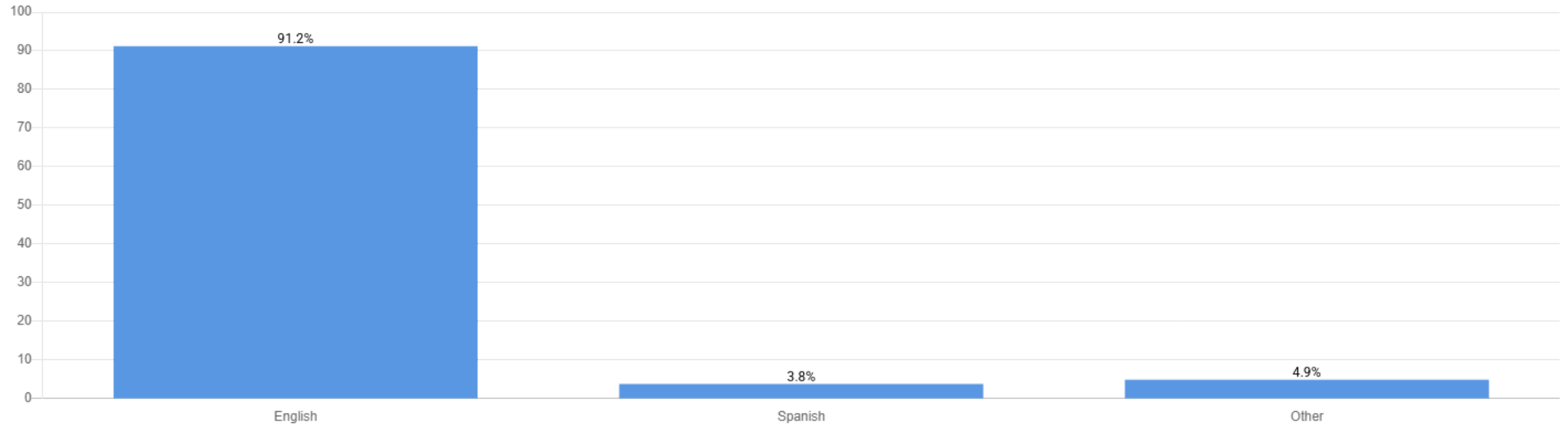

Student Growth

Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. New Jersey's ESSA state plan outlines that academic progress will be measured with school's median student growth percentile (mSGP) on statewide ELA and mathematics assessments. Each individual student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7. The SGP measures their academic progress from one year to the next compared to other students with similar prior test scores (academic peers).

A student's SGP falls between 1 and 99 and can be grouped into three levels. An SGP below 35 indicates low growth, an SGP between 35 and 65 indicates typical growth, and an SGP greater than 65 indicates high growth. If the SGPs for all students are ordered from smallest to largest, the mSGP is the percentile in the middle of the list.

