On March 6, 2025, the Appellant 5 voluntarily self-excluded and completed every 6 step necessary to enroll in the internet 7 Self-Exclusion Program through FanDuel for a 8 one-year term. On the following day, the same 9 appellant voluntarily enrolled again through the 10 Jackpot City application, this time selecting a 11 five-year term. 12 The internet Self-Exclusion Program 13 exists to protect patrons by enforcing the 14 exclusion period that they voluntarily choose. 15 This appellant chose to self-exclude on two 16 separate occasions and for two separate terms and 17 went through the entire process both times and 18 indicated on the record that he did not read 19 through the -- any of the process and that he was 20 simply clicking through. I have a few points I would 6 like to highlight from those. 7 The purpose of NJAC 69G-2.3 is to ensure 8 that all internet gaming operators receive the 9 updated Self-Exclusion List and information from 10 the Division and have a defined period to update 11 their systems. 12 The Division has been delegated the 13 authority to maintain the Self-Exclusion List and 14 to notify the casino licensee whenever someone is 15 added to the list. Nor do they require the Division to 3 ignore a patron's subsequent voluntary election. 4 To the contrary, once the Appellant submitted a 5 valid five-year request, the Division had an 6 obligation to administer the program 7 consistently. 8 The Hearing Examiner repeatedly focuses 9 on which is perceived as an ambiguous regulation. 10 However, the absence of a regulation specifically 11 addressing multiple voluntary enrollments does 12 not invalidate the Division's program. 13 The Division is not ignoring the 14 one-year self-exclusion term. Rather, the 15 Division is simply applying both terms, which is 16 reasonable and consistent with the protective 17 purpose of the Self-Exclusion Program. Allowing 18 patrons to later argue that an earlier request 19 should control would undermine the certainty and 20 reliability of this program. 21 The process. A person self-excludes, 22 the operator then sends the list to the Division 23 in the morning. At approximately 10:45 every 24 morning, the Division confirms the new list that 25 is received and makes the Self-Exclusion List.

38 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 At noon the internet providers are given the 3 list. Once that is received by the internet 4 providers, they have 24 hours to update their 5 system and to suspend patrons from accessing 6 their gaming accounts. 7 Therefore, the timeline in this present 8 matter was all within the regulations. The 9 24-hour implementation requirement prevents 10 against delays by operators. And for the patron 11 to be immediately locked out of their gaming 12 account is not feasible. The Division needs to 13 alert approximately 29 operators of this new self 14 exclusion which would be totally unrealistic to 15 do immediately. 16 There's a process that needs to be 17 followed, and that process was followed correctly 18 here. All within the regulation. The Appellant 19 was not compelled to submit a second request. He 20 did so voluntarily. Interpreting the regulations 21 to invalidate a later five-year self-exclusion 22 simply because the patron later regrets their 23 decision would frustrate the purpose and invite 24 an uncertainty into the administration of this 25 program. And additionally is not consistent with	40 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 The Division is not creating a new 3 self-exclusion period or modifying the patron's 4 election. The Appellant himself selected the 5 five-year period. The Division merely gave 6 effect to the Appellant's own selection. 7 In the SD case that was cited in the 8 initial decision, the initial decision tried to 9 distinguish SD from this matter. However, the 10 underlying principles are the same and the legal 11 principles are the same. SD occurred before 12 internet self exclusion -- before the internet 13 Self-Exclusion Program even existed. 14 The self exclusion here, like in SD, was 15 voluntary, and the Appellant admitted on the 16 record that it was a voluntary self exclusion. 17 Participation in self exclusion carries 18 consequences even if later regretted. The fact 19 that this case involves an internet self 20 exclusion enrollment rather than an in-person 21 lifetime exclusion does not diminish the 22 voluntary nature of Appellant's actions or the 23 Division's obligation to administer the program 24 consistently. 25 Additionally, it was cited in the
