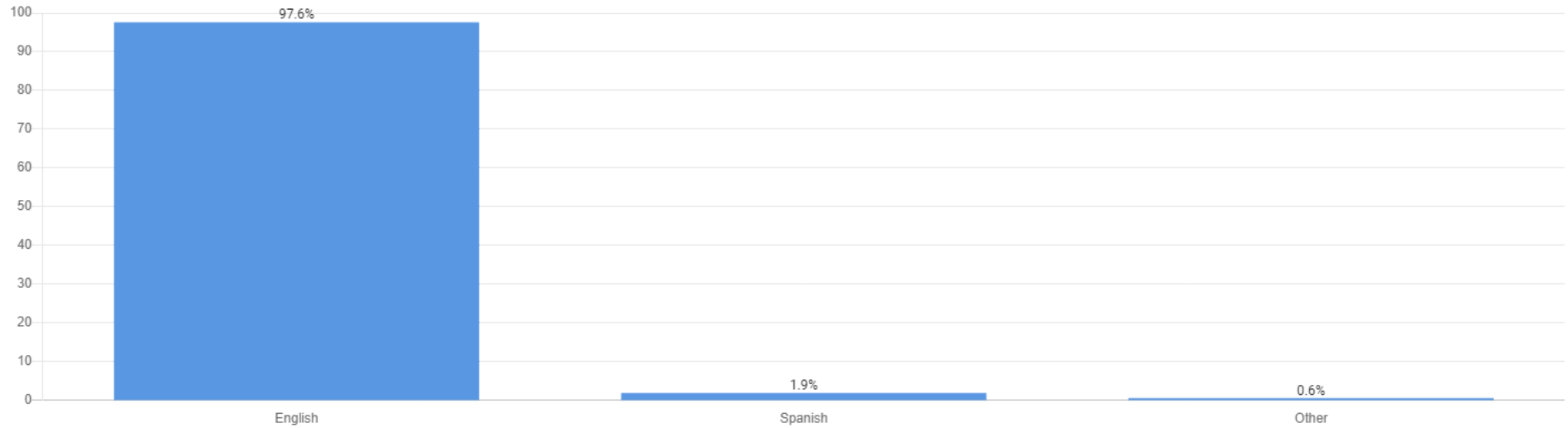

Student Growth

Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. New Jersey's ESSA state plan outlines that academic progress will be measured with school's median student growth percentile (mSGP) on statewide ELA and mathematics assessments. Each individual student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7. The SGP measures their academic progress from one year to the next compared to other students with similar prior test scores (academic peers).

Important Note for 2021-22 Reports: The calculation of mSGPs relies on one to two consecutive years of prior assessment results to calculate individual student growth percentiles. Due to the cancellation of the NJLSA in both 2019-20 and 2020-21, SGPs were not calculated for 2019-2020, 2020-2021, or 2021-2022. The 2021-22 reports will not include any mSGP data.

The NJDOE received approved through the [COVID-19 State Plan Addendum](#), to use an alternative method to calculate academic progress for the 2021-22 school year based on aggregate score improvement on the NJSLA at the schoolwide and student group level between 2018-2019 and 2021-2022. For 2021-22, the NJDOE measured academic progress in ELA and mathematics using Relative School Improvement Measure (RSIM). Results of the RSIM measure are available on the [NJDOE's Accountability page](#) under 2022 Accountability Data.

English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students that met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students that were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. The table below provides participation rates, proficiency rates, annual targets and status in meeting the targets, and statewide proficiency rates.

Important note for 2021-22: Due to the cancellation of statewide assessments in 2019-20 and 2020-21, statewide assessment results are not available for the 2019-20 and 2020-21 school years.

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English Language Arts Assessment - Participation and Performance

This table shows performance on statewide assessments for English language arts (ELA) both overall and by student group. It includes the results of students taking both the NJSLA and DLM assessments. NJSLA results include only students in grades 3 through 9. Students that were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. Student are considered to have met or exceeded expectations if they score at Level 4 or 5 on the NJSLA assessment or at Level 3 or 4 on the DLM assessment.

