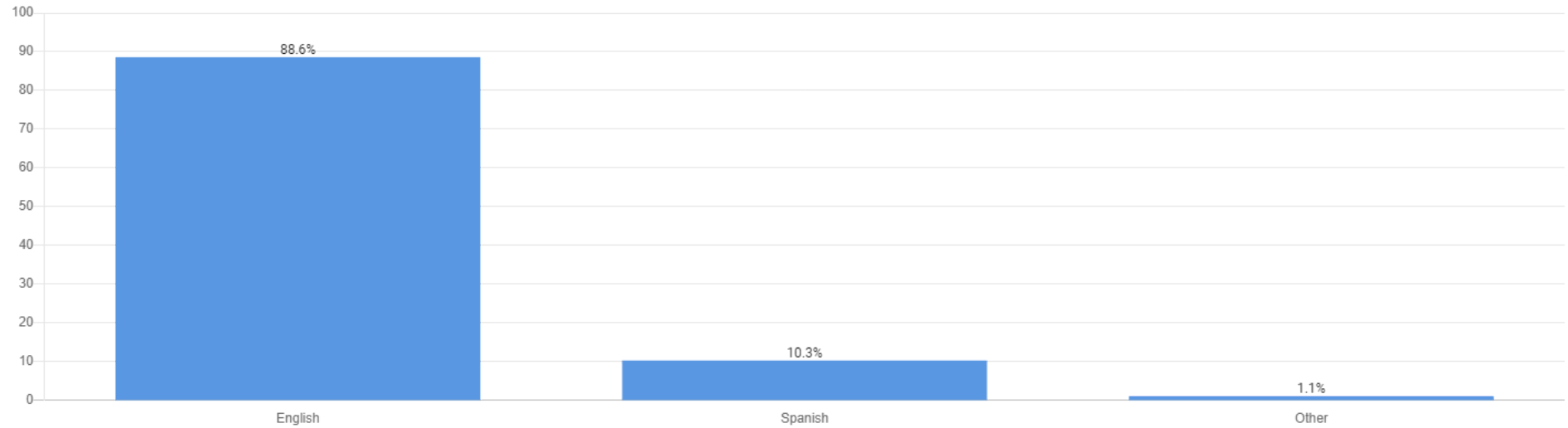

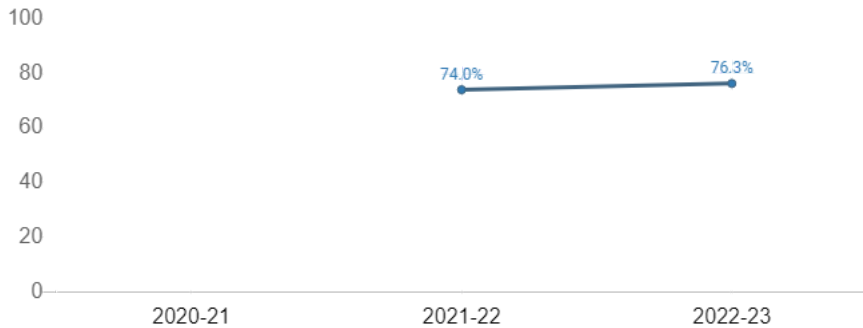

English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

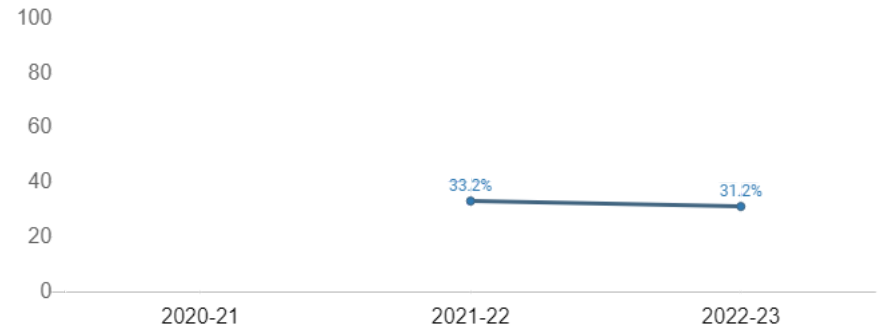

The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. 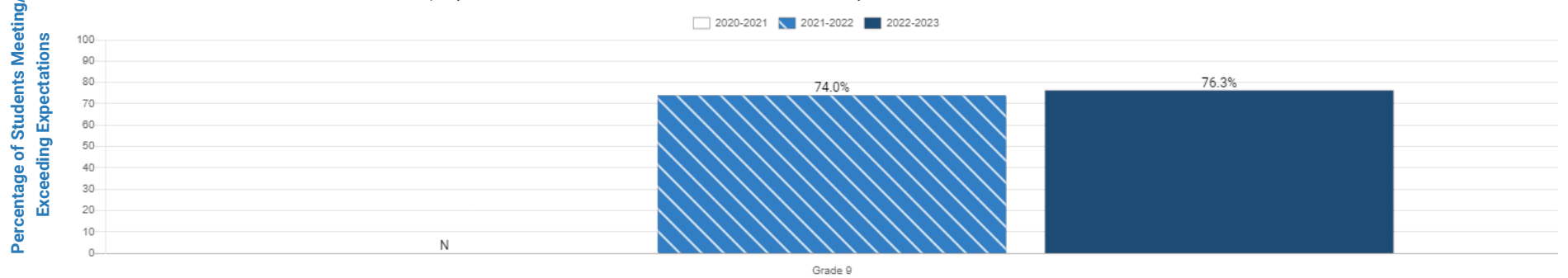

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Mathematics Assessment - Participation and Performance

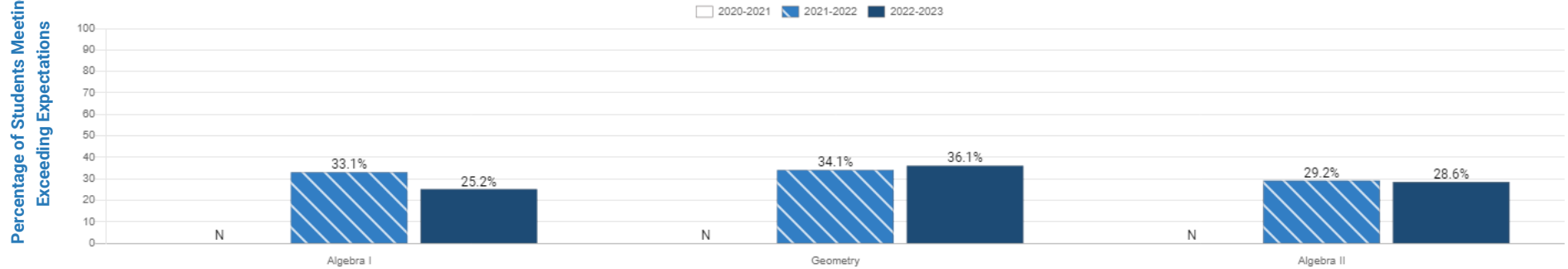

Important note for 2022-23: Due to the cancellation of statewide assessments in prior years, statewide assessment results are not available for the 2020-21 school year. Additionally, end-of-course assessment results for Geometry and Algebra II for 2018-19 and prior years included all students in middle school and grades 9 and 10. The requirements for high school testing changed in 2021-22 so that students are only required to take the NJSLA once in high school. Therefore, 2021-22 and 2022-23 data for Geometry and Algebra II may not be comparable to data from 2018-19.

Mathematics Assessment - Performance By Test: Algebra I

This table shows performance on the NJSLA Algebra I end-of-course assessment. The performance results in this table include all students who took the NJSLA, it does not exclude students who were enrolled less than half a year.

This includes any students who were enrolled in an Algebra I course and took the Algebra I assessment in grades 7 through 12. Students in sixth grade who were enrolled in Algebra I course during the 2022-23 school year were required to take both the Algebra I and Grade 6 mathematics assessment. The results of their Algebra I assessment are not included in these results but will be reported when the student is in grade 9.

Important Note for 2022-23: The NJDOE recommends caution in comparing the 2022-23 Algebra I performance to data prior to 2019-20, as the population of students taking this assessment has changed as a result of new high school testing requirements. NJSLA data is not available for the 2020-21 school year.