39 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 prior precedent set by this Commission. 3 More specifically, Commissioner Formica, 4 you are very clear in two separate recent 5 decisions on June 10th, 2026, and October 3rd, 6 2025, specifically stating on June 10th, 2026, 7 the Appellant Division and In Re: SD long ago 8 made clear that any policy of a brick-and-mortar 9 casino, even those outside of New Jersey that 10 forbids a gambler who self-excluded from a 11 different casino is an indirect collateral 12 consequence and beyond the Commission's 13 jurisdiction to ascertain and enforce. 14 On October 3rd, 2025, similarly it was 15 stated: I cannot allow Appellant's lack of 16 diligence to circumvent the process, the purpose 17 of the self exclusion. The explicitly waivers 18 and acknowledgments that Appellant clicked 19 through to effectuate her signup were there to 20 provide notice to the Appellant of the 21 consequence that would occur by signing up for 22 the self exclusion. 23 This initial decision is contradictory 24 to both of these previous decisions and sets up a 25 dangerous new precedent.	41 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 initial decision that the business decisions of 3 the casino operators were an issue. Independent 4 business decisions made by the casinos explicitly 5 set forth in the clear self-conclusion 6 notifications were followed here, and some of the 7 casinos chose to ban the patron. And the patron 8 was well aware of this, that this could possibly 9 happen when he signed up for both of his self 10 exclusions. It was listed in the acknowledgments 11 that he -- that he himself went through and 12 reviewed. 13 The use of the word "may" demonstrates 14 that exclusion from land-based properties is not 15 an automatic consequence and not one that is 16 imposed by the Division. Appellant's personal 17 belief that he thought exclusion was on line only 18 cannot override the written acknowledgments that 19 were accepted. 20 Individual operator policies rather than 21 mandatory action by the Division is what occurred 22 here. The SD decision stated that SD's recourse 23 lies not with the regulator but with the 24 individual casinos which have implemented 25 responsible gaming programs that exclude him from

42 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 their establishment. 3 Further, the initial decision repeatedly 4 focuses on the practical effect that Appellant 5 was unable to access certain brick-and-mortar 6 casinos after enrolling in the internet 7 Self-Exclusion List. However, the relevant legal 8 question is not whether third-party operators 9 chose to impose additional restrictions, but 10 whether appellant knowingly and voluntarily 11 entered into in the Self-Exclusion List, which he 12 admitted himself that he did. If I may. 3 CHAIR PLOUSIS: Please. 4 COMMISSIONER FORMICA: I apologize, 5 because I'm going to be a little longwinded. 6 Let me start off by saying that the 7 right to gamble in New Jersey is not a 8 Constitutional right. And that comes from In Re: 9 SD, a published Appellate Division opinion 399 10 New Jersey, 107. 11 Now, I'm not saying that a casino 12 licensee's decision and the Division's management 13 and agreement to exclude someone from gambling in 14 a brick-and-mortar casino in New Jersey should 15 not be scrutinized carefully. But if a person wants 24 to self-exclude lifetime, got to come down to 25 Atlantic City or Trenton and request that in	48 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 other. 3 But it can't be denied that NJAC 4 13:69C-1.2, the regulation that charges casino 5 licensees with maintaining public health, safety, 6 morals, and good order and general welfare of New 7 Jersey -- of the state of New Jersey within its 8 brick-and-mortar casinos is giving casino 9 licensees the discretion to exclude internet 10 self-excluders from their brick-and-mortar 11 casinos. 12 And in fact NJAC 13:69C-1.3 says that a 13 casino licensee could be fined, or worse, for 14 failing to exercise discretion and sound judgment 15 to prevent incidents which might reflect on the 16 reputation of New Jersey and act as a detriment 17 to the industry. Maybe. 20 So wouldn't disregarding an indication 21 that someone could possibly be a problem gambler 22 be a failure to exercise discretion and sound 23 judgment? I think so. 24 In my view the discretion afforded by 25 the regulations to the casino licensees to
