ALERTS

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Enterovirus (EV-D68)

Signs and symptoms similar to cold or flu. <u>In</u>
<u>children age 6 weeks to 15 years with</u>
<u>existing respirtory illness may quickly</u>
<u>become respiratory distress, change in skin</u>
<u>color (hypoxemia) or wheezing.</u>

Current cases have been reported in New Jersey.

State of New Jersey EMD Guidecards Version 10/14

Ebola

Patient may present signs and symptoms of flu in early stage such as high fever, severe headache, muscle pain, vomiting, diarrhea, or abdominal pain. Additional sign may be unexplained bleeding.

Look for recent travel (up to 21 days) in affected areas.

Potential case in Newark, NJ
Cases confirmed in US (being treated in Texas,
Georgia and Maryland), screening being
conducted at major airports.
Current outbreaks reported in West Africa.

SIMULTANEOUS ALS/BLS

BLS.DISPATCH

IF PATIENT IS PRESENTING WITH FEVER AND/OR FLU-LIKE SYMPTOMS AND HAS RECENTLY TRAVELED TO AREAS OF CURRENT OUTBREAKS, OR THE PATIENT IS BEING MONITORED BECAUSE THEY HAVE BEEN IN CLOSE PROXIMITY TO A KNOWN EBOLA PATIENT, ADVISE ALL REPONDERS (Police, Fire, EMS, any others)TO USE P.P.E.

NOTIFY LOCAL HEALTH OFFICER OF ALL PATIENTS MEETING THIS CRITERIA.
