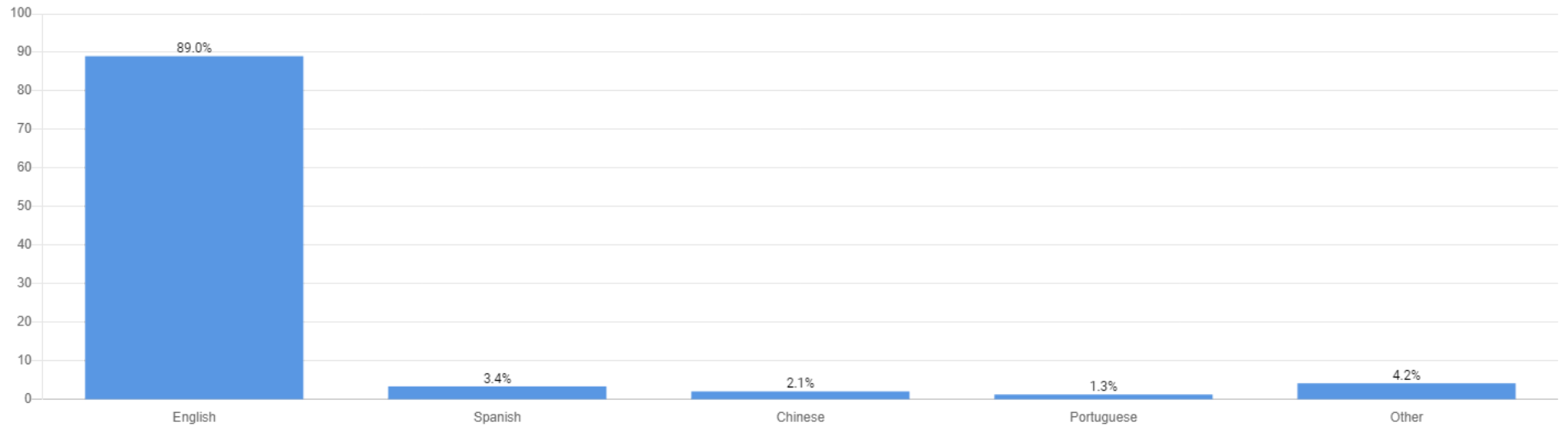

Climate and Environment

Student absences provide important information about a school's culture and climate. Research shows that absences impact a student's ability to succeed in school. The New Jersey Department of Education used input from New Jersey communities to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.

Important Note for 2022-23: The NJDOE recommends caution in comparing the 2022-23 chronic absenteeism rates with the rates from prior years as the pandemic has impacted attendance rates over the last several years.

Chronic Absenteeism

This table shows the number and percentage of students in grades K-12 both overall and by student group who were chronically absent during the school year. The state average column is the target used for accountability purposes and it reflects the statewide average for students in the grades offered by the school. 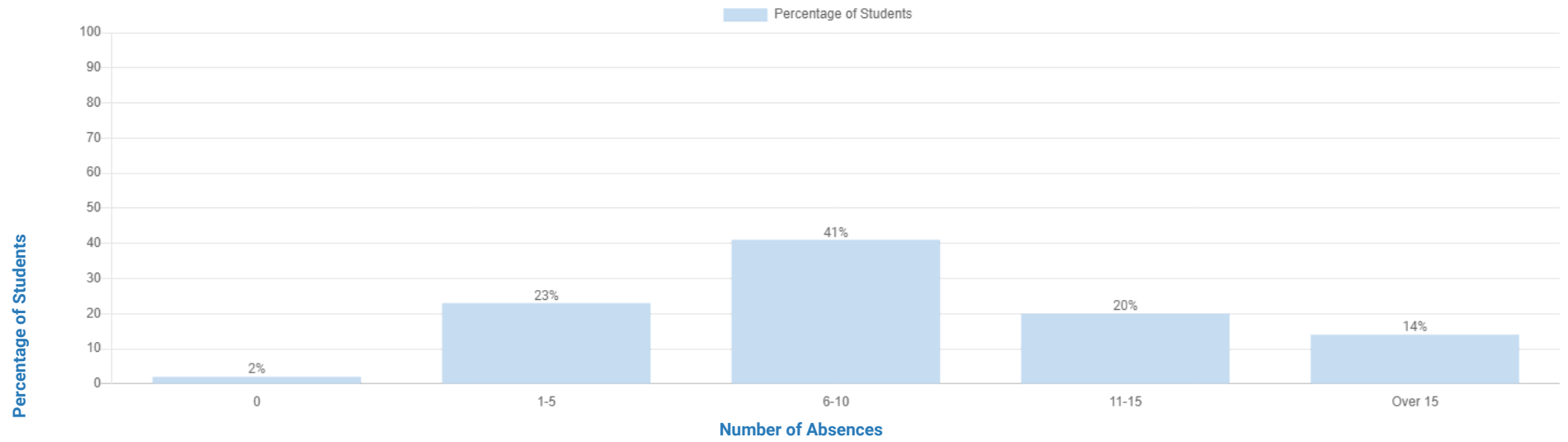
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Days Absent

This graph shows the percentage of K-12 students by the number of days they were absent during the school year.



