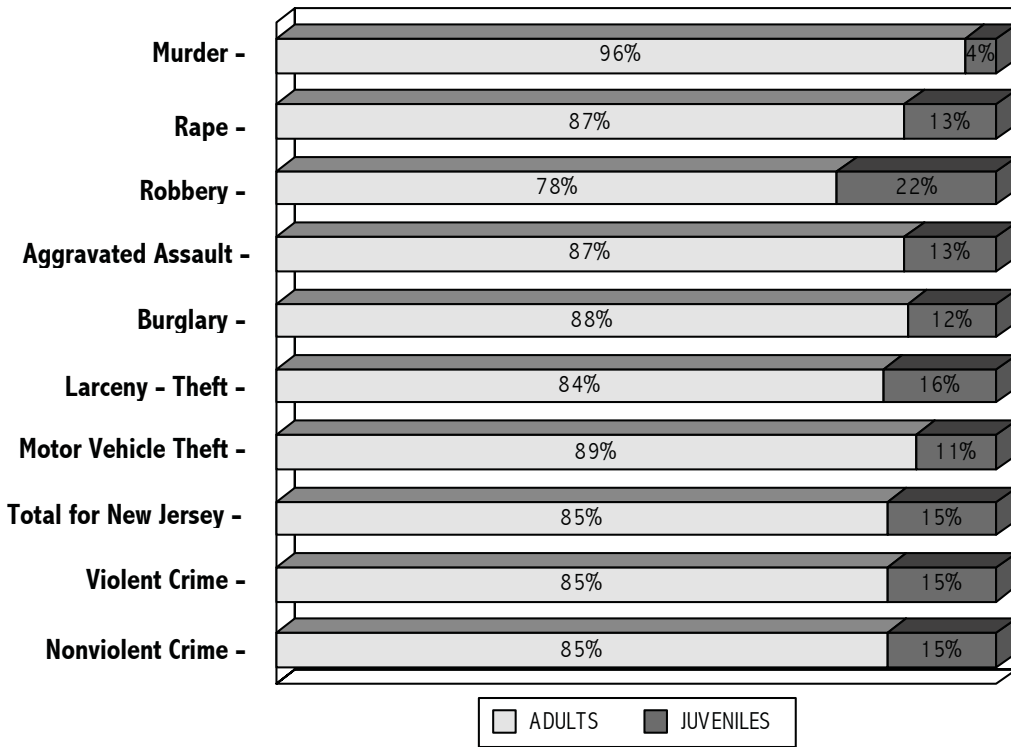

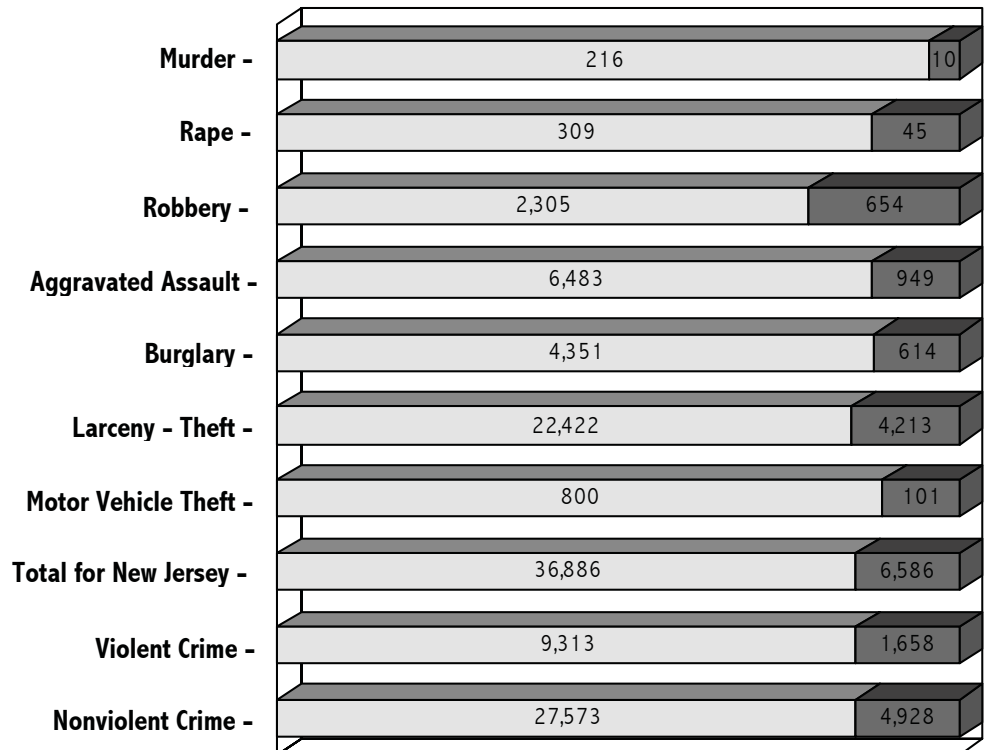

# STATEWIDE CRIME SUMMARY - 2010

## CRIME INDEX - VOLUME/RATE

- There were 210,817 Index offenses in 2010, a 1 percent increase compared to 2009.
- The crime rate of the state is 24 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants, an increase of less than one-half of one percent compared to 2009.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- August with 21,422 offenses reported, recorded the highest incidence of Crime Index offenses while February was the lowest with 11,805 offenses.
- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$354.8 million in 2010, an increase of 2 percent from 2009.
- Value of property recovered was \$92.1 million, resulting in a recovery rate of 26 percent.
- Stolen motor vehicles accounted for 39 percent of stolen property and 85 percent of the recovered property value.

## CRIME INDEX ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 46,678 persons were arrested for Index offenses, which represents a 4 percent decrease compared to 2009.
- Adult Index arrests decreased 1 percent and juvenile Index arrests decreased 15 percent.
- Crime Index arrests accounted for 13 percent of the total arrests in 2010.
- Males accounted for 67 percent of the Crime Index arrests and females accounted for 33 percent.
- Sixty percent of the Index arrests were white, 39 percent were black and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 19 percent of the arrests for Index offenses.
- Police cleared 21 percent of the Index offenses and juveniles accounted for 15 percent of those clearances.

