MS. houenou: Good morning, everyone, and welcome to this virtual meeting of the New Jersey Cannabis Regulatory Commission. By my watch, the time is now 11:02. And I call this meeting to order.

Mr. Said (phonetic), can you please read the notice of the public meeting?

MR. SAID: Good morning, Chairwoman. This is a special meeting of the New Jersey Cannabis Regulatory Commission. Adequate notice of this meeting has been provided in accordance with the Senator Byron M. Baer Open Public Meetings Act.

Notice of the meeting was provided to the Asbury Park Press, Atlantic City Express, Bergen Record, Courier Post, Star Ledger, and The Trenton Times on June 14th, 2023.

The agenda and the information regarding the virtual nature of the meeting was also posted on the CRC website. The meeting time and location has also been posted on the website of the New Jersey Cannabis Regulatory Commission and with the office of the Secretary of the State.

MS. HOUENOU: Thank you, Mr. Said. Can please take roll call?

MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
MR. BARKER: Present.

MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
MS. HOUENOU: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso is absent.

MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?

MS. NASH: Present.

MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
MR. DELGADO: Present.

MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?

MS. HOUENOU: Present.
I believe we now have a quorum.

Mr. Said, can you please announce the first agenda item?

MR. SAID: The first order of business is for the Commission to go into Executive Session to discuss legal matters and litigation updates. These are discussions that are not shared with the public. We believe the Executive Session should take about 30 minutes.

MS. HOUENOU: Thank you. Do I have a motion to go into Executive Session?

MR. DELGADO: Madam Chairwoman, I move that we adjourn to Executive Session.

MS. NASH: Second.
MS. houenou: Moved by Vice Chair Delgado and seconded by Commissioner Nash.

Is there any discussion on this motion to go into Executive Session? Hearing none, all those in favor say aye.
(A11 say aye)
MS. HOUENOU: I only heard two voices, so I'11 just repeat.

All those in favor say aye.
(A11 say aye)
MS. HOUENOU: Okay. A11 those opposed say nay. Are there any abstentions? Al1 right. Hearing none, the motion passes.

The Commission will now go into Executive Session. We expect the Executive Session to last approximately 30 minutes. we will leave the livestream running during that time. We can expect to resume the open public session at about 11:35 a.m.

Thank you for your patience, everyone.
(Pause)
MS. HOUENOU: A11 right. we are back. The time is 11:32 and we will resume the public session of today's meeting.

Mr. Said, can you please announce the next agenda item?

MR. SAID: Next on the agenda is the Chair's report.

MS. HOUENOU: Al1 right. This will be incredibly short. The only thing that I want to note for folks is that the Commission's July 18 board meeting will not be -- it will be held in person, but it will not be held in our regular meeting space. So I encourage everyone to stay tuned to our website where details on the new location for the July 18th board meeting will be posted. And we hope to get those details up soon for everyone. But they will not -- it will not be held at our regular meeting place on South Clinton Avenue in Trenton. So please make sure that you stay up-to-date on the location for the next board meeting.

That is all I have for a Chair's report for today.

MR. SAID: Next on the agenda is the Executive Director's report.

MS. HOUENOU: Executive Director Brown, I turn the floor over to you.

MR. BROWN: Thank you, Madam Chair. Thank you, members of the Commission.

So I'm also going to keep it somewhat short and sweet today. Just two agenda items. We now have numbers on sales -- totals sales for Q1 of 2023 as well as tax revenue collected. So I'm going to share those and then just provide a licensing update. And then we'11 move on to the rest of today's business. So to start off, looking at sales numbers from Q1 of 2023, we continue to see recreational sales increase in the state of New Jersey. They grew from $\$ 80$ million in one quarter, in Q2 of 2022, which was the first quarter of recreational sales, to nearly 146 million in total sales in the first quarter of this year. This shows the market continues to grow quarter-over-quarter.

And, additionally, we still see sales of medicinal cannabis. we did see a significant drop in this last quarter. Previously, they've remained pretty strong. But we did see about a fifteen-million-dollar decrease in medicinal sales from Q1 2023 versus Q4 2022.

Nonetheless, the total market continues to grow. If we look at total recreational cannabis sales for the first year of recreational cannabis in the state of New Jersey, they were just under half a billion dollars. And if we look at total cannabis sales across both markets, they were just under $\$ 700$ million total in cannabis sales in the last year.