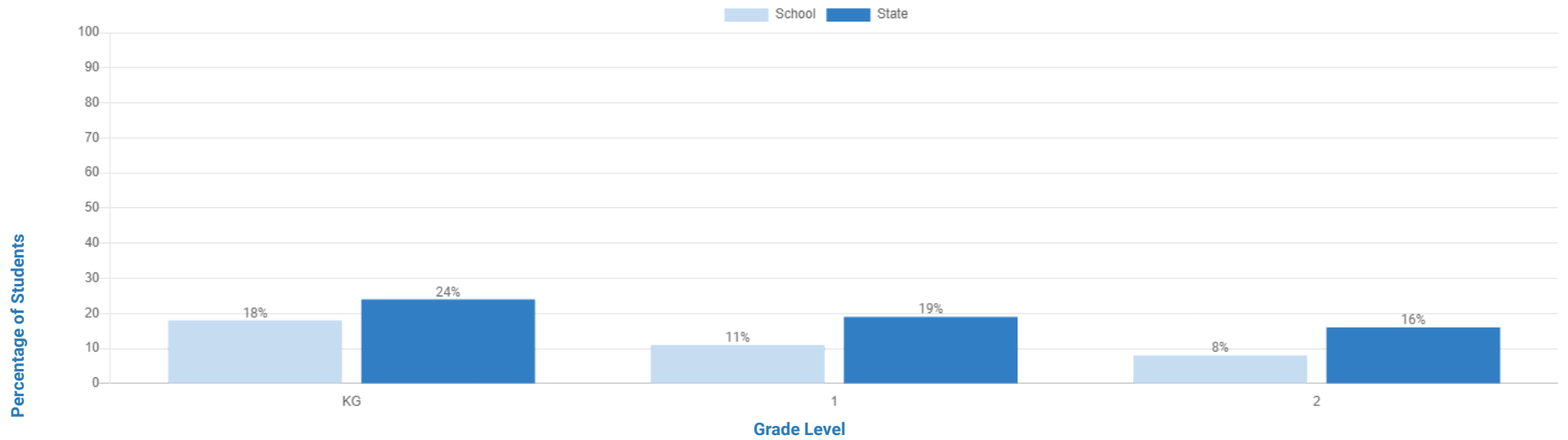
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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

NJDOE is in the process of developing a reporting function for the SSDS which will allow LEAs to use the same data for both submissions.

Important note for 2022-23: The NJDOE recommends caution in comparing the 2022-23 student safety data with the data from 2020-21 and 2019-20 as the pandemic impacted the data for those years.

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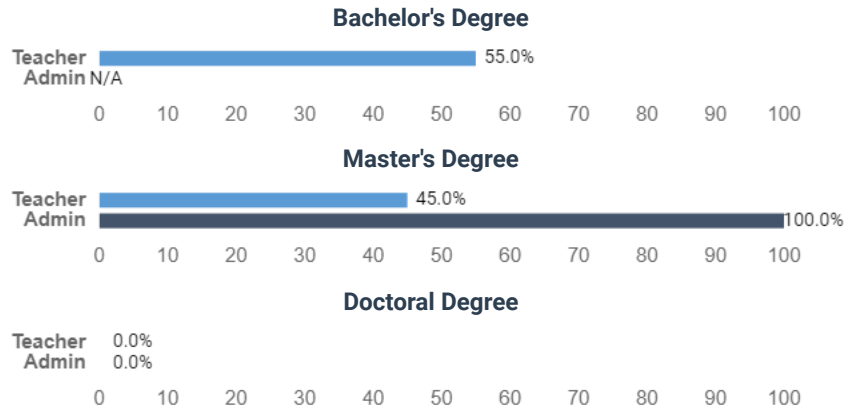

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Accountability

New Jersey's Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Accountability System New Jersey's school accountability system identifies schools that are in need of comprehensive and targeted support as required by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Based on New Jersey's [approved ESSA state plan](#), NJDOE will identify schools in the following four federal categories every three years:

- **Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Overall Low Performing:**
 - Title I schools with a summative score in the bottom 5% of Title I schools.
- **Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Low Graduation Rate:**
 - All high schools with a four-year graduation rate of 67% or less
- **Additional Targeted Support and Improvement: Low Performing Student Group (ATSI):**
 - All schools with one or more student group with a summative score that would be in the bottom 5% of Title I schools
- **Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI): Chronically Low Performing:**
 - Title I schools identified as Additional Targeted Support and Improvement; Low Performing Student Group (ATSI) that are identified for three or more consecutive years, i.e., ATSI schools that do not meet exit criteria.
 - The fall 2023 identification is the first year that the NJDOE identified schools in this category.

Annually, NJDOE will identify schools in the following federal category:

- **Targeted Support and Improvement: Consistently Underperforming Student Group (TSI):**
 - All schools with one or more student groups that missed annual targets or standards for all indicators for two years in a row

For purposes of ESSA accountability, only schools and student groups with data for 20 or more students are included in calculations.

