

#### Introduction

This publication was produced by a team of experienced educators to provide teachers with a sampling of lesson/unit plans on the Holocaust for elementary, middle, and high school students that use the principles of Universal Design for Learning, or UDL.

#### What is UDL?

Universal Design for Learning (UDL) is a research-based framework for designing curricula—that is, educational goals, methods, materials, and assessments—that enable all individuals to gain knowledge, skills, and enthusiasm for learning. This is accomplished by simultaneously providing rich supports for learning and reducing barriers to the curriculum, while maintaining high achievement standards for all students.

The three core principles of UDL (defined by CAST — see David H. Rose & Anne Meyer, Teaching Every Student in the Digital Age: Universal Design for Learning, ASCD, 2002) are:

- 1) Provide Multiple Means of Engagement
- 2) Provide Multiple Means of Representation
- 3) Provide Multiple Means of Action and Expression

Throughout the lesson/unit plans contained in this publication, examples of the three UDL principles have been identified by color, with green for Engagement, purple for Representation, and blue for Action and Expression.
