1. Equine – Red Barn (Treadmill Side) Equine First Aid on the Go: Dr. Anna Hausmann, Rutgers Animal Science Instructor. Are you really ready to travel with your horse? What should be in your "to go" first aid kit?

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| <p>1. Equine – Red Barn (treadmill side)- Jeopardy Game: Test what you learned from the morning sessions! - Dr. Carey Williams, Equine Extension Specialist, Rutgers University and Jennifer Weinert, PhD student, Rutgers University.</p> |
| <p>2. Dairy --Beef Heifer Barn- Roaming the Rumen- Extension Specialist Professor Dr. Mike Westendorf will take participants on a journey through a cows rumen to talk about how this unique structure works and the microorganisms it hosts to benefit the ruminant animal.</p> |
| <p>3. Small Ruminants – Round House-How to Give Injections and Draw Blood, Rebecca Potosky, Rutgers Animal Care Program. Learn about different types of injections, including SQ (subcutaneous), IM (intramuscular), and IV (intravenous). Also learn blood drawing techniques. You will get to practice IM injection techniques on oranges!</p> |
| <p>4. Poultry- Classrooms- Turkey Raising and Youth (TRAY)-Marissa Staffen, Alayne Torretta, Kendrin Dyitt,(RCE 4-H Agents and Staff)and Amy Rowe RCE Agricultural Agent. The TRAY program engages families in poultry science and community service as they raise turkeys to donate to local families in need. Families will hatch and raise turkeys in the spring to be processed in the fall for donations to food pantries for Thanksgiving. Webinars and workshops will be available to support families while they raise their poult. This workshop is an overview of the program to garner interest in participating.</p> |
