**Reptile "Go Bag"-** Place small items in a duffle bag, backpack or similar easy- to- carry container to be your "Go Bag." Keep your "Go Bag" by the door or other easily accessible location.

## **Food and Water**

Food for two weeks in a sealed container (refresh as needed).

Purified, bottled water supply for two weeks (drinking and misting). Rotate as needed based on bottle expiration date.

Essential dietary supplements.

## **Veterinary Records and medication**-Place these items in a sealed plastic bag:

Complete "My Pet Vital Information" form

http://animalemergency.nj.gov/documents/My Pets Vital Information.pdf

Copy of your reptile's medical records.

Copy of important test results.

Medications-include enough for two weeks. Rotate as needed to keep fresh. If not already on the medicine container, include your pet's name, veterinarians name and number, drug name, dose, route and frequency of administration.

Have a pre-signed veterinary medical treatment authorization, which will aid your veterinarian if your animal must be treated in your absence.

## Identification

Current photograph of you together with your reptile. Write your emergency contact information of the back of the photograph.

Have contact information (pet's name, your name and contact information) on the carrier.

Microchip number, if applicable, plus the name and phone number of the company. NOTE:

Please make sure your microchip is registered.

## **Supplies**

Transport carrier, (e.g. small plastic container with holes), pillow case or other cloth sack.

Clearly label each carrier with your pet's name and your emergency contact information.

Tape for sealing bags/container and a water-proof marking pen for identification.

Water bowl for soaking.

Spray bottle for misting.

Heating pad or battery operated heating source, extension cord and extra batteries.

Appropriate handling gloves/supplies.

Extra bedding material to help insulate your reptile.

Newspapers/liners for the bottom of the carrier.

Garbage bags.

First aid supplies (as recommended by your veterinarian).
