Convening

State Board of Education President Kathy Goldenberg convened the public meeting at 9:15 a.m. with the reading of the statement pertaining to the public session of the State Board meeting as it complies with the New Jersey Open Public Meetings Act.

The Open Public Meetings Act was enacted to ensure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meeting of public bodies at which any business affecting their interest is discussed or acted upon.

In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the State Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be published by having the date, time and place thereof posted in the Department of Education (Department), Secretary of State's Office and notice also having been given to the State House Press Corps, the Governor's Office and the State Board agenda subscribers.

And seeing there was a quorum, the meeting of May 3, 2023, was called to order.

Adjourn to Executive Session

President Goldenberg then read the resolution pertaining to the executive session of the State Board meeting as it complies with the Open Public Meetings Act.

Resolved, that consistent with the provision of N.J.S.A. 10:4-12.b, the State Board Education will now adjourn to executive session to discuss personnel and legal issues. The State Board immediately adjourned to executive session on May 3, 2023.

President Kathy Goldenberg reconvened the open meeting at 10:11 a.m. with the reading of the resolution pertaining to the resumption of the public session of the State Board meeting as it complies with the Open Public Meetings Act.

President's Reports

Public Testimony

For the month of May, the State Board will receive open topic public testimony in addition to testimony on the revisions to the draft New Jersey Student Learning Standards in Mathematics and English Language Arts and the rules proposed for the readoption with amendments to Chapter 7, Managing for Equality and Equity in Education. For the month of June, the State Board will receive public testimony on the amendments to Chapter 14, Special Education.

Report of the Permanent Student Representative

Miss Knopp was not present due to exams.

Resolution in Recognition of Better Speech and Hearing Month in New Jersey

President Goldenberg requested that the State Board adopt a ceremonial Resolution in Recognition of Better Speech and Hearing Month in New Jersey. She stated it is fitting that the State Board advance awareness about communication disorders and draw attention to all those individuals who

work tirelessly to help those with communication disorders to communicate effectively and live a high-quality life.

The State Board unanimously adopted the following resolution read by Sylvia Sylvia recognizing May as Better Speech and Hearing Month in New Jersey.

Resolution in Recognition of Better Speech and Hearing Month in New Jersey

Whereas, the month of May 2023 is being celebrated nationally as Better Hearing and Speech Month; and

Whereas, the New Jersey State Board of Education recognizes that many students have communication disorders and acknowledges the significance that the ability to communicate plays in building personal and societal relationships as students grow and mature; and

Whereas, Better Hearing and Speech Month is a time to raise awareness about communication disorders and to encourage children and families to receive appropriate screenings and evaluations; and

Whereas, Better Hearing and Speech Month is also a time to acknowledge the hard work of audiologists, speech-language pathologists, and speech, language, and hearing scientists and the contributions they make that remarkably affect the lives of students in New Jersey; and

Whereas, these professionals are invested in serving the needs of students with speech, language, and hearing disorders to foster success in all aspects of their lives by prioritizing effective communication for the highest quality of life; and

Whereas, the New Jersey Speech-Language-Hearing Association supports students and professionals by its professional development offerings, advocacy efforts, and public awareness campaigns designed to ensure that high-quality care is provided; and

Whereas, it is both fitting and proper that special recognition be given to acknowledge May 2023 as Better Hearing and Speech Month along with commending the New Jersey Speech-Language-Hearing Association for its role in providing outstanding service to professionals throughout the State of New Jersey; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, that the New Jersey State Board of Education and the Acting Commissioner of Education recognize May 2023 as Better Hearing and Speech Month in New Jersey.

Resolution in Recognition of Physical Fitness and Sports Month in New Jersey

President Goldenberg requested that the State Board adopt a ceremonial Resolution in Recognition of Physical Fitness and Sports Month in New Jersey.

The State Board unanimously adopted the following resolution read by Jack Fornaro recognizing May as Physical Fitness and Sports Month in New Jersey.

Resolution in Recognition of Physical Education Fitness and Sports Month in New Jersey

Whereas, childhood obesity has reached epidemic proportions in the United States; and

Whereas, today's childhood obesity rates are putting our children on course to be the first generation in this country to live shorter and less healthy lives than their parents; and

Whereas, children spend many of their waking hours on their devices or at school, and therefore need to be active during the school day to meet the recommendations of the Physical Activity Guidelines for Americans; and

Whereas, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services recommends that young people aged 6–17 years participate in at least 60 minutes of physical activity daily; and

Whereas, N.J.S.A. 18A:35-7 and 8 require all students in grades 1-12 to participate in at least two and one-half hours per week in health, safety and physical education; and

Whereas, research shows that physically active children are more likely to thrive academically and have improved behavior in school; and

Whereas, research shows that regular physical activity in childhood and adolescence improves strength and endurance, helps build healthy bones and muscles, helps control weight, reduces depression, anxiety and stress, increases self-esteem, increases academic performance, improves behavior, leads to better school attendance and may improve blood pressure and cholesterol levels; and

Whereas, schools can promote physical activity through comprehensive school physical activity programs, including recess, classroom-based physical activity, intramural physical activity clubs, interscholastic sports, and physical education; and