So the market continues to grow. Sales continue to be strong. And we look forward to future

1 growth here as we continue to see new businesses open up and serve the growing consumer base here in New Jersey.

When we look at tax revenue, the sales tax specifically, and you can go to the next slide, please, for the first quarter, we collected close to $\$ 9.5$ million in sales tax based on the recreational cannabis sales. And the next slide, looking at the social equity excise fee, we're -- we closed in on about half a million dollars collected on that.

As a reminder, that is set relatively low for the first, you know, year or more of recreational cannabis sales. But once there's some trigger points that occur, it will be able to be raised in accordance with the Commission's regulations. But right now, that continues to grow as well, and we saw close to $\$ 500,000$ in receipts on that money.

And I did want to note just to thank the work of the Public Education and Engagement Committee and the Audit Committee in putting together recommendations that went to the Governor and Legislature on how to invest the social equity excise fee as well as other priorities that should be considered for funding with tax revenue.

So next slide, please.

Looking at overall licensing, we've now eclipsed 2,000 applications submitted and under review by the CRC. Out of those $2,000,1,300$ applications have been approved. There's only 66 applications that haven't made it to our completeness review stage, which is really the first comprehensive stage of review in our applications.

Right now, we have about 400 applications under review in the office of Licensing. I'd say most of those are conditionals, but there are a fair amount of annuals and conversions. And then we have 140 applications currently under review in the office of Compliance and Investigations.

We are seeing more conditionals applying to convert to annual which is a great sign. And right now, 315 conditional conversions have been submitted. We really saw that start to increase at the end of last year, and that increase has continued into this year.

I'11 note, you know, one of the things that we hear from applicants as far as questions all the time is, you know, once the investigation is completed, you know, can I get on a board meeting the next day. And I did want to note that when we look at our process and when we get to the applications under
consideration today, there are things that happen after they leave the office of Compliance and Investigations, like quality control, preparation for board consideration, and so, you know, there is time after the investigation phase before they can get to the board level and ultimately be considered and approved.

But our team is doing tremendous work to get these applications reviewed, processed and brought to the board for consideration. And we expect these numbers to grow, particularly as we get to July and onward.

So, next slide, please.
For today's board meeting, we only have seven applications given the tight turnaround from the last board meeting. But, again, we do expect that number to continue up, again, at the next board meeting and those thereafter. And we don't have any conditionals today, but we do have four conditional-to-annual conversion applications, as well as three annual applications. And we'11 cover exactly what those are when we get to that agenda item.

So with that, thank you, Madam Chair. I'11 turn it back to you.

MS. HOUENOU: Thank you, Director Brown.

Are there any questions from the board for Director Brown regarding his report? All right. Hearing none, thank you, Director Brown.

And, Mr. Said, if you can, please announce the next agenda item.

MR. SAID: Next on the agenda is the consideration of a rule proposal for clinical registrant permits.

MS. HOUENOU: Thank you, Mr. Said.
Director Brown, can you please provide a summary of the need for this proposal and staff's recommendations?

MR. BROWN: Absolutely. Thank you, Madam Chair.

And I'm going to hand it over to Chief Counsel Riggs in a moment to just cover the process here and sort of high level where we are.

But clinical registrants were included in the 2019 (indiscernible). They are a permit type of alternative treatment centers that incentivize and actually require clinical research as a condition of receiving a permit to operate in the medicinal space. They require a partnership with an academic medical center, either an academic medical center in New Jersey or academic institutions out of state under
certain conditions. And aside from being able to serve the medicinal population, their -- again, their core focus is meant to be on clinical research.

And before I turn it over to Chief Counsel Riggs, I did want to note that there's another state, our neighboring state Pennsylvania, that has a similar model to this. And I've seen -- I was -- a stakeholder shared with me some clinical research that came out of one of their entities recently that's looking at the effect of cannabis on stress and anxiety in Alzheimer's patients, and some really promising research being conducted looking at specifically, like, different chemo types of cannabis and how they might affect different types of stress and anxiety.

So this is happening in Pennsylvania right now. This rule proposal will enable New Jersey to have similar types of research happening here and coordination/collaboration between the cannabis industry, the medicinal cannabis industry and our academic institutions that are focused on finding the, you know, next cures and treatments for diseases.

