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State Board of Education Recognizes 2001 Distinguished Teacher Candidates

Commissioner of Education Vito A. Gagliardi, Sr. today recognized 15 outstanding college graduates who participated in teacher education programs. The teachers, who were selected as award recipients for the 2001 Commissioner's Distinguished Candidate Awards, were honored at a special reception.

"I am proud to meet these extraordinary individuals who by their talent and special gifts are poised to enter the classroom," Commissioner Gagliardi said. "Through the Distinguished Teacher Candidate Awards, we single out future teachers who show great promise in their chosen field.

"We need to continue our tradition of attracting and retaining quality teachers who can give our students a strong foundation in learning," Dr. Gagliardi said. "I encourage these candidates to enjoy long and productive teaching careers in New Jersey."

Gagliardi recognized the work of a six-member panel of educators that selected the award recipients.
