2023-2024 School Year Advanced Placement Test Fee (APTF) Program

The New Jersey Department of Education (NJDOE) proudly announces its continued participation in the Advanced Placement Exam Fee Reduction program, increasing access to exams for students with financial need. In the 2023-2024 school year, the Advanced Placement (AP) test fee will be offset with support from the College Board and the NJDOE for students enrolled in an AP class and who qualify as low income. A low-income student is defined as a child, age 5 through 19, from a low-income family based on eligibility for free or reduced-price lunches under the *National School Lunch Act*.

For each 2024 AP Exam (except for AP Seminar Exams and AP Research Exams) taken by students who attend public and nonpublic schools in the State, and who qualify for the College Board AP Exam fee reduction ("Fee-Reduced Exams"), as indicated by the applicable school's AP coordinator, the following will occur:

- The College Board will provide a \$53.00 fee reduction per exam;
- The applicable school will forego its \$9.00 rebate per exam;
- The State will pay \$45.00 per exam to the College Board; and,
- The student will pay \$8.00 per exam.

For each 2023 AP Seminar Exam and each 2024 AP Research Exam taken by students who attend public and nonpublic schools in the State, and who qualify for the College Board AP Exam fee reduction ("Fee-Reduced Exams"), as indicated by the applicable school's AP coordinator, the following will occur:

- The College Board will provide a \$101.00 fee reduction per exam;
- The applicable school will forego its \$9.00 rebate per exam;
- The State will pay \$93.00 per exam to the College Board; and,
- The student will pay \$8.00 per exam.

The College Board will bill the State directly, based on the number of fee-reduced exams administered. This is as determined by each school, and as indicated by the applicable school's AP coordinator in the AP Registration and Ordering system.

Other Federal Funding Sources (Title I-A, Title IV-A, and ESSER): Under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA), as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), local educational agencies (LEAs) are permitted to dedicate a portion of the Title I, Part A and/or Title IV, Part A funding they receive to defray the cost of AP and other advanced course or industry credential exams taken by low-income students. These costs are also allowable under the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (ESSER). For more information on allowable uses of federal funds, refer to the NJDOE's "Unlocking Your Federal Funds Guidance."

If intending to use Title I, Part A, Title IV, Part A, or ESSER funds for this purpose, districts must ensure such costs are supported by their needs assessment and reflected in the budget section of their 2023-2024 ESEA

Consolidated Application or their ESSER application, as applicable, in the NJDOE's Electronic Web-Enabled Grant (EWEG) system.

Additionally, LEAs running a Title I-A Schoolwide Program must ensure these costs are articulated in their annual school plan (ASP) as this is a Title I-A requirement.