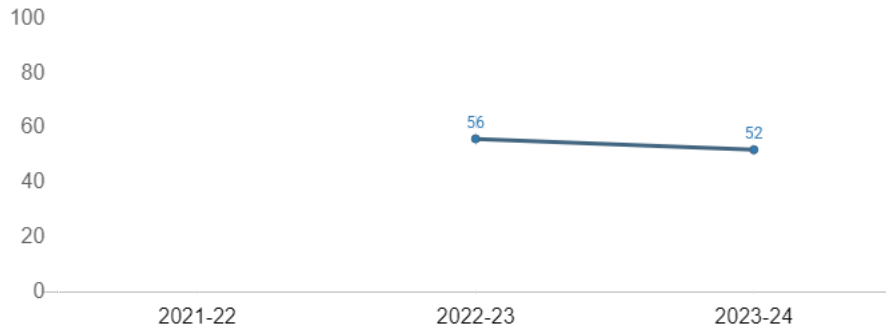

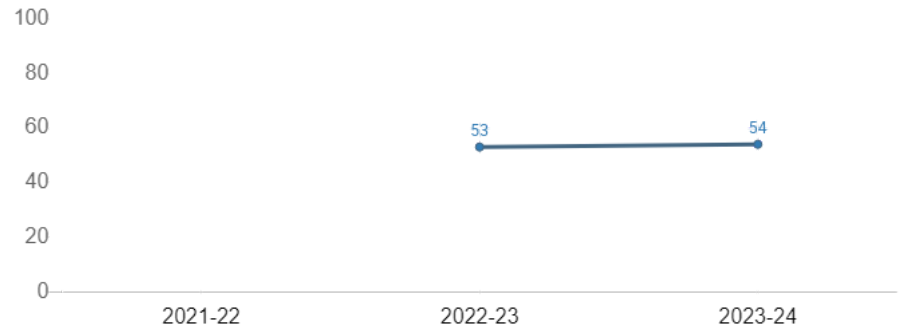

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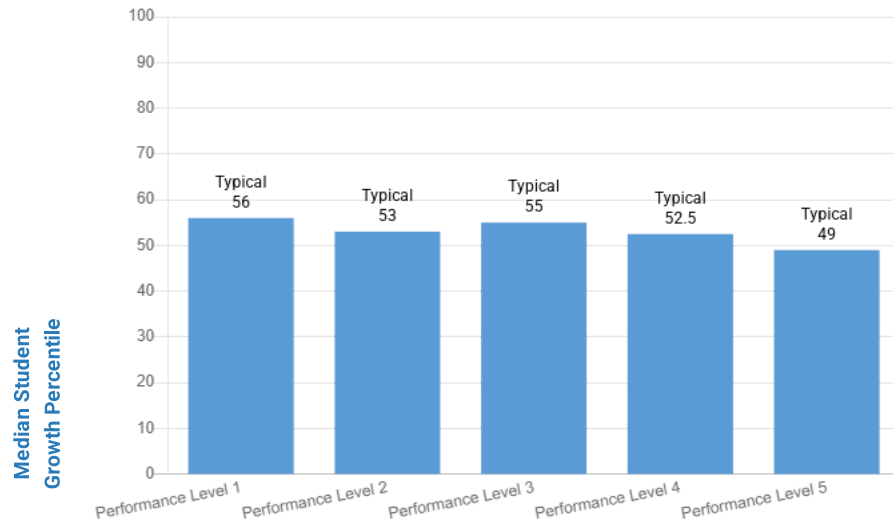
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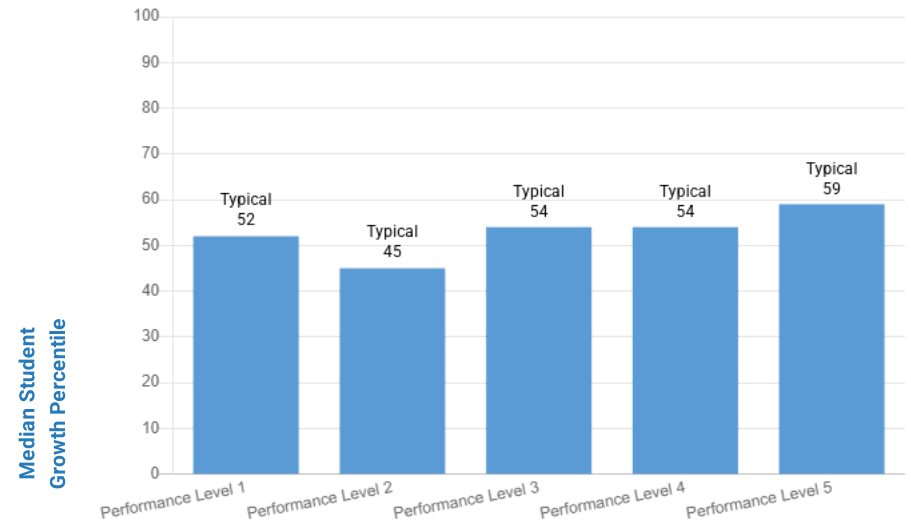

