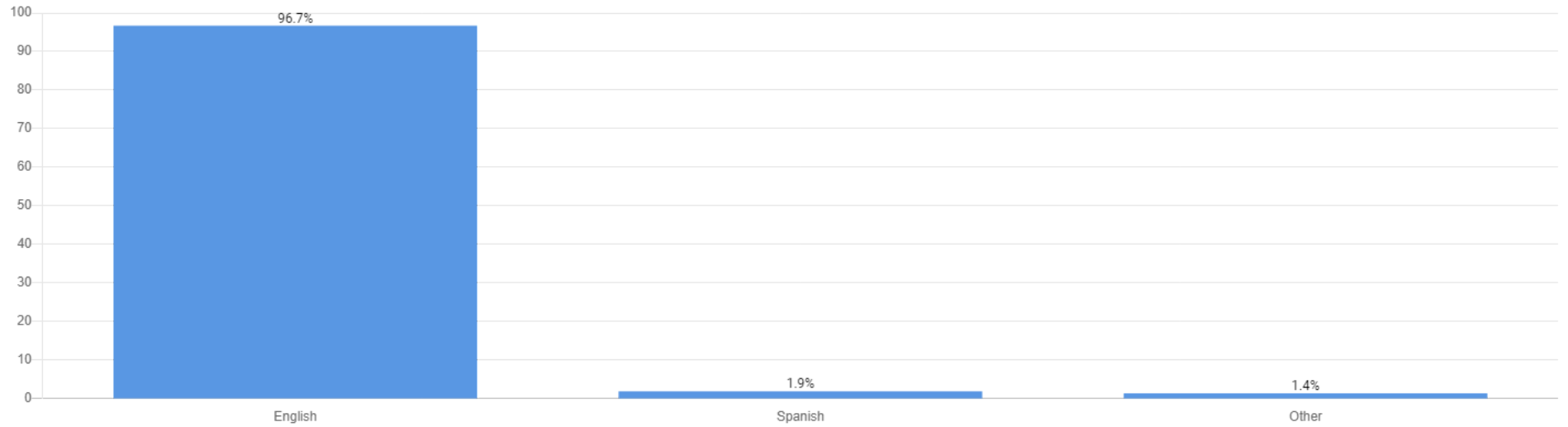

Student Growth

Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. New Jersey's ESSA state plan outlines that academic progress will be measured with school's median student growth percentile (mSGP) on statewide ELA and mathematics assessments. Each individual student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7. The SGP measures their academic progress from one year to the next compared to other students with similar prior test scores (academic peers).

A student's SGP falls between 1 and 99 and can be grouped into three levels. An mSGP below 35 indicates low growth, an mSGP between 35 and 65 indicates typical growth, and an mSGP greater than 65 indicates high growth. If the SGPs for all students are ordered from smallest to largest, the mSGP is the percentile in the middle of the list.

Important Note for 2022-23: Student growth data is not available for the 2019-2020, 2020-2021, and 2021-2022 school years due to federal waivers and assessment cancellations. An alternate measure of academic progress, or growth, called Relative School Improvement Measure (RSIM) was used for the 2021-2022 school year only.

