1. COMMENT:

Susan E. Craft, Executive Director, State Agriculture Development Committee, is requesting that the Racing Commission discontinue stating in the Agriculture Industry Statement that racehorses are not considered livestock for the purpose of determining impacts to the agricultural industry. Executive Director Susan Craft states that horses exist as a recognized part of agriculture and the horse industry as a whole has a significant economic impact. RESPONSE:

The Racing Commission agrees with the commenter that racehorses have a positive indirect impact on the agriculture industry and, therefore, will discontinue the use of this statement.

#### 2. COMMENT:

Barbara Sachau of New Jersey, e-mailed the Racing Commission indicating that she is against continuing racing in any form and does not feel the taxpayer should be forced into paying the cost of racing.

#### **RESPONSE**:

The Racing Commission disagrees with the commenter because there is no supporting basis for the opposition to horse racing in New Jersey and the Commission believes that the proposed new rule establishes procedures, guidelines and requirements for the continuation of live race and simulcast race vents in the event a state of emergency is declared.