## Violent Crime Summary

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 27,174 violent crimes reported in 2010, an increase of less than one-half of one percent compared to the violent crimes reported in 2009.
- Violent crimes accounted for 13 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The violent crime rate remained unchanged in 2010.

### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- The highest number of violent crimes were reported in July with 2,645 offenses while the lowest number was reported in February with 1,624 offenses.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of violent crime was \$13.6 million in 2010 an increase of 7 percent from 2009.

### **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- There were 12,877 violent crime arrests, a decrease of 7 percent compared to 2009.
- Violent crime arrests accounted for 28 percent of the Index arrests and 4 percent of the total arrests during the year.
- Adult arrests for violent crime decreased 4 percent and juvenile arrests decreased 17 percent.
- Adults accounted for 82 percent of the violent crime arrests while the remaining 18 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 81 percent of the Crime Index arrests and females accounted for 19 percent.
- Forty-eight percent of those arrests were white, 51 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 23 percent of the arrests for violent crimes.
- Forty percent of violent crimes were cleared and juveniles accounted for 15 percent of those clearances.

## **NONVIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY**

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft.

### **VOLUME/RATE/TREND**

- There were 183,643 nonviolent crimes reported in 2010, a 2 percent increase compared to nonviolent crimes reported in 2009.
- Nonviolent crimes accounted for 87 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The nonviolent crime rate experienced an insignificant change (20.9 victims for every 1,000 inhabitants in 2010).

### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- The highest number of nonviolent crimes were reported in August with 18,860 offenses while the lowest number was reported in February with 10,181 offenses.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of nonviolent crime was \$341.3 million in 2010 an increase of 2 percent from 2009.

### **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- There were 33,801 nonviolent crime arrests, a decrease of 3 percent when compared to 2009.
- Nonviolent crime arrests accounted for 72 percent of the Index arrests and 9 percent of the total arrests during the year.
- Juveniles were responsible for 20 percent of the nonviolent crime arrests and adults 80 percent.
- Adult arrests for nonviolent crimes increased 1 percent and juvenile arrests decreased 15 percent.

- Males represented 62 percent and females 38 percent of persons arrested for nonviolent crime.
- Sixty-four percent of all persons arrested for nonviolent crimes were white, 34 percent were black and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests for nonviolent crimes.
- Eighteen percent of all nonviolent crimes reported were cleared in 2010, and juveniles accounted for 15 percent of those clearances.

## **TOTAL ARREST SUMMARY**

- There were 364,211 persons arrested in 2010, which represents a 8 percent decrease compared to 2009.
- The arrest rate for 2010 decreased 8.9 percent with 41.9 persons arrested per every 1,000 inhabitants.
- Adult arrests decreased 7 percent to 323,509 and juvenile arrests decreased 17 percent to 40,702 in 2010.
- Adults accounted for 89 percent and juveniles 11 percent of the total state arrests.
- Persons under 21 years of age accounted for 24 percent of the total state arrests.
- Males accounted for 75 percent and females 25 percent of the total persons arrested during the year.
- Fifty-eight percent of total persons arrested in 2010 were white, 40 percent were black and 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests.

## **POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED SUMMARY**

- In 2010, no police officers were feloniously killed in the line of duty.
- In 2010, New Jersey reported 2,479 police officers assaulted in the line of duty.

# CRIME IN NEW JERSEY, UNITED STATES AND THE NORTHEAST REGION

- Violent crime in New Jersey and the Northeast Region remained virtually unchanged compared to the previous year, while the violent crime in the United States decreased by 6 percent overall.
- Nonviolent crime in New Jersey increased 2 percent, while the Northeast Region remained virtually unchanged compared to the previous year. Nonviolent crime in the United States decreased 3 percent when compared to the 2009 figure.

# MURDER

## Definition:

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is included. This Index offense is counted by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court, jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Attempts to kill, are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, negligent manslaughters, and justifiable homicides are not counted, nor reflected in the murder classification.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 372 murders reported to law enforcement agencies of the state in 2010, a 16 percent increase compared to the 320 murders reported in 2009.
- Murders accounted for 0.18 percent of the reported index offenses, and 1 percent of the violent crime.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The age group of 20-24 accounted for 19 percent of all murder victims.
- Firearms were used in 67 percent of the murders, knives or cutting instruments in 14 percent, physical force in 8 percent, and blunt objects in 5 percent.
- Twenty-five percent of the offenders were friends or acquaintances of the victim, while 16 percent were strangers, and 4 percent were relatives.
- Felony murders accounted for 21 percent of all murder circumstances. Robbery was the motive in 52 percent of the 77 felony murders.
- Sixty-six murders were recorded on Saturday for the high, while Friday was the lowest, with 37.
- June recorded the highest number of murders 44, while March recorded the lowest 19.
- Fifty percent of the murders occurred on highways or streets, 17 percent in single family dwellings, and 10 percent in multi-family apartment dwellings.
- Thirty-eight domestic violence murders were recorded in 2010.
- Drug-related and/or gang related circumstances accounted for 9 percent (32) of all murders.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 259 persons were arrested for murder in 2010, a 13 percent increase compared to 2009.
- Adult murder arrests increased 16 percent (from 201 to 234) while juvenile arrests decreased 11 percent (from 28 to 25).
- Sixty-eight percent of persons arrested for murder were black and 32 percent were white.
- Hispanics accounted for 20 percent of the arrests.