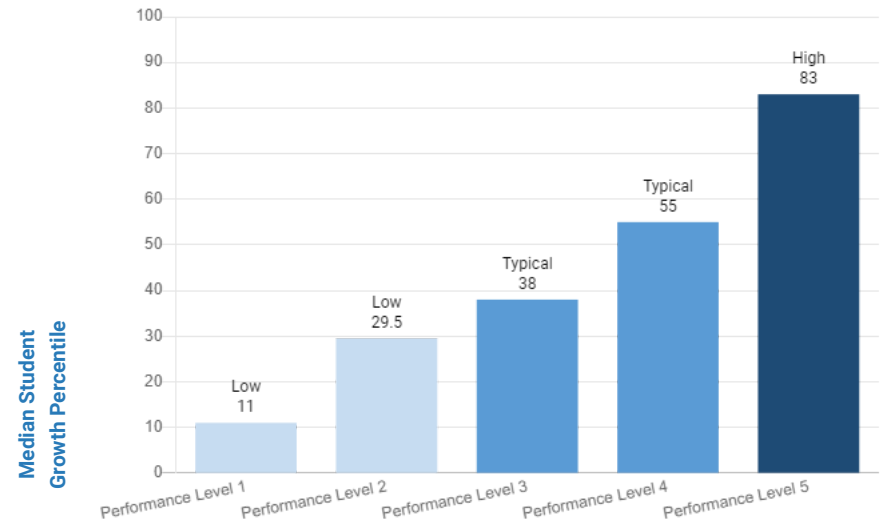
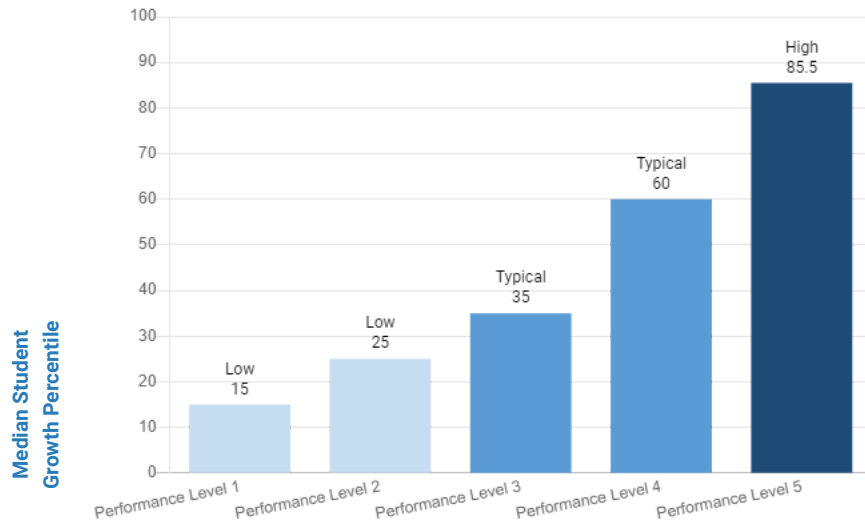