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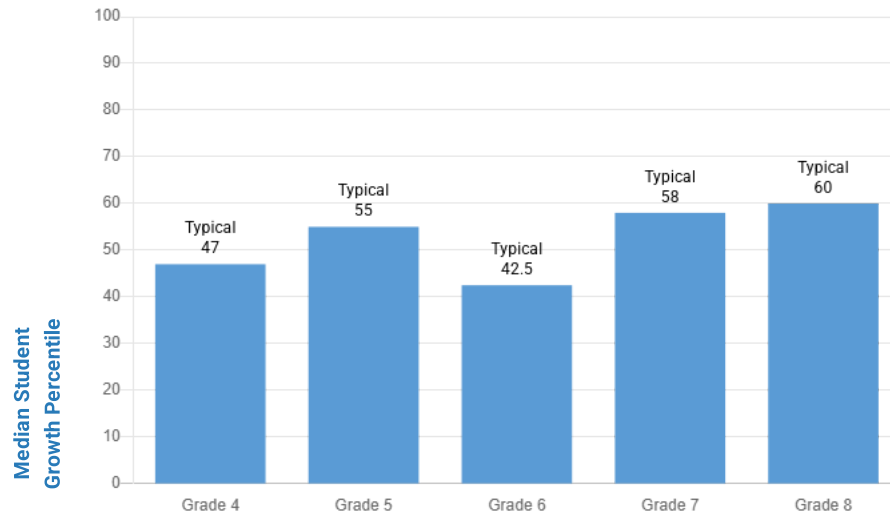
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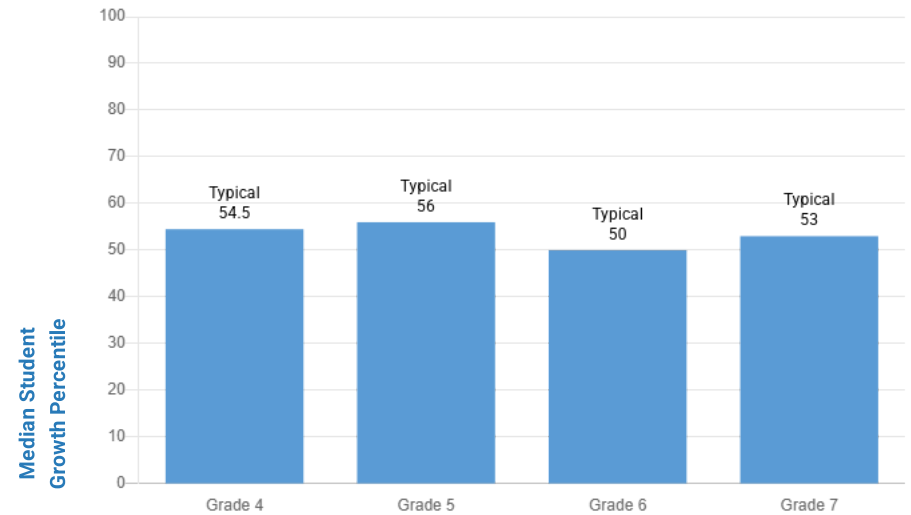

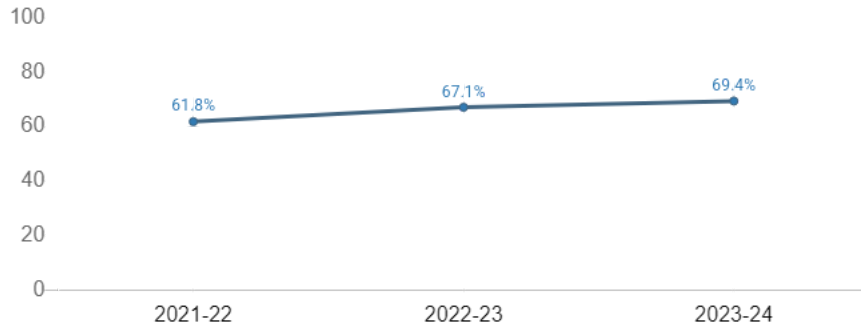

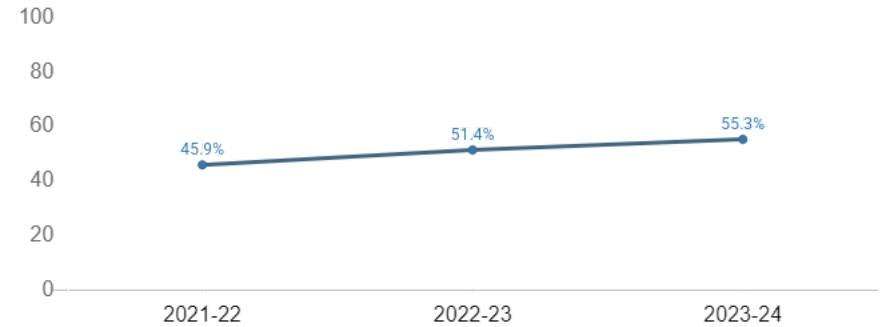
English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. The table below provides participation rates, proficiency rates, annual targets and status in meeting the targets, and statewide proficiency rates.