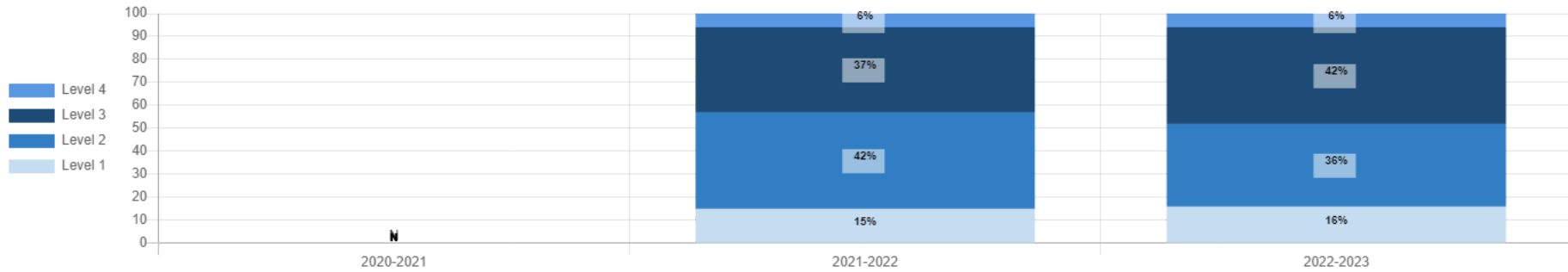

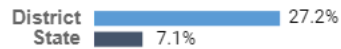

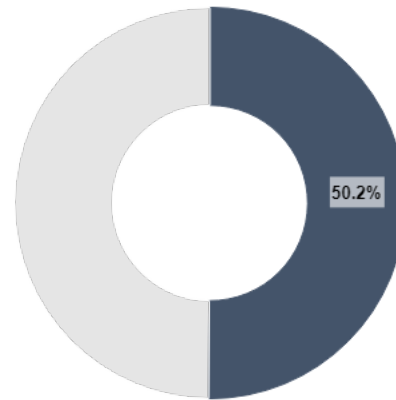
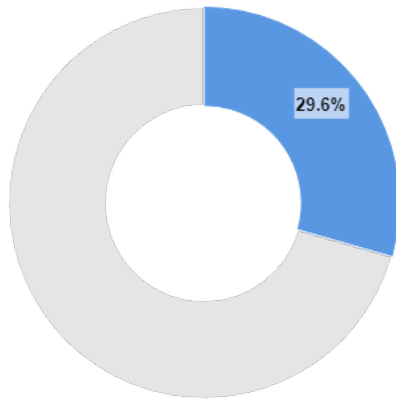

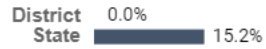

The United States Department of Education (USED) determined that the NJDOE must only include students who receive a diploma that is fully aligned with the state's standards, meaning they have met the state's graduation assessment requirements, course requirements, and local attendance requirements. This means that students who did not meet some or all graduation requirements because of modifications or exemptions in their Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) may not be counted as graduates in the calculations of the adjusted cohort graduation rate used for federal reporting and accountability purposes. It is important to note that this is only a change to how graduation rates are calculated for federal reporting. It does not affect requirements to earn a diploma or the type of diploma that the state awards to students with disabilities.

As a result of these changes, the NJDOE began calculating two versions of the adjusted cohort graduation rate starting with 2021 graduation rates. The "federal version" aligns with ESSA requirements and USED guidance and will be used for federal reporting and ESSA school accountability only. The "state version" continues to use the same methodology used prior to 2021 and reflects all students who received a state-endorsed diploma.

To be included as a graduate in the federal version of the graduation rate, students must have met state course requirements and local attendance requirements for graduation. Additionally, students must meet the graduation assessment requirements in place based on the year they are graduating, regardless of their graduation cohort. The graduation assessment requirements for the classes of 2021 through 2023 have differed as a result of executive orders in response to the pandemic and new legislation. As a result, the calculation of the federal version of the graduation rate has also changed.