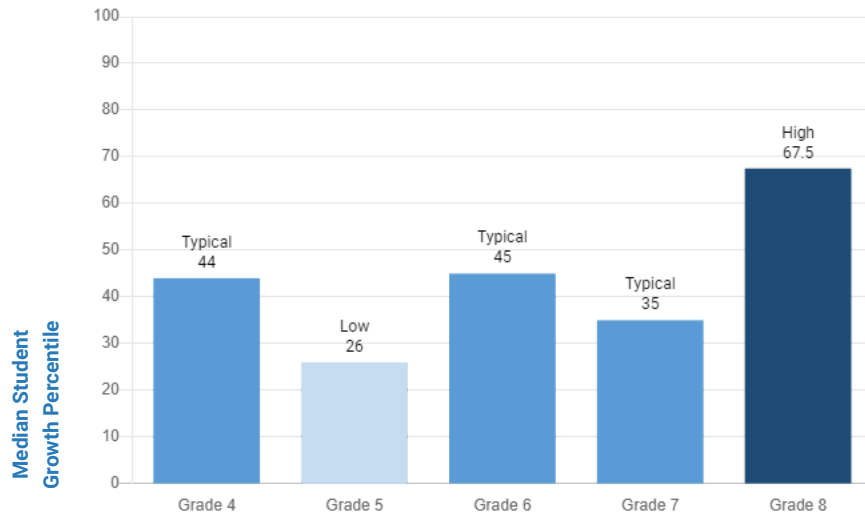

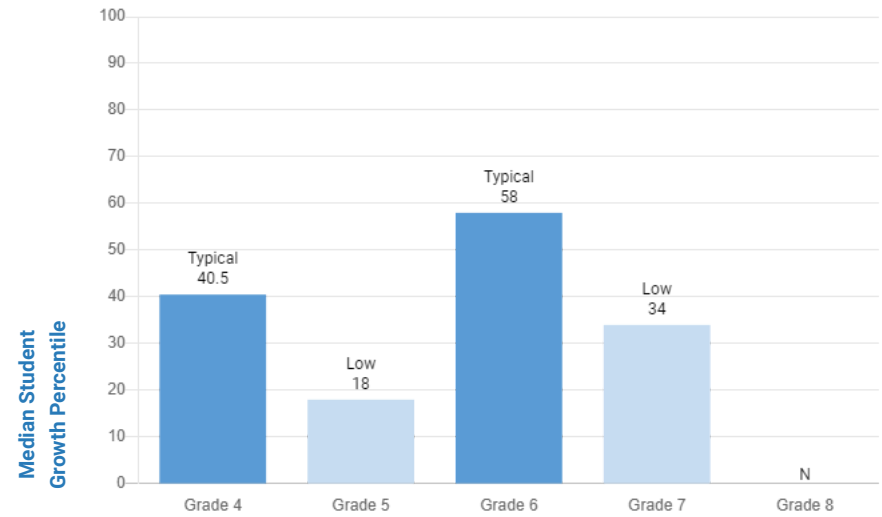
Student Growth by Grade

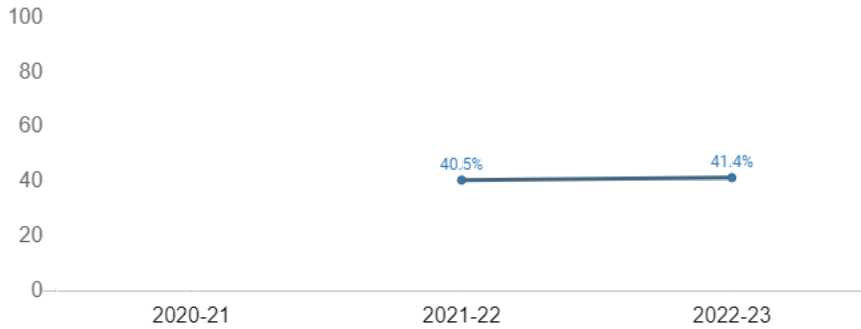

English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

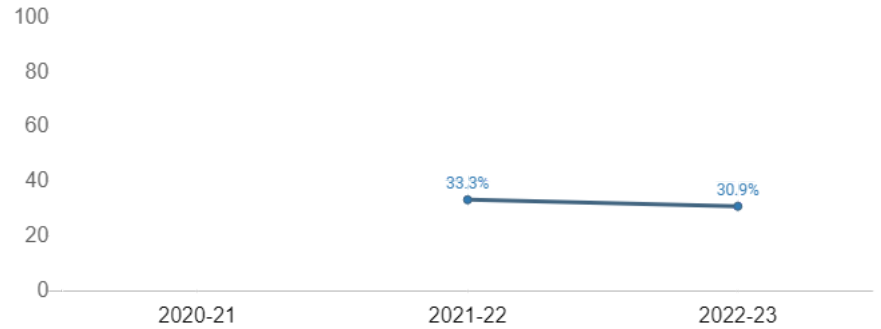
These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. The table below provides participation rates, proficiency rates, annual targets and status in meeting the targets, and statewide proficiency rates.

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English Language Arts Assessment - Participation and Performance

This table shows performance on statewide assessments for English language arts (ELA) both overall and by student group. It includes the results of students taking both the NJSLA and DLM. NJSLA results include only students in grades 3 through 9. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. Student are considered to have met or exceeded expectations if they score at Level 4 or 5 on the NJSLA or at Level 3 or 4 on the DLM.

