The Envirothon

The Envirothon is a dynamic hands-on Environmental Education Program for high school students. Teams of students who wish to compete in the state-level Envirothon competition explore different natural resource related topics throughout the school year, including soils, forestry, aquatics, wildlife ecology and current environmental issues. As they strengthen their background in natural resources, students practice working in teams, considering information and differing viewpoints to reach a decision through consensus and teamwork. One of the purposes of this program is to encourage students to become better-informed, active participants in natural resource management decisions and problem-solving.

The team advisor or "coach" facilitates team preparation for the competition. The Envirothon sponsors offer training and study guides for this preparation. Organized training sessions give students the opportunity to meet a wide range of professionals working in environmentally-related fields. Hands-on activities outlined in the educational study guide acquaint students with the Envirothon testing format.

The study guide can also be used to supplement regular lesson plans or added to a resource library. Preparation for the Envirothon will help teachers meet New Jersey Core Curriculum content Standards in Language Arts, Math, Science and Social Studies.



Each year the Envirothon features a specific, current environmental issue. The 2009 environmental issue is. " *Biodiversity in a Changing World.*"

Competition Structure

The New Jersey Envirothon competition is a one-day event that takes place at the end of the school year. Teams will be tested on environmental topics through hands-on interactive problemsolving at five testing stations. The team that best demonstrates a compre-

hensive understanding of natural resources, as well as teamwork and communication skills, moves on to represent New Jersey in the Canon Envirothon competition which is North America's Largest High School Environmental Education Competition. This multi-day event further tests the team's understanding of the environment and involves teams from all regions of the United States and Canada.

General Information

- ✓ Register on or before March 2, 2009.
- ✓ Upon registration, a study guide with information on natural resource topics and a list of suggested resource materials and contacts will be sent to each team.
- ✓ There is a resource problem to be researched during the school year and presented by the team before a panel of judges during the competition.
- A schedule of the activities on the day of the competition will be sent to each team in advance for travel preparations.
- ✓ The winning team becomes eligible to compete in the Canon Envirothon. The second place team will compete if the first place team cannot attend.

Consider Participating

Make an environmental investment that is both fun and educational! Register your team in the Envirothon competition by returning the form. Early registration is highly recommended to allow time for studying the guide and preparing for this exciting event. Rules



- Students in grades 9-12 are eligible.
- Each team must consist of five members from the same school or organization. One alternate is permitted to prepare with the team, **but cannot attend as a 6th member during the actual event.***
- ✓ Schools may submit a registration form for a second team. A waiting list will be created and if there is space after the registration deadline, your school will be notified about entering the second team. *
- Test questions may cover any information in the study guide and suggested resource materials like web materials and links.
- ✓ The contest will consist of hands-on questions along with some true/false, multiple choice and fill-in-the-blanks.
- ✓ There will be 30 minutes allowed at each station. Team presentations will last 10 minutes.
- ✓ Teams will not be permitted to carry cell phones calculators or any other electronic devices on the day of the competition.*
- ✓ Transportation to the event is the responsibility of each participating team.
- ✓ In the event of a tied score, the team with the highest score in the team presentation portion will be declared the winner. Decisions of the contest judges are **final**.
- Team advisors are prohibited from accompanying their team during any part of the competition. (This includes lunch.)
- ✓ The lunch break is considered part of the Envirothon. No studying or use of other materials is permitted. All rules still apply during the lunch break.
- ✓ Tobacco products, alcohol and other drugs may not be used by any team member during any part of the Envirothon.
- ✓ Any infraction of the New Jersey Envirothon Rules can result in disqualification and dismissal from the event and host site.

(*This is a change from previous years.)

Awards and Recognition

All students will receive certificates for participating in the Envirothon and T-shirts commemorating the event. The NJ Association of Conservation Districts, will offer \$1,000 Scholarships to the members of the 1st place team and Richard Stockton College of New Jersey will also offer the first place team members Scholarships to attend their University or College. The 1st place team will also receive a plaque in honor of their achievement. The team that represents New Jersey at the Canon Envirothon may also receive a cash award to help defray travel expenses.