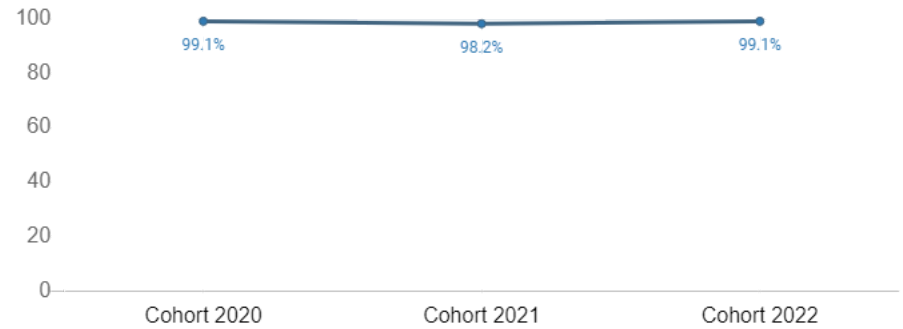

Graduation/ Postsecondary

Information about students enrolling in colleges and universities after graduation is collected from the [National Student Clearinghouse](#) (NSC), which collects data from at least 97% of higher education institutions nationwide. New Jersey graduates are matched to postsecondary enrollment data by NSC each year. While most students who enroll in a postsecondary institution each year are able to be matched by NSC, there are some students each year who cannot be matched. Some reasons that students may not be matched are: 1. Postsecondary enrollment cannot be shared with the NJDOE if students request a FERPA block on their postsecondary enrollment records; 2. Students who attend a college or university outside of the United States are not included in NSC data; 3. Certain colleges or universities may not participate in sharing data with NSC or may fail to report data for a certain semester or a certain group of students; and 4. NSC may not be able to match a student's name or date of birth in NJ SMART to the information provided by the postsecondary institution(s) with a high level of confidence.

In 2023, NSC implemented an additional manual review process to reduce the number of students who do not match due to #4 above, which may result in NSC matching additional students to postsecondary records moving forward. As a result, the NJDOE is not including trend data from previous years in the 2022-2023 reports and, instead, is only showing enrollment as of fall 2023. Updated postsecondary trend data will be posted on the [NJDOE Graduation & Postsecondary](#) webpage.

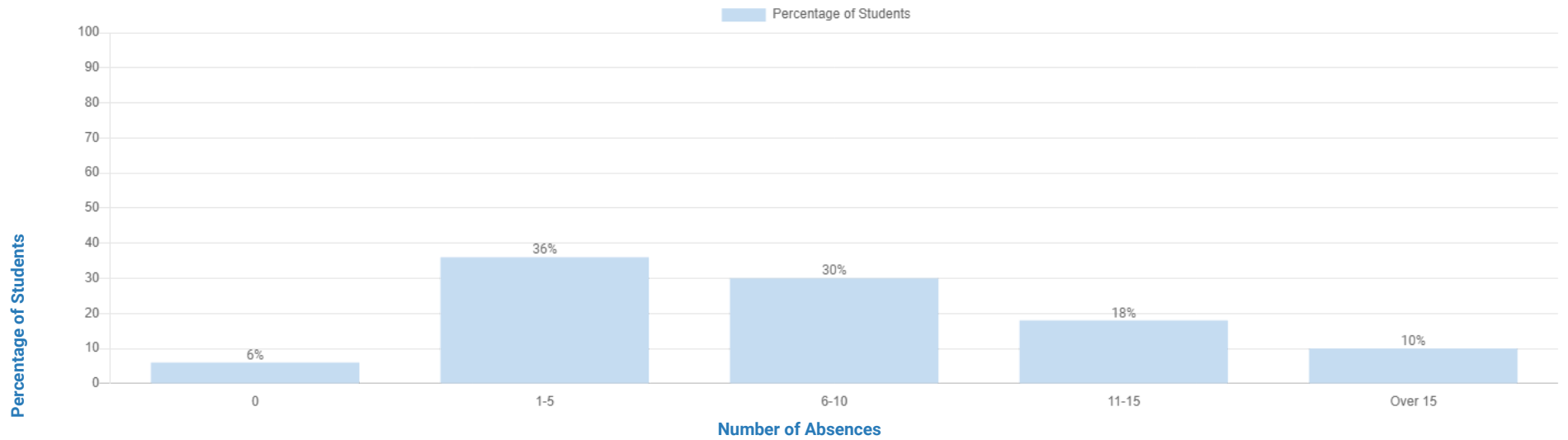

This graph shows the percentage of K-12 students by the number of days they were absent during the school year.