47 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 writing. But if a person wants to exclude from 3 internet gaming in New Jersey, all that person 4 has to do is complete the process of an 5 electronic app on a phone or computer or through 6 the Division's website. And I'm quoting, 7 "through his or her internet gaming account using 8 strong authentication." And that is NJAC 9 13:69G-2.2. 10 A simple check, as the ID recognizes -- 11 like it or not -- that's what the regulations 12 say. But it becomes an issue when a person finds 13 out or should have known that an electronic self 14 exclusion gets him booted from brick and mortar. 15 So I get the inconsistencies. I get the layers. 16 And I get that along the way that two separate 17 exclusion lists and their separate processes have 18 gotten meshed and are less and perfectly clear. 19 And I get the concern that the internet exclusion 20 leading to brick and mortar could be better 21 explained on an app, better explained on the 22 Division's website, and maybe better thought out 23 in terms of how those two separate self 24 exclusions are accomplished and how excluding 25 from one could lead to the exclusion of the	49 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 exclude electronic gaming self excluders from 3 brick and mortars is driven by two concerns, if 4 you will. One, furthering the tenets of the 5 policy for responsible gaming contained in NJAC 6 13:69O, as well as comporting with their duty to 7 ensure the safety and morals and good order in 8 New Jersey as contained in NJAC 13:69C-1.2 and 9 the more realistic concern, if you will, avoiding 10 lawsuits. 11 And I have a unique firsthand view of 12 that concern because I was on the casino floor at 13 Bally's for 20 years behind the tables. And I 14 can recall on more than one occasion a gambler 15 suing Bally for allowing him to keep playing at 16 the tables, keep losing his money when Bally's 17 knew or should have known that he had a gambling 18 problem. 19 Disclaimer time. I'm certainly not 20 saying Bally's did that or should have been sued, 21 or that the gambler's claims had merit. That's 22 my disclaimer. But claims like that were filed. 23 Civil actions, essentially a claim of negligence 24 to failure to exercise discretion to exclude a 25 problem gambler. That was the argument.

50 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 Now, getting back to our matter. Let me 3 firstly touch upon a nuance that I don't think 4 anybody mentioned that was brought up in the 5 hearing and pops up regularly. I recognize that 6 the regulations were changed so that electronic 7 self-excluders are no longer asked whether they 8 had a gambling problem when completing the 9 self-exclusion process on the app or the 10 Division's website. Some apps have it -- still 11 have that question there. I think like Jackpot. 12 Now, some people interpret the absence 13 of that question or the absence of an affirmative 14 answer to support a self-excluder who claims he 15 or she was confused or they didn't want to self 16 exclude or didn't realize self exclusion or 17 electronic self exclusion was going to lead to 18 brick and mortar. The argument goes, well, he 19 never said he had a gambling problem when he 20 self-excluded. That shows he really didn't want 21 to self exclude. I know that's not what happened 22 here. What happened here was a little bit 23 different. The Appellant said he had no ability 24 to opt out of that question when he answered yes, 25 which shouldn't have been there in the first	52 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 the internet SEL. Appellant testified credibly. 3 He placed himself on the internet SEL because he 4 wanted to be excluded from internet gaming -- 5 internet gaming - and only internet gaming. 6 I got to say, I hear that all the time. 7 And I believe it. And while that may be true, 8 what he said, here's what EG also said on Page 9 17. He emphatically said that he acknowledged he 10 did not read the warnings, the ones that told him 11 if he excludes electronically, he may be excluded 12 from brick and mortar. 13 Here's what he said. And I quote, "I 14 should have read the fine print there. I mean, 15 there's no other way around it. It falls on me. 16 And I should have read it. It's my fault." 17 So again, and with all due respect, I 18 don't see how EG could be removed from the SEL 19 based upon the fact that he only intended to 20 remove himself from electronic gaming when he 21 emphatically admitted that he didn't read the 22 warnings that he could be excluded from brick and 23 mortar. 24 Second issue of which I had had to do 25 with the ID's positions timing taken on the two
