# Electronics Purchasing Tool a Great Resource

The Electronic Product Environmental Assessment Tool, most often referred to as EPEAT, is a free environmental product ratings system that helps companies and organizations select high-performance electronics that support their IT and sustainability goals. Specifying EPEAT in electronics purchase agreements sends a clear signal to suppliers that the market demands more sustainable practices throughout a device's lifecycle. EPEAT criteria currently address multiple categories of environmental attributes covering the full product lifecycle — including design, energy use and recycling.

The EPEAT system currently tracks more than 4,400 products from more than 60 manufacturers across 43 countries. The EPEAT registry includes desktops, laptops/notebooks, workstations, thin clients, displays (computer monitors), televisions, printers, copiers, scanners, multifunction devices, fax machines, digital duplicators and mailing machines. The EPEAT program is administered by the Green Electronics Council, a non-profit whose mission is to achieve a world in which only sustainable IT products are designed, manufactured, and purchased. # Tips on Bins and Signs

Office staff should be able to determine where recyclables should be deposited within a few seconds. Use uniform recycling containers throughout your office. Recycling bins with specialized lid openings help staff identify the correct bin as do signs with both text and pictures of recyclable items. Keep signage and branding simple and consistent.

- ChopValue<sup>™</sup>, a startup in Vancouver, Canada collects, cleans and upcycles used chopsticks to make a variety of home décor items and other products, like yoga blocks. # Neighborhood Litter an Unsightly Mess

Unfortunately, littering continues to be a significant problem in New Jersey and throughout the United States. The KAB study also found that individuals under 30 years of age are more likely to litter than those who are older. I have been picking up litter in my neighborhood and township for years and have seen this first hand. While all age groups litter, educational programs and campaigns targeted at those under 30 years old are essential. Use of social media is recommended to reach this segment of the population.

The Garden State is fortunate to have its New Jersey Clean Communities litter prevention and cleanup program, however, more needs to be done by individuals, businesses and other organizations to help with this situation. Be part of the solution and pick up litter in your neighborhood, participate in litter cleanup days or organize your own litter cleanup event either through your employer or through a community group. # The Pull Printing Option

Pull printing is an approach to office printing that can reduce paper consumption and waste. The way pull printing works is by sending a print job to a secure server that then delivers or "pulls" the job to a printer when it is authenticated at the device by the user. This approach is often used to increase document security, but it also reduces unclaimed print jobs and their associated costs. It is estimated that 30% of office print jobs are never collected at the printer by the person sending the print job. Thus, there is more waste paper to manage at the end of the day. Hopefully, this paper is being recycled through office paper recycling programs, but even better yet is an approach that creates less waste in need of management, such as the pull printing approach. Pull printing is also sometimes called "FollowMe printing." Speak with your printer supplier if you would like to learn more about this approach to printing.

# Consider Recycling Cartons in the Office

Refrigerated and shelf stable food and beverage cartons, such milk cartons, juice cartons, soup cartons, juice boxes, etc. are made mostly of high quality recyclable paper fibers. Contact your vendor to see if the recyclable materials collected in your office are being delivered to a processing center that can handle cartons, and if they are, be sure to add these items to your program.