This table shows both the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations and a proficiency rate used for federal accountability. The proficiency rate for federal accountability will be lower if the participation rate is below 95%. This table also shows progress towards meeting the state's long-term goal of 80% proficiency by 2032. Annual targets are specific to each subgroup, school, and district and represent the expected proficiency needed to stay on track to meet the state's long-term goal. 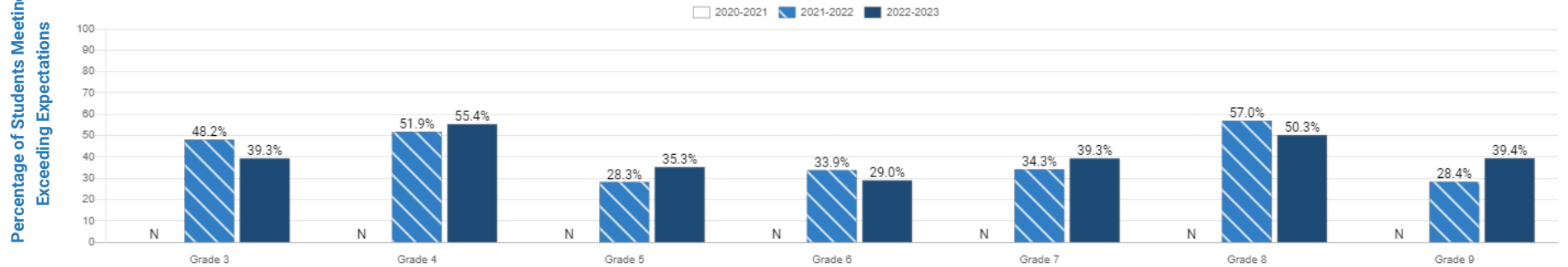

