## IDEA-B State Fiscal Year 2022 Entitlement Allocations and Electronic Grant Application Information

The IDEA-B State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2022 allocations are now posted on the New Jersey Department of Education's (NJDOE) <u>Special Education webpage</u>. The Section 611 (Basic 3-21) and Section 619 (Preschool 3-5) awards are distributed on a formula basis to school districts, charter schools, renaissance school projects, and state agencies. A detailed description of the data used in the individual allocation formulas may be found under the allocation tabs within the online grant application. Eligible agencies should use these amounts to plan for the use of the funds. Districts will notice changes from the previous year's allocations due to various factors, such as available federal funding, the district's enrollment and poverty factors, and the number of children with disabilities being served. Also, be advised that base allocation adjustments may be required during the project period, as per 34 CFR §300.705(b)(2) and §300.816(b).

## SFY 2022 IDEA-B Electronic Grant Submission.

The SFY 2022 IDEA grant application must be completed in the NJDOE's <u>Electronic Web Enabled Grant System</u> (<u>EWEG</u>), a statewide program designed to provide coordination among all grant applications. The SFY 2022 IDEA application was available in the EWEG system as of June 4, 2021. **The applications are due July 16, 2021**. Instructions are provided for each section within the application. Local Education Agencies (LEAs)/State Agencies that submit their applications in substantially approvable form by the due date may begin to obligate the funds as of July 1, 2021.

## **Grant Project Period Timelines/Obligation of Funds**

The LEAs/State Agencies may obligate these funds beginning July 1 of the fiscal year for which the funds were appropriated (SFY 2022 through September 30 of the second successive fiscal year SFY 2024). This maximum period includes a 15-month period of initial availability, plus a 12-month period for carryover.

The NJDOE receives the IDEA Section 611 award from the U.S. Department of Education in two separate awards (July 1, 2021 and October 1, 2021); the full allocations for these programs will not be available until October 1, 2021. Therefore, districts should anticipate *obligating* no more than 14 percent of their SFY 2022 IDEA Basic allocation for activities planned for July 1, 2021 through September 30, 2022.

## LEA Determinations/Significant Disproportionality

In accordance with 34 CFR §300.647, the State will be utilizing a risk ratio to identify those districts with significant disproportionality for the 2021-2022 grant year. The NJDOE is available to provide technical assistance to those districts identified for significant disproportionality. As in previous years, LEAs will be notified of their annual determination in the online application.

Districts identified for significant disproportionality are required to reserve 15 percent of their total allocation (Basic + Preschool x .15) directed to implement Comprehensive Coordinated Early Intervening Services (CCEIS),

according to 34 CFR §300.226. Beginning in the 2019-20 grant year, as per §300.646(d), LEAs identified for significant disproportionality may use the CCEIS funds for:

- Children age 3 through grade 12;
- Children who are not currently identified as needing special education or related services but who need additional academic and behavioral support;
- Children currently identified as needing special education or related services (funds cannot be used exclusively for this group); and
- Professional development and educational and behavioral evaluations, services, and supports.

The activities must address the factors, policies, practices, and/or procedures contributing to the significant disproportionality. For additional information on CCEIS, please refer to the Significant Disproportionality resources available on the NJDOE's <u>Special Education webpage</u>.

LEAs that are not identified for significant disproportionality may still choose to voluntarily reserve 15 percent of their total allocation to implement Coordinated Early Intervening Services (CEIS). In contrast to the information set forth above, LEAs that implement CEIS may only serve an identified group of at-risk students in grades K-12 who are not yet eligible for special education and related services.
