

Black Bullhead

Ameiurus melas



Description:

- dark chin barbels
- dark olive, slate or yellow brown above
- shiny olive gold sides
- yellow to white below
- no well defined teeth on rear of pectoral fin
- caudal fin slightly notched
- short, rounded anal fin

Size:

• up to 24 inches

Range:

- native to Great Lakes, Hudson Bay and Mississippi River basins from New York to
- southern Saskatchewan and Montana south to the Gulf; Gulf Slope drainages from
- Mobile Bay, Georgia and Alabama to northern Mexico; not native to Atlantic Slope

Facts:

- prefer slow moving waters with soft bottoms
- only bullhead species with completely pigmented barbels
- tolerant of poorly oxygenated, turbid, polluted and high temperature waters
- venom on ends of pectoral spines (can cause pain to humans for up to a week)
- spawn May to July
- ♦ females produce 2000 to 3800 eggs
- female guards nest for first day then the male takes over for the remaining 10 days at most
- ♦ young stay near male for 2 weeks
- average life span is 5 years



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