Whereas, participation in sports teams and physical activity clubs can improve grade point average, school attachment, educational aspirations, and the likelihood of graduation; and

Whereas, higher physical fitness levels are associated with better school attendance rates and fewer disciplinary incidents involving drugs, alcohol, violence or truancy; and

Whereas, the New Jersey State Board of Education strongly supports efforts to increase physical education, physical activity and participation in youth sports, recognizes the month of May as National Physical Education and Sports Month; now therefore be it

Resolved, that the New Jersey State Board of Education and Acting Commissioner of Education acknowledge the week of May 1-7, 2023, as National Physical Education and Sports Week and recognize National Physical Fitness and Sports Month and the central role of physical education and sports in creating a healthy lifestyle for all children in the State of New Jersey.

Selection of the State Board Nominating Committee

President Goldenberg announced the members of the State Board Nominating Committee. She stated Mary Beth Gazi will serve as Chair of the committee and State Board members Sylvia Sylvia

and Mary Beth Berry will serve on the committee. She stated the committee will present the slate of officers for the 2023-2024 school year at the June 7, 2023 meeting and in accordance with the bylaws the elections for the State Board leadership will be held after June 30.

State Board Annual Calendar Announcement

President Goldenberg stated that a list of State Board meeting dates and public testimony schedule for 2023-2024 are included in the agenda, and she asked that the Board share their thoughts on the dates as they will vote on the resolution to adopt the dates at the June 7, 2023 monthly public meeting. 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State Board Committee Reports

CTE Committee

Ms. Mary Beth Berry, chair of the CTE committee, stated that the committee met with Department staff on April 26, 2023 to discuss the Department's preliminary plans to transform Certified Nursing Assistant (CAN) programs into other possible health care CIP codes to meet the requirements for CTE programs that receive federal Perkins V funding. Perkins V requires funded programs to meet two of three criteria - high-skilled, high-waged and in-demand careers. She stated the Department discussed one possible transition of the CNA program into a pre-nursing program, which could provide students with additional career and wage growth opportunities. Ms. Berry stated she would like to thank the Department for its extensive planning regarding the transition and I look forward to hearing about its progress as it unfolds.

Assessment Committee

Arcelio Aponte, chair of the Assessment Committee, stated that the committee met with Department staff on April 27, 2023 to discuss the Department's proposal to change the cut score on the New Jersey Graduation Proficiency Assessment (NJGPA). He further stated he thanked the Department for keeping open the lines of communication regarding the NJGPA and the next generation of State assessments. Mr. Aponte stated that this topic is of concern to all State Board members and it is his

belief that everyone wants to do what is best for students across the State, and he looks forward to the robust discussion when we reach the NJGPA resolution later in the meeting.

Petitions for Rulemaking

President Goldenberg stated that three Petitions for Rulemaking were received, two on January 30, 2023, from Jill Caccia and one on February 15, 2023, from Jamie Epstein. She stated in the interest of time, she will advise that each of these petitions has been denied and each request and reasons for denial are available to view on the Department's Administrative Code Website.

Commissioner's Reports

Italian Heritage Commission Presentation

Mr. Robert DiBiase, Chair of the Italian Heritage Commission provided a presentation on the work of the Italian Heritage Commission.

Recognition of Teacher Appreciation Week

Acting Commissioner Allen-McMillan stated that it is an honor and privilege to recognize the phenomenal teachers of New Jersey all the time, and Teacher Appreciation Week provides a perfect forum. She stated teachers deserve recognition not only this week but throughout the year, and extended her eternal gratitude to teachers for helping students realize their full potential daily and over the course of their lifetime.

In Case You Missed It

Acting Commissioner Allen-McMillan stated that on April 13, she had the opportunity to join Governor Murphy and other Murphy Administration cabinet members at the 58th Annual New Jersey Conference of Mayors spring conference in Atlantic City. She stated the goal is to provide a unified approach and open line of communication to our State and Federal Legislatures and Administrations that reflect the will of the people of the great State of New Jersey and to improve the health and wellbeing of all its residents. She stated after Governor Murphy's keynote speech, she met with mayors from across the state in an interactive roundtable discussion format regarding their unique township needs.

Acting Commissioner Allen-McMillan stated in #GoodNewsInNJSchools, she supported Governor Murphy and the New Jersey Commission on Holocaust Education regarding new legislation that will craft and distribute a survey for public schools relating to educational instruction on the Holocaust and genocide. She further stated the survey will measure how each school district is meeting the State's current requirement that every board of education include instruction on the Holocaust and genocide in an appropriate place in the curriculum of all elementary and secondary school students. She further stated the signing of this legislation, which occurred on Holocaust Remembrance Day, underscores the Governor's commitment to combating antisemitism while ensuring the promise of 'never again' is instilled in future generations.