This table shows both the percentage of students that met or exceeded expectations and a proficiency rate used for federal accountability. The proficiency rate for federal accountability will be lower if the participation rate is below 95%. This table also shows progress towards meeting the state's long term goal of 80% proficiency by 2032. 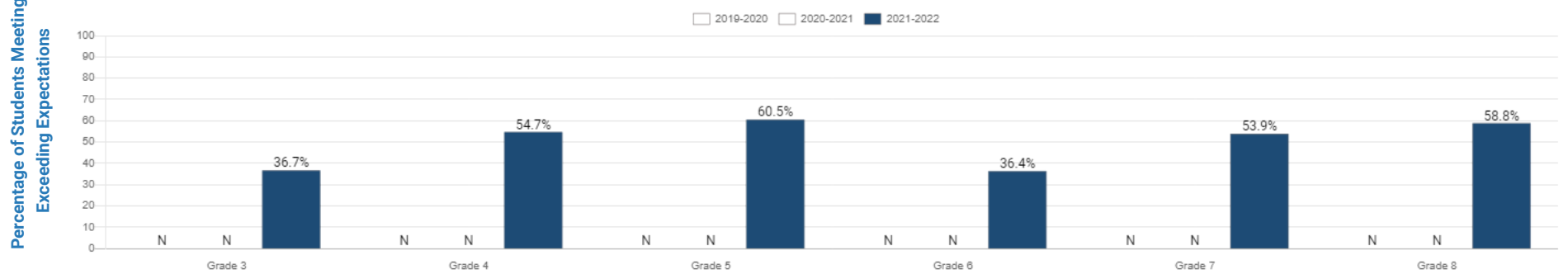

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Mathematics Assessment - Participation and Performance

NJSLA results include students taking end-of-grade assessments in grades 3 through 8, as well as end-of-course assessments (Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II) in middle school and high school. High school mathematics assessment results include all results for Algebra I and Geometry and/or Algebra II results only for students who took Algebra I in middle school and who are enrolled in their first high school mathematics course that corresponds to an end-of-course assessment. 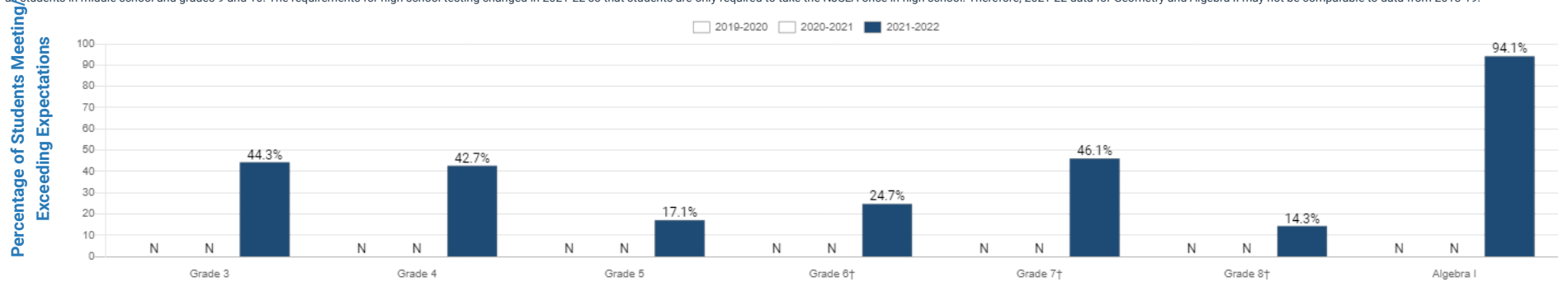