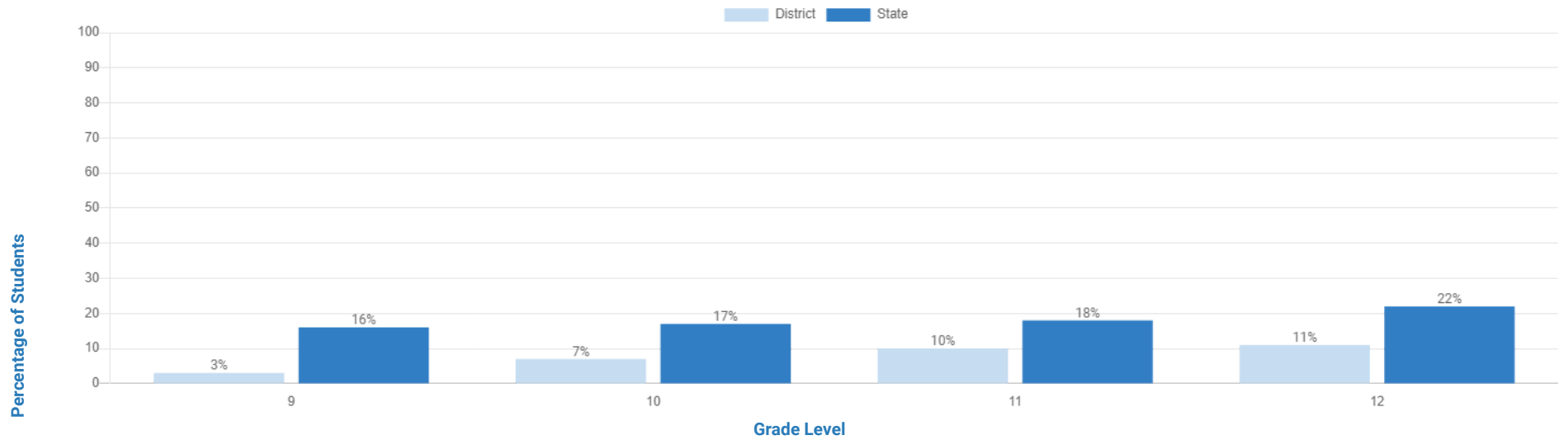

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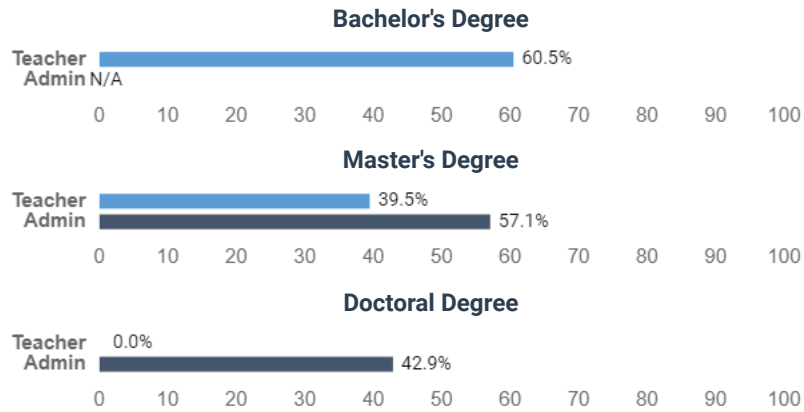

Accountability

New Jersey's Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Accountability System New Jersey's school accountability system identifies schools that are in need of comprehensive and targeted support as required by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Based on New Jersey's [approved ESSA state plan](#), NJDOE will identify schools in the following four federal categories every three years:

