NEW JERSEY CANNABIS REGULATORY COMMISSION PUBLIC MEETING THURSDAY, DECEMBER 7, 2023

1	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Good morning,
2	everyone. Welcome to today's NJCRC Board meeting. And
3	happy first day of Hanukah to anyone celebrating. The
4	time is 10:03, and I am calling this meeting to order.
5	Mr. Said, can you please call the vote? I'm sorry.
6	Can you please read the notice of the public meeting
7	before we do roll call?
8	MR. SAID: Chairwoman, this a regularly
9	scheduled meeting of the New Jersey Cannabis Regulatory
10	Commission's 2023 annual meeting schedule. Adequate
11	notice of this meeting has been provided in accordance
12	with the Senator Byron M. Baer Open Public Meetings
13	Act. Notice of the meeting was provided to the Asbury
14	Park Press, Atlantic City Express, Bergen Record,
15	Courier Post, Star Ledger, and the Trenton Times on
16	January 11, 2023. The agenda and information regarding
17	the in-person meeting and the ability to live stream
18	was also posted on the CRC website. Meeting time and
19	location has also been posted on the website of the New
20	Jersey Cannabis Regulatory Commission and with the
21	office of the Secretary of the State.
22	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. Can you
23	please take roll call?
24	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
25	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Present.

1	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
2	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: You may have to
3	repeat actually.
4	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?

12	MR. SAID: We now have a quorum. The
13	first order of business is for the Commission to go
14	into Executive Session to discuss legal matters and
15	litigation updates. These are discussions that are not
16	shared with the public. We believe the Executive
17	Session should take about 60 minutes.
18	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you, Mr.
19	Said. Is there a motion to go into Executive Session?
20	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Madam Chair, I
21	move that we go into Executive Session.
22	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by
23	Commissioner Barker. Is there a second?
24	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Second.
25	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Seconded by

3	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Madam Chairwoman,
4	before we go into Executive Session I'd just like to
5	recognize that today's Pearl Harbor Day. We have
6	veteran entrepreneurs that are getting into the
7	cannabis business. And I want to recognize their
8	service for our country and those veterans who served
9	our country throughout the years. And today's a
10	special day, 3,500 American veterans from World War
11	in the World War II era were died today in the
12	attack at Pearl Harbor. And I just want to recognize
13	that it is Pearl Harbor Day. Thank you very much.
14	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Very well said,
15	Vice Chair. Thank you. Is there any further
16	discussion before we call the vote for Executive
17	Session? Hearing no further discussion, all those in
18	favor of adjourning into Executive Session say "aye".
19	[All responded "aye".]
20	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: All those opposed
21	say "nay". Any abstentions? Hearing none, the motion
22	passes. As Mr. Said said, we expect the Executive
23	Session to last approximately one hour. And so we will
24	leave the live stream running during that time. There
25	will be select staff members who will remain in this

1	room during that time. However, those individuals will
2	not be able to answer any questions related to
3	information or matters that are pending before the
4	Board currently. So we can expect to resume the public
5	portion of this meeting at 11:07. Thank you.
6	[There is a recess.]
7	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Good afternoon.
8	Welcome back. The time is now 12:12. And we will
9	resume the open public portion of this meeting.
10	Apologies for the extended Executive Session. We do
11	our best to anticipate how long Executive Session will
12	last, but sometimes the conversation just needs to go a
13	bit longer to make sure that the Commission has all the
14	information and that it needs to then make its
15	decisions. Mr. Said, can you please announce the next
16	agenda item?
17	MR. SAID: Next up on the agenda is
18	approving the minutes of both the Commission's open and
19	Executive Sessions held on October 19th. The minutes
20	have been shared with the members of the Commission
21	prior to this meeting.
22	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. If
23	there are no desired edits or changes to the meeting
24	minutes, I will ask for a motion.
25	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Madam Chair, I move

1	that we accept the October 19th minutes of the public
2	meeting.
3	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by Vice Chair
4	Delgado. Is there a second?
5	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Second that, Madam
6	Chair.
7	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Seconded by
8	Commissioner Barker. Is there any discussion on this
9	motion? Hearing none, all those in favor of approving
10	the October 19, 2023, meeting minutes say "aye".
11	[All responded "aye".]
12	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: All those opposed
13	say "nay". Any abstentions? The motion passes. Mr.
14	Said, please announce the next item.
15	MR. SAID: Next on the agenda is the
16	Chair's Report.
17	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. At the
18	top, I want to note that there are a couple of changes
19	to the agenda. One is the rule adoption for the
20	cannabis consumption area. That is being postponed and
21	will be reconsidered at a later date. And there are
22	also no adult-use cannabis business license renewals on
23	the agenda for today. So apologies for that inclusion
24	in error. Want to note couple of items now that we are
25	at the end of the year. So in January I highlighted a

1	few items that folks can anticipate coming from the
2	Commission this year including finalizing the new
3	regulations for personal use cannabis businesses, a
4	continued expansion of the medicinal cannabis program,
5	and more adult-use cannabis businesses opening up. And
6	so I'm proud to say that we did that and more. We also
7	proposed rules for clinical registrants. We opened the
8	applications for the last three classes of adult-use
9	licenses. We've expanded edible products for both
10	patients and adult-use consumers, and launched a robust
11	safe-use public messaging campaign. So I want to thank
12	staff for their indispensable work to make those things
13	a reality. Our legal compliance and investigations
14	licensing outreach customer service and I Teams make it
15	all a reality. We've also made clear that the NJCRC
16	Board will hold businesses accountable for their
17	actions when they don't follow the rules. As the Board
18	of Commissioners is responsible for setting regulatory
19	policies for the cannabis industry, we put the
20	Commission's rules in place for a reason, to say what
21	we mean and mean what we say. So as 2023 comes to a
22	close, I do want to note some of the impacts of the
23	Board's votes over the last two and a half years.
24	Today marks the 33rd public meeting for public
25	participation and transparency in the Agency's actions.

1	We've quadrupled the size of the medicinal cannabis
2	industry. We are now at nearly 50 dispensaries at
3	which patient's can get medical cannabis. We've
4	approved more than 1600 total adult-use cannabis
5	business licenses including more than 300 annual
6	licenses, 12 location changes, six ownership changes,
7	65 expansions of alternative treatment centers, and
8	more than 800 conditional license extensions to help
9	businesses move towards getting an annual license
10	application in.
11	In 2024, we'll continue building on our
12	successes this far. So we'll look to mirror the
13	accessibility and inclusion concepts of our adult-use
14	regulations and our medical regulations. We'll also
15	look to align the medical permits and adult-use
16	licenses for our expanded ATCs which will dramatically
17	improve the renewal process for both the businesses and
18	the Commission. We're also developing written policies
19	that explain the Commission's approach to compliance
20	and enforcement so that it establishes when and how
21	regulatory violations are documented, reflects the idea
22	that some violations rightly warrant a supportive
23	response from the Agency to encourage compliance, and
24	manages both internal and external expectations about
25	how regulatory issues are addressed. So as I mentioned

1	before, transparency and accountability are vital to
2	the success of to successful implementation of the
3	Commission's rules and ultimately to realizing the
4	vision of having a cannabis industry that is safe and
5	with responsible operators. Our investigators take the
6	time to interview complainants, review evidence, and
7	put together detailed reports. And the Board
8	recognizes these efforts and takes investigators'
9	assessments seriously. So my hope is that this written
10	policy on our approach to compliance and enforcement
11	will be finalized and implemented very soon.
12	And I will leave you lastly with a few
13	reminders for our applicants. First and foremost, when
14	it comes to the applications themselves, please
15	remember to answer every question fully and completely.
16	Too many times the Board receives applications that are
17	incomplete or have conflicting information. When this
18	happens, the Board has to request and wait for
19	supplemental information from you, the applicant. So
20	this can lead to delays in processing and approving
21	your application. The fastest way to get your
22	application approved is to fill it out is to fill
23	out the application completely and correctly the first
24	time you submit it. At the insistence of the Board,
25	the Commission is updating the disclosure forms that

1	are part of the applications to clarify the information
2	that applicants need to provide. So look for those on
3	our website when they are ready. Secondly and lastly,
4	the Commission still currently has a lot of inactive
5	applications just sitting in our application portal and
6	unable to advance through the approval process because
7	businesses aren't responding to NJCRC staff when they
8	reach out to fix deficiencies in their application. So
9	applicants, please, please ensure your contact
10	information is up to date and correctly listed in your
11	application. Check your spam folders and your
12	voicemail. We do still use telephones, yes. And
13	contact the Office of Diversity and Inclusion, the
14	Office of Licensing or your assigned investigator if
15	you have questions about how to fix a deficiency in
16	your application. We want to make sure that everyone
17	who submits an application gets to see that application
18	move forward in the review approval process. And we
19	can only do that when you help us make sure that your
20	application is full and complete. That is all that I
21	have for today's Chair's Report.
22	MR. SAID: Next item up on the agenda is
23	the Executive Director's Report.
24	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Director Brown, you
25	have the floor.

1	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: That
2	Madam Chair. So today I'm going to cover a couple
3	things. Number one, a licensing update. I'm going to
4	also provide some information regarding sales for the
5	third quarter of 2023 as well as look back at the last
6	year and some of the statistics we see in the market
7	and then also look at a snapshot of our medicinal
8	cannabis program. So here we have a map showing and
9	listing some of the recent license approvals. These
10	are businesses that have passed inspection and been
11	issued their licenses. You can see a list of new
12	recreational-only dispensaries. These include Camden
13	Apothecary, Soulflora, Hackettstown Dispensary, The
14	Cannabis Place, 1634 Funk, Pure Blossom. New
15	expansions into recreational, downtown FLWR, Garden
16	State Botanicals, Yuma Way. And there are more. And
17	then we have new medicinal-only dispensaries that have
18	opened up, Monteverde in Red Bank. And not listed here
19	opening expected to be opening at the end of the
20	month is Sanctuary Medicinals. Next slide, please.
21	Looking at licensing, we now received close to 2400
22	total applications. Of those 2400, 1650 have been
23	approved. There are 293 applications still under
24	review in the Office of Licensing. 138 of those are
25	pending resubmission following a cure. That means

ank you,

1	they've been issued a letter noting what they have to
2	do to move forward in the process and have not yet
3	responded. And there are 217 applications under review
4	in the Office of Compliance and Licensing. To date,
5	we've issued just one shy of 1300 conditional licenses,
6	208 conditional-to-annual conversions, 142 annuals, and
7	68 expanded ATCs. And the last number's the total
8	number of licences, not operating licenses. Operating
9	licenses would just be conditional to annual, annual
10	and expanded ATCs, but in total that's over 1700
11	licenses issued by the CRC. Today we have a slate of
12	27 conditional applications, 24 conditional-to-annual
13	conversion applications, nine annual applications, and
14	I believe four expanded ATCs.
15	And next I'm going to turn to a look at
16	sales for the last year and particularly for the third
17	quarter of 2023. I have some good news. New Jersey's
18	market continues to grow. For the first time in
19	history, legal cannabis sales in New Jersey eclipsed
20	200 million dollars in the third quarter of 2023. That
21	includes just shy of \$177 million of adult-use sales
22	and just shy of \$30 million of medicinal sales. We
23	continue to see medicinal sales come down slightly over
24	time. And then we continue to see adult-use sales grow
25	over time. In total, we're seeing at this point about

1	ten percent growth in the market quarter over quarter.
2	So that's three quarters of a billion dollars in total
3	cannabis sales in the last year. Looking month to
4	month, this is a list the 2023 year-to-date through the
5	end of October. You can see we started out with just
6	shy of \$50 million in adult-use sales in January and
7	ended October just shy of \$60 million in total sales.
8	So as more dispensaries open up, as more businesses,
9	you know, serve the market, we're seeing more consumers
10	come into the legal market and purchase legal cannabis.
11	And adult-use sales for the year and this doesn't
12	include medicinal at the end the October we're at
10	1 (#550 11)
13	about \$550 million.
14	about \$550 million. So looking at price, too, which we've
14	So looking at price, too, which we've
14 15	So looking at price, too, which we've looked at before, but the last price update I gave
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14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22	So looking at price, too, which we've looked at before, but the last price update I gave showed that prices were coming down. They continue to gradually come down. We've seen prices drop from on average just shy of \$14 per gram in January, and in October we ended at about 12.50 per gram. The year-to-date average is \$13 per gram. And this us for adult-use. Next slide. One interesting piece of data, because we're seeing prices come down, the growth in