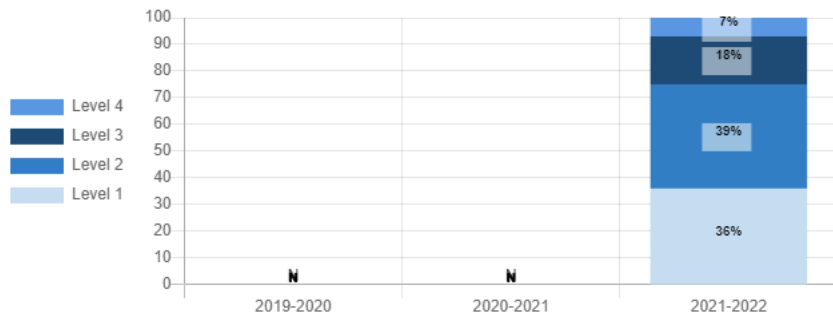

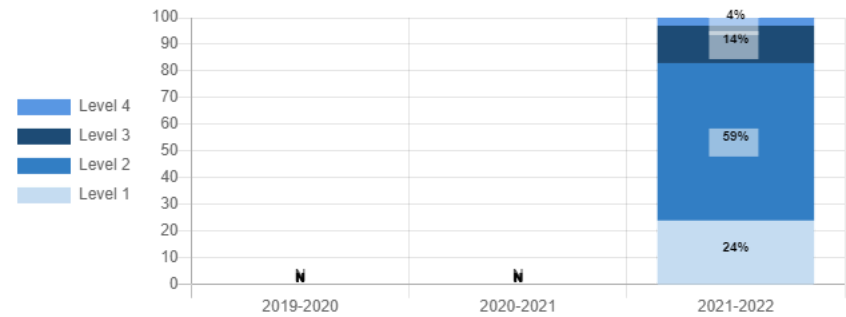

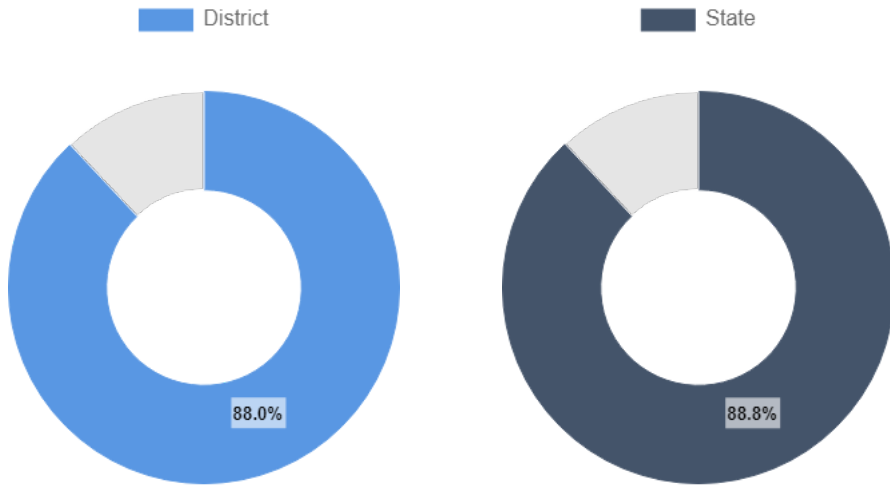

Grades 6-8: Students enrolled in one or more visual and performing arts classes



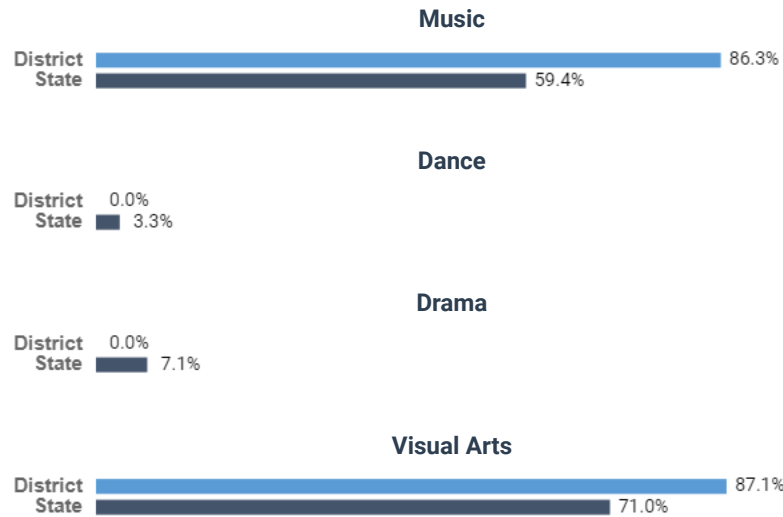

Climate and Environment

Student absences provide important information about a school's culture and climate. Research shows that absences impact a student's ability to succeed in school. The New Jersey Department of Education used input from New Jersey communities to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.

