Gentlemen:

The Supervisor of New York Harbor is charged, by the Congress of the United States, with the responsibility of preventing obstruction or pollution of the navigable waters of the New York Harbor or its tributaries.

During a routine inspection of waterfront facilities along the south shore of the Passaic River, Newark, New Jersey, a concentration of foreign matter, which contained an acid content, was observed in the tidal waters along your waterfront property. Further investigation revealed that this pollution was caused by acid discharged from inside your plant into discharge pipes, located on the east and west end of your bulkhead and empties into the Passaic River, at the foot of Lister Avenue, Newark, New Jersey.

Under the provisions of Federal Statutes (U.S.C. Title 33, Section 407) it is unlawful to discharge, deposit, or cause to be discharged or deposited from a shore, wharf, or manufacturing establishment or mill of any kind, any refuse matter of any kind or description in the navigable waters of the United States. Violators of this Statute are liable to prosecution.

The violation cited herein was brought to the attention of Messrs. Homer Smith, Plant Manager, and W. C. Hill, Engineer Production Supervisor.