So I'm going to turn it over to Chief Counsel Riggs now to walk through the proposal.

MR. RIGGS: Thank you, Executive Director

Brown and Madam Chairwoman.
As Executive Director Brown mentioned, this is a new medical permit type that is authorized by statute. The rule proposal will include a process for how the Commission is going to accept These types of applications and how they're going to review them and process them and get them ready for board approval.

Clinical research is a huge focus for these types of businesses. Clinical research is important. I know that for the Commission it's important and, you know, it stands on (indiscernible) safety and equity that we have as a Commission. The application process in this (indiscernible) is going to look very similar to the adu7t-use licensure process. There's going to be a permitting review, financial review, criminal history background check and, obviously, fees will be required.

As far as next steps, this rule proposal, if approved, will be filed with the Office of Administrative Law in accordance with the Office of Administrative Law publication schedule. The next publication date available will be August 7 , which wi11 then open up a sixty-day comment period that will close on October 6th of 2023. Obvious7y, once that proposal is filed with the Office of Administrative

1 Law and pub1ished, we will have that available on our

11 Thank you.
MR. BROWN: Thank you, Chief Counse1 Riggs. And back over to you, Madam Chair.

MS. HOUENOU: Thank you both.
Chief Counsel Riggs, if you don't mind just reiterating the dates of the publication of this rule proposal in the New Jersey Register and the date for the -- marking the end of the public comment period.

MR. RIGGS: No problem, Chairwoman.
The next available publication date, if filed today, is August 7th of 2023. That is when it will be published in the Register in accordance with the Office of Administrative Law's publication schedule. The comment period will then open for 60 days, and that wil1 close on October 6 of 2023. And
then we will collect those comments and provide an adoption document to this board so they can look at those comments and ultimately adopt the rules and (indiscernible) set in place and file with the office of Administrative Law. Thanks.

MS. HOUENOU: Thank you.
Are there any other questions from the board for Director Brown or Counsel Riggs? All right. Seeing and hearing none, do $I$ hear a motion on this matter?

I'11 make one more call for a motion on this matter related to clinical registrants.

MR. DELGADO: Madam Chairwoman, I move that we approve notice of both for the amendments and new rules in clinical registered permits.

MS. houenou: Moved by vice Chair.
Is there a second?
I will second the motion.
Is there any discussion on this motion?
Hearing none, Mr. Said, can you please call the vote?
MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
MR. BARKER: Nay.
MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
MS. NASH: Yes.
MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?

MR. DELGADO: Yes.
MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?

MS. HOUENOU: Yes.
MR. SAID: The resolution passes.
Next item for consideration are applications to convert conditional 1icenses and annual 1icenses.

MS. HOUENOU: Thank you.
Director Brown, can you please provide a summary of the applications reviewed by staff?

MR. BROWN: Yes. Thank you, Chairwoman Houenou.

Next slide, please.
So, first up for consideration are the conditional-to-annual 1icense conversions. There are four conversion licenses up for consideration here, one cultivator, two manufacturers and one retailer.

Just to review the process, first, applicants are assigned a priority based on what they qualify for, whether it's a social equity business, diversely owned business or impact-zone business.

Then that priority is verified. Applications are reviewed for completeness to make sure they have all the necessary documents required by regulation. They are then scored in accordance with the notice of application acceptance and made sure

1 that they are -- they score sufficiently high to move 2 forward in the process.

Those that score sufficiently high are then reviewed for qualifications, limitations, as well as financial and management agreement review. There's an investigations and qualification review which includes a criminal history background check as well as financial probity.

Once they leave investigations, they are given quality control to make sure that all the determinations made by both Office of Licensing and Office of Compliance and Investigations are correct and in accordance with our authorizing statutes and regulations. And then they are recommended to the board.

So here we have these four conversion licenses that have completed that process and are recommended for approval by the CRC Board of Commissioners.

And back to you, Madam Chair.
MS. HOUENOU: Thank you.
Are there any questions from the board concerning the recommendations for applications to convert their conditional license to an annual 1icense?

I know we have the list of applications under consideration that is hyperlinked on our website. Do we have it ready for sharing here? oh, yes. Great. Excellent.

So there are no questions for Director Brown.

Do I hear a motion on this matter?
MR. DELGADO: Madam Chairwoman, I move the resolution to consideration of applications to convert from conditional to annual Class 1 cannabis cultivator, Class 2 cannabis manufacturer and Class 5 cannabis retail licenses.

