

Education & Teacher Certification at Centenary College

History of the Program

Centenary College first offered education courses in 1929. The first graduate program was offered in 1995, as a Master of Arts in Education: Instructional Leadership. This was joined by a Master of Arts in Special Education in 1999.

The program continued to grow and expand into the first decade of the 21st century. The chair, Barbara-Jayne Lewthwaite, began to investigate national accreditation. In 2004, initiative began in earnest to achieve TEAC accreditation. In May, 2005, Centenary's Education Department became TEAC pre-accredited.

During this time, significant growth and change was occurring within the graduate program. A Master of Arts in Educational Leadership was added in 2003. In 2006, the first on-line program, Master of Education in Educational Practice was begun.

Today

Centenary College offers teacher certification programs in New Jersey to students who are working toward a Bachelor of Arts degree Biology, English, History, Mathematics, Social Studies, and Liberal Arts.

Centenary College is known for its innovative approach to teaching special education methodologies to tomorrow's teachers. We were one of the first colleges with education programs in New Jersey to provide a dual certification program for general education and special education students.

5. The Education Department provides careful advising and close supervision in order to help ensure that students become competent as well as qualified teachers.