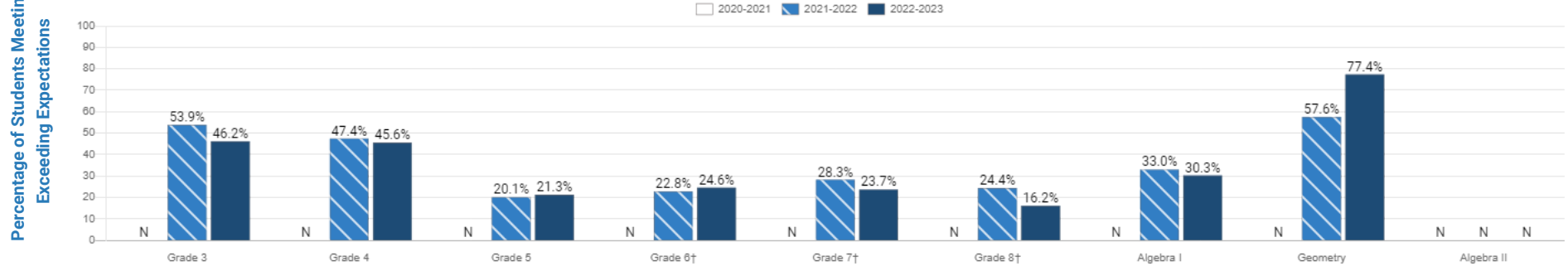

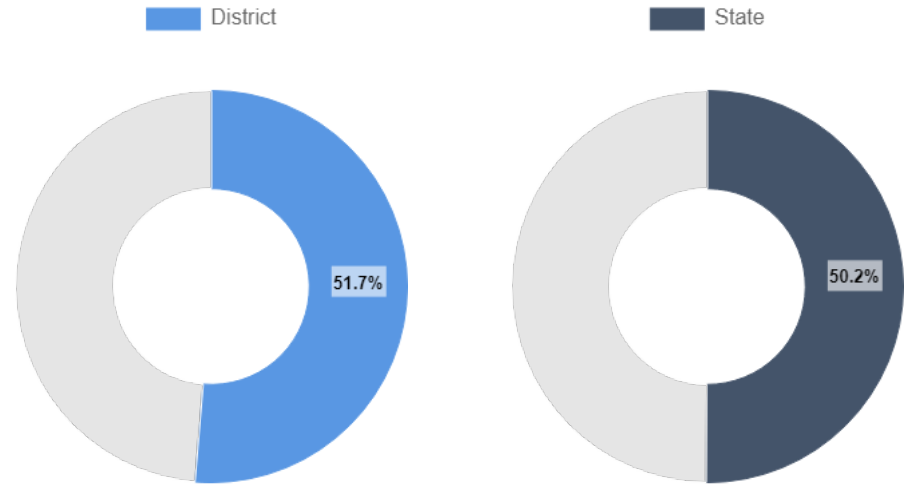

Grades 9-12: Students enrolled in one or more visual and performing arts classes



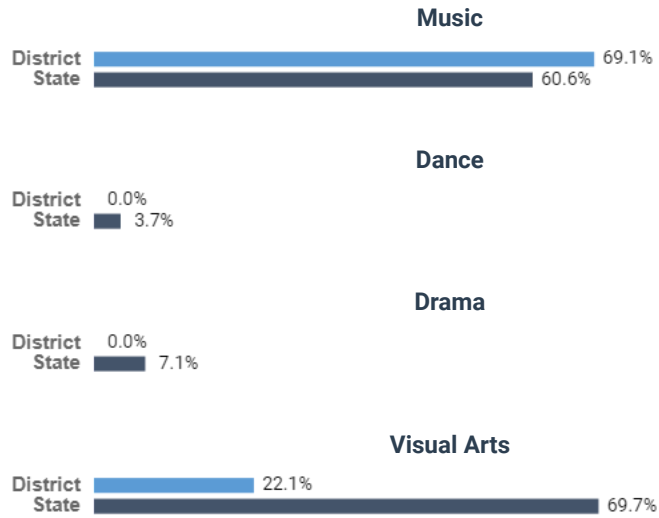

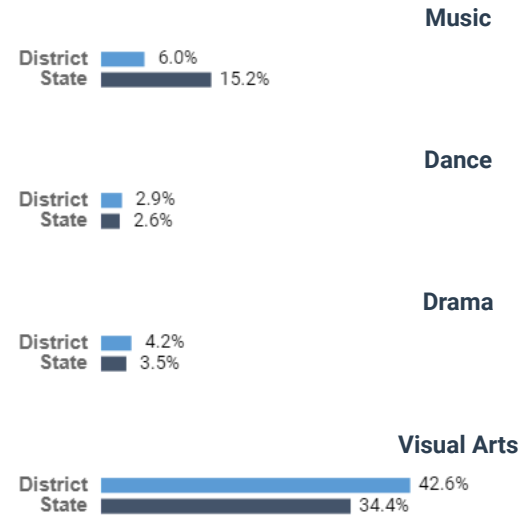