1	sold in total grams of products, that's actually
2	increased by 40 percent. So because prices are
3	starting to come down, the growth in total sales is not
4	reflective of the total growth of the market. We are
5	seeing, you know, year-to-date 40 percent growth in
6	sales when it comes to grams. So, you know, that shows
7	as prices come down more and more, people are coming
8	into the legal market and are purchasing legal
9	cannabis. Next slide.
10	Here we see a breakdown of adult-use
11	sales mixed by product category. Flower continues to
12	be the most popular product category. About 40 just
13	over 40 percent of all sales are flower. Just shy of
14	30 percent are vape cartridges. That's, you know,
15	second highest purchase. And edibles come in third
16	just shy of 15 percent. Looking forward to 2024, we
17	expect to see that edible category grow especially
18	since the Commission approved a set of edible rules
19	that are now, you know, going through the publication,
20	public comment process, and also some waivers that have
21	expanded the ability for businesses to produce edibles.
22	Some of the lesser popular product categories are
23	concentrates. Pre-rolls at about 10 percent. And
24	shake and trim and capsules and pills under 1 percent.
25	Turning to the medicinal program, we

1	continue to see patient enrollment come down month over
2	month. We still have I think today 93,000 patients,
3	but that's a drop from over 120,000 patients in
4	September of 2022. So we are seeing people drop out of
5	the medicinal program. We have an agenda item today
6	that we'll get in a little bit that should hopefully
7	incentivize patients to say in the medicinal program.
8	But as adult-use sales are available, we're seeing the
9	patient roles come down slightly over time.
10	Additionally, the sales lessening as well. I think our
11	high point for medicinal sales was \$60 million or just
12	shy of \$60 million before adult-use was launched. And
13	we're now at about \$30 million. So this is our current
14	snapshot of patient enrollment. 93,924 patients
15	enrolled in the program. 5,372 caregivers, and 1,538
16	healthcare practitioners serving patients. And with
17	that, I'll turn it back to you, Madam Chair.
18	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you, Director
19	Brown. Are there any questions from the Board
20	regarding the information presented? Commissioner
21	Barker.
22	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Thank you for that
23	update, Executive Director Brown. As you eluded to, as
24	Madam Chair eluded to, there has been significant
25	expansion in the last to eight to ten months. I

1	believe the slide said more than 70 medicinal and
2	recreational dispensaries at across 18 counties. So
3	hat tip to the work you and staff are doing. I believe
4	and I will get this exact but I believe since
5	March 2023 there have been about 40 or 50 operational
6	cannabis businesses open in New Jersey. My question is
7	can staff please share how many of those businesses are
8	majority owned by Black, Indigenous, and Hispanic
9	people?
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Yes. So I
11	would just point you know, we did our full quarterly
12	report in September on majority ownership in awardees.
13	We have not compiled a data update since then. But,
14	you know, what we can do is our next quarterly report
15	is in January, and we can look at, you know, awardee
16	versus operational. That should be pretty easy to put
17	together. So while I don't have that data today, I
18	would refer you back to the September numbers for
19	overall ownership of awardees. And then, you know,
20	when we report those numbers out again in January, we
21	can look at operational versus, you know, versus still
22	in process.
23	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Thank you. And
24	I'll review those numbers again from September, but I
25	think my specific request and I'll memorialize this

2businesses that have been open since March. I believe3we had about 20-something for a while. We've been4accelerating that. We may be beyond 70 by the end of5the year. My question is for the 40 or 50 business6that have open since March, how many of those7businesses are Black, Indigenous, or Hispanic majority8ownership? 1	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Thank you.
2	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Any other questions
3	from the Board regarding the information provided?
4	COMMISSIONER BARKER: One more question.
5	Do you a see a significant increase in craft and local
6	cultivation awardees in 2024?
7	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: We don't have
8	a regulatory definition for craft. I could tell you
9	that, you know, certainly, you know, cannabis
10	connoisseurs are a discerning bunch. And, you know, I
11	I would look to, you know, consumers to determine
12	whether or not, you know, craft cannabis craft
13	cannabis is taking hold in New Jersey. You know, I
14	think our framework for licensing, for prioritizing,
15	you know, small independent businesses is working. You
16	know, my hope is that, you know, we continue to see
17	quality increase, continue to see price drop.
18	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: If there's nothing
19	further, then, Mr. Said, please, we'll move on to the
20	next agenda item.
21	MR. SAID: Next item on the agenda is
22	the Permitting and Licensing Committee report.
23	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: And so I'll be
24	giving today's Committee report for the Permitting and
25	Licensing Committee. We do have Commissioner Del

1	Cid-Kosso joining us remotely via phone. And so at
2	various points I will ask Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso if
3	she wants to add anything throughout the Committee
4	report. So for the extension requests received in
5	October and November that have been reviewed by the
6	Committee, we have 176 that have been granted for a
7	grand total of more than 800 conditional license
8	extensions granted this year. And so if you are in
9	need of an tension of your conditional license, go to
10	our website under the cannabis businesses tab. On the
11	right-hand side circled in red you'll see the form for
12	requesting an extension. And please, when you are
13	submitting that form, make sure that you are including
14	any attachments that you need to provide further
15	explanation of your situation or documentation that you
16	want to provide the Committee so that the Committee can
17	make a decision. Next slide, please. Sometimes
18	technology does not want us to win. While we're
19	waiting for that, I'll state that at the last Board
20	meeting I did report that some of the top reasons for
21	oh, there we go. Some of the top oh. Guess not.
22	Some of the top reasons that businesses were requesting
23	extensions, those being municipal approval delays, lack
24	of or delays with site control, and issues with getting
25	sufficient funding, the approximate number of

1	businesses that are requesting extensions in October
2	and November, we see those numbers not budging very
3	much. So nearly 70 percent of businesses with
4	conditional licenses are needing extensions because of
5	issues with getting municipal approval. And a little
6	more than half of them are still having issues with
7	getting site control or property for their businesses.
8	And, again, these two items are mandated by statute.
9	And so businesses have to get have to secure both
10	municipal approval and property control before they
11	submit their application for an annual license to the
12	CRC. Some of the top municipalities in which licensees
13	are waiting for town decisions in October and November
14	were Jersey City and Newark. We do see a lot of other
15	municipalities across the state both in the northern,
16	central, and southern regions that are having longer
17	municipal approval processes the businesses are getting
18	caught up in. At this point, I want to ask
19	Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso if she has anything else to
20	add before we move on.
21	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Yes, Madam
22	Chair. Thank you. I would just like to mention,
23	again, as you mentioned earlier that, you know, we are
24	seeing again and again the delays in municipal
25	approvals is a common reason for extension requests

1	made by the awardees. So we are seeing that as one of
2	our top issues that awardees are making these extension
3	requests to the Commission. I do want to take this
4	time to remind people to submit their extension
5	requests, there form 15 days prior to their respective
6	deadline. This deadline is very important to us
7	internally just because it gives the Committee
8	additional time to inquire to make any inquiries for
9	additional information from the awardee. So that's
10	very important to us. And finally, I would just like
11	to take the time to thank the staff that has been
12	assisting us with the Committee for the last year.
13	Your commitment to our mission doesn't go unnoticed.
14	But, again, thank you, Madam Chair, for allowing me to
15	speak the today.
16	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you,
17	Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso. Moving on, I do want to
18	address a request that Commissioner Nash made at the
19	last Board meeting with an assessment or an analysis of
20	those businesses that are being approved for
21	extensions. And so I believe, Commissioner Nash, you
22	asked for information about how many of these
23	businesses were social equity businesses. Our and
24	as the Permitting and Licensing Committee reviewed the
25	information that we had, we did not have the ability to

1	readily generate that number of social equity
2	businesses. It would require us opening up all 800
3	extensions to the applications for 800 extensions to
4	discern whether those social equity businesses.
5	However, we do have a breakdown of micro businesses
6	versus standard businesses and the type of the
7	classification of licenses that are being sought by
8	these business. So I do want to share at least the
9	information that we do have available. So of the
10	extensions that have been approved, about 41 percent of
11	them are micro businesses with approximately 58 percent
12	being standard businesses. And among the classes of
13	licenses, about a quarter, 25 percent of the
14	extensions, the conditional licenses that are being
15	extended are for cultivators, 14 percent are for
16	manufacturer's, and 70 percent are for retailers. So
17	these are the numbers that we were able to readily
18	assess from the data that we had, but the Permitting
19	and Licensing Committee's constantly thinking about its
20	extension request form and how we can improve that to
21	make sure that we are making data analysis
22	quantitative data analysis possible for us.
23	And then lastly, as we come to the end
24	of the Permitting and Licensing Committee's report, we
25	did want to note that there are a number of adult-use

1	annual license awardees who are approaching their
2	operational deadline. So these are businesses who have
3	had their applications approved for an annual or
4	conversion by the Board of Commissioners and now are
5	approaching their deadline as stipulated in the
6	regulations. You have 365 days from approval to
7	request your final on-site assessment. And that is
8	what is the benchmark to let us know that you are ready
9	to be operational, you are ready to open your doors and
10	finally commence your business activities as a licensed
11	cannabis business. So in this month, the month of
12	December we have 11 businesses that are coming up on
13	their operational deadline. We have 12 businesses that
14	are coming up on their operational deadline in January.
15	22 are coming up on their operational deadline in
16	February. And 17 are coming up on their operational
17	deadline in March. Again, we have 11 businesses whose
18	deadline is at the end of this month to request that
19	final on-site assessment. 12 have a deadline in New
20	January. 22 have a deadline in February. And 17 have
21	a deadline in March. So if you are in this bucket, if
22	you are in this group of businesses and you are
23	approaching your deadline and you feel like you don't
24	have enough time to complete everything that you need
25	to complete, be it construction, renovation, getting

1	final permits from the municipality or what have you,
2	please follow the process to request an extension. As
3	Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso mentioned, getting that in
4	at least 15 days in advance is critical. And so we
5	want to make sure that all of these businesses are
6	aware that they are coming up on their deadlines, and
7	there's an avenue to get an extension if you need it.
8	Please utilize these options that we're making
9	available to you. Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso, is there
10	anything else you'd like to add?
11	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: No. You
12	covered everything. Thank you.
13	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. Are
14	there any questions so that's it for the Permitting
15	and Licensing Committee report. Are there any
16	questions from the Board? Hearing none, Mr. Said, I
17	will turn it back over to you.
18	MR. SAID: Next item on the agenda is
19	the consideration of the schedule for regular meetings
20	for year 2024.
21	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you.
22	Director Brown, would you like to provide any summary
23	remarks? If not, I will turn it over to Vice Chair to
24	talk through the proposed schedule.
25	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Madam Chair,

1	I have no remarks. We're obviously supportive of the
2	schedule. Looks good.
3	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. Vice
4	Chair.
5	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Very good. So as
6	everyone can see up on the board, this is the 2024
7	schedule. All regular scheduled meetings will be at 44
8	South Clinton Avenue here in Trenton. And all meetings
9	will start at 11:00 a.m. promptly. For the
10	January 17th meeting, it's going to be a virtual
11	meeting. As you could see through the schedule, every
12	meeting date except for the January 17th meeting and
13	the May 8th meeting will be on Thursday. The
14	January 17th meeting is Wednesday and the May meeting
15	on May 8th is also a Wednesday. And that's all I have,
16	Madam Chairwoman. It's pretty self-explanatory.
17	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Indeed it is.
18	Thank you, Vice Chair Delgado.
19	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Thank you.
20	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Are there any
21	questions from the Board?
22	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Brief comment,
23	Madam Chair.
24	CHAIRWOMAN Comment or HOUENOU:
25	question?

1	COMMISSIONER BARKER: No question.
2	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Okay. If you have
3	a comment, by all means, and then we'll move then
4	I'll ask a question motion.
5	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Madam
6	Chair?
7	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Commissioner Del
8	Cid-Kosso, just give me I will come to you in one
9	moment. Commissioner Barker.
10	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Madam Chair, I can
11	wait until you make a motion and then ask if there are
12	any questions on the motion.
13	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Understood. Thank
14	you, Commissioner Barker. Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
15	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: I want to
16	ask Commissioner Vice Chair Delgado if there was no
17	meeting in August and is he a hundred percent sure
18	about the schedule.
19	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Well, Commissioner
20	Del Cid-Kosso, as you can see there is no meeting in
21	August. However, you know, the Commission can always
22	place a meeting in August if one needs to be done just
23	like we can schedule a meeting in November if it needs
24	to be done. But right now there is no August meeting.
25	Nor is there a November meeting in 2024.

