

PORTRAITS OF RESILIENCE

The American Psychological Association defines **RESILIENCE** as “the process and outcome of successfully adapting to difficult or challenging life experiences, especially through mental, emotional, and behavioral flexibility and adjustment to external and internal demands.” This trait is demonstrated by Holocaust survivors, not only during the events of the Holocaust, but in the years that followed as they rebuilt their lives and their families.

While one sentence cannot define a person’s identity, it can offer a powerful glimpse into the lived experiences that enabled resilience to reveal itself as a trait shared by the following survivors.

“We must do our best to understand those eldest among us, those who have ‘borne most’; to talk to them, and love them, and bear witness.”

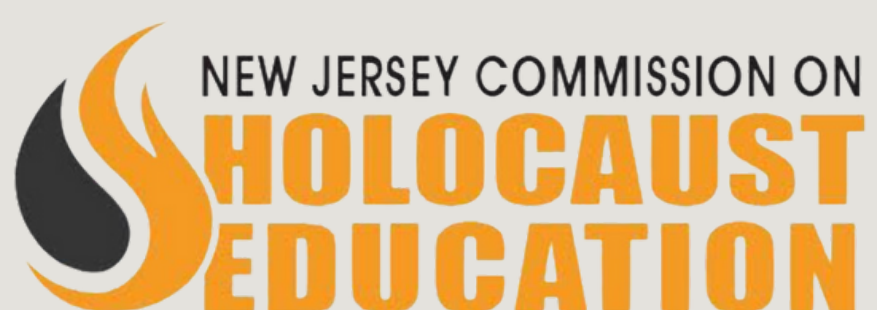

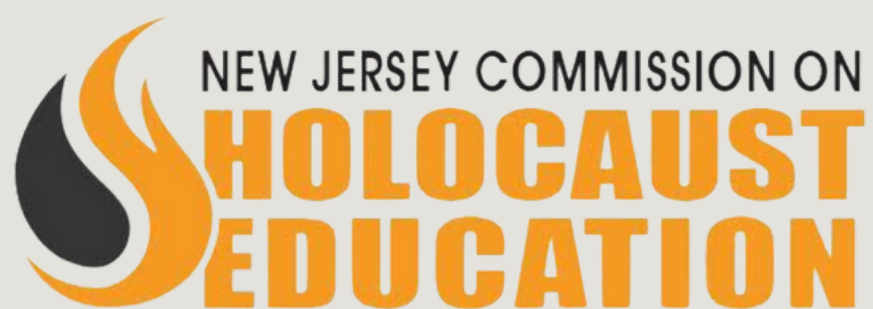

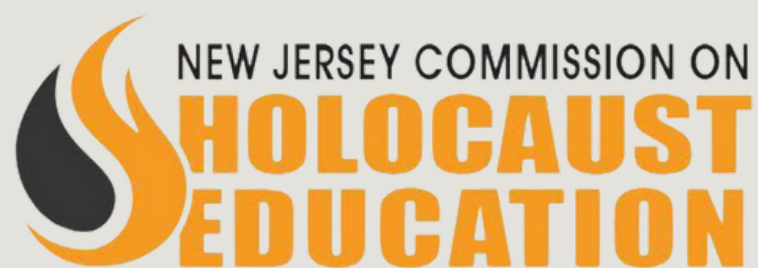

Leon hid in an underground hole disguised as a manure heap for sixteen months.