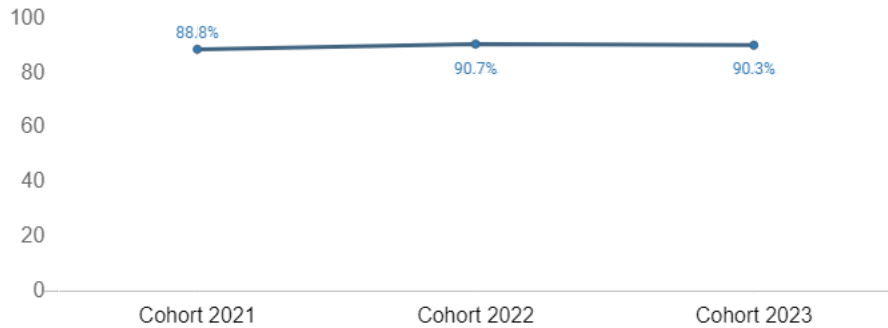

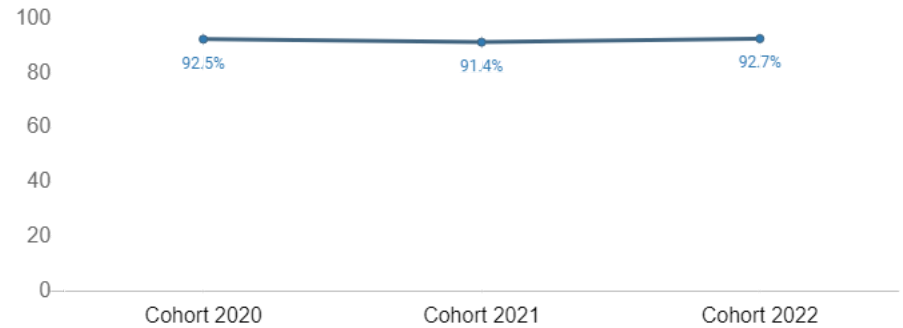

Climate and Environment

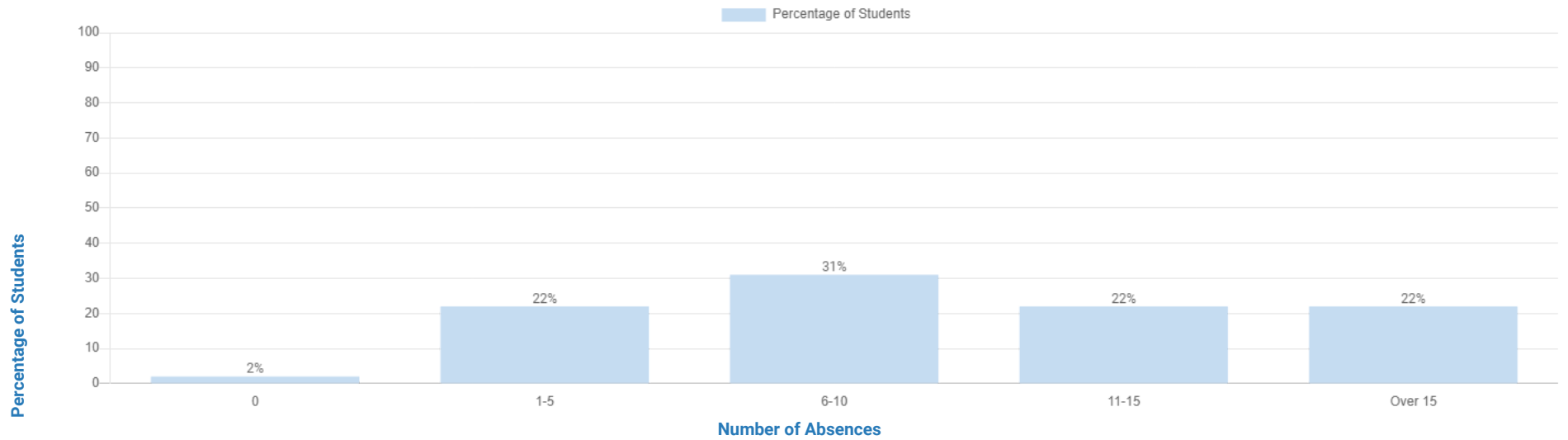

This graph shows the percentage of K-12 students by the number of days they were absent during the school year.



