the incidence, illness, and death from cancer. This is addressed through a culturally-sensitive plan, the NJ Comprehensive Cancer Control Plan (NJ-CCCP), which reflects prevention, early detection, treatment, rehabilitation, palliation, and quality of life issues and embraces all of the citizens of New Jersey. Coalition building, partnerships, and education are essential to achieving this mission.

The NJ-CCCP addresses 7 priority cancers: breast, colorectal, gynecologic, lung, melanoma, oral, and prostate; 5 overarching issues: palliation, childhood cancer, access and resources, advocacy, and nutrition and physical activity; and 3 future issues: implementation, emerging trends, and evaluation.

What Can I Find At www.njcancer.gov?

Resources for cancer prevention, early detection, and treatment are now available with just the click of a mouse, thanks to the New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services' (NJDHSS) Office of Cancer Control and Prevention (OCCP) and the Task Force on Cancer Prevention, Early Detection and Treatment in New Jersey. Visitors to the site can search for hospitals, hospices, mammography centers, NJCEED lead agencies, Centers for Primary Health Care, and County Cancer Coalitions. Nutrition and Physical Activity programs will soon be available, as well as cancer support groups and other cancer resources.


Powered by Google Maps, the site provides visitors with detailed maps and driving directions to and from facilities, as well as links to individual facilities' web sites.


How Do I Use www.njcancer.gov?

Using www.njcancer.gov is as easy as clicking your mouse. Simply select the type of search you would like to make. You can search by County and Type of resource, by City and Type of resource, or by the name of the facility.

Next, enter your search criteria and click the *Start Search* button. A list of facilities matching your criteria will be generated by www.njcancer.gov. Scroll down to view them all. To view the resources on a map, select the facilities you would like to view by clicking on the boxes to the right. Then click the *View Map* button. Click on any icon on the map to view details about that resource. You can also get directions to and from the facility by clicking on an icon.

What Is NJCEED?

NJCEED stands for New Jersey Cancer Education and Early Detection. The program provides free and low-cost outreach, education and screening services for breast, cervical, colorectal and prostate cancers. Persons eligible for these services must be at or below 250% of the federal poverty level. There are 25 NJCEED lead agencies throughout New Jersey. What Is A CPHC?

CPHC stands for Center for Primary Health Care. New Jersey's CPHCs offer a wide range of health care services for the entire family. You don't need health insurance to get care at a center. CPHCs serve the uninsured and underinsured, as well as patients with Medicaid, Medicare and private insurance. If you're uninsured, your bill will be based on your ability to pay. No one is ever turned away for lack of ability to pay. Visit www.njcancer.gov to find the CPHC nearest you.

What Is A County Cancer Coalition?

The OCCP funds a Cancer Coalition in each of New Jersey's 21 counties. Each Coalition is charged with implementing the NJ Comprehensive Cancer Control Plan at the local level. Each coalition is made up of health care professionals, health educators, cancer survivors, advocates, and other interested community members.