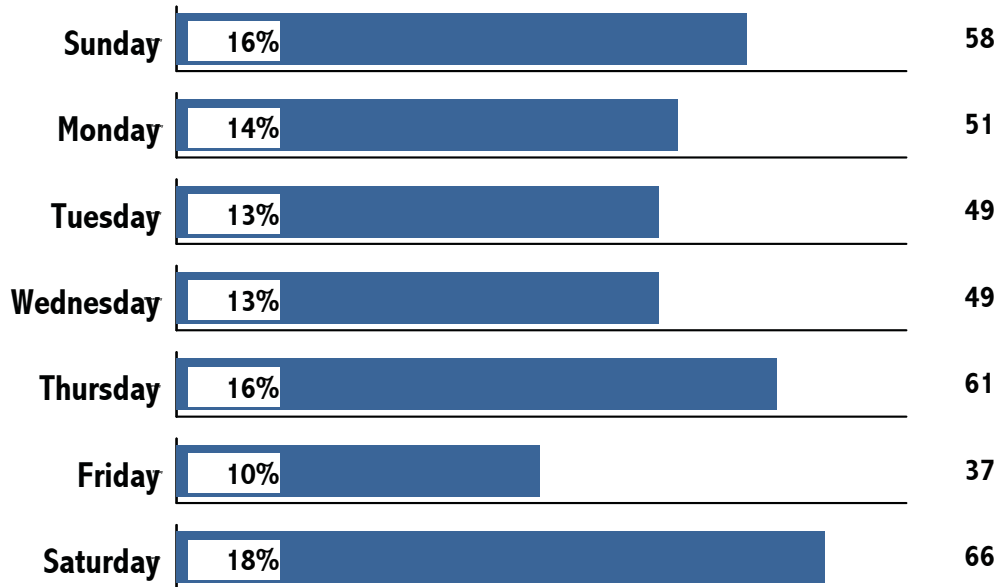
- Sixty-two percent of the murders were cleared in 2010 (229 out of 371). Juveniles accounted for 4 percent of those cases cleared.
- Males accounted for 92 percent and females 8 percent of those arrested for murder.