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English Language Arts Assessment - Participation and Performance

This table shows performance on statewide assessments for English language arts (ELA) both overall and by student group. It includes the results of students taking both the NJSLA and DLM. NJSLA results for ELA include only students in grades 3 through 9. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. Student are considered to have met or exceeded expectations if they score at Level 4 or 5 on the NJSLA or at Level 3 or 4 on the DLM.

This table shows both the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations and a proficiency rate used for federal accountability. The proficiency rate for federal accountability will be lower if the participation rate is below 95%. This table also shows status in meeting annual targets. Annual targets are specific to each student group, school, and district and represent the expected proficiency needed to stay on track to meet long-term goals. Student groups where the annual target fields are grayed out are not required to meet annual targets under ESSA accountability. 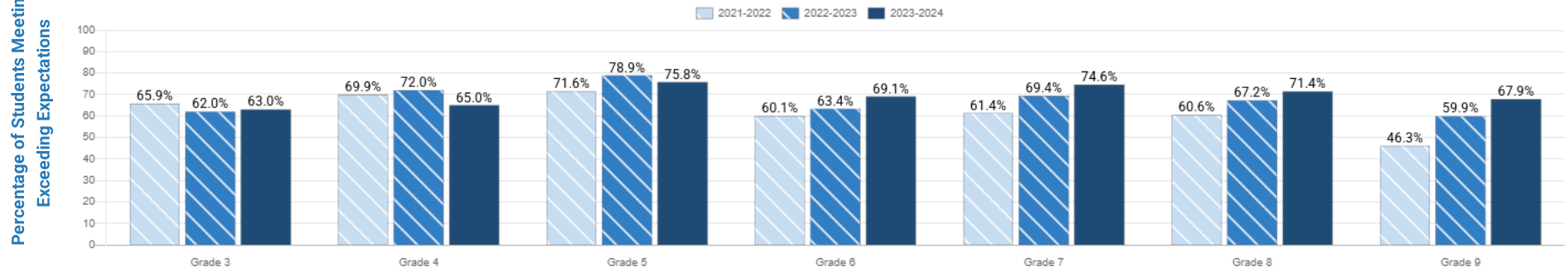

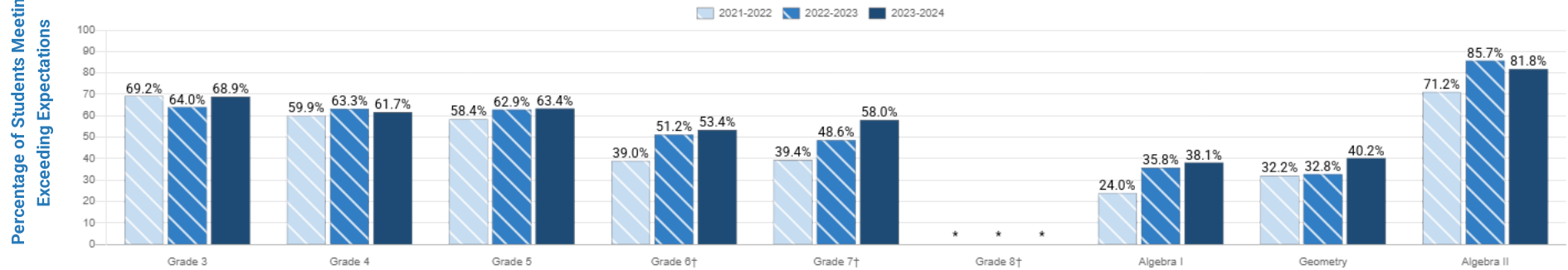

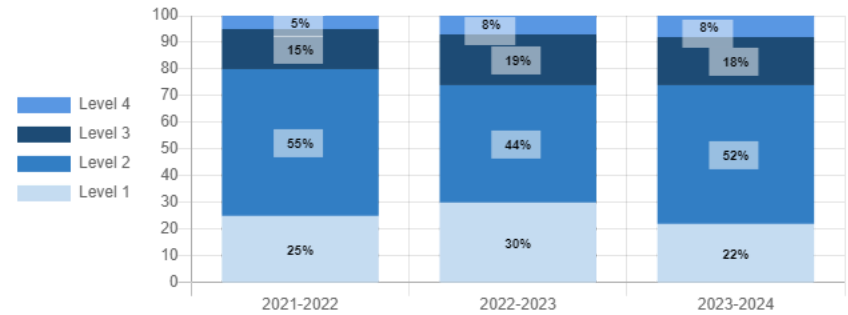
NJSLA Science Assessment: Grade 5 Summary