51 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 place. And the fact that it was there, he was 3 prejudiced by that in the Division's eyes. I get 4 that. 5 But in my view, let's be honest. 6 Whether there's a question or an answer there, 7 isn't it reasonable for a casino licensee to 8 infer that a person who excludes from internet 9 gaming in the comfort of their own home, their 10 basement, isn't it reasonable for a casino 11 licensee to assume that that person may be a 12 problem gambler? Even if they are not required 13 to admit it? Isn't that a reasonable inference? 14 I think it is. 15 And if that's a reasonable inference, 16 wouldn't a casino license policy to exclude 17 self-excluders from their brick and mortar also 18 be reasonable? 19 All right. We get to the decision. 20 And with all due respect to my 21 colleague, the first issue I have is the ID 22 indicated that EG's position was that he only 23 wanted to self exclude from online gaming. I'm 24 going to quote the ID at Page 15: It is clear to 25 me that Appellant voluntarily placed himself on	53 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 self exclusions now. I think this is what really 3 drove the decision in this case in granting the 4 removal even though it wasn't explicitly said 5 that way. 6 Miss DeAnnutis, are you on the edge of 7 your seat yet? 8 MS. DeANNUNTIS: Yes. 9 COMMISSIONER FORMICA: I need you to 10 please help me out here and let me know if I have 11 this right. 12 According to the evidence of record, 13 EG excluded from FanDuel at 6:01 p.m. on March 14 6th, and the Division confirmed that signup on 15 10:46 a.m. on March 7th for one year; is that 16 correct? 17 MS. DeANNUNTIS: That is correct. 18 COMMISSIONER FORMICA: On March 7th, 19 2025, the evidence of record shows that EG 20 self-excluded from Jackpot for five years at 1:53 21 p.m. Do I have that right? 22 MS. DeANNUNTIS: Again, that's correct. 23 COMMISSIONER FORMICA: So the second 24 exclusion for five years takes place about three 25 hours after the Division confirmed the first self

54 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 exclusion; is that right? 3 MS. DeANNUNTIS: Yes. 4 COMMISSIONER FORMICA: Now, here's a big 5 if, and I didn't understand this so help me out 6 with this one. The ID reasons that EG shouldn't 7 have been allowed to do the second self exclusion 8 because according to the ID -- I'm on top of Page 9 18 -- during oral argument the Division stated 10 that once a person is confirmed by the Division 11 for placement on the internet SEL, they are 12 precluded from accessing their online accounts. 13 That doesn't sound like 24 hours. Did 14 you say that? 15 MS. DeANNUNTIS: That's not correct. 16 They would be locked out from -- in this 17 particular matter the Appellant would have been 18 immediately locked out from his FanDuel account 19 when he self-excluded. Then the list is given to 20 the Division at approximately 10:45. Then at 21 noon each day that list goes out to all of the 22 operators. 23 COMMISSIONER FORMICA: Okay. 24 MS. DeANNUNTIS: Once the operators 25 receive that list at approximately 12 p.m., they	56 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 COMMISSIONER FORMICA: All right. I 3 looked up the rights myself. And I researched 4 13:69G-2.3 and it says: A, the Division shall be 5 maintain the Self-Exclusion List and the internet 6 Self-Exclusion List. 7 B says: For internet self exclusion 8 changes shall be made within 24 hours after the 9 notice is transmitted to the Division. 10 Do I have that right? 11 MS. DeANNUNTIS: Yes. 12 COMMISSIONER FORMICA: So according to 13 the transcript, the Division confirmed the self 14 exclusion at 10:46 a.m. on March 7th. That 15 sounds like when notice was transmitted. So by 16 regulation, the way I read it -- unless I'm 17 wrong -- the Division had until 10:46 a.m. on 18 March 8th to notify all the other casino 19 licensees; is that right? 20 MS. DeANNUNTIS: Correct. 21 COMMISSIONER FORMICA: But EG 22 self-excluded for five years the second time from 23 Jackpot on March 7, 2025, at 1:52, only three 24 hours after the Division confirmed the first 25 exclusion; is that right?
