

## Sandy Funding Criteria Worksheet

Overview:
The funds will be utilized to support and expand primary prevention services to the currently contracted Sexual Violence Programs via the addition of one (1) part-time prevention coordinator, materials and supplies, and related expenses for up to two (2) years.
Federal Department of Origin:
U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services, Administration for Children and Families, Office of Community Services – The Disaster Relief Appropriations Act, 2013, (P. L. 113-2); “Hurricane Sandy Supplemental Funds” to address necessary expenses resulting from Hurricane Sandy, including social, health, and mental health services for individuals, and for repair, renovation and rebuilding of health care facilities (including mental health facilities), child care facilities, and other social services facilities.
Federal Requirements / Restrictions:
Funds to be totally expended by September 30, 2015. Also subject to Integrity Oversight monitoring via Assembly Bill A60 (A-60)(P.L.2013,c.37). Additional State regulations related to Governor Christie's Executive Order 125, as well as all applicable federal and state regulations for Procurement and Grants Management
Selection Standards:
All existing programs shall be expanded.
Eligibility Standards:
All existing programs are eligible for funding.

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Other Notes:

Primary prevention is the cornerstone of the program. Program activities are guided by a set of prevention principles that include:

- Preventing first-time perpetration and victimization;
- Reducing modifiable risk factors while enhancing protective factors associated with sexual violence perpetration and victimization;
- Using the best available evidence when planning, implementing, and evaluating prevention programs;
- Incorporating behavior and social change theories into prevention programs;
- Using population-based surveillance to inform program decisions and monitor trends; and
- Evaluating prevention efforts and using the results to improve future program plans.