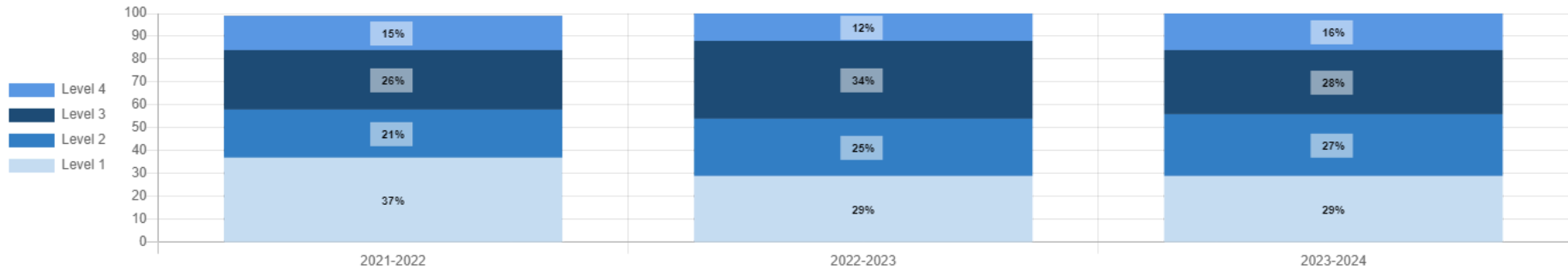

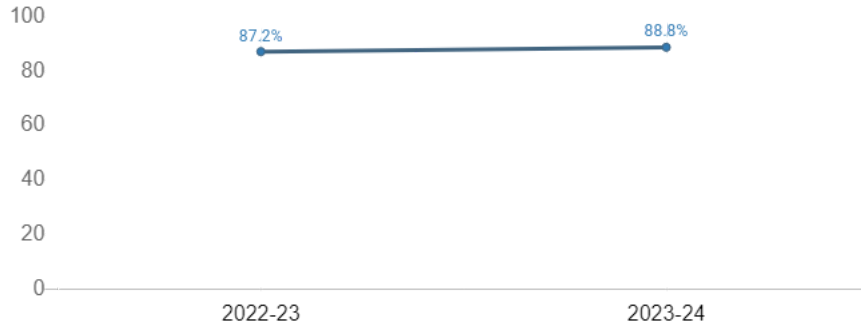

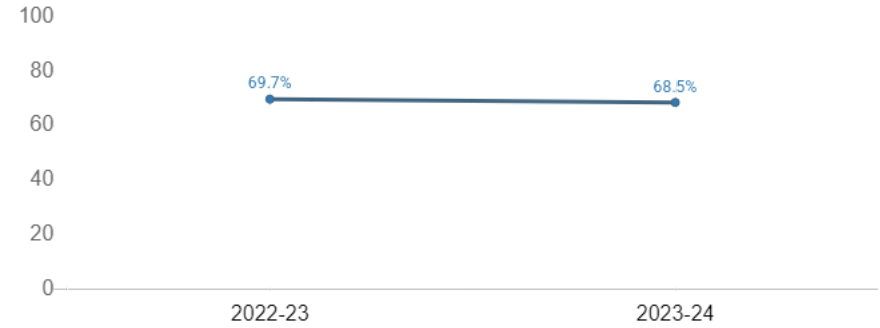

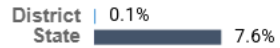

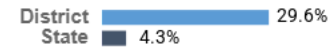

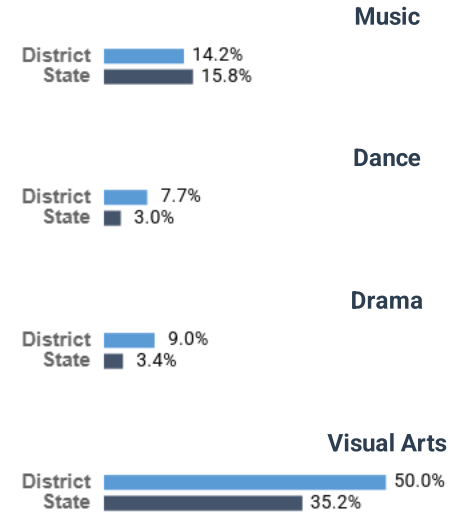

Beginning in the 2020-2021 school year, the NJDOE was required to make changes to the methodology used to calculate the adjusted cohort graduation rate for federal reporting and accountability purposes. The United States Department of Education (USED) determined that the NJDOE must only include students who receive a diploma that is fully aligned with the state's standards, meaning they have met the state's graduation assessment requirements, course requirements, and local attendance requirements. This means that students with disabilities who did not meet some or all graduation requirements because of a modifications or exemption in their Individualized Education Program (IEP) may not be counted as graduates in the calculation of the adjusted cohort graduation rate used for federal reporting and accountability purposes. It is important to note that this was only a change to how graduation rates are calculated for federal reporting. It does not affect requirements to earn a diploma or the type of diploma that the state awards to students with disabilities.

As a result of these changes, the NJDOE began calculating two versions of the adjusted cohort graduation rate starting with 2021 graduation rates. The "federal version" aligns with ESSA requirements and USED guidance and is used for federal reporting and ESSA school accountability only. The "state version" continues to use the same methodology used prior to 2021 and reflects all students who received a state-endorsed diploma.

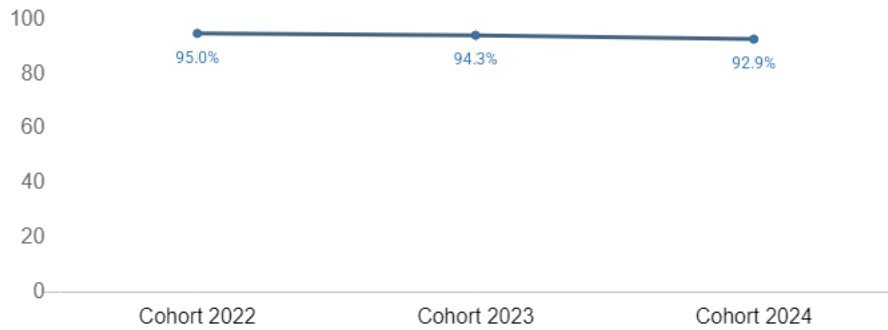