MS. HOUENOU: Thank you, Vice Chair.
Is there a second?
MS. NASH: Second.
MS. houenou: Seconded by Commissioner Nash. Thank you.

Is there any discussion on this motion?
Hearing no discussion, Mr. Said, can you please call the vote?

MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
MR. BARKER: Abstain.
MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
MS. NASH: Yes.
MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?

MR. DELGADO: Yes.
MR. SAID: And Chairwoman Houenou?

MS. HOUENOU: Yes.
MR. SAID: The resolution passes.
Next item for consideration is the annual 1icense applications.

MS. HOUENOU: Thank you.
Director Brown, can you please provide a summary of the staff's recommendations with respect to the applications going directly to an annual license?

MR. BROWN: Yes. Thank you, Madam Chair.
So you have -- the Commission has before it three annual licenses for consideration, one cultivator, one manufacturer and one retail -- on retailer.

Similarly to the conversions, these applications followed a similar process. They were reviewed for priority assignment. They were assigned priority based on their qualification, whether that be social equity business, diversely owned business, impact zone or otherwise. That priority designation was verified. They were reviewed for completeness and deemed complete.

They were scored and they al1 have scored sufficiently high in accordance with the notice of
application acceptance to be moved forward. They've been reviewed for qualification limitations, financial management agreement review, including criminal history background checks and financial probity. They've undergone quality control and now they are recommended for approval by the CRC Board of Commissioners.

Madam Chair, back to you. And I think you're muted.

MS. HOUENOU: Thank you.
Are there any questions from the board for Director Brown?

A11 right. Then we'11 move forward. I believe here we are actually breaking up These applications and will consider two applications first, and then the last application separately.

So as it pertains to -- do we have a list of those two? Great. Thank you.

As it pertains to these two applications, Application Number 1216 and 1222, do I hear a motion?

MS. NASH: Madam Chair, I move to approve the annual license applications for these two applicants.

MS. HOUENOU: Thank you.
Is there a second?

MR. DELGADO: I second the motion.
MR. BARKER: Defer to Vice Chair Delgado, Madam Chair.

MS. HOUENOU: Al7 right. Seconded by Vice
Chair Delgado.
Is there any discussion on this motion as it relates to these two applications?

Hearing no discussion, Mr. Said, can you please call the vote?

MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
MR. BARKER: Aye.
MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
MS. NASH: Yes.
MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
MR. DELGADO: Yes.
MR. SAID: And Chairwoman Houenou?

MS. HOUENOU: Yes.
MR. SAID: The resolution passes.
Next item for consideration is the annual license Application Number 1745.

Commissioner Nash has recused herself from Application 1745 from AACCTPro. On account of her recusal, she will remove herself from the Zoom meeting while the board considers this particular application. Afterward, Commissioner Nash will come back in and
wil1 take up the next order of business.
MS. HOUENOU: Thank you.
Director Brown, will you please either provide a new summary or refresh the board's recollection on staff's processing of this application?

MR. BROWN: Absolutely. This application followed the same process I outlined for the previous application. It has been reviewed for priority, deemed complete. It scored sufficiently high to be considered by our office of Investigations. It's undergone qualification limitations and financial management and agreement review. We recommend they be deemed qualified to hold a license. They've been -undergone quality control, and they are now recommended for approval by the CRC Board of Commissioners.

MS. HOUENOU: Thank you.
Are there any questions from the board for Director Brown regarding this application?

A11 right. Hearing and seeing none, is there a motion as it relates to Application Number 1745?

MR. DELGADO: Madam Chairwoman, I move that we move the resolution before us, consideration of
annual license application for a Class 5 cannabis retail license.

MS. HOUENOU: Moved by Vice Chair Delgado.
Is there a second?
MR. BARKER: Madam Chair, I second that.
mS. HOUENOU: Seconded by Commissioner
Barker.
Is there any discussion on this motion?
Hearing no discussion, Mr. Said, can you please call the vote?

MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
MR. BARKER: Aye.
MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
MR. DELGADO: Yes.
MR. SAID: And Chairwoman Houenou?
MS. HOUENOU: Yes.
MR. SAID: The resolution passes.
Next on the agenda we have the open public comment period.

MS. HOUENOU: Al1 right. Thank you, all.
For today's public comment period, we'11 go back to the early days of the Commission and Mr. Said will call out those individuals who are registered to speak. If you are -- if you hear your name called, please make sure that you have your name as it appears

1 on the Zoom that matches the name that you registered to speak with. I believe I see a few -- I've seen a few Jessies, a few Michaels and, unfortunately, we here at the CRC are not mind readers. So please make sure that your name as it appears on Zoom matches what you used to register.

If you are not sure what your name -- how your name appears, please take a moment to log off of the Zoom meeting and try coming back in, and you should be prompted to enter your name.

If you're working with an older version of Zoom, it is possible that that function is not equipped on older versions of Zoom. But we need to make sure that your name is -- matches what you've used to register to speak.

Members of the pub1ic can always submit written comments to the Commission during this meeting or after the meeting by going to our website, NJ.Gov/meeting/cannabis/meetings. And the deadline to submit written comments for today's meeting is five o'clock tomorrow, Thursday, June 2nd.

Speakers will be limited to three minutes. So we'11 have a timer on the screen. Please be mindful of the time. And note that the public comment period is really meant to give members of the public
an opportunity to address the Commission about matters that the Commission should be aware of. This is really not a space for people to simply market or advertise private businesses. So please keep your remarks focused on matters that pertain to the Commission's work or items that the Commission should be aware of.
with that, I will turn it over to Mr. Said to call out the names of our speakers. When it is your turn to speak, you'11 be directed to unmute yourself and then you'll be allowed to proceed.

MR. SAID: Thank you, Chairwoman. As a reminder, public speakers during this afternoon's public comment period will be limited to three minutes. Please be respectful and concise during your comments.

MR. LEE: Can you hear me okay?
MR. SAID: Yes.
MR. LEE: Okay. I will start now.
MR. SAID: okay.
MR. LEE: Good afternoon, members of the Cannabis Regulatory Commission. My name is Ed Lee and I'm the Director of Human Resources, People and Culture for Peerless Beverage Company (phonetic). Peerless is based in Union County, New Jersey, and it is in its fourth generation of distributing beer, wines, beers and progressive adult beverages throughout northern New Jersey.

The community of the more than 275 people who work for Peerless is as diverse as the state of New Jersey, and that diversity is one of the keys to our success.

Our workplace culture is thoughtful, authentic and respectful. We have employment policies that make it easier for people who work with us to have careers and raise their families. Peerless is a great place to work.

Several years ago, the leadership of Peerless began to take steps to expand its businesses into the cannabis wholesaling and distribution in New Jersey and those proposed operations are the Green Lane Distribution Company.

The founding principles of Green Lane are consistent with the ethos of Peerless, and also align with the CRC's own goals related to promoting social equity and restorative justice.

Green Lane intends to operate as an impact zone business. Notably, if Peerless were evaluated according to the criteria, it would also qualify as an impact zone business. Forty-one percent of our current workforce resides in designated impact zones, far exceeding the required 25 percent, and 28 percent of those employees reside in the nearest impact zone.

Our employees from impact zones work throughout the company in all departments and at a11 levels. We offer competitive salaries and excellent benefit packages. Our operations, delivery and sales

1 jobs are union jobs and compromise [sic] a large majority of our workforce.

Employment with Peerless, and hopefully someday with Green Lane, is a true avenue to economic empowerment.

Green Lane was discouraged by the actions of the board at its June lst meeting which restricted applicants for Classes 3,4 and 6 licenses to social equity applicants only for a period of one year, followed by another period of exclusivity of three months to diversely owned businesses. This prohibits Green Lane from even applying for its 7 icences until the very 1 ast days of next year, and we have already been waiting for over 18 months since Classes 1 and 2 1 icenses began to be accepted.

Quite frankly, the business is not viable according to this time line. We believe that the board adopted these restrictions to promote social equity and we are committed to the same principles. The impact zone designation is a meaningful one in the pursuit of restorative justice. Ownership of cannabis businesses is not the only way to achieve social justice. Employment of people from economically disadvantaged communities creates opportunities and changes lives. We have seen it in our existing
business.
Further, the law requires that 25 percent of businesses in each class be impact zone businesses, and we believe that a period of exclusivity is not compliant with the law.
we respectfully ask that the board reconsider this restriction and to allow for all businesses to apply accordingly to the priorities assigned to the other classes of licensure.