Acting Commissioner stated that she hopes you enjoyed following April's Department of Education social media pages for informative posts regarding Autism Awareness Month, Military

Child Appreciation Month, Week of the Young Child, School Library Month, Child Abuse Prevention Month, and Earth Day, amongst many other important initiatives not withstanding our desire to attract great talent to our agency. She further stated that in May, stay tuned for social media content recognizing Teacher Appreciation Week, including special YouTube video messages from our State Teacher of the Year and County Teachers of the Year, Special Education Week, Better Speech and Hearing Month, and Physical Fitness and Sports Month. She stated she would like to highlight that May is Mental Health Awareness month as the mental health of our students and educators remains at the forefront of much of our work through various training and grant opportunities. She further stated recently Sarah Adelman, Commissioner of the New Jersey Department of Human Services shared the importance of self-care in a person's daily routine and the role that it plays in helping you manage stress, lower your risk of illness, and increase your energy. She further stated she would also like to pass on that the Division of Mental Health and Addiction Services is hosting a series of webinars throughout May on topics ranging from suicide prevention to self-care to wellness to navigating difficult topics with children.

*C. Religious Holidays Calendar Resolution

• Adopted the following resolution pertaining to the annual calendar of religious holidays for the 2023-2024 school year as established at N.J.A.C. 6A:32-8.3(j), pursuant to N.J.S.A. 18A:36-14 to 16.

Resolution The List of Religious Holidays Permitting Student Absence from School

Whereas, according to N.J.S.A. 18A:36-14 through 16 and N.J.A.C. 6A:32-8.3(j), regarding student absence from school because of religious holidays, the Acting Commissioner of Education, with the approval of the State Board of Education, is charged with the responsibility of prescribing such rules and regulations as may be necessary to carry out the purpose of the law; and

Whereas, the law provides that:

1. Any student absent from school because of a religious holiday may not be deprived of any award or of eligibility or opportunity to compete for any award because of such absence;

- 2. Students who miss a test or examination because of absence on a religious holiday mustbe given the right to take an alternate test or examination;
- 3. To be entitled to the privileges set forth above, the student must present a written excusesigned by a parent or person standing in place of a parent;
- 4. Any absence because of a religious holiday must be recorded in the school register or in any group or class attendance record as an excused absence;
- 5. Such absence must not be recorded on any transcript or application or employment form or on any similar form; and
- 6. The Acting Commissioner, with the approval of the State Board of Education, is required to:
 - (a) prescribe such rules and regulations as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this act; and
 - (b) prepare a list of religious holidays on which it shall be mandatory to excuse a student. The list, however, is to be a minimum list. Boards of education, at their discretion, may add other days to the list for the schools of their districts; and

Whereas, the New Jersey Department of Education makes every attempt to ensure the accuracy of the dates using the lunar, Gregorian and Julian calendars; and

Whereas, the district board of education has the right to add any bona fide religious holiday to the list for its own schools;

Whereas, dates within this resolution may not be fixed before the State Board adopts the annualcalendar and may require additional revision; now therefore be it

Resolved, that the State Board of Education permits the Acting Commissioner of Education, after annual adoption by the State Board of Education, to revise the dates provided in list of religious holidays; and be it further

Resolved, that the State Board of Education adopts the following list of religious holidays for the 2023-2024 school year:

*D. Resolution to Adopt the New Jersey Graduation Proficiency Assessment (NJGPA) Cut Scores Standards

• Adopted new proficiency level cut score standards for the New Jersey Graduation Proficiency Assessment Mathematics and English Language Arts, and the Alternate Assessments, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 6A:8-4, N.J.A.C. 6A:8-5.1(g) and N.J.S.A. 18A:7C-1.

A Resolution Establishing Proficient Level Cut Score Standards for the New Jersey Graduation Proficiency Assessment (NJGPA): Mathematics and English Language Arts and the Alternate Assessments

Whereas, according to N.J.S.A. 18A:7C-1, the Acting Commissioner of Education with the approval of the State Board of Education shall establish a program of standards for graduation from secondary school, an such a program shall include, but not be limited to the development of a Statewide test in reading, writing and computational skills to be administered to all secondary school pupils as provided herein, and clear and explicit Statewide levels of proficiency in reading, writing and computational skills to be demonstrated as a minimum requirement for high school graduation; and

Whereas, according to N.J.S.A. 18A:7C-6, the State graduation proficiency test shall be administered to all 11th grade pupils and to any 11th or 12th grade pupil who has previously failed to demonstrate mastery of State graduation proficiency standards on said test; and

Whereas, the establishment of cut scores was completed for the State graduation proficiency test, called the New Jersey Graduation Proficiency Assessment (NJGPA), in accordance with industry best practices in large-scale assessment to determine the assessments' validity and the theoretically appropriate performance level cut scores; and

Whereas, an alignment study was conducted between the state assessments and the assessments proposed for use as an alternate to the NJGPA, to establish equivalent performance level cut scores; and

Whereas, the State Board acknowledges the Department's selection of the respective NJGPA and assessments listed as alternate graduation assessments proficient level cut scores; and

Whereas, the Department will monitor the impact of these tests and proficient level cut scores on the proficiency rates and will report any problems with the same to the State Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, that the New Jersey State Board of Education hereby approves the following proficient level cut scores, effective May 3, 2023:
