# Convening

State Board of Education President Kathy Goldenberg convened the public meeting at 9:05 a.m. with the reading of the statement pertaining to the public session of the State Board meeting as it complies with the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Act.

The Open Public Meetings Act was enacted to ensure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meeting of public bodies at which any business affecting their interest is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the State Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time and place thereof posted in the Department of Education (Department), Secretary of State's Office and notice also having been given to the State House Press Corps, the Governor's Office and the State Board agenda subscribers.

And seeing there was a quorum, the meeting of March 2, 2022, was called to order.

# **Adjourn to Executive Session**

President Goldenberg then read the resolution pertaining to the executive session of the State Board meeting as it complies with the Open Public Meetings Act.

Whereas, in order to protect the personal privacy and to avoid situations wherein the public interest might be disserved, the Open Public Meetings Act permits public bodies to exclude the public from that portion of a meeting at which certain matters are discussed, now therefore be it

**Resolved,** that consistent with the provision of N.J.S.A. 10:4-12.b, the State Board Education will now adjourn to executive session to discuss personnel and legal issues. The State Board immediately adjourned to executive session on March 2, 2022.

President Kathy Goldenberg reconvened the open meeting at 10:12 a.m. with the reading of the resolution pertaining to the resumption of the public session of the State Board meeting as it complies with the Open Public Meetings Act.

**Whereas,** consistent with the provision of N.J.S.A. 10:4-12.b, the State Board will now adjourn from executive session to resume the open session of this meeting.

# Pledge of Allegiance

# **Approval of Minutes of The Meetings**

On a motion duly seconded and carried, the State Board members approved the minutes of the public meeting conducted on February 2, 2022. State Board members Ms. Sylvia Sylvia-Cioffi and Dr. Ernest Lepore abstained.

# **President's Reports**

President Goldenberg welcomed the viewing audience to the virtual State Board of Education meeting and asked for a moment of silence for all those in Europe who are suffering.

# **Public Testimony**

President Goldenberg stated that the State Board will receive written testimony on School District Operations (proposal level notice of substantial change) and Standards and Assessments (Bridge Year amendments). She also stated that the State Board will be accepting written testimony for the month of April on School Ethics Commission readoption with amendments.

# **Report of the Permanent Student Representative**

President Goldenberg introduced and welcomed the State Board of Education's new permanent student representative, Miss Maura Baker, a junior at West Orange High School in Essex County. Ms. Baker provided remarks encouraging students to participate in student council and the new requirement that school boards have a student liaison throughout the state.

### **State Board Committee Reports**

# **Policy Committee**

Ms. Elaine Bobrove, chair, Policy committee, stated that the committee met with Department staff on February 16, 2022. She stated they discussed a number of issues currently pending before the State Board, including the Bridge Year Pilot Program and changes upon adoption to Chapter 17, Education for Homeless Students and Students in State Facilities. She stated that both of those items will be discussed later in the meeting.

Ms. Bobrove further stated they also discussed the upcoming readoption of Chapters 9, 9A, 9B and 9C. She stated the four chapters include requirements for educator, administrator and educational services certificates and endorsements, as well as educator preparation programs, professional standards, and operations of the State Board of Examiners. Ms. Bobrove stated the Department will be working closely with the Policy Committee to review the existing chapters and possible changes prior to the State Board's consideration of the proposed readoption later this year.

### **CTE Committee**

Ms. Mary Beth Berry, chair, CTE committee, was not in attendance to provide the report. President Goldenberg, ex-officio, stated that the committee met with Department staff on February 23, 2022. She stated they received an update from the Department regarding a new law providing flexibility for certificate holders seeking a CTE endorsement. She stated they also discussed CTE student enrollment and national enrollment data by career cluster. She further stated they received updates on the wonderful CTE programs in a few school districts and they also received a status update on the four school districts participating in the P-TECH initiative.

# National Association of State Boards of Education (NASBE) Government Affairs

Dr. Ronald Butcher gave an update on the NASBE Government Affairs Committee (GAC) monthly meeting. He stated that this year they have had two meetings and at these meetings the NASBE staff updates the then they follow with Q&A session. He stated in the most recent meeting one of their discussions centered around President Biden's stalled Build Back Better Proposal. He further stated another significant discussion held that is of great importance to the State Board and the Department is the Competes legislation recently introduced.