Thank you.
MR. SAID: Thank you, Ed.
Next I'11 go to the next person with their hand raised, John Dockery.

MR. DOCKERY: Good afternoon, Council. And thank you for your time today. My name is John Dockery. I'm the CEO/owner of Simply Pure Downtown Trenton Class 5 micro-dispensary.

I'm a little disappointed today because I was hoping to be on the agenda due to the fact that I submitted my conversion license March 14th. Even though I'm a little disappointed, I'm very pleased with the work the council is doing.

I was born and raised and still live in Trenton, New Jersey today. Not the best of places, but it's home to me, and these are my people.

Most people in this industry don't come from places like Trenton. I've sold cannabis for over 20 years on the legal market and when the State of New Jersey offered me this opportunity and made me a priority, it was a no-brainer to me.

To my friends, it took a little more convincing. The things that they said were like this is a setup and you're going to jail. Needless to say, some of them have different feelings today, and I thank the board for that. We come from a place that sometimes is very hopeless.

In my journey through this process, I started May 26, 2022 with me receiving my conditional license, one of the first in 11 -- one of the first 11 in the state. That's given my people hope.

My journey has been a wild one, to say the 1east. But it's made me a better person. I'm giving back hope to my city and I thank the council for that.

I walk into rooms that $I$ have to represent the true legacy people. I carry that with honor, not with shame or guilt. We deserve to be here just like everyone else.

I thank the CRC Board and the State of New Jersey for this opportunity because where I'm from, this doesn't happen often. Thank you for your time
today.
MR. SAID: Thank you, John.
Next I have Eric Wudtke.
MR. WUDTKE: Thank you.
Good afternoon, members of the Commission. My name is Eric wudtke. I'm speaking today on behalf of Zacate LLC, a Class 5 conditional 1icense holder who has applied for conversion to annual licensure.

Zacate is a social equity business seeking to open a retail dispensary in Delran, New Jersey. And to prepare for that opening, real estate was secured, vendors have been selected, local approvals granted, permits issued and a general manager has been hired.

Zacate, like so many others in this same position, is ready to move forward once this Commission acts on its conversion application. But the focus on social equity and the CREAMM Act, the rules, and the notice of application acceptance, we were hopeful that Zacate would have received its annual 1icense by now, 161 days after submitting its conversion application on January 11th.

Zacate is in Category 1c of the Commissioner's priority categories and still hopes to be approved before non-social-equity businesses.

I'11 just say please, please provide updates to license applicants or respond to the numerous inquiries sent by Zacate's owner to employees at the Commission and the Executive Director. This is an expensive business with people's livelihoods on the line. And the lack of responsiveness is frustrating.

Let's talk social equity more generally. At the Commission's March meeting, we saw that 25 percent of recreational license applications were from social equity businesses through February 13th. Where is the updated data on approval of social equity annual and conversion applications? The Commission has this data and people want to see it. Please put that data out there on a more regular basis so that everyone can see the Commission's progress and approving businesses in the highest priority category, those most harmed by the war on drugs.

New Jersey still has a chance to be a guidepost for new adult-use cannabis markets, but most do better in communicating with license applicants during the application process, working with applicants, and not leaving emails and phone calls unanswered. The Commission must approve annual licenses for social equity businesses and more regularly report that data to the public.

1 the City of Elizabeth, and it has been a little bit 2 difficult.

And my questions are, how much guidance is the CRC giving the local municipalities and how much discretion is given to the local council? At this time, our application is about to be -- about to go in front of the council members in Elizabeth next week. But I have received phone calls from a council member stating his dislike or non-approval of our application ahead of the actual meeting, which, you know, brings a lot of questions into my mind in terms of their discretion in the matter because we have met all regulatory requirements. Our application -- we have crossed all the Ts, dotted a11 the Is, and everything is in order.

And he expressed some dislike in our location. However, we are zoned in the correct place and everything is there.

So I really urge the Council to speak to the 1ocal council members and really give them some guidance into how the process should go moving forward and, hopefully, we'11 have a approval on our hands soon. We are a one-hundred-percent minority business, one-hundred-percent woman owned. And we are not a big MSL. So our money, my life savings pretty much, has
been gone into this business. And I would really appreciate any guidance from the CRC on this matter.