1	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: I noticed
2	that. Thank you.
3	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: You're welcome.
4	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you,
5	Commissioner Del Cid. Any other questions from the
6	Board regarding the information that Vice Chair Delgado
7	shared? Hearing none, is there a motion on this
8	matter?
9	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Madam Chairwoman, I
10	move that we accept the 2024 meeting schedule.
11	COMMISSIONER NASH: Second.
12	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by Vice Chair
13	Delgado and seconded by Commissioner Nash. Is there
14	any discussion on this motion?
15	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Brief discussion,
16	Madam Chair.
17	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Commissioner
18	Barker, go ahead.
19	COMMISSIONER BARKER: We know and we've
20	heard from the public and from experience that
21	businesses need as many opportunities as possible to
22	move through the process. And so I hope we can
23	reconsider scheduling a meeting at least once every
24	month to continue to move applicants along. I wish we
25	could have included it during this motion. And I hope

1	we are open to amending the schedule before we get to
2	those months where there is no meeting scheduled.
3	Thank you.
4	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: So Commissioner
5	Barker, are you making are you moving to amend the
6	schedule?
7	COMMISSIONER BARKER: I mean, I'm not
8	because I don't want to put anybody on the spot. I
9	don't believe I have the votes. So I'm willing to go
10	back to the table at the office and see if we can get
11	this course corrected and put it on the table in a
12	subsequent meeting in front of the public. I don't
13	want to just make a motion for the sake of making a
14	motion. But I do want to express and I think staff
15	I mean the public has expressed to us and we have been
16	down this road it's important to have a meeting every
17	month. Applicants are waiting and burning cash. And
18	for us to not be meeting and to hold them up I, think
19	we should reconsider that.
20	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: All right. So
21	that's a comment. You're not moving to amend the
22	motion. Okay. All right. So with that, is there any
23	further discussion on this motion to accept the 2024
24	schedule? Hearing no further discussion, Mr. Said, can
25	you please call the vote?

1	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
2	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Nay.
3	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
4	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Yes.
5	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
6	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.
7	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
8	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes.
9	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?
10	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yes.
11	MR. SAID: The motion passes. Next item
12	on the agenda are regulatory requirement waivers.
13	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. And
14	here we have two I believe, yes, two regulatory
15	requirement waivers for the Board to consider. So I
16	will turn to Director Brown for any summary remarks.
17	Apologies. Just one waiver. My apologies. I
18	misspoke. There is only one regulatory requirement
19	waiver under consideration. Director Brown, please
20	provide the floor is yours for any remarks.
21	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Yes. Thank
22	you, Madam Chair. You know, dating back to 2018 when
23	the governor issued his sixth Executive Order asking
24	the Department of Health to look at ways to improve
25	access to the medicinal cannabis at the time

1	medicinal marijuana program, we've looked for ways to
2	do just that, to help patients enrolled, help them stay
3	enrolled, and help them access the medicine that many
4	of them rely on. In the EO 6 response, the Department
5	of Health reduced fees for enrollment. At the time
6	they were \$200 for every two years or \$20 if you
7	qualified for a reduced fee. That was limited to
8	people on government assistance. At the Department of
9	Health we then reduced that two-year fee to 100, cut it
10	in half, and expanded eligibility for the reduced fees
11	to include seniors and veteran. This Board approved
12	further reductions in I believe it was the summer of
13	2022 reducing that \$100 fee to \$50 and keeping that \$20
14	fee for reduced fee cards in that expanded eligibility
15	group. Now that, you know, sales are improving,
16	there's more revenue coming in as far as fees and other
17	things, we can continue to look at our fees for
18	patients and caregivers and make sure that we're doing
19	everything that we can to make sure people can access
20	the medicinal cannabis program.
21	And so before you you have a further
22	waiver to reduce fees, to reduce registration fees for
23	all patients to \$10. And that if approved, that
24	would take effect today at 5:00 p.m. So there are
25	probably some patients who are waiting to pay in the

1	registry. I would encourage you to wait until
2	5:00 p.m. We'll update all the fees to make sure
3	they're set to the new fee if approved. And then in
4	early 2024, the other piece of this waiver, we expect
5	to roll out digital identification cards in the patient
6	registry. As many of you may know or not, we created a
7	new thanks to a team of folks who worked on it
8	launched a new patient portal. Previously that's going
9	to enable us to credit digital-only ID cards. That
10	reduces staff time needed to print those cards. It
11	reduces staff time needed to review. And so
12	corresponding with the release of those digital ID
13	cards in early 2024, if a patient or caregiver opts for
14	a digital ID card, it will be free. There will be no
15	cost from the CRC to process that. There will continue
16	to be a \$10 fee for those who opt for a physical card.
17	There will certainly be some people who opt to do that.
18	For example, there are states who offer reciprocity.
19	Sometimes you need to have a physical card in order to
20	do that. But if you're just accessing the market here,
21	you will be able to get a free digital ID card with
22	your registration. We hope that this further reduces
23	costs for patients, helps them stay enrolled in the
24	program if they, you know, can benefit from medicinal
25	cannabis. And this waiver is recommended for approval.

1	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you, Director
2	Brown. Are there any questions from the Board
3	regarding the information provided?
4	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yeah. I have one
5	question.
6	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Vice Chair Delgado.
7	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Director Brown, on
8	the digital IDs, is that are they perpetual, or do
9	they have to re-up every couple years?
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: No. They'll
11	still have to renew every two years like a regular
12	card, but they'll be able to renew with a digital ID
13	card.
14	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Thank you.
15	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Any other questions
16	from the Board for Director Brown? Hearing none, is
17	there a motion on this matter?
18	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Madam Chair, I
19	move that we approve the waiver.
20	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Second.
21	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by
22	Commissioner Barker and seconded by Commissioner Del
23	Cid-Kosso. Is there any discussion on this motion to
24	approve the waiver? Hearing no discussion, Mr. Said,
25	can you please call the vote?

1	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
2	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Aye.
3	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
4	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Before I
5	cast my vote, I would just like to say that four years
6	ago I recall sitting in the legislative committee
7	listening to Jake Honig's father share the obstacles
8	that their families face as their seven-year old son
9	battles brain cancer. And then again in the summer of
10	2019 I heard him speak as Governor Murphy signed the
11	Jake Honig Compassionate Youth Medical Cannabis Act.
12	Many of the medical reforms are thanks to the Jake
13	Honig Act. And I admit that we still have a lot of
14	work to do ahead of us in order for us to improve the
15	medical program. And I am proud to support this.
16	Today's waiver is for Jake Honig and the 93,000
17	patients that are currently enrolled. So my vote is
18	yes.
19	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
20	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.
21	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
22	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes.
23	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?
24	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yes.
25	MR. SAID: The motion passes. Next item

- 1 on the agenda are the advisory notices on regulatory
- 2 policy.

3	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. And
4	here we have two advisory notices that are under
5	consideration. So the first being with respect to
6	alternative treatment center permits and the renewal of
7	such. So Director Brown, I will turn it over to you.
8	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Thank you.
9	And I'm just going to cover both because they're very
10	similar, and then the Commission can proceed to vote.
11	And these this really just codifies, you know, the
12	practice for any number of years. Honestly, predates
13	me under DOH. They're two medicinal permits. And then
14	there are testing laboratory licenses. And pursuant to
15	the corresponding regulations, they are on the calendar
16	year. When a business or a testing laboratory becomes
17	operational during a calendar year, there's a partial
18	year, you know, essentially permit or license. And so,
19	you know, what past practice has been is to not require
20	that full renewal, you know, including submission of
21	renewal forms and everything required by regulation
22	until there's been a full year on that permit. And
23	actually, there's a regulation that states, you know,
24	permit shall be in effect for one year. So, you know,
25	these advisory, you know, policies just codify that as

1	it pertains to medicinal cannabis permits and testing
2	laboratory licenses. So, you know, if a testing
3	laboratory or ATC is issued a permit today, you know,
4	that first renewal even though the 365 days wouldn't be
5	up until, you know, 12/7/2024, they would get some
6	extra time before that full renewal is necessary.
7	Madam Chair, as you noted, you know, as we look to
8	update regulations both medicinal and make updates to
9	adult use, we're going to look at this issue and try to
10	get it in line so it's more manageable for all. But
11	this just acknowledges what that practice is and the
12	fact that, you know, on that initial year you're not
13	going to get a partial year, you'll get a full year and
14	then plus whatever that extra is before that renewal
15	occurs. So this is recommended these advisory, you
16	know, advisory notices on regulatory policies are
17	recommended for approval here. Just codify the
18	practice and so that everybody's on the same page as to
19	how we move forward as it pertains to both medicinal
20	cannabis alternative treatment center permits and
21	testing laboratory licenses.
22	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you, Director
23	Brown. Are there any questions from the Board
24	regarding the information provided? Hearing none, we
25	will start with the first being the advisory notice

1	with respect to renewal of the alternative treatment
2	center permits. Is there a motion on that matter?
3	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Madam
4	Chair, I move to adopt the approval renewal process for
5	the newly permitted medical cannabis businesses.
6	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by
7	Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso to approve.
8	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: I second.
9	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Seconded by Vice
10	Chair Delgado. Is there any discussion on this motion
11	to approve the advisory notice? Hearing no discussion,
12	Mr. Said, can you please call the vote?
13	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
14	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Abstain.
15	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
16	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Yes.
17	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
18	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.
19	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
20	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes.
21	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?
22	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yes.
23	MR. SAID: The motion passes.
24	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Now, with respect
25	to the renewal of the testing laboratory licenses, is

1	there a motion on that advisory notice?
2	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Madam Chair, I move
3	that we approve the renewal process for the newly
4	for the testing laboratory process.
5	COMMISSIONER NASH: Second.
6	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by Vice Chair
7	Delgado. Seconded by Commissioner Nash. Is there a
8	second? I'm sorry. Is there any discussion on this
9	motion to approve the advisory notice? Hearing no
10	discussion, Mr. Said, can you please call the vote?
11	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
12	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Abstain.
13	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
14	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Yes.
15	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
16	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.
17	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
18	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes.
19	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?
20	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yes.
21	MR. SAID: The motion passes. Next item
22	on the agenda is the consideration of applications for
23	name changes.
24	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you.
25	Director Brown, I'll turn it over to you to describe

1 to provide remarks on those applications for name

2 changes received.

3	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Thank you,
4	Madam Chair. The Commission has six name changes up
5	for consideration. They've, you know, filed with the
6	Secretary of State, filed with us. They're all
7	recommended for approval. And the next slide those
8	shows the list of those old names and the new names in
9	bold. So they're recommended for approval. Thank you.
10	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. Is
11	there a motion I'm sorry. Are there any questions
12	from the Board for Director Brown regarding the
13	information provided? No questions. So is there a
14	motion on this matter?
15	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Madam Chair, I
16	move that we approve the applications to change the
17	business names.
18	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Second.
19	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by
20	Commissioner Barker and seconded by Commissioner Del
21	Cid-Kosso. Is there any discussion on this motion?
22	Hearing none, Mr. Said, can you please call the vote?
23	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
24	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Aye.
25	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?