## MURDER BY DAY OF WEEK



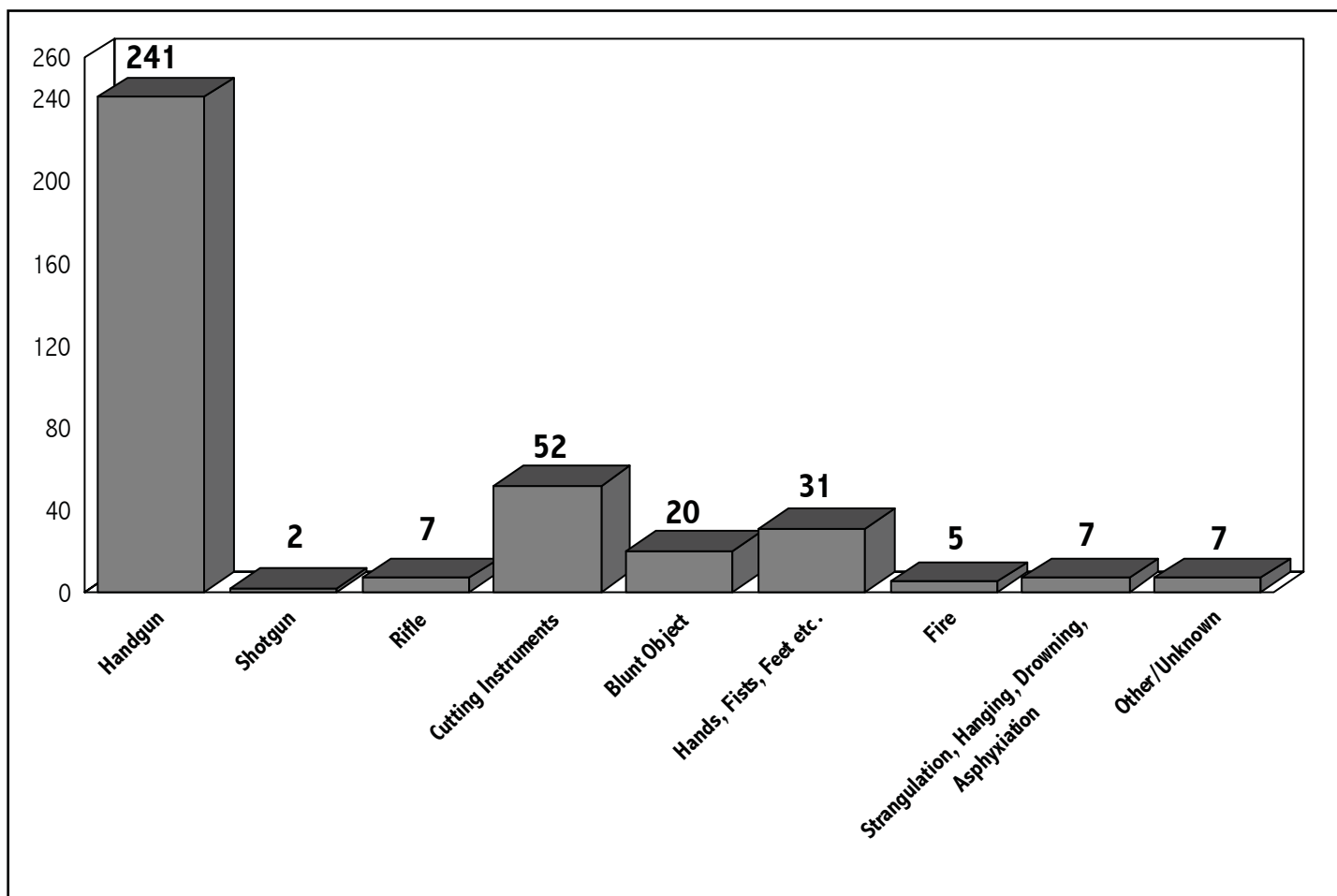

# MURDER DISTRIBUTION BY TYPE OF WEAPON - 2010

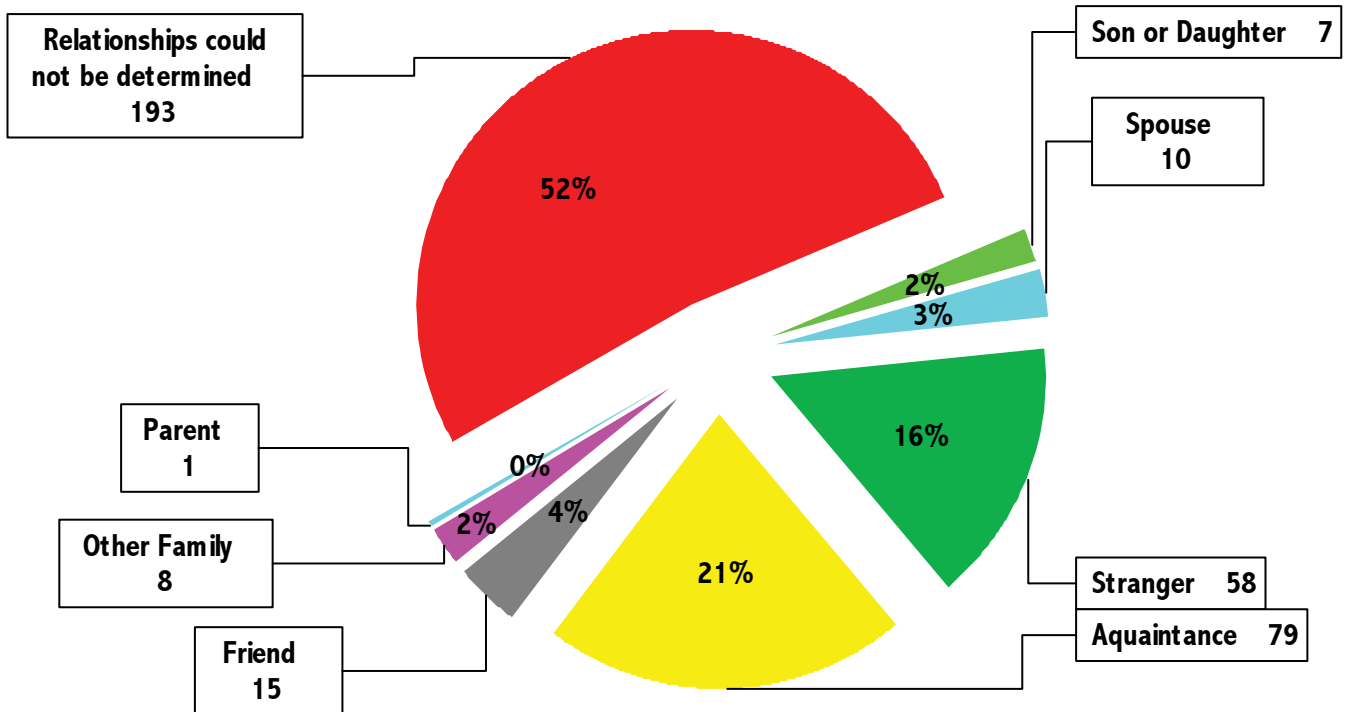

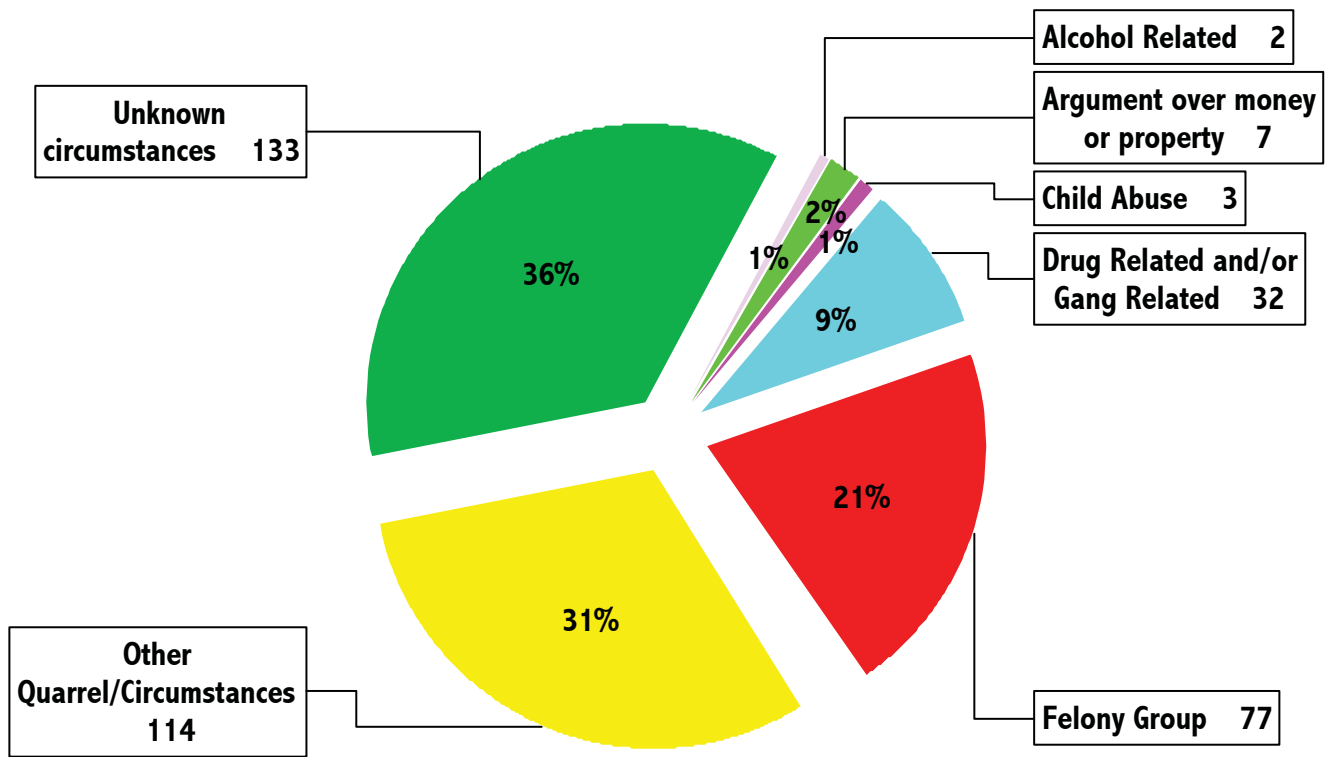


# RELATIONSHIP OF MURDER VICTIMS TO OFFENDER

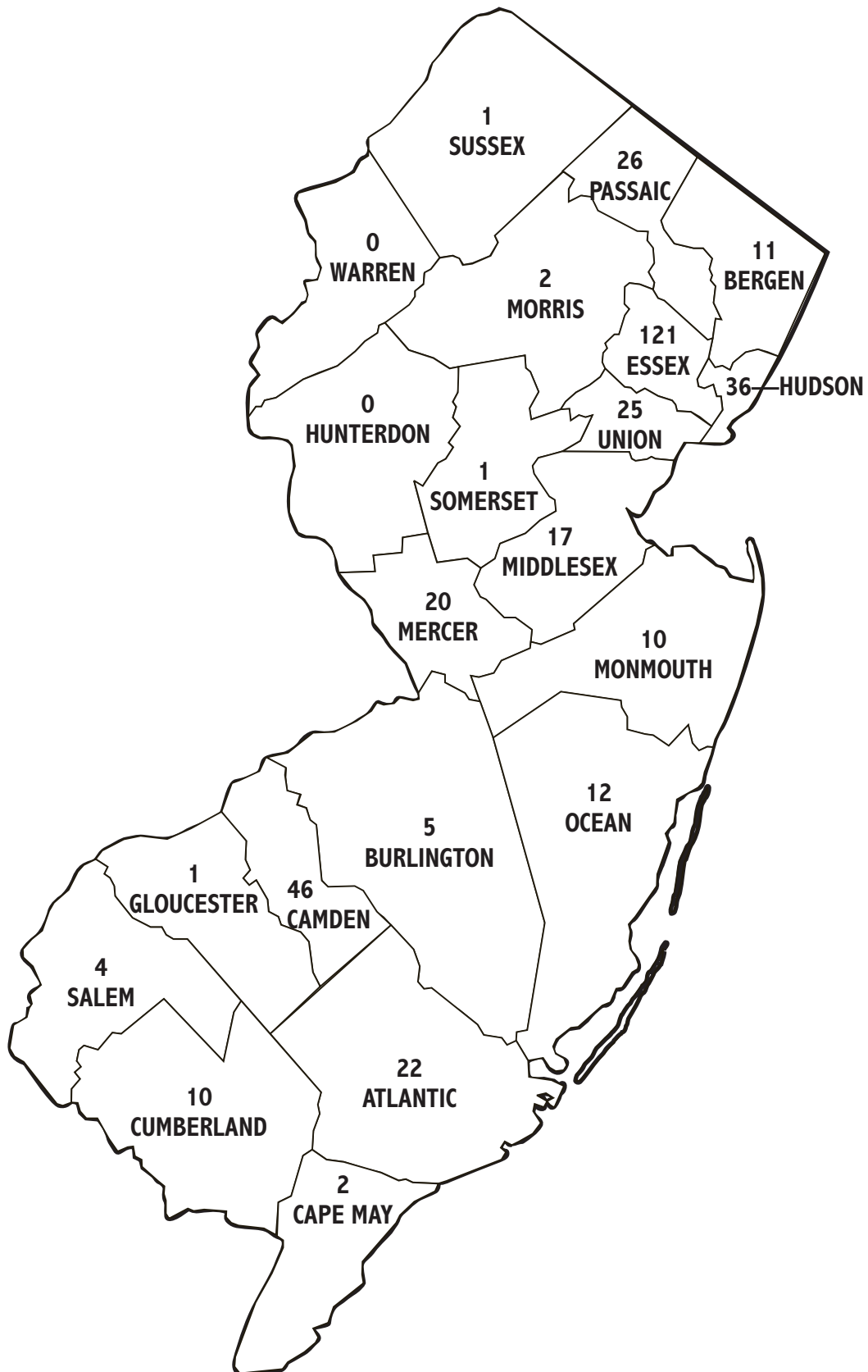
# MURDER CIRCUMSTANCES

# RAPE

## Definition

Rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will. All assaults and attempts to rape are counted, but carnal abuse, rape without force (statutory rape) and other sex offenses are not included.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 985 reported rapes in 2010, a 5 percent decrease compared to the 1,041 in 2009.
- Rape accounted for an increase of less than one-half of one percent of the total Crime Index and 4 percent of all violent crimes.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Ninety-three percent of the rapes were forcible, the remaining 7 percent were attempts to rape.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of Rape amounted to \$25,573.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 326 persons were arrested during 2010, a 11 percent decrease compared to 2009.
- Adult rape arrests decreased 12 percent, and juvenile arrests decreased 4 percent.
- Fifty-two percent of the arrested perpetrators were white, 46 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 30 percent of the arrests.
- Thirty-one percent of all persons arrested for rape were between 25 and 39.
- Thirty-six percent of rape cases were cleared in 2010. Juveniles accounted for 13 percent of those cases cleared.

# ROBBERY

## Definition

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 11,859 robbery offenses in 2010, an increase of 2 percent compared to 2009.
- Robbery accounted for 6 percent of the total Crime Index and 44 percent of all violent crimes.
- The robbery rate was 1.3 victims per 1,000 population.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Highway robberies accounted for 65 percent of all reported robberies.
- Convenience store robberies increased 18 percent, while highway robberies increased 5 percent.
- The total value of property stolen during robberies amounted to \$13,450,834.