Dr. Butcher stated it is a major funding and policy package that includes a STEM Pathways model, Computer Science and the National Internship Act. Dr. Butcher stated that a new initiative that may be included in this package would involve assessments and accountability in innovative projects and initiatives in relation to funding for State Boards, specifically in relation to getting away from rank score tests and moving more toward achievement tests centered around specific standards and academic skills.

Dr. Butcher stated another item discussed is the Supreme Court's decision to look at the lawsuit in Maine that relates to higher education admission practices. He also stated that a question came up regarding the Competes Act and how it will deal with funding related to social and emotional learning, as well as the staffing shortages throughout the United States; and a Prep Act, primarily related to higher education; as well as environmental conditions related to facilities issues such as lead in water. Dr. Butcher stated that he will send a link to the Competes Act to Ms. Shoener so that it can be disseminated to the State Board.

# **Commissioner's Report**

### **Read Across America**

Acting Commissioner Allen-McMillan stated that each year, National Read Across America Day is celebrated on March 2nd, the birthday of Theodore Giselle, otherwise known as Dr. Seuss. She stated the annual event is part of a reading initiative established in 1998 by the National Education Association to help get students excited about reading. She further stated on this day, students, teachers, parents, and community members around the nation come together to read books and celebrate the joy of reading. She stated whether hardcover, paperback, on paper, or on an electronic tablet, computer, or phone, reading great material is more accessible now more than ever. She stated this year the White House annual proclamation points to the path to literacy that begins with timeless traditions being read to at bedtime, gathering in classrooms for story time, and attending events at local libraries with family and friends. Acting Commissioner Allen-McMillan stated today's stories and adventures are as diverse as in the world in which we live, and by reading them we come to more fully understand the vibrant diversity of our nation and the world.

# Resolution in Recognition of Gifted and Talented Students Month in New Jersey

Acting Commissioner Allen-McMillan requested that the State Board adopt a resolution recognizing March as Gifted and Talented Students Month in New Jersey.

The State Board unanimously adopted the following ceremonial resolution read by Mary Beth Gazi recognizing March as Gifted and Talented Students Month in New Jersey.

# Resolution in Recognition of Gifted and Talented Students Month In New Jersey

Whereas, gifted and talented children and youth demonstrate high achievement capability in areas such as intellectual, creative, artistic, or leadership capacity, or in specific academic fields, and need services and activities not ordinarily provided by the school in order to fully develop those capabilities; and

Whereas, gifted and talented education is needed to provide education for advanced students, to teach gifted and talented students the skills needed in their careers and lives, to meet social and emotional needs of students, and to keep them engaged in school; and

Whereas, longitudinal research has shown that gifted and talented programs have a positive effect on students' post-secondary plans, including a higher rate of advanced college degrees and involvement in creative productive work following college and graduate school; and

Whereas, the New Jersey State Board of Education and the Department support Statewide and local education agencies' efforts to meet the needs of gifted and talented and twice-exceptional students and to ensure they are appropriately identified and provided the opportunity to fulfill their potential; and

Whereas, in response to Governor Murphy's enactment of the Strengthening Gifted and Talented Education Act, the New Jersey Department of Education (Department) established the Strengthening Gifted and Talented Education Advisory Committee (Advisory Committee) to provide

recommendations and guidance on the law's implementation, identification of students, programming, the intersectionality of cognitive and affective needs, and professional development; and

Whereas, the Department and the Advisory Committee continue to support gifted and talented students by developing resources for school districts to enhance the gifted and talented continuum of services, policies, and procedures implemented in school districts, as well as professional development for teachers, educational services staff, and school leaders; now, let it be

**Resolved,** that the New Jersey State Board of Education and the Acting Commissioner of Education recognize the month of March as "Gifted and Talented Students Month in New Jersey" to honor the gifted and talented students of New Jersey, as well as their parents, teachers, and school leaders who are working to ensure that these students have equitable access to the resources and opportunities they need to achieve their full potentials.

# Resolution in Recognition of Social and Emotional Learning Day in New Jersey

Acting Commissioner Allen-McMillan requested that the State Board recognize Social and Emotional Learning Day in New Jersey.