Important Note for 2021-22: The NJDOE recommends caution in comparing the 2021-22 chronic absenteeism rates with the rates from 2020-21 and rates prior to 2019-20 as the pandemic has impacted attendance rates over the last three years.

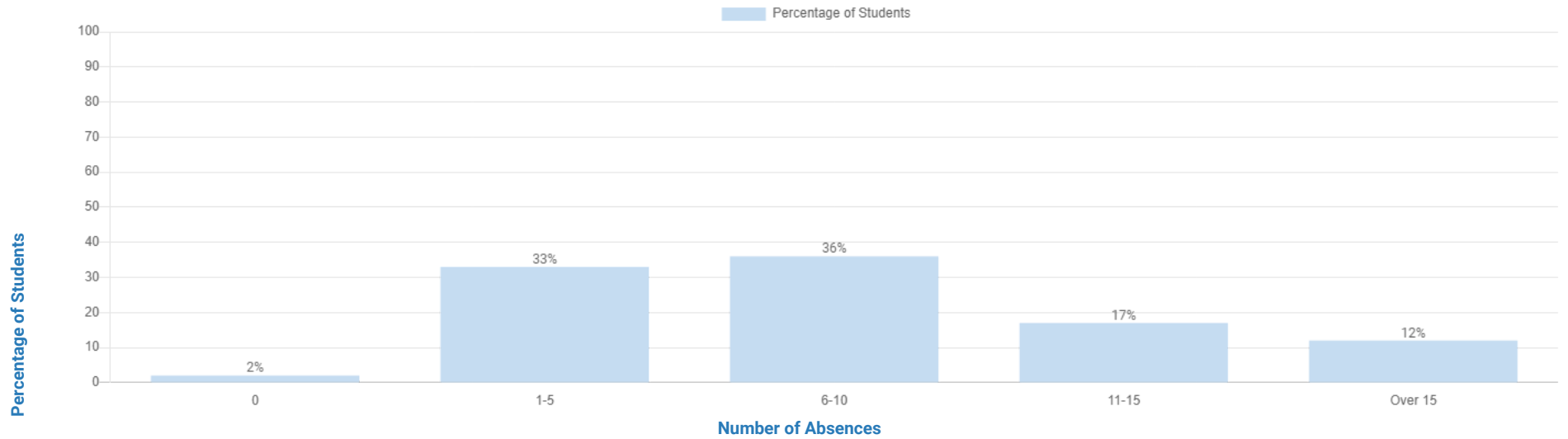

This graph shows the percentage of K-12 students by the number of days they were absent during the school year.