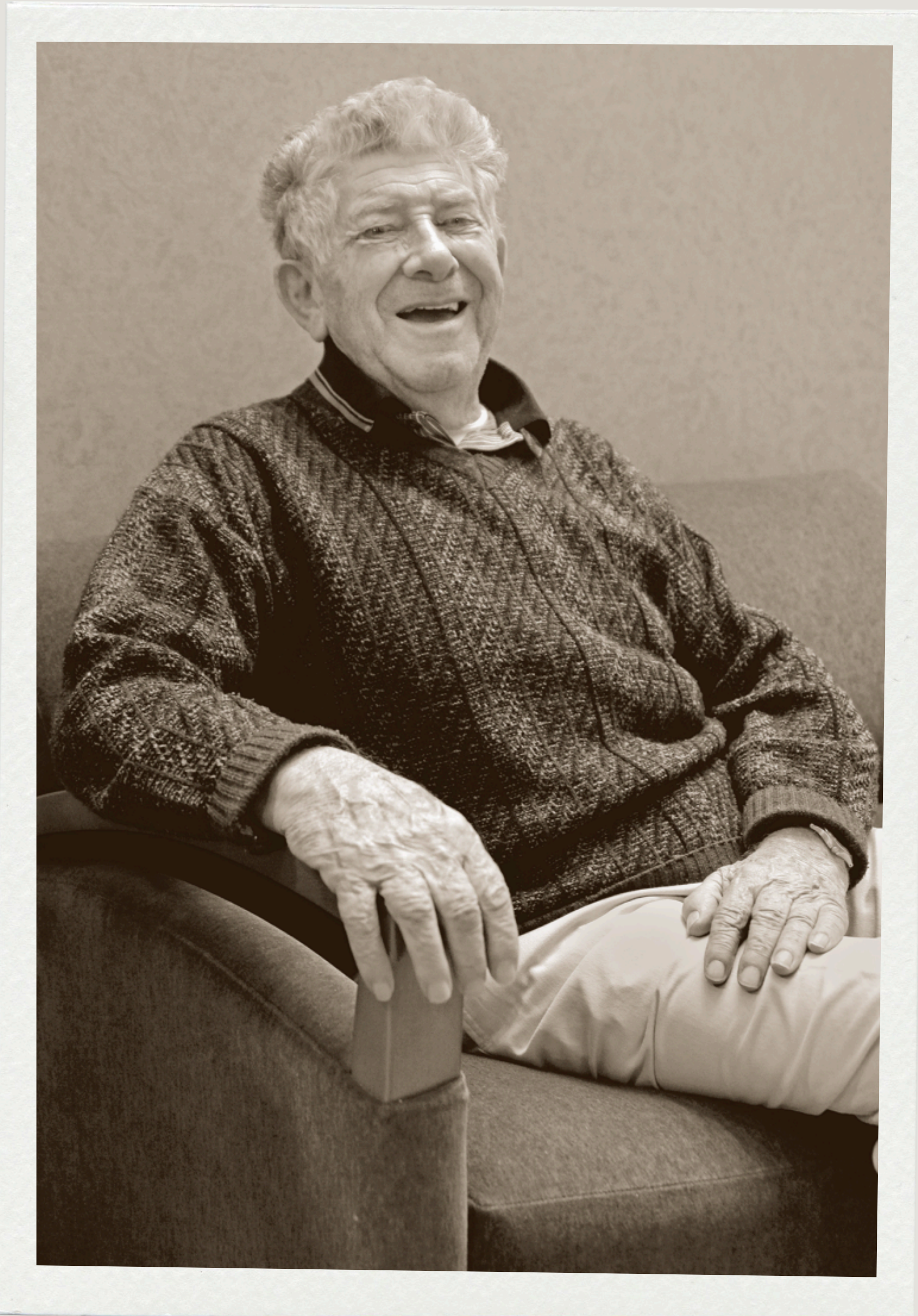

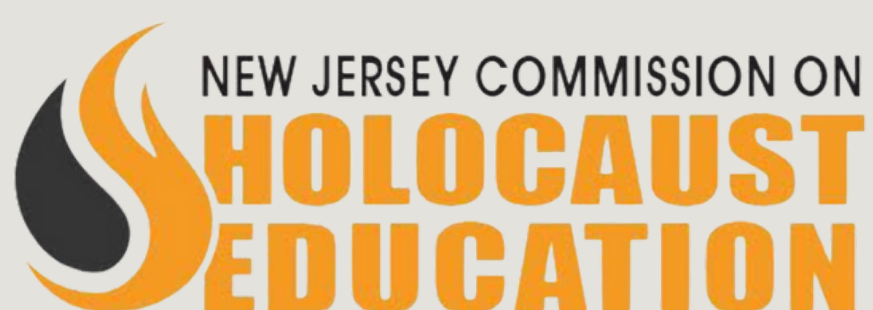

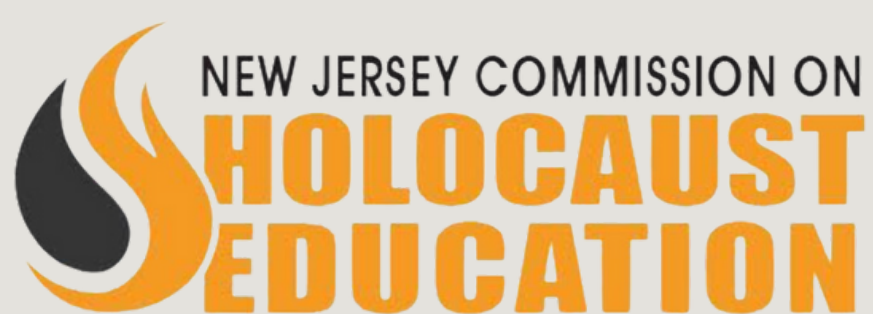