1	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Yes.
2	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
3	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.
4	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
5	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes.
6	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?
7	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: I'm going to vote
8	yes. However, I will ask staff with respect to the
9	Goldfinch Wellness, LLC that is seeking to change their
10	name to the Green Pony Dispensary to confirm with the
11	business that the display of that name will not be in a
12	manner that is enticing to children given the actual
13	name that is being used. My vote is yes.
14	MR. SAID: The motion passes. Next item
15	on the agenda is the consideration of applications for
16	location changes.
17	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you.
18	Director Brown, the floor is yours.
19	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Thank you.
20	So the Board has before it an application for a
21	location change from Ascend, a class five retailer as
22	well as medicinal cannabis dispensary. It's currently
23	located at 395 Bloomfield Avenue in Montclair. They
24	have applied to move that location to 325 NJ-215 North
25	in Wharton. Both those locations are in the northern

1	region. They've submitted the requisite documentation
2	for the location change. You know, process wise, if
3	approved, there will obviously be some time it will
4	take some time to actually shift operations. You know,
5	we'll make sure, you know, any patients being served
6	are adequately noticed and that, you know, things are
7	transferred in an orderly manner. But Ascend has
8	applied to make this business decision. And they've
9	submitted everything that they are required to submit.
10	And we are recommending this location change for
11	approval.
12	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you, Director
13	Brown. Are there any questions from the Board
14	regarding the information Director Brown provided?
15	Hearing no questions, is there a motion on this matter?
16	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Madam Chair, I move
17	that we approve the location change for Ascend located
18	in Montclair to Wharton, New Jersey.
19	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by Vice Chair
20	Delgado. Is there a second?
21	COMMISSIONER NASH: Second.
22	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Seconded by
23	Commissioner Nash. Is there any discussion on this
24	motion to approve the location change?
25	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Madam

1 Chair, if I may?

2	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Commissioner Del
3	Cid-Kosso, the floor is yours.
4	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Thank you.
5	So this is just something to consider. When I was
6	reviewing the materials, I noticed there is a 25 mile
7	distance between the old and the new location. And
8	also the proposed location's in a whole different
9	county than the original one. Again, this is a
10	business decision that was made. However, I do hope
11	that these entities are having conversations with the
12	employees ahead of time so that they can restructure or
13	employees can plan ahead of these changes. Right?
14	Because we don't know, but from employees may depend on
15	public transportation to get to their job. So an
16	additional 30 minutes from their location, you know,
17	from the original location could be an issue for those
18	them please. So just for planning purposes, I do hope
19	that these businesses are having conversations with
20	their employees about, you know, what changes are
21	coming. Thank you.
22	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you,
23	Commissioner Del Cid. Is there any further discussion
24	on this motion? Hearing no further discussion, Mr.
25	Said, can you please call the vote?

1	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
2	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Abstain.
3	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
4	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Yes.
5	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
6	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.
7	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
8	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes.
9	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?
10	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: I agree and echo
11	Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso's comments regarding making
12	sure businesses are communicating with their workers
13	and accommodating their workers as appropriate. With
14	that, my vote is yes.
15	MR. SAID: The motion passes. Next item
16	on the agenda is the consideration of medicinal
17	cannabis business permit renewals.
18	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Director Brown, the
19	floor is yours.
20	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Thank you,
21	Madam Chair. So as we just went over with the advisory
22	notice regarding permit renewals, we have two cohorts
23	of alternative treatment centers up for renewal for
24	calendar year 2024. Their permits do run on the

1	operation for more than one year who are required to
2	submit the full renewal application and require fees
3	and then those who are operational less than one year.
4	All of those who have been operational less than one
5	year came in through the 2019 RFA. And fees were
6	collected for that RFA to cover the cost of the first
7	full year of permit issuance. So for the first cohort,
8	again, that full pursuant to regulation the full
9	application, renewal application is required, the regs
10	say to renew a permit they have to submit that
11	application, pay the fees. And then those operational
12	less than one year, staff did, you know, make sure they
13	were still compliant with post cohort conditions
14	particularly for the 2019 RFA. In the memo for
15	Commissioners, the locations are noted as well as
16	staff's assessment for what they, you know,
17	completeness of their submissions, whether or not there
18	are any unresolved enforcement actions and, you know,
19	looked at made sure they all had active labor peace
20	agreements. So there are in total 32 up for renewal
21	here. There are 15 in operation for more than one year
22	and 17 in operation for less than one year. Those 17
23	all 32 will have to do a full renewal next year.
24	They are all recommended for approval. They are all in
25	staff's opinion, you know, in compliance. We don't

1	have any unresolved enforcement actions pending against
2	any of them. And we do recommend all 32 to be renewed.
3	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. And is
4	the list of businesses there we go. Perfect. Thank
5	you. Some of these businesses do have multiple
6	locations. Not Director Brown, just for
7	clarification, the all of the locations that are
8	represented by these entities are being up for renewal?
9	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: That's
10	correct. Under the medicinal rules, the permit the
11	permit is renewed as a whole. And so they, you know,
12	there are vertically integrated entities on this list.
13	And so, you know, essentially the renewal application
14	is for renewal of all of those locations.
15	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yes, Commissioner
16	Nash.
17	COMMISSIONER NASH: Director Brown, so
18	you cannot separate out one of the facilities from an
19	entity because they're vertically integrated; correct?
20	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: I'm going to
21	have to consult Chief Counsel.
22	CHIEF COUNSEL RIGGS: That's correct.
23	They're entity specific, not location specific under
24	the medical rules.
25	COMMISSIONER NASH: Thank you.

1	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Any other questions
2	from the Board? With that, is there a motion on this
3	matter? Is there a motion on this matter?
4	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes, Madam Chair.
5	[Inaudible.]
6	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by Vice Chair
7	Delgado to approve all 32 businesses. Is there a
8	second?
9	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Second.
10	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Seconded by
11	Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso. Is there any discussion on
12	this motion to approve?
13	COMMISSIONER NASH: Madam Chair?

17	a motion to separate to consider Columbia Care
18	separately.
19	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: So Commissioner
20	Nash, you are moving to remove from consideration at
21	this immediate time the application for permit renewal
22	for Columbia Care New Jersey LLC? The current motion
23	on the floor is to approve all of them. So at present
24	we would need to either entertain a motion to amend the
25	current motion on the floor, or if the motion that's

1	currently operation floor fails then the floor will be
2	open to any motion.
3	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes. So I would
4	consider Columbia Care at this meeting a separate
5	motion.
6	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: So you would like
7	to amend the motion?
8	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.
9	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Would you please
10	state just for clarity what the amended motion would
11	be? The motion presently on the floor is to approve
12	all 32 businesses as recommended. And you are seeking

17	looking to amend the motion, what would you like the

21	31. Yes. 31.

23	to amend the prior motion to approve 31 businesses,
24	their medical permit renewal with the exception and
25	not Columbia Care New Jersey, LLC? Consider that

8	or conditional permit." I'm pointing to this because
9	at present with the information that the Board has
10	received thus far it seems that there are several
11	businesses who might be violation of that provision of
12	the statute. The Board has requested staff to assess
13	the conditions on the ground. We've also consulted
14	with our legal counsel. And so the Board may take
15	action based on this statutory language at a later
16	date. But I want to point to it now because it is
17	important and it has come up and this Board has made it
18	very clear what its position is on maintaining the
19	statutory and regulatory requirements that have been
20	put in place. Because, again, it is important for us
21	as an agency to say what we mean and mean what we say.
22	With that stated, my vote is yes to approve the 31 ATC
23	permit renewals.
24	MR. SAID: The motion passes.
25	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: So now

1	the remaining ATC for consideration, Columbia Care New
2	Jersey. Is there a motion related to that entity?

13	to deny Columbia Care New Jersey, LLC's application for
14	renewal. Is there a second on this motion to deny?
15	Again, I'll ask for a second on this motion to deny.
16	There's no second, so this motion fails. Is there a
17	motion with respect to the pending matter of Columbia
18	Care New Jersey, LLC?
19	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Madam
20	Chair?
21	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yes, Commissioner
22	Del Cid?
23	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: I move to
24	approve Columbia Care with stipulations that will be
25	addressed in the FAD.

1	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: All right.
2	Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso has moved to approve
3	Columbia Care New Jersey, LLC with stipulations.
4	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO:
5	Stipulations and conditions that will be addressed in
6	the FAD.
7	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you.
8	Stipulations and conditions addressed in the final
9	agency decision. Is there a second on this motion?
10	I'll second the motion and ask that Commissioner Del
11	Cid-Kosso identify any stipulations or conditions that
12	she might have in mind at present.
13	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: I believe
14	there were some concerns that the Board had in terms of
15	the CBA, the collective bargaining agreement, and some
16	of the LPA condition. And we wanted to, one, gather
17	more information and two, allow the awardee to allow
18	the licensee to provide that information to the Board
19	as soon as possible.
20	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. Is
21	there any other discussion on this motion to approve
22	Columbia Care New Jersey, LLC'S permit renewal with
23	stipulations and conditions that will be addressed in
24	the final agency decision?
25	COMMISSIONER NASH: Madam Chair, I'd

1 like to make a s	tatement.
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2	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Commissioner Nash,
3	the floor is yours.
4	COMMISSIONER NASH: I motioned to
5	separate the application of Columbia Care,
6	sophisticated multi-state operator making millions in
7	revenue here in New Jersey. I don't believe that they
8	in my opinion I don't believe they're respecting
9	their workers or they're choosing to ignore the
10	specific legislation of the Jake Honig Law which
11	protects those workers. I could spend an hour
12	reviewing the labor laws from the Jake Honig Act and
13	the twisted methods employed to avoid them. The bottom
14	line based on the many reports that I have reviewed, in
15	my view the workers of Columbia Care voted to be
16	represented by UFCW. Notwithstanding that vote, the
17	applicant has not bargained in good faith with that
18	union. It hasn't even come to the table. And that is
19	a direct violation of the Jake Honig Law and its
20	explicit labor mandates. I have always made my
21	position very clear as some of you may know. If an
22	applicant steps on an New Jersey's worker's rights I
23	will always vote no. And that is my vote here. I see
24	the floor back to you, Madam Chair.
25	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you,

1	Commissioner Nash. Any additional discussion? I want
2	to reiterate just as I did on the last matter that the
3	Commission has the regulatory authority to deny medical
4	permits if the applicant is non-compliant with
5	applicable local rules, ordinances and/or zoning
6	requirements, or if the Commission determines that the
7	facility is in violation of the Jake Honig Act or
8	Chapter 30A of the Administrative Code. And I want to
9	underscore again Jake Honig Act explicitly states,
10	"Failure to enter into a collective bargaining
11	agreement within 200 days after that medical cannabis
12	operator first opens shall result in the suspension or
13	revocation of such permit or conditional permit." This
14	agency needs to say what it means and mean what it
15	says. That is the only way that a regulated industry
16	can have some level of confidence in what will be
17	forthcoming. I understand staff's position. And I
18	thank staff for their time in collecting materials and
19	information from the businesses, from all 32 businesses
20	that are up for permit renewal today. I think the
21	statute is quite clear. And I think the regulations
22	are clear in that the Commission has in its authority,
23	is well within its authority to verify that the Act,
24	the Jake Honig Law, is being adhered to. These
25	businesses, many of these businesses not all of them

1	but many of them have been operational for several
2	years. Jake Honig Act was signed in 2019. This is not
3	a new requirement. So while the Commission is just now
4	presented the Board is just now presented with an
5	opportunity to look through these medical permit
6	renewals, the law is not new. And so I want to just
7	underscore that point. This agency needs to say what
8	it means and mean what it says. And I intend to do the
9	same. Is there any further discussion on this matter?
10	Director Brown, you wish to provide comment. Yes.
11	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Just quickly,
12	I did just want to reiterate staff's recommendation to
13	approve Columbia Care. They understand the Board has
14	concerns. As previously shared, they serve 5,000
15	active patients. I think 8,000 patients total. And I
16	would just urge the Board to take them into
17	consideration with all the factors. And, you know, our
18	recommendation stands to approve Columbia Care's
19	renewal.
20	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you, Director
21	Brown. Any further discussion? Vice Chair Delgado.
22	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: There seems to be a
23	disconnect between the staff and the Board. So I just
24	want Director Brown to help me understand why, you
25	know, what did you base your approval on considering

1	that Commissioner Nash here there seems to be a
2	consensus on the Board that they're not in compliance.
3	Why are you saying they are? Obviously, your opinion
4	is that they are in compliance because you recommended
5	it, and on this side of the house there seems to be a
6	question about whether they are or not.
7	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Yeah. I
8	mean, I would just
9	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Explain it.
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: I would just
11	refer you know, the Board we covered, you know,
12	in Executive Session. I don't want to really delve
13	into my comments made there because it's protected. I
14	would say, you know, staff's thorough review of the,
15	you know, the entity, the documentation submitted, the
16	compliance record, you know, we balance of all those
17	factors, still recommend them for approval. I'm glad
18	the Board is considering approving with conditions
19	rather than denial. I think denial could really create
20	some, you know, extenuating circumstances for some, you
21	know, very vulnerable individuals that are served by
22	Columbia Care. So, you know, I certainly, it would
23	be far more supportive of approval with conditions to
24	address the Board's concerns rather than an outright
25	denial. Certainly, staff can work with the Board to

