Eastern Worm Snake

Eastern Worm Snake (Carphophis amoenus amoenus) - Pl.14

Identification: 7 1/2" - 14 3/4". The Eastern Worm Snake looks very much like a large earthworm. It has a very round body (typical of snakes that spend time burrowing), and a pointy head and tail. Ground color is a dull brown. The underside and the first one or two rows of scales on the lower sides are pink. Scales are smooth and opalescent; anal plate is divided.

Where to find them: Hides under rock or debris, in rotting logs, or burrows underground. It prefers moist ground. It goes underground in dry or cold weather.

When to find them: Active April through September.

Range: Entire state.