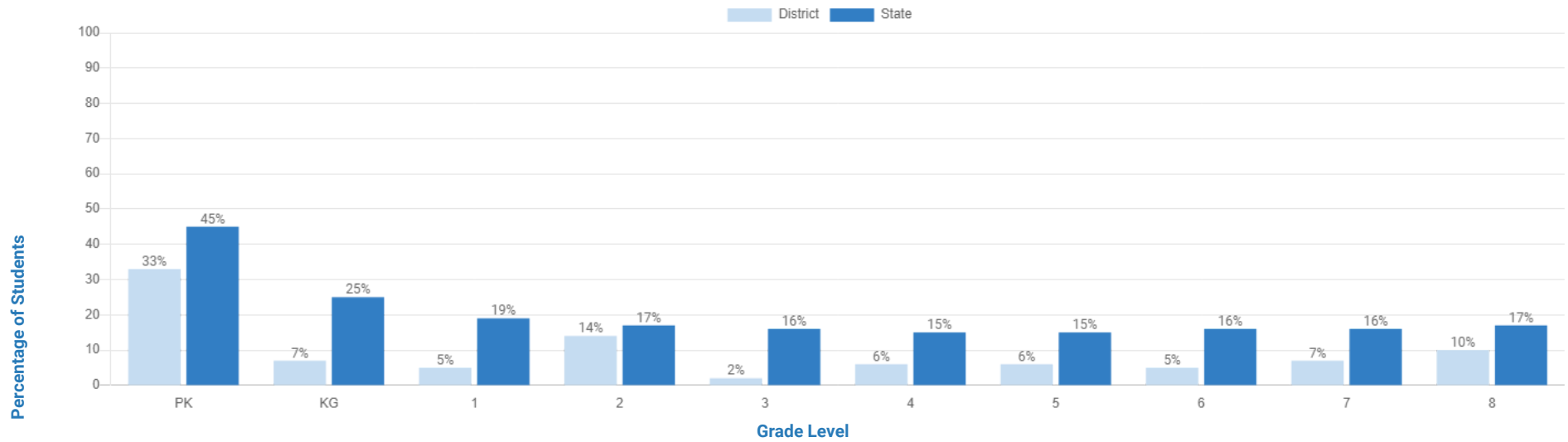

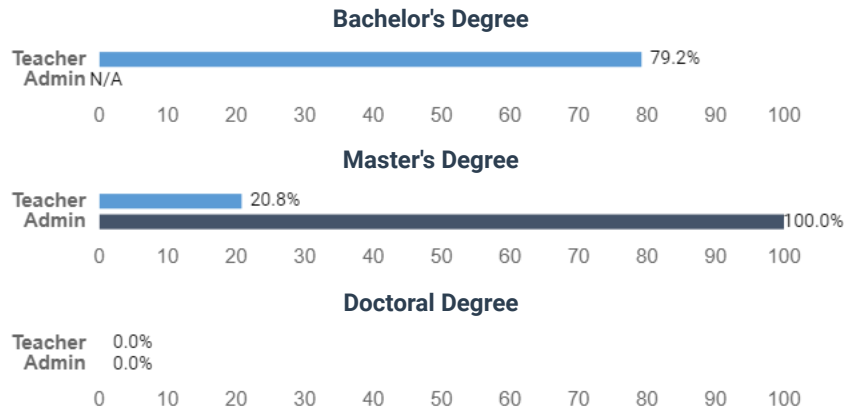

New Jersey's Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Accountability System New Jersey's school accountability system identifies schools that are in need of comprehensive and targeted support as required by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Based on New Jersey's [approved ESSA state plan](#), NJDOE will identify schools in the following four federal categories every three years:

- **Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Overall Low Performing:**
 - Schools with a summative score in the bottom 5% of Title I schools.
- **Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Low Graduation Rate:**
 - High schools with a four-year graduation rate of 67% or less
- **Additional Targeted Support and Improvement: Low Performing Student Group (ATSI):**
 - Schools with one or more student group with a summative score that would be in the bottom 5% of Title I schools
- **Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Chronically Low Performing:**
 - Title I schools identified as Additional Targeted Support and Improvement; Low Performing Student Group (ATSI) that are identified for three or more consecutive years, i.e. ATSI schools that do not meet exit criteria.
 - The NJDOE has not yet identified schools in this category as no ATSI schools have been in status for three or more years.

Annually, NJDOE will identify schools in the following federal category:

- **Targeted Support and Improvement: Consistently Underperforming Student Group (TSI):**
 - Schools with one or more student groups that missed annual targets or standards for all indicators for two years in a row

For purposes of ESSA accountability, only schools and student groups with data for 20 or more students are included in calculations.

Important Note for 2021-2022: Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, New Jersey received waivers from the United States Department of Education (USED) in both [March 2020](#) and [March 2021](#) that waived accountability-related requirements in the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) for the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 school years. These waivers removed the requirements to:

- Calculate indicator scores and summative scores for the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 school years;
- Measure progress toward long-term goals and measures of interim progress for accountability indicators for the 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 school years; and
- Identify schools for comprehensive and targeted support and improvement during the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 school years (based on 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 data, respectively).

As a result of these waivers, any school that was identified for comprehensive or targeted support and improvement during the 2019-20 school year will retain the same status for the 2021-22 and 2022-23 school years.