1	address those concerns, but I would, you know, like to
2	see continued operation here. And we do think on
3	balance, you know, with the regulations that we do have
4	that, you know, our recommendation is to approve them
5	for renewal. Again, I do want to reiterate if the
6	Board has concerns our strong recommendation is to
7	address those through a condition on the approval
8	instead of denial.
9	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: General Counsel
10	Riggs is not here. I wanted to ask him the same
11	question, but let's just move on.
12	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you, Vice
13	Chair Delgado. Thank you, Director Brown. I think it
14	is not lost on any of the five members of this Board
15	the implications that each of our decisions carry.
16	That includes decisions that impact patients who are
17	fighting debilitating conditions and in need of relief.
18	And given that this particular part of the law, statute
19	has been in place since 2019, I would hope that all
20	businesses are reading the law that affects them and
21	understanding understand and acknowledge the fact
22	that their decisions impact patients, their decisions
23	impact workers who are looking to provide for
24	themselves and their families, and that their decisions
25	impact adult-use consumers who have the constitutional

1	right to use and possess cannabis. Any further
2	discussion?
3	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: I see the General
4	Counsel's back.
5	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Would you like to
6	pose the question?
7	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes. I wanted to
8	ask him the same question I asked Director Brown.
9	General Counsel Chris Riggs, Christopher Riggs, there
10	seems to be a disconnect between the staff and the
11	Commission, Commissioners. Staff recommended Columbia
12	Care to be approved, their medical to be approved. And
13	we took we took we've just voted to take Columbia
14	Care out of the 32 entities that are supposed to be
15	approved for their medical licenses. What's the
16	disconnect? The question is you're the general counsel
17	of this Commission. Why was the why did you approve
18	why did the staff approve Columbia Care? They're
19	out of compliance.
20	CHIEF COUNSEL RIGGS: You're seeking
21	legal advice
22	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Speak louder.
23	CHIEF COUNSEL RIGGS: Sorry. If you're
24	seeking legal advice on this, I would recommend that we
25	go into closed session, and we can counsel you again on

1	this issue just as we did in Executive Session.
2	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Let's just keep
3	going.
4	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you, Vice
5	Chair Delgado. Thank you, Counsel Riggs. Is there any
6	further discussion on this motion to approve Columbia
7	Care New Jersey, LLC's permit renewal with stipulations
8	and conditions that will be addressed in their final
9	agency decision? Hearing no further discussion, on the
10	motion to approve Columbia Care New Jersey, LLC's
11	permit renewal with stipulations and conditions that
12	will be addressed in the final agency decision, Mr.
13	Said, can you please call the vote?
14	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
15	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Abstain.
16	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
17	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Yes.
18	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
19	COMMISSIONER NASH: No.
20	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
21	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes.
22	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?
23	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: As the person who
24	carries the weight of being the last to cast their

25 vote, I have that distinct honor that always gives me

1	joy, as I cast my vote I want to make it very clear
2	that I believe that this agency through the staff and
3	the Board have done tremendous good work for patients,
4	for adult-use consumers, for entrepreneurs who want to
5	realize their business dreams and for the broader
6	public who need to see a level of assurances from the
7	government agency that we are taking our duties to
8	expand and build this industry safely and responsibly.
9	For me, it is paramount that our agency operate with
10	integrity, that we, again I sound leak a broken
11	record to say what we mean and mean what we say and
12	make it very clear to the public, to those regulated
13	entities so that they know what they can expect from us
14	and they know what the rules of the road are. For
15	businesses that choose to not abide by the rules of the
16	road, they have to be held accountable for their
17	actions because those actions affect people. They
18	affect patients. They affect workers. They affect
19	adult-use consumers. And they affect public health and
20	public safety. Here, when it comes to the issues of
21	labor rights, I am everything all right? Okay. I
22	want to see documentation, definitive documentation
23	about what is happening on the ground in these
24	facilities. I know we've sought legal counsel, and our
25	legal counsel needs some time to assess some of the

1	questions that were presented. So I want to give our
2	legal counsels times to do that assessment thoroughly,
3	completely so that we can make an informed decision.
4	But nothing in the regulations, nothing in the statute
5	prevents the Commission from coming back even after
6	today to underscore the importance of adhering to the
7	law. And so I am challenging my Board members and our
8	staff to make sure that we as a collective do that.
9	That we as a collective say what we mean, mean what we
10	say, and hold ourselves and our industry accountable
11	for their actions. With that, my vote is yes.
12	MR. SAID: The motion passes. Next item
13	for consideration is the adult-use cannabis business
14	conditional license applications.
15	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Director Brown, the
16	floor is yours.
17	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Thank you,
18	Madam Chair. And for this, we have a recommendation
19	report covering all three classes, conditional,
20	conditional-to-conversion and annual. I'm going to run
21	through all of them and make the recommendation and
22	then the Commission can proceed to vote on the
23	different cohorts. I know that we'll have to the
24	conditionals come back to a second cohort, but overall,
25	there are 27 conditional applications, 24 conversions,

1	nine annuals up for consideration here. For the
2	conditional applications specifically, five
3	cultivators, three manufacturers. We have important to
4	note first of our new classes of licenses. So we have
5	a class three wholesaler, two class four distributors,
6	as well as two class six delivery services. So these
7	were the applications that we opened up for in
8	September. And so these applications, they've been
9	assessed for priority, assigned to priority based on
10	their qualifications whether it's social equity,
11	business, diversely-owned business, impact zone, or
12	otherwise. That priority's been verified. They've
13	been reviewed for completeness. They've been scored.
14	They've all scored sufficiently high for approval.
15	They've been reviewed for qualification limitations and
16	financial management at least initial for conditional
17	applications. And for the conditional conversion and
18	annual applications, they're reviewed to determine
19	whether or not they qualify as a license holder under
20	our regulations of the statute. We conduct quality
21	control to make sure nothing's missed and that they are
22	indeed compliant, and then they're recommended to the
23	Board. So here we have 27 conditional licenses.
24	Breakdown as displayed on the slide. All recommended
25	for approval by the CRC Board.

1	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you, Director
2	Brown. Are there any questions from the Board
3	regarding the information provided? The overall
4	information provided? Hearing no questions, with
5	respect to conditional license applications sorry.
6	Director Brown, can you provide can you reiterate
7	apologies if I missed this earlier the
8	recommendation with respect to the conditional license
9	applications?
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Sorry. The
11	recommendation is to approve the 27 conditional license
12	applications.
13	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. So on
14	the matter of 27 conditional license applications
15	before us, is there a motion?
16	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Madam Chair, I
17	move that we approve the 27 conditional license
18	applications.
19	COMMISSIONER NASH: Second.
20	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by
21	Commissioner Barker and seconded by Commissioner Nash.
22	Is there any discussion on this motion? Hearing no
23	discussion, Mr. Said, can you please call the vote?
24	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
25	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Aye.

1	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
2	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Yes.
3	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
4	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.
5	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
6	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes.
7	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?
8	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yes.
9	MR. SAID: The motion passes. Next item
10	up for consideration is the adult-use cannabis business
11	conversion license applications.
12	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Director Brown, is
13	there any further information you wish to provide?
14	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: So these
15	applications as noted, they followed the process I just
16	outlined. All I think there are 24 of them. Yep.
17	All 24 are recommended for approval by the CRC Board.
18	And yes. 24 recommended for approval. The
19	breakdown, four cultivators, four manufacturers, 16
20	retailers.
21	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. And do
22	we have a list of the 24?
23	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yeah, it's on here.
24	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: I just note
25	that list is also posted online.

1	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. Yes.
2	Good note. So for those watching at home or wishing to
3	review this list afterwards, it is posted online on our
4	website. If you go to our meetings page click on the
5	relevant agenda item. That should give you the list of
6	businesses under consideration today. So with respect
7	to the 24 applications, is there a motion?
8	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Madam Chair, I move
9	consideration of the 24 applications to convert from
10	conditional to annual class one, cannabis cultivator
11	class two, cannabis manufacture class five, and
12	cannabis retail license.
13	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: When you say
14	"consider", do you mean to approve?
15	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: I move to yes,
16	to approve. That's what I mean.
17	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you.
18	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: You're welcome.
19	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Is there a second
20	on this motion?
21	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Second.
22	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Seconded by
23	Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso. Is there any discussion on
24	this motion?
25	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Brief discussion,

1 Madam Chair. 2 CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Commissioner 3 Barker. COMMISSIONER BARKER: I just want to 4 thank the staff for their hard work and ask that we 5 continue to improve on the overall number of cannabis 6 7 businesses that are being recommended to the Board 8 especially those that are majority by Black and 9 Hispanic and Indigenous people and businesses located in communities that have been most harmed by the failed 10 11 war on drugs. I really hope that we can dig deep and 12 make significant strides in '24. Thank you. 13 COMMISSIONER NASH: Madam Chair, I have 14 a question for the Director. CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Commissioner Nash. 15 16 COMMISSIONER NASH: Thank you. Director 17 Brown, now that we've been doing this for a couple years with review, the applications and staff is like a 18 19 well-oiled machine, what is the timeline approximately 20 now for people who have submitted for a conversion and 21 assuming there's, you know, no cures to consideration by the Board? 22

- 23 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: If there's no
- 24 cures and, you know, it's just smooth sailing and
- 25 everybody's responsive, timely, you know, et cetera, it

1	can be about six months. I think most are in the six
2	to eight-month range right now with, you know, some
3	requests for additional information, potentially some
4	cures. There's certainly, you know, some that could be
5	faster depending on, you know, complexity of the
6	company as well as, you know, how quickly we can get
7	the information we need, you know, as far as background
8	checks and stuff like that. But I think, you know, if
9	everything's there and it can just move through, we're
10	around six months. That said, I think most right now
11	even with some cures are in the six- to eight- or
12	nine-month range for the annuals or conversions.
13	That's accounting for some cures. And you see with the
14	conditionals, we're the first from the new classes
15	which we didn't start accepting until September 27th
16	are now being recommended for approval less than
17	90 days from when they submitted.
18	COMMISSIONER NASH: Good to hear. Thank
19	you.
20	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: And so for those
21	who aren't who are on the longer end of that average
22	timeline, remember, fill out your application fully and
23	completely and make sure that your contact information
24	is up to date so that the CRC staff can contact you to
25	get those deficiencies fixed. Any additional

1	discussion on this motion to approve the conversion
2	applications? Hearing no further discussion, Mr. Said,
3	can you please call the vote?
4	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
5	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Aye.
6	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
7	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Yes.
8	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
9	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.
10	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
11	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes.
12	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?
13	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yes.
14	MR. SAID: The motion passes.
15	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: I believe we now
16	turn to the annual licenses. Is that right? Direct to
17	annual?
18	MR. SAID: That's correct. That's
19	correct, Madam Chairwoman.
20	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: All right.
21	Director Brown, is there any additional information you
22	wish to provide regarding the applications going
23	straight to the annual license?
24	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Here we have
25	for consideration by the Board nine annual licenses,

1	two cultivators, three manufacturers, four retailers.
2	Followed the process that I outlined. All have been
3	deemed complete, scored sufficiently high, deemed
4	qualified by staff, and are recommended for approval.
5	And the list is on the next slide. And there we have
6	the list. It's also posted online. These are all
7	of these annual applications are recommended for
8	approval.
9	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. Any
10	questions from the Board for Director Brown? Hearing
11	no questions, is there a motion?
12	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Madam Chair, I
13	move that we approve the annual license applications.
14	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: I second.
15	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by
16	Commissioner Barker to approve the annual license
17	applications and seconded by Vice Chair Delgado. Is
18	there any discussion on this motion? Hearing no
19	discussion, Mr. Said, can you please call the vote?
20	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
21	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Aye.
22	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
23	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Yes.
24	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
25	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.

