ERIC S. KOMAR : ORDER OF REVOCATION

At its meeting of January 24, 2019, the State Board of Examiners (Board) reviewed information received from the Office of Student Protection (OSP) regarding Eric S. Komar. On February 6, 2018 Komar pled guilty to one count of knowingly receiving and distributing child pornography. According to the Indictment, Komar had received 600 or more images and videos of child pornography involving prepubescent minors or minors who had not attained the age of 12 years. On October 2, 2018, Komar was sentenced to 82 months in federal prison and supervised release for 10 years. He was also subject to computer monitoring, ordered to participate in a mental health program, ordered to have restricted contact with minors, and participate in a sex offender treatment program, among other conditions.

The OSP notified the Board that, as a result of his conviction, Komar was disqualified from public school employment pursuant to *N.J.S.A.* 18A:6-7.1 *et seq.* Komar currently holds a Teacher of Russian Certificate of Eligibility with Advanced Standing.

Komar did not challenge the accuracy of his criminal history record before the Commissioner of Education. Upon review of the above information, the Board voted at its meeting of March 8, 2019 to issue Komar an Order to Show Cause as to why his certificate(s) should not be revoked.

The Board sent Komar the Order to Show Cause by regular and certified mail on March 12, 2019. The Order provided that Komar had 30 days to respond. The certified mail receipt was received and the regular mail copy was not returned. Komar did not file a response.

Thereafter, on April 24, 2019, the Board sent Komar another notice by certified and regular mail providing him an additional 15 days to respond to the Order to Show Cause. The certified mail receipt was received and the regular mail copy was not returned. Komar did not file a response.

Thereafter, pursuant to *N.J.A.C.* 6A:9B-4.6(e), on May 22, 2019, the Board sent Komar a hearing notice by regular and certified mail. The notice explained that the allegations in the Order to Show Cause were deemed to be admitted as a result of his failure to file an Answer. Thus, Komar was offered an opportunity to submit written arguments on the issue of whether the conduct addressed in the Order to Show Cause constituted conduct unbecoming a certificate holder, as well as arguments with regard to the appropriate sanction in the event that the Board found just cause to take action against his credential. It also explained that, upon review of the charges against him and the legal arguments tendered in his defense, the Board would determine if his offense warranted action against his credential. Thereupon, the Board would also determine the appropriate sanction, if any. Komar was also offered the opportunity to appear before the Board to provide testimony on the sanction issue. The certified mail receipt was signed and returned and the regular mail copy was not returned. Once again, Komar did not file a response.

The threshold issue before the Board in this matter is whether Komar's conviction and subsequent disqualification constitute conduct unbecoming a certificate holder or other just cause. Since Komar failed to respond to the Order to Show Cause, the allegations therein are deemed admitted. *N.J.A.C.* 6A:9B-4.6(c). Consequently, at its meeting of September 19, 2019, the Board considered only the allegations in the Order to Show Cause and the information received from the OSP. The Board concluded that no material facts related to Komar's offense were in dispute since he never denied that he had engaged in the conduct alleged and therefore determined that summary

decision was appropriate in this matter. *N.J.A.C.* 6A:9B-4.6(h). After reviewing the allegations, the Board found that Komar had engaged in unbecoming conduct.

The Board must now determine whether Komar's conviction and resulting disqualification, as set forth in the Order to Show Cause, represent just cause to act against his credential pursuant to *N.J.A.C.* 6A:9B-4.4. The Board finds that they do.

In enacting the OSP statute, *N.J.S.A.* 18A:6-7.1 *et seq.* in 1986, the Legislature sought to protect public school pupils from contact with individuals whom it deemed to be a danger. Individuals convicted of crimes such as Possession of Child Pornography fall squarely within this category. The strong legislative policy statement is also in accord with the Commissioner's long-standing belief that teachers must serve as role models for their students. "Teachers... are professional employees to whom the people have entrusted the care and custody of ... school children. This heavy duty requires a degree of self-restraint and controlled behavior rarely requisite to other types of employment." *Tenure of Sammons*, 1972 *S.L.D.* 302, 321. Moreover, unfitness to hold a position in a school system may be shown by one incident, if sufficiently flagrant. *Redcay v. State Bd. of Educ.*, 130 *N.J.L.* 369, 371 (1943), *aff'd*, 131 *N.J.L.* 326 (E & A 1944). In this instance, Komar's conviction demonstrates behavior that falls far short of a role model.

The strong policy statement on the part of the Legislature set forth in *N.J.S.A.* 18A:6-7.1(b) also offers guidance to the Board as to the appropriate sanction in this matter. An individual whose offense is so great that he or she is barred from service in public schools should not be permitted to retain the certificate that authorizes such service. Nor should a person who has been disqualified from teaching in a public school be permitted to continue to hold himself out as a teacher. Thus,

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because the Legislature and the Commissioner consider Komar's offense so significant, the Board

believes that the only appropriate sanction in this case is the revocation of his credential.

Accordingly, on September 19, 2019, the Board voted to revoke Eric Komar's Teacher of

Russian Certificate of Eligibility with Advanced Standing. On this 1st day of November, 2019, the

Board voted to adopt its formal written decision and it is therefore ORDERED that the revocation

of Komar's certificate(s) be effective immediately. It is further ORDERED that Komar return his

certificate(s) to the Secretary of the State Board of Examiners, Office of Certification and

Induction, P.O. Box 500, Trenton, NJ 08625-0500 within 30 days of the mailing date of this

decision.
