


**Children in Out-of-Home Placement:

Point In Time data is based on data as of the last day of each month. Axis begins at 2,000 to enhance separation of data.








CWS Referrals Assigned to Local Offices




Caseload Compliance (Individual Worker Level)




Response and Investigation Timeliness




Referrals to Early Intervention



Worker - Child Visits




Parent - Child Visits




Worker- Parent Visits & Sibling Visits







Medical Assessments for Children in Out of Home Placement (OOHP)




Immunizations for Children in OOHP





The goal of this ongoing work is to create three meaningful categories for 18-21 year olds 1) Youth in a formal out-of-home placement setting, 2) Youth that achieved permanency, and 3) Youth that never achieved permanency.








IAIU Caseload Report by Region
June 2017




Children in Care Management
July 2017




Rate of Children in Care Management by County


Children in Out of Home Treatment Settings




Children in Out-of-Home Treatment Settings



Mobile Response Stabilization Services (MRSS) Dispatched








School-Based Youth Services Programs - New and Ongoing Clients Served




Sexual Assault, Abuse and Rape Care Programs (SAARC)




Displaced Homemaker Program Clients Served




**Residential Domestic Violence Programs:
Victims' Average Length of Stay (days)**