1	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
2	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes.
3	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?
4	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yes.
5	MR. SAID: The motion passes. Next item
6	for consideration are the expanded alternative
7	treatment center certifications.
8	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Director Brown,
9	I'll turn the floor over to you.
10	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Thank you,
11	Madam Chair. The numbers earlier were wrong. There
12	are only three expanded ATC certifications for
13	consideration today. The fourth is being reserved for
14	a future meeting once they are operational and can
15	prove they meet the expansion standard. So they're
16	MPX, class five retailer in Pennsauken, Monteverde,
17	class five retailer in Red Bank, and Terrapin
18	Investment Fund, class five retailer in Hoboken. We've
19	assessed these against the expansion standards in our
20	regulations and the statute including making sure they
21	have municipal approval, adequately supply, adequate
22	operational capacity to meet both patient need as well
23	as adult-use consumers. All three are recommended
24	approval by the CRC Board.
25	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. Are

1	there any questions from the Board for Director Brown?
2	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Not for Director
3	Brown, but, Madam Chair, just procedurally, are we
4	voting on all three of these as one or three separate?
5	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: One by one.
6	COMMISSIONER BARKER: One by one.
7	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: All right. So no
8	questions from the Board. So with respect to the first
9	MPX New Jersey, LLC, is there a motion with respect to
10	the expansion certification for MPX New Jersey, LLC?
11	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes, Madam
12	Chairwoman. I move that we accept certification for
13	alternative treatment center MPX New Jersey, LLC.
14	COMMISSIONER NASH: Second.
15	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: To expand the
16	operations for adult personal use.
17	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by Vice Chair
18	Delgado. I believe Commissioner Nash was seconding.
19	Is that correct?
20	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.
21	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Second by
22	Commissioner Nash. Is there any discussion on this
23	motion? Hearing no discussion, with respect to MPX New
24	Jersey, LLC, Mr. Said, can you please call the vote?
25	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?

1	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Abstain.
2	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
3	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Yes.
4	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
5	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.
6	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
7	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes.
8	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?
9	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yes.
10	MR. SAID: The motion passes.
11	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Next up is Terrapin
12	I believe. Yes. Terrapin. Right. Terrapin
13	Investment Fund II Cultivation, LLC. What a name. Is
14	there a motion on that matter?
15	COMMISSIONER NASH: Madam Chair, I
16	motion to approve the certification for Terrapin
17	Investment Fund Cultivation to expand operations to the
18	AU market.
19	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: And I second it.
20	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by
21	Commissioner Nash and seconded by Vice Chair Delgado.
22	Is there any discussion on this motion with respect to
23	Terrapin Investment Fund II Cultivation, LLC? Hearing
24	no discussion, Mr. Said, can you please call the vote?
25	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?

1	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Abstain.
2	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
3	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Yes.
4	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
5	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.
6	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
7	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes.
8	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?
9	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yes.
10	MR. SAID: The motion passes.
11	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: And lastly, with
12	respect to Monteverde NJ, Inc., is there a motion with
13	respect to their expansion request?
14	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes, Madam
15	Chairwoman. I move that we accept the certification
16	for alternative treatment center Monteverde NJ, Inc. to
17	expand their operations to the adult personal use
18	cannabis market.
19	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by Vice Chair
20	Delgado. Thank you. Is there a second?
21	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Second.
22	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Seconded by
23	Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso. Is there any discussion on
24	this motion?
25	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Brief discussion,

1	Madam Chair.
2	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Commissioner
3	Barker.
4	COMMISSIONER BARKER: I just want to ask
5	that the ATCs being considered for expansion in
6	addition to all ATCs that have been previously expanded
7	please adhere to the FADs, the final agency decisions.
8	There are critical and important reporting requirements
9	to evidence your commitment to our patient population.
10	And we ask that you do not take that lightly. Thank
11	you.
12	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. Any
13	further discussion on this motion? Hearing none, Mr.
14	Said, can you please call the vote?
15	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
16	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Abstain.
17	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
18	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Yes.
19	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
20	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.
21	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
22	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes.
23	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?
24	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yes.
25	MR. SAID: The motion passes. Next item

1	on the agenda is the denial of conversion applications.
2	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Conditional
3	applications.
4	MR. SAID: I'm sorry. Conditional. My
5	apologies.
6	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: All right.
7	Director Brown, I will turn the floor over to you.
8	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Thank you,
9	Madam Chair. Here we have recommended a number of
10	conditional applications that have been approved but
11	pending for quite some time due to unpaid approval
12	fees. When an application is submitted, they have to
13	submit a submission fee which is 20 percent of the
14	total application fee, and then upon approval pay the
15	approval fee which is 80 percent of the application
16	fee. These applications have been pending I think
17	range from the most recent is January of this year, and
18	the oldest, you know, date back into, you know, midyear
19	2022. They've received multiple notices that they have
20	to pay. So there are 17 applications here. Now, even
21	if denied, they can certainly come right back in and
22	reapply for a conditional license or an annual license
23	when ready. So, you know, if a company's on this list
24	and they can qualify for a conditional or an annual
25	license and want to apply again, they are more than

1	welcome to do so. But there have been unpaid approval
2	fees that have gone unpaid for quite some time. And so
3	we are recommending these for denial. And, again, even
4	if denied, these applicants could resubmit if they can
5	qualify for a conditional license or an annual license,
6	but we want to clear out the licensing system. These
7	have been pending for quite some time, have received
8	adequate notice and, therefore, are recommended for
9	denial.
10	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you, Director
11	Brown. Are there any questions from the Board for
12	Director Brown regarding the information provided?
13	Hearing none, is there a motion on this matter?
14	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes, Madam
15	Chairwoman. I move that we approve the denial for the
16	17 applicant businesses named in the resolution.
17	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by Vice Chair
18	Delgado. Is there a second?
19	COMMISSIONER NASH: Second.
20	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Seconded by
21	Commissioner Nash.
22	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Just one
23	clarifying note for the public. You may see some names
24	of businesses on here who are expanded ATCs. In some
25	cases these applications have been pending because they

1	expanded, they can't qualify for for further retail
2	sites. This is not it doesn't have any bearing on
3	the expanded ATC certification or their operational
4	locations.
5	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you for that
6	clarification. Any additional discussion on this
7	motion to deny these 17 applications?
8	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: I just want to make
9	clear. So it's just for the license class listed on
10	the resolution?
11	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: That's
12	correct. Yeah.
13	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Thank you.
14	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Any other
15	discussion? Hearing none, Mr. Said, can you please
16	call the vote?
17	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
18	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Abstain.
19	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
20	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Yes.
21	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
22	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.
23	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
24	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes.
25	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?

1	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yes.
2	MR. SAID: The motion passes. Next item
3	on the agenda we have cases, claims and petitions.
4	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Excellent. Thank
5	you. So I will now turn it over to Chief Counsel Riggs
6	to provide summary remarks.
7	CHIEF COUNSEL RIGGS: Thank you, Madam
8	Chair. Similar to the October meeting, we have
9	employees that have undergone a background check, and
10	their criminal histories have shown in the medicinal
11	cannabis permittee situation, they have shown that they
12	have a disqualifying conviction. What the statute
13	requires is that we allow them the opportunity to show
14	rehabilitation by showing clear and convincing
15	evidence. There are five individuals that have
16	provided that documentation and have shown by clear and
17	convincing evidence that they are rehabilitated. And
18	staff is recommending that we approve rehabilitation
19	and allow them to have an ATC identification card and
20	work in the medicinal cannabis space.
21	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you, Chief
22	Counsel. There are any questions from the Board for
23	Counsel Riggs? Hearing none, is there a motion on this
24	matter?
25	MS. NASH: Madam Chair, I move to

1	approve the request for determination of rehabilitation
2	by alternative treatment center employees.
3	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: And I second.
4	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by
5	Commissioner Nash and seconded by Vice Chair Delgado.
6	Is there any discussion on this motion? Hearing no
7	discussion, Mr. Said, can you please call the vote?
8	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
9	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Aye.
10	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
11	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Before I
12	cast my vote, I do want to say that I read each and one
13	of the cases. And I commend each one of you for
14	turning your life around. So I commend you for doing
15	that. And my vote is yes.
16	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
17	COMMISSIONER NASH: I reiterate
18	Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso's sentiments. And I wish
19	you all the best. Yes.
20	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
21	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yes.
22	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?
23	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yes.
24	MR. SAID: The motion passes. Next item
25	up for consideration are the notices of enforcement

1 actions.

2	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Director Brown, I
3	will turn it over to you for summary.
4	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: Thank you,
5	Madam Chair. This enforcement action is the one that
6	was tabled from the last October meeting on TerrAscend.
7	They received two notices of violation, one for I
8	believe five patient complaints. And following that
9	initial round of complaints we issued a notice of
10	violation. They submitted a corrective action plan
11	where they're in the process of correcting. There was
12	another instance where TerrAscend served essentially
13	had a medical patient purchase off the adult-use menu
14	for products that should have been available on the
15	medical menu. So we issued another notice of
16	violation. I covered my recommendation at the last
17	meeting. You know, I don't have anything more to add
18	than that. So I'll just let those comments stand and,
19	you know, turn it over to the Commission.
20	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you, Director
21	Brown. Any there any questions from the Board?
22	Hearing no questions, is there a motion on this matter?
23	COMMISSIONER NASH: Madam Chair, I move
24	to approve the resolution to imposition of sanctions
25	against TerrAscend New Jersey, LLC.

1	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: And moved by
2	Commissioner Nash. Now, Commissioner Nash, just some
3	clarity on this motion. What penalty? There's a
4	staff have draft a resolution for us that leave it for
5	the Board to actually make a final determination on
6	what the penalty or the sanction would be. So could
7	you clarify for your motion what penalty you would like
8	to see imposed?
9	COMMISSIONER NASH: Well, I don't want
10	to be arbitrary. And I really would appreciate the
11	input from my colleagues on this. I will say that they
12	TerrAscend has provided proof of corrective action.
13	However, it appears to be another repeat offense or
14	repeat violation I should say of a common occurrence
15	with this particular operator. So I don't have a basis
16	to start with here.
17	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Would you like to
18	withdraw your motion at present?
19	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes. I would like
20	to withdraw my motion. Thank you.
21	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: No problem.
22	Director Brown.
23	EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BROWN: I'm happy to
24	reiterate staff's recommendation if it is helpful.
25	Yeah. So our recommendation is no penalty on this one.

1	However, it's obviously up to the Board to consider.
2	If the Board does choose to institute a penalty, strong
3	recommendation is adhere to what's in the penalty
4	matrix. So this would be a Category 5-2 which I
5	believe is a max of \$10,000. But we now have another
6	month of compliance on Terrascend's behalf. I think,
7	you know, they made a good faith effort to correct and
8	have now corrected. And we have several months of them
9	operating compliantly. And so, you know, as I shared,
10	the goal is compliance. So our recommendation is to
11	not level a penalty here. But I can assure you that
12	our compliance staff is providing ongoing vigilance on
13	this. And so, you know, if it happens again, my
14	opinion would obviously change on any, you know,
15	additional NOVs that we have to issue.
16	COMMISSIONER NASH: Thank you very much
17	for that.
18	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you. Any
19	questions for Director Brown? I'd like to move that
20	the Board impose penalty of \$20,000 against TerrAscend
21	NJ for this in response to this notice of violation.
22	I believe that notwithstanding the I'm happy to hear
23	that TerrAscend is doing better. I'm happy to see that
24	they have provided better documentation about their
25	training pursuant to the request that was made. I

1	think the training documentation might not meet the
2	standards that are in the regulations for
3	recordkeeping, but I am happy to see improvements from
4	this entity here. And I think for consistency, in the
5	past the Commission has imposed \$10,000 per violation
6	for other patient access violations against other
7	entities. At the September Board meeting I believe it
8	was, the Board imposed a penalty against TerrAscend for
9	\$20,000 for each violation for a total of \$100,000. I
10	think maintaining the position there is warranted. I
11	think given that the facts around this particular
12	complaint that came in indicate that the issue is not
13	fully as rampant as it was previously as the assigned
14	investigator found. Again, I think some of the efforts
15	from TerrAscend to improve their practices and improve
16	their documentation of their training for their staff
17	is a step in the right direction. And so I don't
18	believe that we should be increasing the penalty that
19	was previously imposed on TerrAscend in this instance.
20	So I am making a motion I move to impose a penalty
21	of just \$20,000 staying exactly where we were at the
22	last instance that these problems occurred. Is there a
23	second on this motion to impose a penalty of \$20,000?
24	COMMISSIONER BARKER: I echo those
25	sentiments, Madam Chair. And I second that motion.

