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1 MS. PFAFF: It is 6:00 p.m. which is
2 the official start time for our public hearing. I
3 will ask everyone to silence their cell phones or
4 other electronic devices before we begin.

5 Good evening. My name is Ann Pfaff.
6 I am the Supervisor of the Nuclear Emergency
7 Preparedness Section in the Bureau of Nuclear
8 Engineering within the New Jersey Department of
9 Environmental Protection.

10 I will be the Hearing Officer this
11 evening. The purpose of this hearing is to
12 receive comments and questions regarding the
13 adequacy and effectiveness of the New Jersey
14 Radiological Emergency Response Plan for Nuclear
15 Power Plants.

16 In order that this hearing may be
17 properly documented, these proceedings are being
18 recorded by a certified shorthand reporter.

19 Everyone attending this meeting is
20 asked to sign the attendance sheet before leaving.
21 The attendance sheets for these hearings are used
22 to update the Bureau of Nuclear Engineering's
23 public hearing mailing list.

24 Public notice of this hearing was
25 published in the New Jersey Register on June 17th

1 and July 1st, 2019. In addition, public notice
2 was published in the South Jersey Times from
3 July 1st through July 9th, 2019. Copies of the
4 public notice for the hearings were mailed to all
5 the people who attended last year's hearings.

6 This hearing will proceed as
7 follows: I will provide a brief background as to
8 why we are conducting this hearing. Then I will
9 introduce the panel members and ask them to
10 briefly describe the role of their organization in
11 nuclear emergency preparedness and response.
12 Finally, I will open the hearing for comments and
13 questions from the public.

14 The New Jersey Radiation Accident
15 Response Act requires that the Department of
16 Environmental Protection in cooperation with the
17 New Jersey Division of State Police, conduct
18 public hearings to take comments on, and to
19 address questions relevant to the adequacy and
20 effectiveness of the New Jersey Radiological
21 Emergency Response Plan for Nuclear Power Plants.

22 These public hearings are held
23 annually in each of the three counties affected by
24 the plan; Ocean County for the Oyster Creek
25 Nuclear Generating Station, and Salem and

1 Cumberland Counties for the Salem Unit 1, Salem
2 Unit 2 and Hope Creek Nuclear Generating Stations.
3 We are here tonight to listen to your questions
4 and comments on New Jersey's nuclear emergency
5 response plan. Comments on more general nuclear
6 power issues or issues that relate to licensing
7 and regulatory matters at nuclear power plants are
8 not within the purview of this meeting, and hence
9 are not appropriate and will not be addressed.

10 Now, I would like to introduce the
11 members of the panel. To my right is Gian Campesi
12 representing the New Jersey Division of State
13 Police. Mr. Campesi is the Assistant Unit Head of
14 the Radiological Emergency Response Planning and
15 Technical Unit in the Office of Emergency
16 Management. To my left is Patrick Mulligan.
17 Patrick Mulligan is representing the New Jersey
18 Department of Environmental Protection. Mr.
19 Mulligan is the Assistant Director of the
20 Radiation Protection Program within the New Jersey
21 Department of Environmental Protection.

22 Now, I will ask Mr. Campesi to
23 briefly describe the role of the State Police in
24 the plan.

25 MR. CAMPESI: Thank you. Good

1 evening. I am Gian Campesi representing the State
2 Office of Emergency Management within the Division
3 of the State Police. Our office has the
4 responsibility for administering and implementing
5 the Radiological Emergency Response Plan for
6 incidents at nuclear power plants in New Jersey.

7 In addition to the preparation of
8 the radiological emergency plans, the New Jersey
9 State Police is the lead agency in the following
10 functional areas; notification and Communication,
11 Command and Coordination, Protective Actions,
12 which include, Evacuation, Shelter-in-Place,
13 Monitor and Prepare, Access Control and Food,
14 Water and Milk Control.

15 Parallel Actions also include
16 Traffic Control, Decontamination, Exposure
17 Control, Mass Care, Law Enforcement, Fire Control,
18 Public Health and Re-entry, Return and Recovery.

19 For the record, I would like to
20 introduce Captain Patrick Gorman of the New Jersey
21 State Police. He is the Emergency Preparedness
22 Bureau Chief and he is also part of the
23 Radiological Response Plan. Thank you.

24 MS. PFAFF: Now, I will ask Mr.
25 Mulligan to briefly describe the role of the

1 Department of the Environmental Protection in the
2 plan.

3 MR. MULLIGAN: Good evening. My
4 name is Patrick Mulligan. I am the Assistant
5 Director of the Radiation Protection Program. I
6 will briefly discuss the role of the Department of
7 Environmental Protection in New Jersey's
8 Radiological Emergency Response Plan.

9 The New Jersey Radiological Response
10 Plan identifies all responsible state agencies and
11 outlines their specific roles in the event of a
12 nuclear emergency. The Plan includes Standard
13 Operating Procedures which contain detailed
14 instructions and guidelines used by each agency
15 when performing their specific duties. The
16 Standard Operating Procedures are reviewed and
17 tested annually through drills and exercises. The
18 procedures are then revised as necessary in order
19 to enhance emergency response.

20 Under the New Jersey Radiation
21 Accident Response Act, the Department of
22 Environmental Protection has the lead role in
23 Accident Assessment and control of food, water and
24 milk following an incident. Accident Assessment
25 involves two separate analyses, an engineering

1 analysis of the event at the plant as it unfolds,
2 and an analysis of the amount of radiation to
3 which the public may be exposed in the event of a
4 release.

5 Depending upon the severity of the
6 event, the Department provides Protective Action
7 Recommendations to the Governor who will make a
8 final decision on actions to be implemented to
9 protect public health and safety. Protective
10 Action Recommendation for the public may include
11 the administration of potassium iodide,
12 evacuation, sheltering and access control within
13 the affected, or potentially affected area.

14 The Act also specifies that the
15 Department develop and implement a comprehensive
16 monitoring strategy that includes the daily
17 monitoring of levels of radioactivity in the
18 environment. The Department provides public
19 health, safety, and technical guidance with
20 respect to the preparation and implementation of
21 the plan. The Department's final responsibility
22 under the Act is to conduct, in cooperation with
23 the State Police, public hearings annually in each
24 designated county to determine the adequacy and
25 effectiveness of the Plan. I would like to take a

1 moment to identify the staff I have here from the
2 Department of Environmental Protection: Elliot
3 Rosenfeld representing our engineering section.
4 Jay Vouglitois representing our environmental
5 section and three folks from our Nuclear Emergency
6 Preparedness section; Sahar Azmat, Daniel Salama,
7 and Rubin Papraniku.

8 MS. PFAFF: We will now proceed with
9 the public's questions and comments. Those
10 individuals who wish to speak should complete a
11 speaker registration card and hand it to one of
12 the staff. I will call the speakers' names in the
13 same order as I receive the registration cards.
14 Please be certain to clearly print your name and
15 address on the registration card so that we may
16 contact you if we need to respond to your comments
17 and questions more fully in writing. When I call
18 your name, come forward to the microphone, face
19 the panel, and make yourself comfortable. Before
20 you begin your comments, please state and spell
21 your name for the reporter. Speakers will be
22 limited to five minutes each. If time still
23 remains after everyone has had a chance to speak,
24 I will invite additional comments from those
25 individuals who have already spoken. In fairness

1 to the speaker and in order that we all can make
2 best use of this time, I ask the cooperation of
3 the audience in refraining from calling out.
4 Comments from the audience will only delay the
5 proceedings and will disrupt our ability to hear
6 and accurately record the speaker's statements.

7 Again, I would like emphasize that
8 we are here tonight to listen to your questions
9 and comments on New Jersey's Nuclear Emergency
10 Response Plan. Comments on more general nuclear
11 power issues or issues that relate to licensing
12 and regulatory matters at nuclear power plants are
13 not within the purview of this meeting and hence
14 are not appropriate, and will not be addressed.

15 Thank you. We will now proceed to
16 call our first commenter.

17 (Pause.)

18 MS. PFAFF: I have no registration
19 cards. In the absence of anyone wishing to speak
20 at this point, we will temporarily adjourn in the
21 event they are in route and have been delayed. So
22 I would briefly adjourn until 6:25 p.m.

23 (Off the record at 6:15 p.m.)

24 (Back on the record at 6:25 p.m.)

25 MS. PFAFF: All right. It is 6:25.

1 I will open the meeting again. If there are any
2 members of the public that would like to provide
3 comment, please pick up a registration card and
4 hand it to me for that opportunity.

5 (Pause.)

6 So in the absence of anyone wanting
7 to make comment at tonight's public hearing, I
8 will officially adjourn the meeting.

9 Thank you for coming this evening.

10 (Meeting adjourned at 6:25 p.m.)