The NJDOE identified schools across four categories during the 2022-23 school year (based on 2021-22 data):

- CSI: Overall Low Performing;
- CSI: Low Graduation Rate;
- ATSI; and
- TSI.

For the TSI identification that occurred during the 2022-23 school year, status in meeting annual targets for the 2018-19 and 2021-22 school years were used since data was not available for two consecutive years.

Additionally, all schools that were previously identified were eligible to exit status at the end of the 2022-23 school year if the NJDOE's Exit Criteria were met.

The NJDOE received approval to make a one-time change to the identification timeline under the COVID-19 State Plan Addendum. Under the approved Addendum, the NJDOE will identify schools for CSI and ATSI status in both fall 2022 and fall 2023. Schools identified for CSI or ATSI status in fall 2022 will be eligible to exit status in fall 2023 if all exit criteria are met. Schools identified for TSI status will be eligible to exit annually if exit criteria are met.

- The district is continuing to focus on several major initiatives that are the basis for school district goals. These goals may be viewed on the homepage of the school district website.



Mission, Vision, Theme:

The Southampton Township School District shall empower our students with the life skills necessary to attain academic excellence while fostering social and emotional growth. By aligning our academic programs with the New Jersey Student Learning Standards, advocating a safe secure environment, our students will become life-long learners and responsible, caring, contributing community members both locally and globally.



Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

The Board of Education and administration feel that strong curricula, coupled with a comprehensive ongoing professional development program for teachers has a significant impact on enhancing classroom instruction and performance of our students on the state assessments. Our ELA and Math curricula include programs aligned to NJSLs and enhance classroom instruction and student achievement. Focused professional development provides teachers with the necessary tools to differentiate effectively to meet the needs of all students. Additional resources in science supplement our program provide students with a hands-on approach to science. Designing Thinking has expanded beyond Technology at the middle school level, and different after school programs focused on I-STEAM is available for all grade levels. We have a robust Intervention program to help students in need and a S.T.E.P. and advanced math program to challenge our advanced students.

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Sports and Athletics:

Southampton School #3 offers a variety of athletic programs for our middle school students. Students in grade 5 are eligible to participate in the Cross Country program. Please reference the School #3 School Performance Report for a listing of available athletic programs.



Clubs and Activities:

Before and After School Programs:

Before and After School childcare services are offered by the district via an agreement with Kindercare. The program is housed in Southampton Township School #1. This program meets the needs of our busy families by providing a fun, safe space for supplemental learning activities, homework help, healthy snacks, structured activities, and free play. Information about the program can be obtained via the Before and After School Program link on each school website. We also offer an Action Program for students in grade K-2 in need of academic assistance. The program runs from January - June each year. More Information about each program can be obtained on the Southampton School District website.

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Staff and Professional Learning:

There are six professional development days annually that focus on a variety of topics including social-emotional learning, technology, pedagogy, and curriculum. Training in these areas is sustained throughout the year. In addition, all teachers participate in Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) throughout the year, grade-level / department meetings, school faculty meetings and articulation to review assessment data and plan for instruction. Professional development activities also include completion of State Mandated training on an annual basis through a combination of on-line training and workshops. Teachers and administrators participate in regularly scheduled Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) throughout the year. The PLCs focus on district goals, as well as the individual Professional Development Plans (PDPs) of the educators.



Student Supports and Services:

The school district currently has two full-time and one-part-time counselor to provide counseling services to our students. Each school has an Intervention and Referral Services Committee (I&RS) to provide assistance and support to students who are struggling academically or socially / emotionally. The I&RS committee is chaired by the respective building principal and coordinated by the school counselor. The district also has a Response to Intervention program that addresses the needs of students who require additional assistance pertaining to reading and mathematics, as well as providing enrichment activities for learners performing on or above their grade level. The middle school designates a period a day as the W.I.N. period so students can focus on the support and services they need.