1	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Seconded by
2	Commissioner Barker. Is there any discussion on this
3	motion? I'll say Vice Chair Delgado?
4	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Why not 40,000?
5	You want to keep consistent, I'm against it, but my
6	question is why not 40,000? I'm reading this and it
7	says four days, three days per week and one day during
8	the weekend. And that would be Category 5, violation
9	2. That's \$10,000. So it should be 10,000 every
10	instance. Right? Four times 10,000 is 40,000. I
11	mean, I'm not going to vote for this, but if you want
12	to be consistent isn't that what you should do?
13	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Sorry. When you
14	are talking about a number of days, can you clarify
15	what you're can you clarify please what you're
16	referring to?
17	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Yeah. On page one.
18	Oh. I misread it. My apologies. It's not four
19	instances, it's just one.
20	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yeah.
21	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Okay. Apologize.
22	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: No problem. No
23	problem. That's what we're here to talk it all out and
24	work through it together. Any further discussion on
25	this motion? Again, I want to thank TerrAscend for

1	their improvements and for moving in the right
2	direction. I hope we can keep it up so that we don't
3	find ourselves here again. I'll leave it there. If
4	there's no further discussion, Mr. Said, on the motion
5	to impose a penalty of \$20,000, can you please call the
6	vote?
7	MR. SAID: Commissioner Barker?
8	COMMISSIONER BARKER: Aye.
9	MR. SAID: Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso?
10	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Abstain.
11	MR. SAID: Commissioner Nash?
12	COMMISSIONER NASH: Yes.
13	MR. SAID: Vice Chair Delgado?
14	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: I'm going to follow
15	the opinion of staff. And I'm going to say no.
16	MR. SAID: Chairwoman Houenou?
17	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Yes.
18	MR. SAID: The motion passes. Next item
19	on the agenda we have the open public comment period.
20	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: All right. So as
21	we turn to the public comment period I want to note
22	just as we always do at every Board meeting that
23	members of the public can submit their comments during
24	and after this meeting in writing via our website,
25	www.nj.gov/cannabis/meetings. The deadline for

1	submitting written comments for today's Board meeting
2	is 5:00 tomorrow, Friday, December 8th. Written
3	comments will be shared with the Commission members and
4	will be made public. Speakers will be limited to three
5	minutes. A note: The public comment period is meant
6	to give members of the public an opportunity to address
7	the Commission about matters that the Commission should
8	be aware of. It's not a space for people to simply
9	market or advertise private businesses. Mr. Said will
10	call out the names of our registered speakers. When it
11	is your turn to speak, please come forward and tap the
12	button on the microphone in front of you until you see
13	a green light. And then you will see your time, your
14	three minutes. The status of your three minutes will
15	appear on this clock over here to your left. And with
16	that, I will turn it over to Mr. Said to call on our
17	first speakers.
18	MR. SAID: Thank you, Chairwoman. As a
19	reminder, public speakers during this afternoon's
20	public comment period will be limited to three minutes.
21	Please be respectful and concise during your comments.
22	I'm going to call three names at a time. Sheril Murray
23	Powell, Chirali Patel, and Melissa Shade.
24	CHIRALI PATEL: Hi. Good afternoon.
25	I'm Chirali Patel. I'm going to start with the

1	positive. Thank you, guys, for all the work that you
2	guys have done. And as a state agency, whoever's
3	monitoring the CRC licensing email, God bless because I
4	don't know any other agency that gives you same day
5	responses. And that's what applicants and operators
6	really need. So thank you for just being responsive to
7	everybody. Chairwoman, you mentioned accountability.
8	And this is the part that makes me sick to my core
9	because there's no accountability at the local level.
10	The corruption that's happening. Nothing's merit
11	based. I understand discretion, but I have people
12	who've submitted hundreds pages of applications for
13	consideration that haven't been not even given a
14	hearing, let alone a reason for denial. There is task
15	force at the U.S. Attorney General, and the FEDs are
16	now I mean, they've been doing this for a while now.
17	But states like Massachusetts, Michigan, California,
18	mayors have gone to jail for bribery. That's what's
19	happening right here in New Jersey. I don't want to
20	call out specific towns. I know you don't have the
21	jurisdiction to tell them how to dictate, but if you
22	can tell us as a public on who's responsible for what
23	area so we can advocate accordingly to the literature,
24	but something has to be done. Bear minimum, education.
25	Making them required to do trainings on, like, how to

1	do these ordinances, how to set up the planning zones
2	or and especially the fact that when local officials
3	are telling you, hey, maybe you should go into this
4	spot, that to me is, like, that's not discretionary.
5	That's them telling you which landlord is preferable.
6	And so it just unheard of in other industries. And I
7	think we need to clean it up because that's what's
8	making people bleed out. They can't convert and they
9	help can't find real estate because these
10	municipalities are literally out of control. And then
11	or maybe a timeframe by which municipalities have to
12	review and score these applications because I know
13	that's a hold up waiting for local approval to convert
14	your licenses. And so just a consideration. And I do
15	want to mention the medical issues at a said ATC which
16	I will submit through the medical process. But I was
17	waiting in line. And autoimmune disorders, they're
18	invisible. So I look perfectly healthy, but on the
19	inside things are happening. So when I'm waiting in
20	line and the bud tender tells me, oh, like, I got to
21	take her and not the other person, like, in front of
22	face. Now you feel like it's a little weird. Like,
23	I'm not asking for special priority as a patient.
24	That's the rules. So I don't know if these bud tenders
25	are getting trained on the Jake Honig Act or what

1	medical accesses, but I do think that's a concern so
2	that we can contain or prioritize patient access. That
3	was it. So local corruption, something needs to be
4	done please. And then training better training I
5	think bud tenders for medical access. And thank you
6	for continuing to monitor emails, responding. Thank
7	you for all the work.
8	MELISSA SHADE: Hello. Thank you. My
9	name is Melissa Shade. I am the president and owner of
10	Atlantic City Cannabis. I received my license in my
11	conditional license in March of this year. I am I
12	will be operating out of 1714 Atlantic Avenue. I'm a
13	local resident of that city. I am as you can see a
14	minority woman. And I've had many challenges over the
15	last few months in this process. First, I want to
16	thank the Commission because you did a great job of
17	advancing my application and getting me through rather
18	quickly. I also want to thank the NJEDA because they
19	are giving people like me an opportunity to be a part
20	of this. To the comments of Mr. Barker, I would like
21	to offer myself and my business as someone or a
22	business that you can collaborate and engage with to
23	track and monitor our success in the field. I'm not
24	sure if that's happening. I'm not sure if you have
25	someone that actually identifies that. And by today's

1	comments, you weren't able to provide much information
2	about Black and Brown businesses. So I am happy to
3	offer myself to answer any questions, surveys, whatever
4	you might need to help make local businesses like
5	myself become successful. Once, again, my name Melissa
6	Shade. I'm from Atlantic City Cannabis. And I work
7	I plan to work in an impact zone. And I really would
8	like to make a difference there.
9	MR. SAID: The next three names are
10	Reina Garcia, Lynn Gefen and Al Kamara.
11	LYNN GEFEN: Hi. Good morning. My name
12	is Lynn Gefen, chief legal officer of TerrAscend. I'm
13	here to speak on behalf of my company which has been
14	part of the conversation during the past few meetings.
15	As I mentioned last time, TerrAscend takes compliance
16	very seriously. We strive to be an industry leader
17	and, we work diligently to be an outstanding partner to
18	this Commission and in our local communities. I am
19	disappointed by the Commission's additional fine
20	imposed today despite the repeated recommendation of
21	Executive Director Brown to the contrary in September,
22	in November, and again today. Further, the violation
23	finally heard today was unable to be investigated since
24	the Commission did not provide us with any detail
25	surrounding the transaction in question. This did not

1	allow us to do any fact finding on our own to
2	investigate the issue. TerrAscend intends to appeal
3	the decision today adding this additional ground just
4	like we appealed the excessive fines received in
5	September. I along with my colleagues have decades of
6	experience working with regulators which is why we
7	remain confused at the series of events that have
8	unfolded this year. Regulators are given a
9	responsibility, but with that responsibility comes
10	duty, honor, and the expectation of due process. Here
11	are the facts: The violations that were decided in
12	September and again today were the result of the same
13	issue, were caused by simple human error, occurred more
14	than six months ago, and were fixed immediately. Plus,
15	we understand that the Commission has since created
16	clarifying rules such that the errors would no longer
17	be considered a violation if done today. We struggle
18	with understanding your goal because this isn't a
19	situation of a protracted pattern of non-compliance by
20	a bad actor. TerrAscend is a compliant company with an
21	impeccable record with leading practice. To say it
22	simply, we are an excellent corporate citizen doing the
23	best we can every day for the patients of New Jersey.
24	All regulators exist to serve a common goal, to govern
25	in the public's interest. So respectfully, with the

1	facts at hand it is hard to see your actions are in the
2	best interest of New Jersey patients. And I wonder if
3	they might be motivated by some other agenda.
4	Investing our talent and time into compliance in New
5	Jersey will always be our top priority. On behalf of
6	my colleagues who have spoken before you as well as the
7	hundreds of other TerrAscend employees who reside and
8	work in New Jersey at our cultivation processing
9	facility and our three retail dispensaries, we will
10	continue to comply with your regulations as we have
11	since 2008 when we started business in New Jersey. We
12	will continue to prioritize patients and the people of
13	this wonderful State of New Jersey. Thank you for your
14	time.
15	MR. SAID: The next three up to speak
16	are sorry.
17	AL KAMARA: All right. Good afternoon
18	to the NJCRC. My name is Al Kamara. I'm CEO of Spark
19	9, LLC. I just want to started off by saying thank you
20	for giving me a platform to talk here today. It means
21	a lot to me. And I know that there's so many people
22	out here sitting here today and are watching at home
23	that have the same dreams as me as starting a cannabis
24	business out here in New Jersey. As a conditional
25	license holder, the timeframe of converting to an

1	annual license without capital or proper infrastructure
2	has been very overwhelming. I truly appreciate the
3	hard work that the NJCRC has put into helping minority,
4	women, and veteran owned businesses receive capital
5	from the NJEDA's equity seed grant which I did apply
6	for last week. As a conditional license holder, is it
7	possible to provide more and better resources that can
8	help guide minority-owned businesses to convert from
9	legacy to legal? A little bit myself: I've been
10	arrested for cannabis five times in one year in 2017.
11	I used that as motivation to graduate from TCNJ with
12	I got my Masters in Business. I attended Oaksterdam
13	University for two years, received certifications in
14	horticulture and cannabis business startup. I worked
15	in the cannabis industry for five years working for
16	Garden State Dispensary, Air Wellness and Ascend
17	Wellness. I've networked with some of the top names in
18	the cannabis industry in New Jersey just so I wouldn't
19	have to feel like I'm starting from the bottom because
20	if you could see with my credentials you wouldn't think
21	that somebody like me would be starting from the
22	bottom. I've learned that everyone in this industry
23	has different journeys aiming for the same goals. I've
24	learned that being a black face in high places is not
25	just about getting a seat at table, but it's about

1	having a voice when you're at the table. We've reached
2	the pinnacle of you know, once we reach this
3	pinnacle of this field, in this industry, in this
4	sector, I just don't want us to, you know, forget where
5	we come from and to just everything that we're doing
6	is for nothing, you know. I am a leader in my
7	community. I want to impact Black and Brown people to
8	take more ownership in business. I don't want them to
9	understand that it's possible to be a successful
10	entrepreneur. And it's also possible to receive your
11	40 acres of land and a mule like we all promised when
12	we all came to this country. I have a great
13	relationship with Wesley McWhite. Actually spoke to
14	him about a week ago. And he did mention that they're
15	working on technical assistance for conditional license
16	applicants like myself. But, you know, I'm just here
17	to say, you know, as a black man it's hard out here,
18	man, you know. I feel like me taking the initiative to
19	come here and speak to you guys face to face is big,
20	you know. Like, I just don't want everything that, you
21	know, Charles Barkely's been saying to just go in vein,
22	you know. We do need help out here. And I'm one of
23	those people, too, as well. And if there's anything
24	that we can do, you know, the Spark 9 team and me will
25	be definitely happy to help. Thank you.