- **Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Overall Low Performing:**
 - Title I schools with a summative score in the bottom 5% of Title I schools.
- **Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Low Graduation Rate:**
 - All high schools with a four-year graduation rate of 67% or less
- **Additional Targeted Support and Improvement: Low Performing Student Group (ATSI):**
 - All schools with one or more student group with a summative score that would be in the bottom 5% of Title I schools
- **Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Chronically Low Performing:**
 - Title I schools identified as Additional Targeted Support and Improvement; Low Performing Student Group (ATSI) that are identified for three or more consecutive years, i.e., ATSI schools that do not meet exit criteria.
 - The fall 2023 identification is the first year that the NJDOE identified schools in this category.

Annually, NJDOE will identify schools in the following federal category:

Mission, Vision, Theme:

Our Mission is to provide each student a pathway into the global workforce with advanced educational options. Our Vision is to be the global leader in educating exceptional career and college-ready students.



Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

CCTEC is a career and technical education high school. Courses are designed to ensure that students are provided with a pathway into the global workforce with advanced educational options. There are 11 different programs: Automotive Technology; Construction Trades, Cosmetology; Culinary Arts & Hospitality; Engineering Technology; Health Science & Medicine; Information Technology; Innovation, Design, and Entrepreneurship; Law Enforcement; Studio Production & Broadcasting; & Welding Technology. CCTEC continues to refine student courses and goals to ensure that they meet the demands of an ever-changing society. The curricula has been designed by a committee of various school stakeholders. CCTEC offers a wide range of programs to serve all students, including highly-rigorous AP courses, dual enrollment opportunities to obtain college credits with Rowan College of South Jersey, school-to-work options, and many co-curricular programs.



Clubs and Activities:

CCTEC offers students clubs and activities: Art Club; Asian Cultural Club; Black Student Union; Book Club, Channel ONE ; Class Officers; Club Active; Drama Club; Gaming Club; Gay-Straight-Alliance; IGNITE; Interact Club; LACI Club; Lego Mindstorm Club, Mock Trial; Model Congress; NHS; NTHS; Robotics Club; School Newspaper; Science Club; Special Olympics; Student Council; TEC Ambassadors; Writers Circle; Sign Language Club; Youth-2-Youth; and Yearbook.

Staff and Professional Learning:

New Teacher Orientation to learn best instructional practices through the Danielson growth framework, classroom management strategies, cooperative learning, data driven instruction, questioning and discussion techniques, assessment strategies, technology integration, and student-centered learning. Weekly professional development workshops that take place after school hours. CCTEC also provides teachers of the same subject area with time to collaborate in professional learning communities (PLCs) which meet every other day and focus exclusively on student achievement. The school will also host professional development opportunities during in-service days. Staff members are able to choose which workshops to attend and which techniques and/or areas they would like to focus on. Many of the ideas for these days include out-of-the-box activities inclusive of physical movement, friendly competition, themes, and challenging learning tasks.



Postsecondary Information:

All of our programs have articulation agreements with institutions of higher learning. CCTEC students graduate high school with work credentials that allow them to gain employment immediately after high school and/or college credits to give them a jump start on post-secondary education. Students can pursue these advanced educational options through the school's Early College High School (ECHS) program by automatically enrolling at Rowan College of South Jersey beginning with their freshman year of high school. Students can simultaneously earn a high school diploma and up to 60 college credits, as well as the potential to earn an associate degree by the time they graduate from high school. All tuition fees and course materials are paid for by CCTEC. With all of these opportunities, students can jumpstart their college/career planning in addition to eliminating some of the financial burden that comes with post-secondary education.



Student Supports and Services:

At CCTEC, the Student Support & Services department offers a full complement of services for all students in order to promote college and/or career readiness beyond the classroom. During the school day, students are offered a 30-minute remediation/enrichment period along with homework club being offered after school. All students have access to their program counselors, Early College High School (ECHS) counselor, and School-to-Work coordinator. Programs and support for students with IEPs are employed through the school-based Child Study Team and range from in-class resources to self-contained classrooms (STRIVE program). CCTEC also has an Intervention & Referral Services team comprised of an administrator, social worker, counselor, teacher, and nurse. CCTEC is equipped to offer a high level of individualized service for all students.