Important Note for 2022-23 Reports: The NJDOE received approval to make a one-time change to the identification timeline under the [COVID-19 State Plan Addendum](#). Under the approved Addendum, the NJDOE identified schools for CSI and ATSI status in both fall 2022 and fall 2023. Schools that were identified for CSI or ATSI status in fall 2022 were eligible to exit status at the end of the 2023-2024 school year if all exit criteria were met. Schools that were identified for CSI or ATSI status in fall 2023 will be eligible to exit status at the end of the 2026-2027 school year if all exit criteria are met. Accountability Summary by Student Group - 2022-23 School Year

The NJDOE is required under ESSA to identify schools for Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) and Additional Targeted Support and Improvement (ATSI). Both TSI and ATSI identifications are based on how student groups within schools perform. - A team of teachers and administrators is participating in the Transforming Early Childhood Leadership Institute, offered by the Foundation for Educational Administration and the NJ Department of Ed.



Mission, Vision, Theme:

Recognizing that children are unique individuals, the mission at William Woodruff School is to provide a respectful, caring and supportive educational environment that enables children to be lifelong learners.



Awards, Recognition, Accomplishments:

A first grade teacher was the recipient of a Presidential Science Award.

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Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

William Woodruff School is committed to fostering an inclusive model and offers co-taught classrooms at each level. The curricula includes lessons that empower students and develops critical thinking. During reading and writing students are exposed to a variety of genres, authors, strategies and skills. Phonics/spelling patterns are taught using 95% Phonics Core program. In Big Ideas Math students master content, skills and embedded mathematical practices through engaging activities. In Science and Social Studies, students actively participate in experiences based on NJLS, current events, and connections to their own lives. Instruction occurs in large groups, small groups and individually. Differentiated instruction, station-based learning and developmentally appropriate practices occur throughout the day.



Before and After School Programs:

Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Funds were used to create a Beyond the School Day program to provide intervention and remediation for students identified at risk in first and second grade. This after school program was taught by classroom teachers. The local YMCA offers before and after school care for our students. After care is provided both at the YMCA and at Woodruff School.



Staff and Professional Learning:

The district offers a comprehensive PD catalog and multiple opportunities for staff members to hone their craft. As new district wide initiatives take place, appropriate staff members participate in rigorous professional development. PLCs, grade level meetings and staff meetings provide opportunities for micro PD.

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Student Supports and Services:

William Woodruff prides itself on fostering an inclusive environment in which students with and without disabilities and English language learners learn together while being provided with daily support. Following the New Jersey Tiered System of Support model, a daily "What I Need" intervention/enrichment period meets the needs of all students with interventionists providing remedial support for students that are struggling and enrichment activities for those that need more challenging opportunities. 100% of the classified students attending Woodruff School are supported by a general and special educator through a comprehensive co-taught model. Additional support is provided by a variety of interventionists and therapists.



Student Health and Wellness:

William Woodruff supports the whole child academically, socially and emotionally and promotes the health and safety of children by helping them to establish lifelong healthy habits. Monthly Community Celebrations and precepts foster inclusivity and recognition of our diverse community of students. A school counselor supports the social and emotional needs of both students and staff members. Health lessons are taught by the Nurse and physical education teacher. Physical education classes are designed to develop motor skills and promote physical activity and fitness. The school nurse conducts routine screenings and leads the MERT team, consisting of staff members trained in CPR, AED and Epi-pen administration. The district's data management system allows all staff members access to medical information to ensure the health and well-being of each child.



Parent and Community Involvement:

The school supports ongoing parental interest and involvement through art and library class volunteers, Writer's Celebrations, and "Care to Share" opportunities for parents to visit and share family traditions and/or work related topics. An active Parent Teacher Organization supports school-wide initiatives and assembly programs. Parents are represented on both the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion committee and School Safety committee.

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Facilities:

Woodruff School was built in 1961. The facility continues to be well maintained, through preventive and ongoing maintenance, to ensure the safest environment for all. Yearly inspections determine the specific areas to be addressed at the building. Inspections include structural integrity, lighting, plumbing, heating, and electrical.



School Safety:

The safety and well-being of the students and staff are a top concern at Woodruff School. Over the past several years, the district has made a significant commitment to improving school safety and security. The district has provided more secure entrances, employed a key card entry system, updated school visitor procedures and maintained a positive and visible working relationship with local law enforcement. Our district school safety team continues to research and evaluate best practices for students and staff. By making these improvements, concerns regarding safety have been addressed and have allowed for a safe and supportive community. Fire and security drills occur monthly and parents receive notification after a security drill.



Technology and STEM:

Students are exposed to various STEM activities and design challenges throughout the school year. During library/computer class, the media specialist teaches the students the importance of digital citizenship and coding. A district STEAM Specialist collaborates with the media specialist and provides additional STEAM opportunities for students. Each student at the K-2 level has an assigned Chromebook for a variety of classroom uses including iReady.

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Effective and Efficient Use of ESSR Funding:

William Woodruff School's warm and caring environment promotes students, staff, families and administration working as a team to address students' academic and social-emotional needs. Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Funds were used for a Beyond the School Day program to provide intervention and remediation for students identified at risk in first and second grade. This after school program was taught by classroom teachers.
