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

AMENDMENT TO THE LOWER DELAWARE WATER QUALITY MANAGEMENT
PLAN

Public Notice

Take notice that on **APR 01 1999**, pursuant to the provisions of the New Jersey Water Quality Planning Act, N.J.S.A. 58:11A-1 *et seq.*, and the Statewide Water Quality Management Planning rules (N.J.A.C. 7:15-3.4), an amendment to the Lower Delaware Water Quality Management Plan was adopted by the Department of Environmental Protection (Department). This amendment, submitted by the Delaware River and Bay Authority, adds Block 192.01, Lot 2 in Carneys Point Township to the sewer service area of the Carneys Point Sewerage Authority (CPSA) Sewage Treatment Plant (STP). The sewer service area extension will serve the **Conectiv Building** that is presently being constructed within the proposed Salem County Business Park. The 121,200 square foot building will generate a projected wastewater flow of 12,120 gallons per day, however no expansion to the CPSA STP was necessary to serve this site. This amendment only adds the Conectiv site within the proposed Salem County Business Park to the CPSA STP sewer service area. The remainder of the Salem County Business Park site will be addressed by the CPSA Wastewater Management Plan, which is presently under review by the Department.

This amendment represents only one part of the permit process and other issues will be addressed prior to final permit issuance. Additional issues which were not reviewed in conjunction with this amendment but which may need to be addressed may include, but are not limited to, the following: antidegradation; effluent limitations; water quality analysis; exact locations and designs of future treatment works (pump stations, interceptors, sewers, outfalls, wastewater treatment plants); and development in wetlands, flood prone areas, designated Wild and Scenic River areas, or other environmentally sensitive areas which are subject to regulation under Federal or State statutes or rules.
