

Anti-Bias Coaching Scenario Handout (Silent Read)

Ms. Smith is a veteran teacher who has been teaching 3rd grade at your school for fifteen years. In the past five years, your school's demographics have changed bring more diversity into the classroom and a large population of students that receive free/reduce meals.

In your assessment, Ms. Smith's instructional practices are sound. She integrates some creative, hands-on activities and is known for designing rigorous, well-structured lessons. Average and above average students have historically performed well in her class. However, students with low ability, those that lack home support for learning, and some minority students struggle to master the content and are often disciplined for not completing classwork, homework, or not returning items with a parent signature. When this happens, Ms. Smith blames the student or their families.


Of particular concern to you is a pattern of pushing out boys from class. She will often send them to a colleague in her grade level or lower grade levels when the boys misbehave, and you are deeply concerned about the amount of instructional time a couple boys are missing. The boys' parents have been to the school to speak with Ms. Smith, and she became very agitated and told you later she felt "harassed." You believe this perception stems from conscious or unconscious bias on Ms. Smith's part. You have experience with the parents of these students, and you think they are simply concerned, and want their children to be treated fairly by the teacher. In the past, when you have made suggestions to Ms. Smith about things she can do differently, she has gotten defensive.

What should you do?

Silent Discussion Protocol

- No one is allowed to speak during this activity
- In a small group of 4-5 people respond in writing to the question at the end of the passage
- Each member of the group must offer a unique suggestion
- Once everyone has responded, you may discuss them all
- Try to agree on two things you can do in this scenario
