ADOPTED AMENDMENT TO THE CAPE MAY COUNTY WATER QUALITY
MANAGEMENT PLAN


Public Notice

Take notice that on September 12, 2006, pursuant to the provisions of the New Jersey Water Quality Planning Act, N.J.S.A. 58:11A-1 et seq., and the Statewide Water Quality Management Planning rules (N.J.A.C. 7:15-3.4), an amendment to the Cape May County Water Quality Management Plan was adopted by the Department of Environmental Protection (Department). This amendment submitted on behalf of Scarborough Properties, Inc., allows for the construction of a discharge to groundwater wastewater treatment facility to serve a proposed 136,000 square foot commercial facility consisting of a supermarket, a pharmacy, and fast food and eat-in restaurants. The projected wastewater flow, calculated in accordance with N.J.A.C. 7:14A-23.3, is 14,210 gallons per day (gpd). The treatment facility's service area includes 18 acres located on Block 651, Lots 1-5, 10, 11 and 16, Block 653.01, Lots 1 and 5, in Upper Township, Cape May County. The proposed project is located on the southbound side of Route 9, and is bordered to the north by County Route 623 (Roosevelt Boulevard Extension), to the west by Stage Coach Road and to the south by County Route 631 (Tuckahoe Road). The proposed project will be provided public water by New Jersey American Water Company within an existing allocation utilizing the confined Atlantic City 800 foot sands aquifer. The project location is within the Marmora/Beesley's Point/Palermo designated coastal town center.

This amendment has been reviewed in accordance with Executive Order 109 (2000) and N.J.A.C. 7:15-5.18. This evaluation determined that the threshold for Executive Order 109 (2000) (EO109) was not triggered, therefore alternative and environmental impact analyses were not required.

This amendment proposal was noticed in the New Jersey Register on June 19, 2006 at 38 N.J.R. 2743(a) and no comments were received during the comment period.


This amendment represents only one part of the permit process and other issues may need to be addressed prior to final permit issuance. Additional issues which may need to be addressed may include, but are not limited to, the following: compliance with stormwater regulations; antidegradation; effluent limitations; water quality analysis; exact locations and designs of future treatment works (pump stations, interceptors, sewers, outfalls, wastewater treatment plants); and development in wetlands, flood prone areas, designated Wild and Scenic River areas, or other environmentally sensitive areas which are subject to regulation under Federal or State statutes or rules.