Student Health and Wellness:

The district provides breakfast for students in order to give them a healthy start to the day. Our health curriculum teaches students healthy habits and promotes wellness. Our guidance counselors' monthly class visits promote mental and physical wellness through informative mini-lessons and activities. Wellness Wednesdays (K-2) and Feel Good Fridays (3-8) also promote healthy habits and allow students to practice new activities like yoga, mindfulness, and self-reflection. All students have physical education and take part in a variety of physical activities that include competitive games and dancing. Students in grades K-8 have recess daily and have an extra period of physical activity called Class PE, and students in School # 2 enjoy collecting charms for walking/running miles during recess as part of our Warriors Runner program.

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Parent and Community Involvement:

Each school generally provides opportunities for parent and community member volunteers. Parents and community members are also invited in to share information, be guest readers, or participate in a classroom activity. The district uses focus groups, committees, and town hall meetings to garner feedback and input pertaining to key school district initiatives. These groups consist of parents, community members, staff members, administration and Board of Education members. Our school district has a very active and supportive PTA. This dedicated group of parents and teachers enhances the educational program by sponsoring assembly programs, class parties, school dances, and school initiatives to promote community engagement. Parents have full access to their child's academic progress via the Parent Portal. This can be accessed on our website and our newly developed mobile app.

Facilities:

The Board of Education has made it a priority to maintain the school district's facilities. All three schools have undergone infrastructure upgrades on an ongoing basis. These upgrades have included the installation of a security office, upgrades to the HVAC system, additional security cameras around campus, an irrigation system, an upgrade door security system, and technology upgrades across the district. There was also a storage garage built on campus and bollards installed around the buildings.

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School Safety:

The safety and security of our students and staff is an extremely high priority. School safety and security protocols are constantly reviewed with the staff, and drills are routinely conducted to enhance our preparedness for emergencies. An emphasis is placed on adhering to the best practices recommended by the New Jersey Office of Emergency Preparedness. Enhancement of physical security is ongoing and includes visitor vestibules, upgraded ID / Access systems, 911 buttons, classroom lockdown shades, lockdown notification lights, classroom door lockdown buttons, classroom / exterior door numbering, intruder doors, and a CCTV surveillance system. The district also employs a full-time armed security officer. The newly built security office provides a prime view of the district campus from the windows of the office and via CCTV. The district is equipped with 24/7 interior/exterior surveillance systems accessible by NJ State Police in the district's live streaming system.



Technology and STEM:

Preparing our students for succeeding in an increasingly global society is another priority of the school district. This is evidenced by projects such as interactive Smart Boards in every classroom to supplement instruction, Chromebooks for every student in School #2 and School # 3, and the availability of mobile computer labs that can be used in classrooms in School # 1. In addition, the district has two I-STEAM Labs and a Makerspace Classroom. The revised Design Thinking curriculum focuses on having students collaborate by working in design / research teams on projects based on SDGs. I-STEAM activities also include "Southampton Spark" a version of "Genius Hour" that enables students in grades 3-5 to select and research a topic of their interest and complete a project. There are also a number of extra-curricular I-STEAM clubs for students offered in each school.



Early Childhood Education:

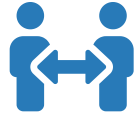
Our district offers a half-day preschool disabled program for eligible students. The program focuses on preparation for kindergarten and early literacy / numeracy skills. "Creative Curriculum" is our newly adopted preschool curriculum, which focuses on center / play-based activities and integrates various "studies" introduce engaging themes and hands-on, cross-curricular learning.

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Addressing the Impact of COVID-19:

To address learning loss, our intentional focus has been on closing academic gaps and moving students closer to grade level expectations. Professional development for staff focuses on differentiated instruction, co-teaching, accommodation/modifications, unpacking changes to NJSLs, and understanding new district programming. PLCs support district goals while also providing opportunities for vertical articulation to address learning loss. Additional programming for this same purpose includes the addition of the Summer Learning Academy (serving students in grades 2-8), after school tutoring (serving students in grades 3-5), and a WIN period to provide individualized student support. Our other priority is mental health. We have integrated a new social and emotional health program across grade levels, adopted Wellness Wednesdays and Feel Good Fridays, and expanded recess to middle school. SEH is addressed by our after school socialization program and our partnership with Care Solace.