The State Board unanimously adopted the following ceremonial resolution red by Fatimah Burnam-Watkins recognizing Social and Emotional Learning Day in New Jersey.

# Resolution in Recognition of Social and Emotional Learning Day in New Jersey

**Whereas,** the second Friday in March has been designated internationally as the third annual SEL Day by SEL4US and the Urban Assembly; and

Whereas, social and emotional learning (SEL) is the process through which all young people and adults acquire and apply the knowledge, skills, and attitudes to develop healthy identities, manage emotions and achieve personal and collective goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain supportive relationships, and make responsible and caring decisions; and

Whereas, SEL supports individuals and communities coping with significant challenges, to build protective factors for mental health and wellness, develop resiliency skills, seek help when needed, and exhibit care for fellow citizens; and

**Whereas,** SEL competencies develop throughout people's lives – from early childhood, through adolescence, and beyond – and are essential to success in schools, workplaces, homes, and communities; and

Whereas, New Jersey relies on citizens who exhibit the knowledge and skills encompassed in New Jersey's SEL competencies and sub-competencies, which include self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, responsible decision-making, and relationship skills; and

Whereas, schools, families and the wider community must be engaged to enhance the strength, depth, and pace of acquisition of SEL competencies; and

**Whereas,** the New Jersey State Board of Education and the Acting Commissioner of Education continue to recommend school districts implement the *New Jersey Social and Emotional Learning Competencies* to promote safe, supportive, and challenging learning environments in schools; and

Whereas, SEL competencies enhance educators' capacity to navigate stressors, foster positive learning environments and connections among colleagues and students; and

Whereas, SEL advances educational equity and excellence through authentic school-family-community partnerships to establish learning environments and experiences that feature trusting and collaborative relationships, rigorous and meaningful curriculum and instruction, and ongoing evaluation; and

Whereas, SEL can be incorporated into different subject matters and seamlessly embedded in everyday instruction; now, therefore, be it

**Resolved,** that the New Jersey State Board of Education and the Acting Commissioner of Education hereby recognize March 11, 2022, as SEL Day in New Jersey.

# \*D. Religious Holidays Calendar Resolution

• Adopted the following revised resolution pertaining to the annual calendar of religious holidays for the 2021-2022 school year as established at N.J.A.C. 6A:32-8.3(j), pursuant to N.J.S.A. 18A:36-14-16.

# Resolution The List of Religious Holidays Permitting Student Absence from School

Whereas, according to N.J.S.A. 18A:36-14 through 16 and N.J.A.C. 6A:32-8.3(j), regarding student absence from school because of religious holidays, the Commissioner of Education, with the

approval of the State Board of Education, is charged with the responsibility of prescribing such rules and regulations as may be necessary to carry out the purpose of the law; and

# Whereas, the law provides that:

- 1. Any student absent from school because of a religious holiday may not be deprived of any award or of eligibility or opportunity to compete for any award because of such absence;
- 2. Students who miss a test or examination because of absence on a religious holiday must be given the right to take an alternate test or examination;
- 3. To be entitled to the privileges set forth above, the student must present a written excuse signed by a parent or person standing in place of a parent;
- 4. Any absence because of a religious holiday must be recorded in the school register or in any group or class attendance record as an excused absence;
- 5. Such absence must not be recorded on any transcript or application or employment form or on any similar form; and
- 6. The Commissioner, with the approval of the State Board of Education, is required to:
  - (a) prescribe such rules and regulations as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this act; and
  - (b) prepare a list of religious holidays on which it shall be mandatory to excuse a student. The list, however, is to be a minimum list. Boards of education, at their discretion, may add other days to the list for the schools of their districts; and

**Whereas,** the New Jersey Department of Education makes every attempt to ensure the accuracy of the dates using the lunar, Gregorian and Julian calendars; and

Whereas, the district board of education has the right to add any bona fide religious holiday to the list for its own schools;

Whereas, dates within this resolution may not be fixed before the State Board adopts the annual calendar and may require additional revision; now therefore be it

**Resolved,** that the State Board of Education permits the Commissioner of Education, after annual adoption by the State Board of Education, to revise the dates provided in list of religious holidays; and be it further

**Resolved,** that the State Board of Education adopts the following list of religious holidays for the 2021 - 2022 school year:
