Stakeholder involvement allows the Department to better understand the impacts that potential rule changes will have on our constituents. Accordingly, you are invited to provide your input on the following rule concepts and issues related to regulation of PFOA and PFOS:

- New Maximum Contaminant Levels for PFOA and PFOS based on recommendations from the Drinking Water Quality Institute (DWQI);
- New GWQS for PFOA and PFOS based on the DWQI recommended MCLs;
- Addition of PFOA and PFOS to the DPHS List of Hazardous Substances;
- New cleanup standards for PFOA and PFOS based on the new GWQS;
- New testing requirements for private well owners for PFOA, PFOS, and PFNA based on DWQI recommended MCLs;
- Geographic extent of testing requirements;
- The applicability and frequency of monitoring;
- Costs of treatment and analysis; and
- Lab capacity and analytic methods.