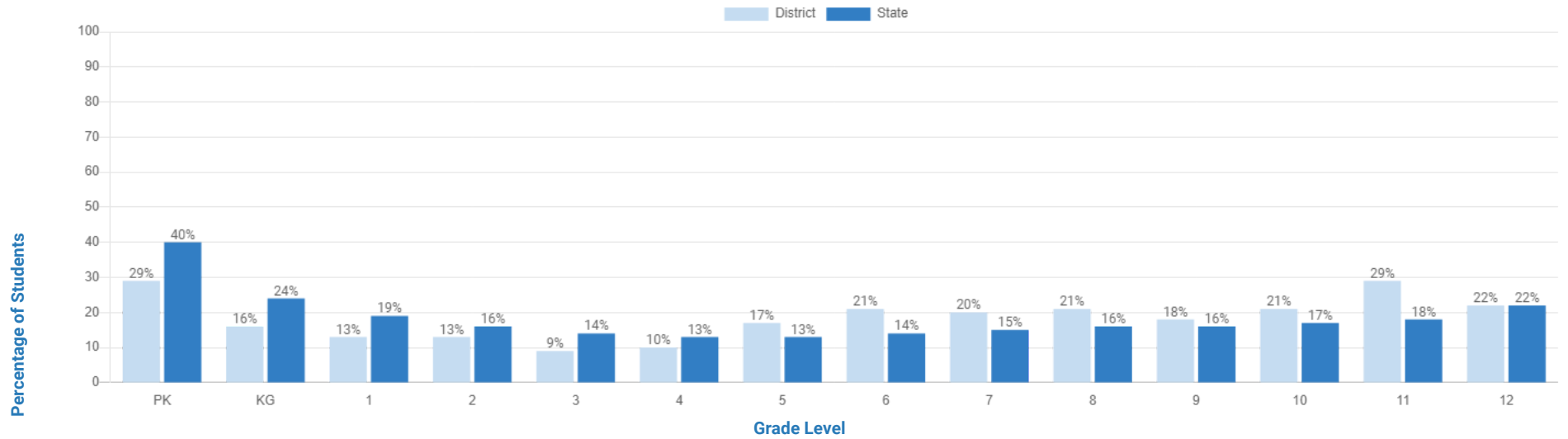

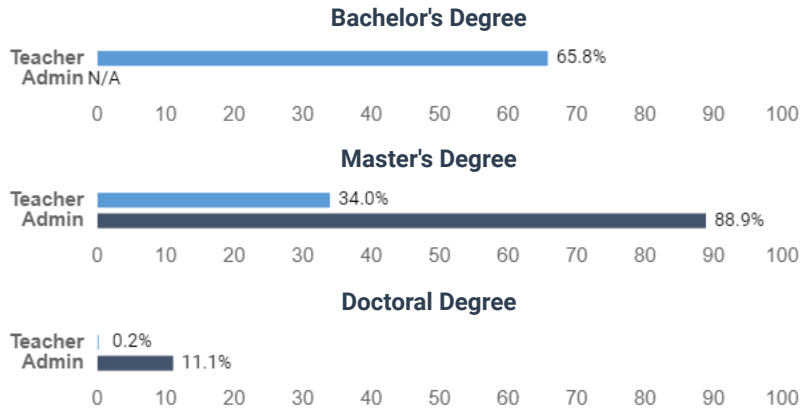

Accountability

New Jersey's Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Accountability System New Jersey's school accountability system identifies schools that are in need of comprehensive and targeted support as required by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Based on New Jersey's [approved ESSA state plan](#), NJDOE will identify schools in the following four federal categories every three years:

- **Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Overall Low Performing:**
 - Title I schools with a summative score in the bottom 5% of Title I schools.
- **Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Low Graduation Rate:**
 - All high schools with a four-year graduation rate of 67% or less
- **Additional Targeted Support and Improvement: Low Performing Student Group (ATSI):**
 - All schools with one or more student group with a summative score that would be in the bottom 5% of Title I schools
- **Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Chronically Low Performing:**

Important Note for 2022-23 Reports: The NJDOE received approval to make a one-time change to the identification timeline under the [COVID-19 State Plan Addendum](#). Under the approved Addendum, the NJDOE identified schools for CSI and ATSI status in both fall 2022 and fall 2023. Schools that were identified for CSI or ATSI status in fall 2022 were eligible to exit status at the end of the 2023-2024 school year if all exit criteria were met. Schools that were identified for CSI or ATSI status in fall 2023 will be eligible to exit status at the end of the 2026-2027 school year if all exit criteria are met. Schools identified for TSI status are eligible to exit annually if exit criteria are met.

The NJDOE resumed using median student growth percentiles (mSGPs) to measure academic progress, or growth, for the 2022-2023 school year. The NJDOE had received approval through the Addendum to use an alternate measure of academic progress, Relative School Improvement Measure (RSIM) for the 2021-2022 school year only because mSGPs were unavailable.

Important Note for 2022-23: The NJDOE received federal waivers that waived certain assessment and accountability-related requirements for the 2019-20 and 2020-21 school years. As a result, proficiency, growth, and progress toward English language proficiency data is not available for 2020-21. The growth measure used for 2021-22 was an alternate measure used because median student growth percentiles were not available for 2021-22 and the NJDOE resumed using mSGPs for 2022-2023, so growth data for 2021-22 to 2022-23 should not be compared. As data over the last three years was impacted by the pandemic in various ways, the NJDOE recommends caution in comparing data from year to year.