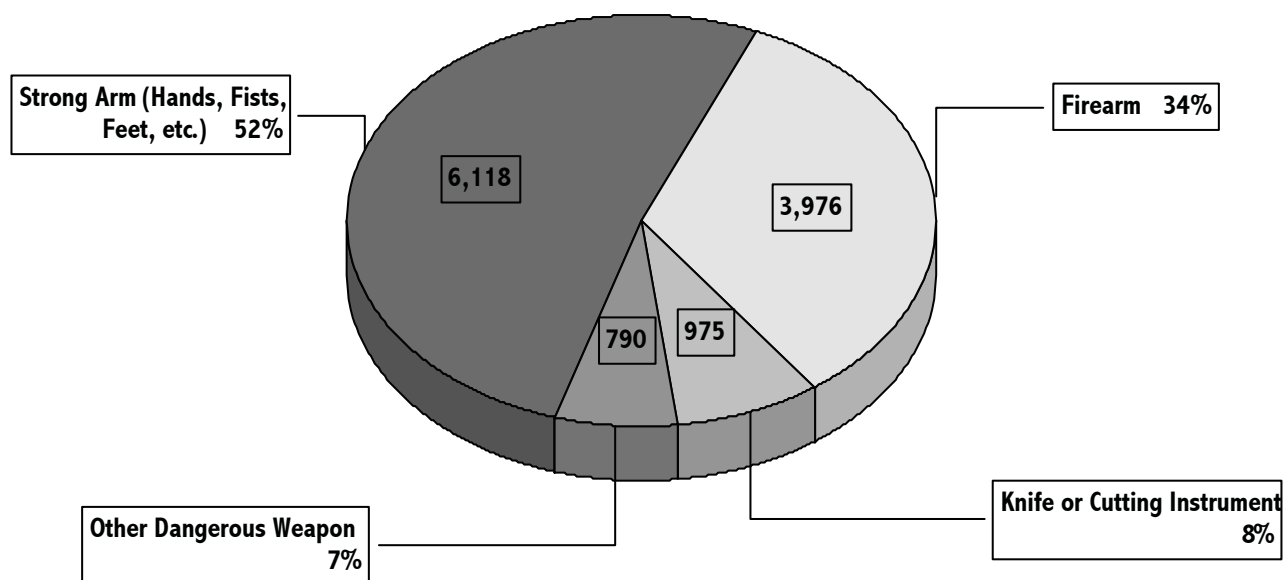
## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 3,875 persons were arrested for robbery in 2010, a 12 percent decrease compared to 2009.
- Adult robbery arrests decreased 7 percent and juvenile robbery arrests decreased 25 percent.
- Males accounted for 88 percent and females 12 percent of the robbery arrests during 2010.
- Sixty-three percent of all persons arrested for robbery were black, 36 percent were white, and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 20 percent of the robbery arrests.
- Twenty-five percent of robbery cases were cleared and juveniles accounted for 22 percent of those clearances.

# CARJACKING HIGHLIGHTS

Highlights of carjacking offense statistics for 2010 are listed below:

- There were 359 carjacking offenses reported to the police; which involved 405 victims, including passengers.
- Carjackings increased 52% when comparing 2010 to 2009 reported offenses.
- Sixteen of the 566 municipalities in New Jersey reported carjackings.
- Firearms were involved in 75% (271) of all carjackings. Three percent (9) of the firearms used were assault firearms. Shootings were involved in 1 percent (5) of all carjackings.
- New Jersey registered vehicles represented 88% (317) of all carjackings. BMW, with 11% (40), was the most frequently carjacked vehicle make, while the most frequently targeted vehicle year was 2007 with 9% (34).
- Seventy-three percent (262) of all carjacked vehicles were recovered. The average value of a carjacked motor vehicle was \$10,725.
- Carjackings occurred in a residential area 84% (303) of the time. The hours of darkness (6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.) accounted for 77% (277) of all carjackings.
- Thirteen percent (47) of all carjackings were witnessed.
- The most frequent victim age group was 30-34, which accounted for 18% (73) of the victim total (405). Seventy-one percent (286) of all victims were male. Sixty percent (241) of all victims were black.
- The total number of offenders was 775. Insufficient analysis information was supplied on 44 % (342) of the offenders. Of all known offenders (433), 20-24 was the most frequent offender age group and accounted for 65% (283). Ninety-nine percent (427) of all known offenders were male. Ninety-four percent (405) of all known offenders were black.
- Juveniles accounted for 33% (8) of the total arrests for carjacking (24), while adults accounted for 67% (16).
- December had the highest number of offenses with 66, accounting for 18% of all carjacking offenses.
- Saturday recorded the highest number of offenses, accounting for 23% (84) of all carjackings.
- Region I, which consists of Essex, Hudson, and Union counties, accounted for 88% (317) of all carjackings.
- One murder was reported in 2010 as a result of carjacking.
- Five percent (18) of all carjackings (359 ) were cleared by arrest.

# AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

## Definition

Aggravated assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do serious physical injury to another. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a firearm, knife, or other weapon is used which could result in serious personal injury if the crime was successfully completed.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 13,958 reported aggravated assaults in 2010, a decrease of 1 percent when compared to 2009.
- Aggravated assault accounted for 7 percent of the total Crime Index and 51 percent of all violent crimes.
- The rate for aggravated assault in 2010 remained 1.6 victims per 1000 population when compared to 2009.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- The categories of physical force (i.e. hands, fists, and feet) and other dangerous weapons (i.e. clubs, bricks, tire irons, etc.) were used in 62 percent of all reported aggravated assaults.
- Firearms were used in 15 percent of all aggravated assaults committed.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