55 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 then have 24 hours from that time period based on 3 the regulation to lock each patron out of their 4 accounts. So all of this -- this timeline in 5 this specific matter was all within the 6 regulation. 7 At 10:45 we received his FanDuel self 8 exclusion. The Division then made the 9 Self-Exclusion List for that day. We transmitted 10 it to all of the operators, which is 11 approximately 29 separate operators have to 12 receive this list. And then once they receive 13 that list at noon, they then have 24 hours from 14 that time period to make sure that these 15 individuals are locked out of their account and 16 can no longer wager. They can no longer even 17 enter their accounts. So all of that happened 18 within the regulation here. 19 Additionally, we were able to speak with 20 all of the operators after this. And we found 21 that the longest that any of the operators took 22 was six hours. So it didn't even take 24 hours. 23 It took -- the longest they took was six hours to 24 implement the self exclusion and be able to lock 25 this patron out of their account.	57 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 MS. DeANNUNTIS: Yes. And they would 3 have had -- they would have had 24 hours from 4 that time to be able to -- to -- in theory to be 5 able to access his other accounts. 6 COMMISSIONER FORMICA: Okay. Thank you. 7 But let's say for the sake of argument 8 that the system failed. Not by days or weeks, 9 not that it failed here. But let's say it failed 10 24 hours. That's basically the reasoning. If EG 11 shouldn't have been able to access Jackpot to 12 exclude for the second time, the five-year 13 exclusion doesn't count. 14 Respectfully. That's like saying that a 15 guy enters a store in the middle of the night to 16 rob it, gets caught, admits he wanted to rob the 17 store, can't be held responsible if the store 18 owner left the door unlocked. If the door wasn't 19 unlocked, he couldn't have taken the stuff even 20 though he admitted he still wanted to steal. 21 Now, let me extend that simple analogy 22 to a more formal one to a principle of law which 23 I am quite familiar with, and we're going to come 24 full circle on the Constitution thing. The ID's 25 reasoning in that regard sounds a lot like the

58 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 fruit of the poisonous tree principle of 3 Constitutional law. And I know not everybody 4 knows what that is. I'm going to tell you. It's 5 a common law evidence doctrine. Common law means 6 a judge made it up. Still the law. And it's 7 aimed at protecting or remedying a violation of a 8 Constitutional right by excluding evidence 9 derived from an unconstitutional search or 10 seizure for a violation of arraignment. 11 Let me give you an example. Let's say a 12 police officer didn't have legal authority to 13 search a suspect's car, but he does anyway. He 14 pops open the trunk and he finds a dead body. 15 Under the fruit of the poisonous tree doctrine, 16 the evidence of that dead body doesn't come into 17 evidence. It can't be used to prosecute the 18 person for murder because it was only gotten by 19 the primary illegality of opening that trunk when 20 they didn't have the right to. So anything 21 connected to that primary illegality doesn't come 22 in. 23 So just like, but for the police 24 unlawfully entering the vehicle, the dead body 25 would have been found, again respectfully, to me	60 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 full paragraph on Page 19, the ID says: In my 3 opinion banning patrons from being able to engage 4 in any gambling when they made it clear they only 5 wanted to exclude themselves from internet 6 gambling does not further the policies of the Act 7 nor advance the statutory goals of our 8 comprehensive responsible. 9 And this is again, I'm not sure how EG 10 made it clear he only wanted to exclude from the 11 internet when he admitted that he didn't read the 12 fine -- the fine print. "It falls on me." 13 Continuing, the ID says on the same 14 page: Submitting an application, it takes 15 seconds to complete, has no time-outs to ensure 16 the fine print is read by the patron, and is 17 confirmed only by a click of a button does not, 18 in my opinion, ensure those signing -- those 19 signing up for the internet SEL are doing so 20 knowingly. They will be banned from brick and 21 mortar when the intention of the internet SEL is 22 stated to apply for internet gaming only. 23 Moving to the bottom of Page 20, I also 24 find it particularly concerning, an internet SEL 25 was primarily occurred through a licensing casino