1	MR. SAID: Next three up to speak are
2	Anthony Passananti, Abigail Kambach, and Jonathan
3	Julian.
4	ANTHONY PASSANANTI: Hello. I'm Anthony
5	Passananti. I was awarded three licenses in New
6	Jersey. So I really appreciate you guys from the
7	bottom of my heart. Thank you for the opportunity. I
8	moved here from California. I was there for five years
9	in the industry. I have extensive knowledge on
10	manufacturing, cultivation, retail. I came all the way
11	back here. I dropped everything I was doing out there
12	to come here and try to set the bar and be a pioneer
13	and as Mr. Barker was saying, produce craft cannabis
14	for New Jersey. I have over 30 or 40 strains that I
15	created in California that nobody in the world has that
16	I brought to the Garden State to try to hold it very
17	highly. And I have a lot of passion for this state.
18	Unfortunately, it's been quite a journey. I actually
19	had two warehouses in Mount Holly that I applied for.
20	I went to the township meetings. They don't care.
21	They say we're going to get back to you. Nobody got
22	back to me. I lost my leases. And now you my license
23	expired for two license. So I'm sitting here. I'm
24	running out of money. I moved back from California on
25	year ago. I pretty much am draining my savings just

1	trying to hold on. And it's been very difficult.
2	Mount Holly's extremely corrupt. As soon as I went to
3	the clerk office I call them, call them, nobody
4	answers. I send emails, nobody answers. I go to their
5	office, they're not doing anything. They're twiddling
6	their thumbs. The assistant, twiddling their thumbs.
7	Nobody cares. So I'm just here just trying to shine
8	some light on the situation. Even when I talk to
9	another township that I'm currently trying to get my
10	manufacturing license with, they have no education.
11	They're trying to tell me you can't do this, you can't
12	do that, but everything that is in my business plan was
13	off the CRC's website. So I don't understand the
14	misunderstanding. Even when I try to explain to them
15	about pre-rolls, they don't even know what a pre-roll
16	is. They call it cigarettes. So I think a little bit
17	more training would definitely be should be
18	established. I don't think that these people have any
19	idea what they're talking about. They don't have any
20	idea of cannabis. I can help any I can help. I
21	don't want any money. I'm willing to do it for free.
22	But as the gentleman before just said, I don't want all
23	my work to go to waste. I've literally been in this
24	industry for 23 years. I dropped everything I'm doing
25	to come to New Jersey, and it's just been, like, almost

1	like a smack in the face with all due respect not from
2	you guys, but just from the townships, the
3	municipalities. I literally had warehouses with
4	leases, and for some weird reason they didn't approve
5	me. They said we're going to get back to you, but now
6	somebody else has that warehouse and has that lease and
7	now has a license there. So it's like, if you guys
8	approve me why wouldn't they? What did I do wrong?
9	You know, I'm a very sincere person. I'm very humble.
10	I'm very grateful. I'm grateful to sit in front of all
11	you guys right now. I'm grateful for your time. I'm
12	grateful to just be in your presence, you know. And I
13	just don't understand why this has to be so difficult.
14	Why do I have to pay \$2,000 for my two license to be
15	reinstated when had two warehouses? You could contact
16	the real estate agent. I mean, I could show you emails
17	from me to the clerk. I've left multiple messages.
18	I've spoken in front of the township. I've done
19	everything I can, and it's just like they just step on
20	you and shut you down. It's just not fair. I know
21	life isn't supposed to be fair, but I literally came
22	3,000 miles to come put on for the Garden State and I'm
23	just stuck right now. I feel so depressed. I don't
24	want to get out of bed. Every single day I'm checking
25	my email seeing Mount Holly got back to me. No emails.

1	It's just very frustrating. So anything I could do to
2	help or any light I could shine on the situation. I
3	really appreciate you guys listening. So thank you
4	very much. I appreciate your time. Thank you, guys.
5	ABIGAIL KAMBACH: Hi, Commissioners. My
6	name is Abigail Kambach. Thank you for the opportunity
7	to address you today. I come before you as a member of
8	the New Jersey Cannabis Associations Laboratory Testing
9	Committee. We're a group of scientists and laboratory
10	testing professionals who are advocating for the
11	enhancement of cannabis testing standards, scientific
12	integrity, and safety for cannabis consumers in the
13	State of New Jersey. Our focus today resolves around
14	two crucial points that require your attention and
15	immediate action. First, we implore the Commission to
16	push for the establishments of New Jersey's own
17	comprehensive testing guidance for cannabis. We are
18	still following the 2020 version of Maryland's testing
19	guidance and standards which is antiquated from even
20	what Maryland is using today. Advances in science have
21	enabled scientists to do so much more to ensure product
22	transparency and data accuracy. Our committee has
23	provided detailed feedback to the Commission staff
24	regarding testing standards for a safe and effective
25	marketplace. It is time for the CRC to issue New

1	Jersey's own testing guidance. Second, we draw your
2	attention to the pressing issue of questionable
3	laboratory practices and data circulating without
4	proper governance. This is one of the largest problems
5	in the cannabis markets. And New Jersey is not immune
6	to it. The lack of oversight and lack governance poses
7	a serious threat to the integrity of the cannabis
8	industry in our state. We must address the potential
9	manipulation of laboratory results and emphasize the
10	need for transparent and accountable system. The
11	Commission should explore measures to enhance
12	monitoring, reporting, and auditing processes within
13	testing laboratories to ensure the reliability and
14	accuracy of data generated. The advocacy of this
15	governance will make or break our market. Our
16	laboratory testing committee worked diligently on a set
17	of recommendations for a robust lab governance program.
18	We pulled best practices from cannabis markets across
19	the country and have outlined a comprehensive plan that
20	includes practical what achievable uplift points.
21	These measures can be implemented swiftly to address
22	the current gaps in the system. By taking immediate
23	action on those recommendations, the Cannabis
24	Regulatory Commission can truly stand behind the by
25	legal it's safe and tested campaign and can demonstrate

1	its commitment to upholding the highest standards in
2	cannabis testing and ensure the long-term success of
3	the regulated market in New Jersey. In conclusion, we
4	urge the Commission to prioritize the establishment of
5	New Jersey's own testing guidance, address questionable
6	laboratory data through the implementation of a
7	recommended lab governance program without delay. The
8	citizens of New Jersey deserve a well regulated and
9	safe cannabis industry. And your leadership is pivotal
10	in achieving this goal. Thank you for your time and
11	dedication to the betterment of this community.
12	JONATHAN JULIAN: Good afternoon, Board
13	and staff. My name is Jonathan Julian. And I'm an
14	undergraduate student from Rutgers New Brunswick. And
15	I'm a biology and public health major. And I'm looking
16	to represent my age demographic because often times I
17	feel like we're our age demographic is a little lazy
18	in coming to these platforms to talk about our needs.
19	So overall, I'm very excited and satisfied with your
20	efforts this Committee has put in, but I have some
21	suggestions. Commissioner Barker's last session and
22	report on Public Engagement and Education Committee
23	talking about the cannabis smart and cannabis safe
24	campaign, I thought was pretty smart. The highlights
25	of it that you that were important to me were that

1	you said it was providing unbiased, non-judgmental,
2	science based information to the public which is truly
3	valuable to my community as well, our age demographic
4	for college students. And I understand that this
5	Committee is targeted toward adult populations, but the
6	younger population has a value for your wisdom. And
7	you did say you had a target audience of tweens and
8	teens. So I feel like there does need to be more of an
9	effort to push that sort of education into both high
10	schools and universities. I did like your URL media,
11	but I think it's just is not close enough to the public
12	education system. And I'm sure it's hard to tackle a
13	federal instituted federal education systems
14	considering the federal government still criminalizes
15	cannabis, but I think if there's anyone to push that
16	goal out it would be people like you. And I know those
17	are big steps, but plausible goals could be like
18	preventing public health campaigns in high school from
19	I remember in my high school there would be a police
20	precinct that came in and just labeled cannabis as a
21	gateway drug. It was lazy. And honestly, they didn't
22	provide any education on it. It was just like, this
23	bad, this schedule one drug, et cetera. So I think for
24	starters those should be removed. And as the previous
25	commenter mentioned, I think research needs to be

1	improved about this. So pushing universities to
2	encourage this criminalized substance I feel like we'd
3	get better study and better results on how it affects
4	our local communities. So, yeah. Maybe it could just
5	be observational studies, but at the end of the day I
6	think tackling these federal institutions is where we
7	need to make the most impactful education reform. And
8	finally, I feel like willing precincts, willing police
9	precincts could really use your wisdom as well in legal
10	expertise because I feel like they struggle in
11	understanding the new laws surrounding DUIs and, like,
12	whether or not they can pull over someone if there's
13	smoking in the car, whatnot. So, yeah. Thank you for
14	your time.
15	MR. SAID: The next three are Chris
16	Goldstein, Lou Magazzu and Cindy Ortiz.
17	CHRIS GOLDSTEIN: Hello. My name is
18	Chris Goldstein. It's okay that you said Stein. I'm a
19	longtime cannabis consumer advocate. And it was really
20	interesting here today. I used to be on a Board of
21	Directors of the Coalition for Medical Marijuana in New
22	Jersey. And helped pass the Compassionate Use Act
23	here. So the discussion about the decline in the
24	medical marijuana program was particularly interesting
25	to go me. I also work as regional organizer so I'm in

1	Pennsylvania and Delaware, New York. Pennsylvania has
2	nearly a million registered medical marijuana patients.
3	And they only have about 3 million more people in
4	population. They don't have a ton more dispensaries in
5	Pennsylvania. We have about 60 operating here. They
6	have 160 in Pennsylvania. The interesting part is that
7	a lot of the same corporations operate on both sides of
8	the river. Why are patients not going to the
9	dispensaries? One big reason as you know is price.
10	But my problem with the price is that when you look at
11	Air Wellness, Air Wellness will sell you an eighth in
12	the medical menu across the river you can see
13	Pennsylvania from here for \$18. The lowest price
14	they have for patients here is 45. Then you get to
15	TerrAscend who you fined today I think correctly
16	that's just my opinion. \$20,000 is only, what, like
17	35, \$400 eighths or \$400 ounces. Not that much money
18	for them. TerrAscend in Pennsylvania will sell you
19	half ounce for \$42. That's a whole ounce for 84 bucks.
20	In New Jersey, the lowest price they offer patients is
21	\$95 a quarter. We're talking about patients who are
22	expected to pay three and four times as much as across
23	the river to the same companies for the same products.
24	Consumers are not stupid. We look at menus. We look
25	at menus across states. And I encourage you please

1	look at the menus for the operators across the river
2	because they're gouging on this side. Now, as far as
3	the doctors go, this is the another thing that patients
4	face in New Jersey. There are hundreds of doctors and
5	even now urgent care centers in Pennsylvania that will
6	make the medical marijuana recommendation. We've never
7	had that kind of access to doctors here in New Jersey.
8	What can you do? We've got to break through this
9	barrier. How do we get urgent care centers and doctors
10	in New Jersey to make the recommendation? Because
11	patients are sick of paying \$200 and \$300 not to the
12	state for the recommendation and I really appreciate
13	you dropping that charge but to the doctors, the
14	doctor card services that are charging the patients.
15	That's why patients aren't participating. So I
16	appreciate this. And I'll send in my written comments
17	all the info about pricing. Thank you again.
18	MR. SAID: I'm going to go over the
19	names of people that haven't spoken just one more time.
20	Sheril Murray Powell, Reina Garcia, Lou Magazzu, and
21	Cindy Ortiz. Not seeing any of those people, so
22	Chairwoman Houenou, this will conclude the registered
23	speakers we have for today's public meeting.
24	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Thank you, Mr.
25	Said. And thank you to all of our commenters for

1	sharing your thoughts with us today. This concludes	107
2	the business that the Board of Commissioners has before	
3	it. Is there any new business for the Board to	
4	consider? Hearing none, is there a motion to adjourn?	
5	VICE CHAIR DELGADO: Madam Chairwoman, I	
6	move that we adjourn.	
7	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Moved by Vice Chair	
8	Delgado. Is there a second?	
9	COMMISSIONER DEL CID-KOSSO: Second.	
10	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: Seconded by	
11	Commissioner Del Cid-Kosso. Is there any discussion on	
12	this motion to adjourn? I'll ask the audience to	
13	please keep it down. Any discussion on this motion to	
14	adjourn? Hearing none, all those in favor of	
15	adjourning say "aye".	
16	[All responded "aye".]	
17	CHAIRWOMAN HOUENOU: All those opposed	
18	say "nay". Any abstentions? The motion passes. The	
19	time is now 2:45. And we are adjourned. Thank you,	
20	everyone. Happy Holidays. Happy New Year. And have a	
21	good evening.