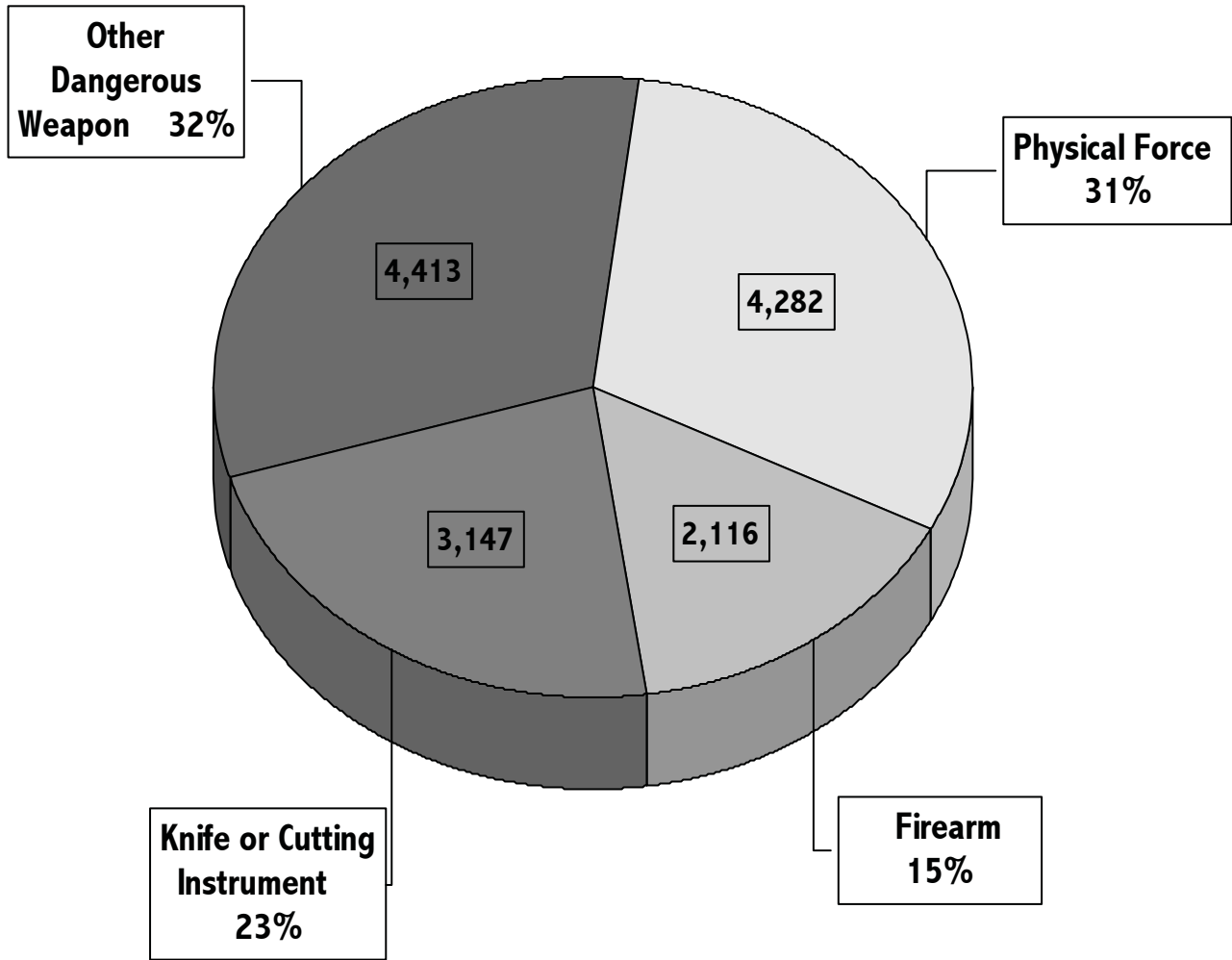
- There were 8,417 persons arrested for aggravated assault in 2010, a 5 percent decrease compared to 2009.
- Adult arrests decreased 3 percent, and juvenile arrests decreased 10 percent.
- Males accounted for 77 percent and females 23 percent of the aggravated assault arrests.
- Fifty-three percent of all persons arrested for aggravated assaults were white, 45 percent were black, and the remaining 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 24 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-three percent of aggravated assault cases were cleared; juveniles accounted for 13 percent of those clearances.

# BURGLARY

## Definition

Under this program, burglary is defined as an unlawful entry or attempted entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. Data collection for this offense is further categorized as forcible entry, unlawful entry (where no force is used) and attempted forcible entry.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 38,794 reported burglary offenses in 2010, an 5 percent increase when compared to 2009.
- Burglary accounted for 18 percent of the total Crime Index and 21 percent of all nonviolent crimes.
- The burglary rate was 4.4 victims per 1,000 population.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Fifty-six percent of all burglaries involved forcible entry, 33 percent were unlawful entry where no force was used and attempts to forcibly enter accounted for 10 percent in 2010.
- Residences were targets in 74 percent of the reported burglaries.
- Forty-seven percent of nonresidential burglaries are known to have occurred between the hours of 6:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.
- Stolen property as a result of burglary statewide, amounted to \$90.4 million, for an average loss of \$2,330.
- The average loss as a result of residential burglaries was \$2,142 and of nonresidential burglaries was \$2,871.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Burglary arrests decreased 2 percent with 6,066 persons arrested.
- Adult arrests increased 4 percent, and juvenile arrests decreased 20 percent.
- Males accounted for 85 percent, and females 15 percent of the burglary arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 19 percent of all burglary arrests.
- Sixty-five percent of burglary arrests were white, 35 percent were black, and the remaining 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 18 percent of the arrests.
- Thirteen percent of the burglaries statewide were cleared and juveniles accounted for 12 percent of those clearances.

# LARCENY-THEFT

## Definition

The definition of larceny-theft, as provided under this program, is the taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocketpicking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from motor vehicles, thefts or motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad checks are not included.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 129,294 larcenies reported in 2010 an increase of 1 percent compared to 2009.
- Larceny accounted for 61 percent of the total Crime Index and 70 percent of all nonviolent crimes.
- The rate for larceny was 15 victims per 1,000 population.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories and thefts from motor vehicles collectively accounted for 30 percent of all larceny-theft reported.
- Shoplifting offenses increased 3 percent when compared to 2009.
- Theft from buildings accounted for 16 percent of all larceny-thefts reported.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Larceny arrests decreased 2.5 percent in 2010 with 27,080 persons arrested.
- Adult arrests increased 1 percent, and juvenile arrests decreased 13 percent.
- Males accounted for 56 percent, and females 44 percent of the larceny arrests.
- Sixty-four percent of larceny arrests were white, 34 percent were black, and the remaining 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 17 percent of the arrests.
- Twenty-one percent of the larcenies were cleared with juveniles accounting for 16 percent of those clearances.

# MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT

## Definition:

In Uniform Crime Reporting, motor vehicle theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of a motor vehicle. This includes the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle which is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on the rails. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle. The motor vehicle theft category includes the subheadings of autos, trucks and buses, and other vehicles (motorcycles, mopeds, etc.)