Narrative

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Student Health and Wellness:

CCTEC offers a comprehensive Health and Physical Education Program. The focus of the program is lifetime fitness and wellness. Students are taught to create achievable fitness goals and to design personalized training programs. Outside of the classroom, students are provided with a 30-minute remediation/enrichment period each day (SMART period), which they can use to report to the gymnasium or fitness center for physical activity. CCTEC offers Club Active, where students can meet after school and participate in team activities and/or fitness center routines. CCTEC also facilitates the bussing of students to their resident districts, if they wish to participate in interscholastic sports. A factor in lifetime fitness and wellness is nutrition. Our food service vendor provides a full breakfast and lunch program for all students. Throughout the cafeteria there is signage indicating the importance of including whole grains, dairy, fruit, and vegetables as part of the students' daily diet.



Parent and Community Involvement:

Parent/Guardian communication is valued at CCTEC. Each week, parents receive an email from the principal indicating upcoming student activities and events (inclusive of both the English and Spanish translations). Several times a year, parents/guardians are also invited to evening informational events such as Back-to-School Night, Junior College Planning Night, Senior College Planning Night, community outreach activities, Early College High School Night, Technology Night, wellness events, and STEAM Night. Within the classroom, families are given the opportunity to play an active role in their child's education. Each class taught at CCTEC utilizes Google Classroom, which includes a parent/guardian portal allowing access to specific classroom assignments and grades. Parents/guardians are able to view and track their child's grades, attendance, and discipline referrals. Additionally, the principal meets with the (PTO) monthly.



Climate Surveys:

Is a Climate Survey Used: Yes; Who is surveyed: Students, Parents, Administrators, Teachers. Each year CCTEC administers an annual School Climate Survey to students, parents/guardians, administrators, and staff members. This Survey is anonymous, and is designed to provide the administration and the Board of Education with data to determine the perception of our school to students, families, and staff members. Questions relate to a variety of areas, including school safety and climate, teaching and learning, technology integration, and facility maintenance. Data from the survey is analyzed and shared with CCTEC's faculty, BOE, and the PTO. The data is triangulated and action steps are developed to address areas of concern.

Narrative

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Facilities:

In 2016, CCTEC opened a brand new, state-of-the-art, 205,000 square foot facility. CCTEC recently opened the doors of a new 50,000 square foot addition. This addition is the home to our Health Science and Medicine Program. Through these facilities, CCTEC is able to not only offer quality CTE curriculum, but state-of-the art spaces and industry-standard equipment which further strengthen the workforce pipeline and lead to increased post-secondary and community partnerships.



School Safety:

The School Safety Unit is comprised of an armed unit of retired law enforcement officers. All school safety officers attend a certification course sponsored and approved by the NJ Police Training Commission. A massive camera surveillance system encompasses the internal and external campus perimeters. Entry into the school is controlled; visitors are screened and must produce an official identification, which is documented and checked through a database, "Raptor," used to identify convicted child predators. CCTEC strives to take a proactive role in student safety. The "Students Anonymously Forwarding Evidence" program allows students to anonymously report possible threats of school violence being planned. The School Safety Unit is also engaged in a drug awareness program, "Not Even Once," approved by the NJ DOE. In September 2018 a K-9 member, "Meadow," was added to the School Safety Unit as an extra deterrent to any individual who may be planning a violent and/or disruptive event.



Technology and STEM:

As a 1:1 school district, each student has a school-owned Chromebook. The 1:1 policies and hardware selection are driven by the student technology team and staff technology committee. Technology is incorporated daily into the curriculum and various interactive student-friendly platforms are utilized in order to enhance engagement and learning. Teachers are required to stay current on our online digital grading tool open to parents/guardians and students. We have numerous programs that fall under Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math, including but not limited to: Automotive Technology; Construction Trades; Engineering Technology; Health Science & Medicine; Information Technology; Innovation, Design, and Entrepreneurship; Studio Production & Broadcasting; and Welding Technology. Cross-curricular STEM initiatives are embedded in various courses throughout the school including art, English, and history classes.