59 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 the ID sounds like it says but for having access 3 to Jackpot app, which he should not have had, he 4 never would have been excluded for the five 5 years. 6 But here's the difference. Nobody is 7 going to jail here. I love to say that. Nobody 8 is losing their freedom or property. There's no 9 due process here, and there's no Constitutional 10 rights. I'm guided by the general rules of 11 Administrative law, NJAC 1:1-15.1 which says: 12 Evidence ruling should be made to promote 13 fundamental principles of fairness and justice, 14 and to aid in the ascertainment of truth. 15 And I that I to try for to both sides. 16 And C: Parties in contested cases shall not be 17 bound by statutory or common law rules of 18 evidence like the fruit of the poisonous tree. 19 So on that point I must part ways too. 20 Lastly -- I'm almost done. And with all 21 due respect, I had some difficulty reconciling 22 the policy concerns in the ID to support the 23 decision to remove EG from the SEL when I look at 24 the regulations. 25 Reading from the middle of the first	61 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 gaming entity or affiliates as opposed to 3 being -- patrons being directed to the Division's 4 website. Well, the regulations on both of those 5 accounts say otherwise. 6 But anyway, after reading thee policy 7 concerns, which I admit I share to some degree, I 8 first ask myself again, did EG voluntarily 9 exclude? Well, on Page 15 the ID says and it is 10 clear to me that Appellant voluntarily placed 11 himself on the SEL. Okay? 12 Second, I ask were the warnings and self 13 exclusion may lead to brick and mortar adequate? 14 I got to say they were because again on Page 17 15 of the transcript, EG acknowledges their adequacy 16 by inference when he says, "I should have read 17 the fine print there. I mean, there's no other 18 way around it. It falls on me. I should have 19 read it. It's my fault." Isn't he saying that 20 they were there, but he doesn't read them? 21 Now, despite the fact that I find the 22 warnings are adequate and that EG voluntarily 23 self-excluded, could the warnings have been 24 clearer? Yeah. Could the Division's website -- 25 can the Division's website be modernized or more

62 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 intuitive? Yeah. Could additional descriptions 3 such as mandatory pause or an enhanced stop 4 prompt be built into these apps? I'm not a tech 5 guy, but it sounds like they could. And could 6 the Division consider regulatory amendments to 7 better harmonize the two exclusion lists and 8 reduce this recurring problem? That is a 9 decision for the Division outside of my purview. 10 But I respectfully suggest that such 11 clarification through amendment would be helpful. 12 Those potential improvements do not 13 change the responds circumstances that EG 14 voluntarily self-excluded. He admitted that he 15 didn't read the warnings. The warnings were 16 sufficient. There's no evidence in this record 17 that there was a problem with the app or 18 something like that. So putting that all 19 together -- almost done. 20 I'm obligated to assess the self- 21 exclusion issues here against the regulatory 22 framework as it presently exists. Like the 23 framework that allows a person one click to self 24 exclude, and I quote "through his or her internet 25 gaming account using strong authentication."	64 1 ITEM NO. 9 2 exclude patrons as it sees fit and as authorized 3 by regulation. 4 Those are my comments. 5 CHAIR PLOUSIS: Thank you, Commissioner 6 Formica. 7 Commissioner Mollineaux? 8 VICE CHAIR MOLLINEAUX: Mr. Chairman, 9 yes. What's the shortest? 6 MS.
