CERTIFICATION
OF THE OCTOBER 1, 1996
AMENDMENT TO THE SOMERSET COUNTY
DISTRICT SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLAN

### BY ORDER OF THE COMMISSIONER:

### A. Introduction

The New Jersey Solid Waste Management Act (N.J.S.A. 13:1E-1 et seq.) established a comprehensive system for the management of solid waste in New Jersey. The Act designated all twenty-one (21) of the state's counties, and the Hackensack Meadowlands District, as Solid Waste Management Districts, and mandated that the Boards of Chosen Freeholders and the Hackensack Meadowlands Development Commission develop comprehensive plans for waste management in their respective districts. On July 31, 1980, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department or DEP) approved, with modifications, the Somerset County District Solid Waste Management Plan (County Plan).

The Act requires that all district plans be based accompanied by a report detailing the existing waste disposal situation in the district, and a plan which includes the strategy to be followed by the district in meeting the solid waste management needs of the district for a ten-year planning period. The report must detail the current and projected waste generation for the district, inventory and appraise all facilities in the and analyze the waste collection and transportation district, systems which serve the district. The disposal strategy must the maximum practicable use of resource techniques. In addition to this strategy, the plan must designate sufficient available suitable sites for the disposal of the district's waste for a ten-year period, which sites may be in the district or, if none are available, in another district. provides procedures for reaching any necessary interdistrict agreements.)

The Act further provides that a district may review its County Plan at any time and, if found inadequate, a new County Plan must be adopted. The Somerset County Board of Chosen Freeholders (County Freeholders) completed such a review and on October 1, 1996, adopted an amendment to its approved County Plan.

The amendment proposes the use of and a disbursement schedule for the County's Resource Recovery Investment Tax (RRIT) Fund. Specifically, the amendment proposes to use RRIT Fund moneys to continue and to expand the County's household hazardous waste collection program. The amendment also identifies for informational purposes the uses of the County's Solid Waste Services Tax and Recycling Grant Funds.

The amendment was received by the Department on October 22, 1996, and copies were distributed to various administrative review agencies for review and comment, as required by law. The Department has reviewed this amendment and has determined that the amendment adopted by the County Freeholders on October 1, 1996 is approved as provided in N.J.S.A. 13:1E-24.

## B. <u>Findings and Conclusions with Respect to the Somerset County</u> District Solid Waste Management Plan Amendment

Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 13:1E-24a(1), I have studied and reviewed the October 1, 1996 amendment to the County Plan according to the objectives, criteria, and standards developed in the Statewide Solid Waste Management Plan and I find and conclude that this plan amendment is consistent with the Statewide Solid Waste Management Plan. In this regard, the County Freeholders are notified of the issue of concern concerning the October 1, 1996 amendment which is included within Section B.2. below.

In conjunction with the review of the amendment, the Department circulated copies to fifteen administrative review agencies and solicited their review and comment. Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 13:1E-24a(2) and (3), these agencies included various bureaus, divisions, and agencies within the Department. All agencies contacted are as follows:

## 2. Issue of Concern Regarding the October 1, 1996 Amendment

In addition to including a RRIT Fund use and disbursement schedule, the October 1, 1996 amendment includes, for informational purposes, uses and disbursement schedules for moneys from the County's Solid Waste Services Tax and Recycling Grant Funds. Since the Solid Waste Management Act (N.J.S.A. 13:1E-1 et seq.) does not stipulate that the disbursement of moneys from these funds requires approval through the county planning process, there is no need for the Department to certify approval of this component of the amendment within Section C. of the certification. Also, the County is hereby advised that the current balance of moneys from the Solid Waste Services Tax Fund available to Somerset County is \$182,575.00 and not \$144,950.00 as indicated in the October 1, 1996 amendment.

# C. <u>Certification of the Somerset County District Solid Waste</u> <u>Management Plan Amendment</u>

In accordance with N.J.S.A. 13:1E-1 et seq., specifically N.J.S.A. 13:1E-21, which establishes specific requirements regarding the

contents of the district solid waste management plans, I have reviewed the October 1, 1996 amendment to the approved County Plan and certify to the County Freeholders that the October 1, 1996 amendment is approved as further specified below.