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 15,555 motor vehicle thefts reported in 2010, an increase of less than one-half of one percent when compared to 2009.
- Motor vehicle theft accounted for 7 percent of the total Crime Index and 8 percent of all nonviolent crimes.
- The motor vehicle theft rate was 1.8 victims per 1000 population.

- Motor vehicles represented 39 percent of the total value of property stolen during 2010.
- Total value of stolen motor vehicles amounted to \$138 million during the year.
- The average value of a stolen motor vehicle was \$8,620.
- Recovered vehicle values totaling \$78 million represent 85 percent of the total value of recovered property.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 655 persons arrested for Motor Vehicle Theft, this represents 18 percent decreased compared to 2009.
- Adult arrests decreased 13 percent, and juvenile arrests decreased 32 percent.
- Males accounted for 75 percent, and females 25 percent of the motor vehicle theft arrests.
- Fifty-nine percent of all persons arrested for motor vehicle theft were white and 41 percent were black.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of the arrests.
- Six percent of motor vehicle thefts were cleared in 2010; juveniles accounted for 11 percent of those clearances.

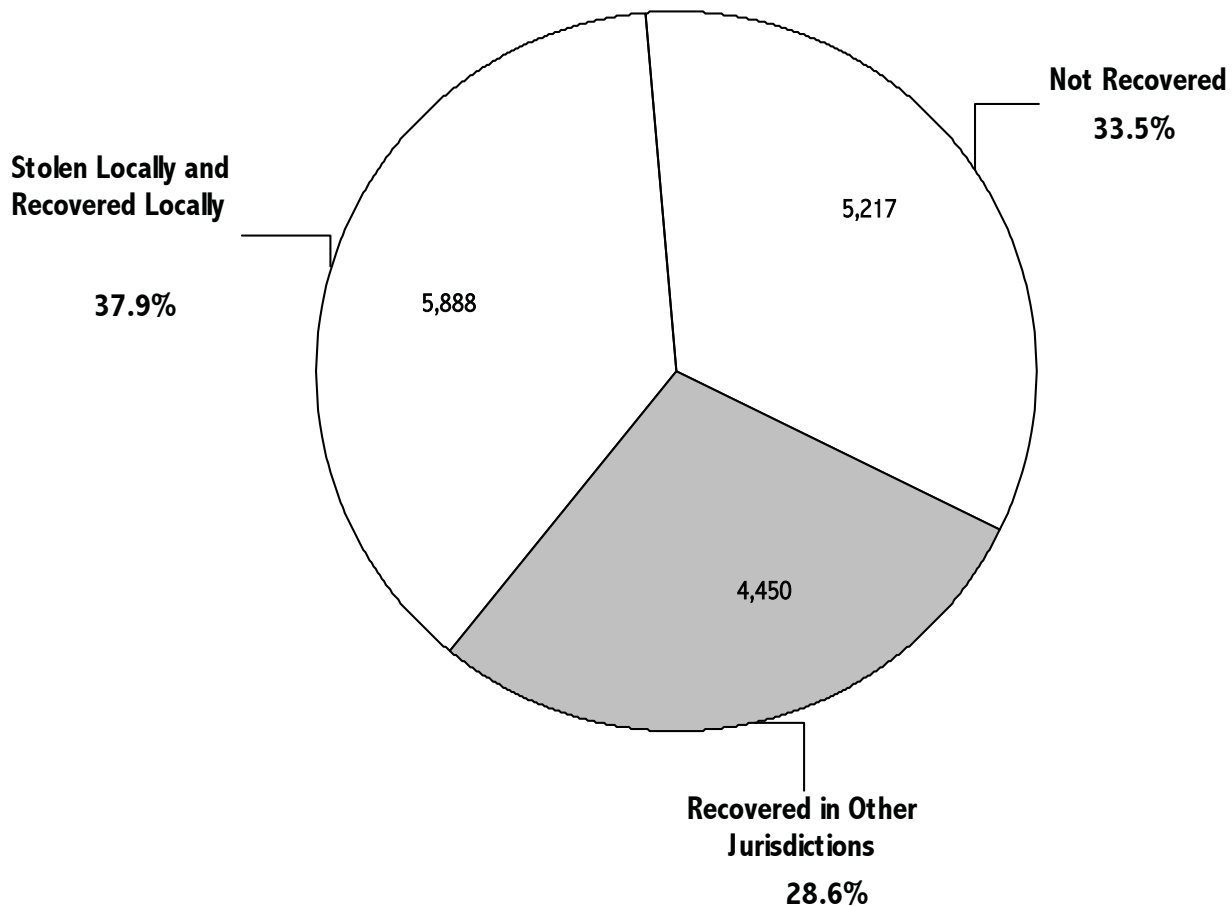

# ARSON

## Definition

Arson is defined by the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling, house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

## VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 997 reportable arsons in 2010, which represents a decrease of 10 percent when compared to 2009.
- The arson rate was 0.1 victims per 1,000 population.

## ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Forty-six percent of arsons were structures, with single occupancy residences accounting for 21 percent.
- Mobile property, including motor vehicles, accounted for 25 percent of the arsons in the state.
- Other property (timber, crops, etc.) accounted for 29 percent of the reported arsons.
- Total value of property damage due to arson amounted to \$24.9 million, for an average loss of \$24,550.
- The average residential loss was \$69,203, while the average loss to industrial/commercial structures was \$14,910.
- The average loss to mobile property was \$7,162.

## ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Arson arrests numbered 295 in 2010 representing 8 percent decrease, compared to 2009.
- Adult arrests decreased 6 percent, and juvenile arrests decreased 10 percent.
- Males accounted for 81 percent, and females for 19 percent of the arson arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 54 percent of all arsons arrests.
- Seventy-two percent of the persons arrested for arson were white, 26 percent were black, and the remaining 2 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 14 percent of the arrests.
- The arson clearance rate was 29 percent, and juveniles accounted for 39 percent of those clearances.
