Program Summary

This course will provide an overview of legal process, from subpoenas through wiretaps. It will focus on the many different types of search warrants and include practical tips for writing affidavits and obtaining warrants. The program will also cover the differences between search warrants and communications data warrants, outline how to obtain telephonic search warrants and highlight important considerations to remember when executing search warrants.

Eligibility

This program is mandatory for new assistant prosecutors and Division of Criminal Justice deputies hired after October 2019 who have been selected to attend by each county prosecutor's office and the Division of Criminal Justice. Other assistant prosecutors and Division of Criminal Justice deputies are welcome to register.

Faculty

DAG Lauren S. Yfantis is the Bureau Chief of the Division of Criminal Justice's Gangs and Organized Crime Unit. She was formerly a Supervising Deputy Attorney General in the unit, managing a legal staff of up to 11 attorneys in the investigation and prosecution of traditional and non-traditional organized crime organizations and narcotics and weapons trafficking organizations. Prior to that position, she investigated and prosecuted large-scale racketeering and narcotics and weapons cases involving traditional organized crime groups and criminal street gang organizations. DAG Yfantis began her career in the Major Financial Crimes Bureau/Money Laundering Unit, where she investigated and prosecuted complex money laundering cases. She received her Juris Doctor from Seton Hall University School of Law and a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice from Jersey City State College.