### RRIT Fund

The County Plan inclusion of the RRIT Fund use and disbursement schedule for Program Years 1996 and 1997 is approved. Specifically, the amount of \$434,771.17 of RRIT Fund moneys shall be disbursed to the County as follows:

It must be noted that the ultimate conformance of the RRIT Fund use and disbursement schedule with the requirements of N.J.S.A. 13:1E-150 shall be the responsibility of Somerset County.

## Solid Waste Services Tax and Recycling Grant Funds

As noted within Section B. of this certification, since the October 1, 1996 amendment includes for informational purposes only the proposed uses of and disbursement schedules for moneys from the Solid Waste Services Tax and Recycling Grant Funds and such county plan inclusion is not required by the Solid Waste Management Act, there is no need for the Department to certify approval of this component of the amendment.

## D. Other Provisions Affecting the Plan Amendment

#### 1. Contracts

Any contract renewal or new contract for solid waste collection or disposal which is inconsistent with this amendment to the County Plan and which was executed prior to the approval of this amendment and subsequent to the effective date of the Solid Waste Management Act (July 29, 1977), and which shall further be for a term in excess of one year, shall immediately be renegotiated in order to bring same into conformance with the terms and provisions herein set forth. Any solid waste collection operation or disposal facility registered by the Department and operating pursuant to a contract as herein described, shall be deemed to be in violation of this amendment and of the County Plan if such renegotiation is not completed within ninety (90) days of the effective date of this amendment provided, however, that any such registrant may, upon application to the Department, and for good cause shown, obtain an extension of time to complete such renegotiation.

## 2. Compliance

All solid waste facility operators and transporters registered with the Department and operating within the County and affected by the amendment contained herein shall operate in compliance with this amendment and all other approved provisions of the County Plan. Any facility operator or transporter who fails to comply with the provisions contained herein shall be deemed to be in violation of N.J.S.A. 13:1E-1 et seq., in violation of N.J.A.C. 7:26-1 et seq., and in violation of their registration to operate a solid waste facility or a collection system issued thereunder by the Department and shall be subject to the provisions and penalties of N.J.S.A. 13:1E-9 and 12 and all other applicable laws.

## 3. Types of Solid Wastes Covered by the District Solid Waste Management Plan

The provisions of the County Plan shall apply to all solid wastes defined in N.J.S.A. 13:1E-3 and N.J.A.C. 7:26-2.13 and shall not apply to liquid waste, sewage sludge, septage, and hazardous waste. All nonhazardous materials separated at the point of generation for sale or reuse and all construction and demolition waste classified as Type 13C are excluded from the waste flows designated in the Interdistrict and Intradistrict Solid Waste Flow Rules set forth at N.J.A.C. 7:26-6, but are subject to regulation in accordance with N.J.A.C. 7:26A-1 et seq.

## 4. <u>Certification to Proceed with the Implementation of the Plan</u> Amendment

This document shall serve as the certification of the Commissioner of the Department to the County Freeholders and pursuant to  $\underline{\text{N.J.S.A.}}$  13:1E-24c. and f., the County shall proceed with the implementation of the approved amendment certified herein.

### 5. Definitions

For the purpose of this amendment and unless the context clearly requires a different meaning, the definitions of terms shall be the same as those found at N.J.S.A. 13:1E-3 and -99.12, N.J.A.C. 7:26-1.4, -2.13, and N.J.A.C. 7:26A-1.3.

### 6. Effective Date of the Amendment

The amendment to the County Plan contained herein shall take effect immediately.

### 7. Reservation of Authority

Nothing contained herein shall be construed as a limitation on any other action taken by the Department pursuant to its authority under the law. The County Plan, including any amendment made

thereto, shall conform with the Statewide Solid Waste Management Plan, with appendices, which includes the Department's planning guidelines, rules, regulations, orders of the DEP, interdistrict and intradistrict waste flow rules, and also includes the compilation of individual district plans and amendments as they are approved.

## E. <u>Certification of Approval of the Amendment by the Commissioner of the Department of Environmental Protection</u>

In accordance with the requirements of N.J.S.A. 13:1E-1 et seq., I hereby approve the amendment, as outlined in Section C. of this certification, to the Somerset County District Solid Waste Management Plan which was adopted by the Somerset County Board of Chosen Freeholders on October 1, 1996.