The Middle School offers a wide variety of extracurricular activities such as Renaissance Program, Drama Club, Band or Art Club, and Award Winning Choir. Grades K-4 offer many clubs including Safety Patrol, Student Council, Art Club, Running Club, and Helping Hands.

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Before and After School Programs:



Staff and Professional Learning:

Our teachers and administrators participate in a variety of Professional Development opportunities including District PD Days, Contractual PD Days and reimbursement of college courses and online learning. Each month, teaching teams meet twice to collaborate and plan with content leaders within the district.



Postsecondary Information:

81% of the Class of 2020 applied to study at the post-secondary level. 1% of the class opted to enlist in military service and 4% went on to attend trade school 14% went on to FT employment. Students have regular meetings w/ assigned guidance counselors as they navigate the college application process. Parents and students are also invited to attend evening workshops to assist in post-secondary decisions and to navigate the financial aid process. Our graduates attended universities such as United States Air Force Academy, University of Pennsylvania, Rutgers, Drexel, and many others.

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Narrative

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Student Supports and Services:

We house preschool handicapped classes, full-day preschool classes for children ages 3 and 4, as well as classes for preschool autism. We stress least restrictive programming through co-teaching environments, all of which are supported through Wilson methodology and recently with the addition of the Heggerty curriculum. Math is also supported with ST Math. We offer addition self-contained programs such as an Autism program, and MD program, a BD program, and an LLD program 3-4 & 5-6. Our secondary programs are primarily departmentalized, and we complete our self-contained program with an OTP (Occupational Transitions Program) for students during their last years eligibility. In non-covid environments, additional supplemental Wilson programs are available after school during either the winter or spring, and as summer supplemental program. ELL instruction is provided through in-class support services. ELL students work daily with a certified teacher.



Student Health and Wellness:

Our schools offer a variety of healthy breakfast and lunch choices daily. Monroe Township School District will partner with local law enforcement to implement Handle With Care (HWC) Program. HWC provides a framework for partnerships between law enforcement and schools to provide children exposed to adverse experiences with a safe and supportive academic environment. The program's goal is to give a school notice when a student has been identified at the scene of a traumatic event so they may handle that child with care. Recess for students K-5 is provided 5 days per week. P.E. Classes for Middle and High School students. All students participate in quarterly health classes.



Parent and Community Involvement:

Our District has implemented a Special Education Parent Advisory Group (S.E.P.A.G.). There will be parent volunteers to represent each school.

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Facilities:

Monroe Township Public Schools is participating in a five year Energy Saving Improvement Plan that includes, but not limited to, using LED lighting throughout the district (interior and exterior). New HVAC controls, new pumps, new roofing, and new boilers are being installed in all six schools. Solar Panels will be installed at three of our schools.



School Safety:

Each school is required to perform a minimum of one fire drill and one security drill each month. Our Middle and High School buildings have a School Resource Officer on the premises.



Technology and STEM:

Technology is infused across the K-12 curriculum to enhance learning through our Chromebook 1:1 initiative, Google Apps for Education, and digital components of our core and supplemental programs. Many STEM related electives, clubs, and activities are also offered.

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Early Childhood Education:

Monroe Township Public Schools offers Pre-K for students age three and age four (full-day) along with special education autism preschool classes.

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Other Information:

The middle schools and elementary schools have excellent character education partnerships. Middle school has established a promising practices school activity for its Braves. All K-12 schools have a goal of providing strong academic as well as social and emotional programs to assist the children. An emphasis is placed on 21st century skills, promoting student engagement with problem solving, critical thinking, collaboration and the use of technology. Technology is available in all classrooms including interactive whiteboards, document cameras, work stations and programs that provide measures of academic progress assessments. Annual district goals are based on our strategic plan, periodic surveys, and continued stakeholder input. The district has established these 4 goals: 1. Teach effectively using state of the art technology and student learning. 2. Economize by reducing costs and redirecting funds to priority programs and services. 3. Aggressively market our accomplishments. 4. Mobilize stakeholders to support school funding. We continue to incorporate the many strengths and talents of our community in cultivating greater support as well as in generating the greater sense of civic pride.
