- <u>Build a Kit</u>: Assemble emergency kits containing essential supplies like water, non-perishable food, first aid supplies, flashlights, batteries, and important documents. Ensure these kits are easily accessible and periodically updated.
- <u>Ready Kids</u>: Engage students in age-appropriate preparedness activities. Utilize FEMA's "Ready Kids" resources to teach children about emergency planning.
- Pet Preparedness: Pets are important members of families too; include any pets when planning.