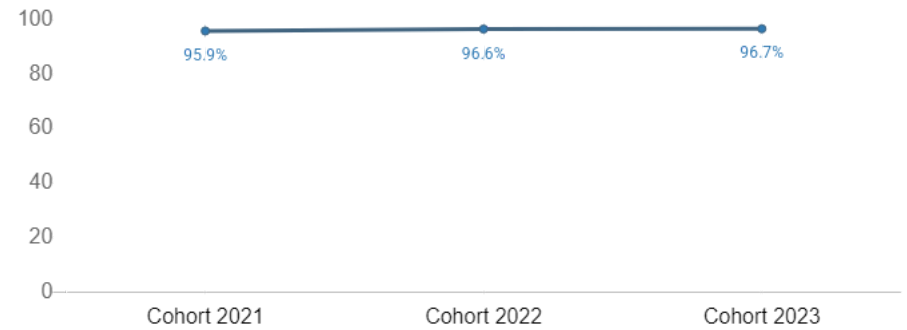

Graduation/ Postsecondary

Information about students enrolling in colleges and universities after graduation is collected from the [National Student Clearinghouse \(NSC\)](#), which collects data from at least 97% of higher education institutions nationwide. New Jersey graduates are matched to postsecondary enrollment data by NSC each year. While most students who enroll in a postsecondary institution each year are able to be matched by NSC, there are some students each year who cannot be matched. Some reasons that students may not be matched are: 1. Postsecondary enrollment cannot be shared with the NJDOE if students request a FERPA block on their postsecondary enrollment records; 2. Students who attend a college or university outside of the United States are not included in NSC data; 3. Certain colleges or universities may not participate in sharing data with NSC or may fail to report data for a certain semester or a certain group of students; and 4. NSC may not be able to match a student's name or date of birth in NJ SMART to the information provided by the postsecondary institution(s) with a high level of confidence.

In 2023, NSC implemented an additional manual review process to reduce the number of students who do not match due to #4 above, which may result in NSC matching additional students to postsecondary records moving forward. As a result, the NJDOE is not including trend data from prior to 2022-2023 in the reports.

Note for 2023-2024: Postsecondary enrollment data for the 2023-2024 school year is not yet available. The NJDOE expects to release the data in the coming months. Please refer to the 2022-2023 reports for the most recently available postsecondary enrollment rates.

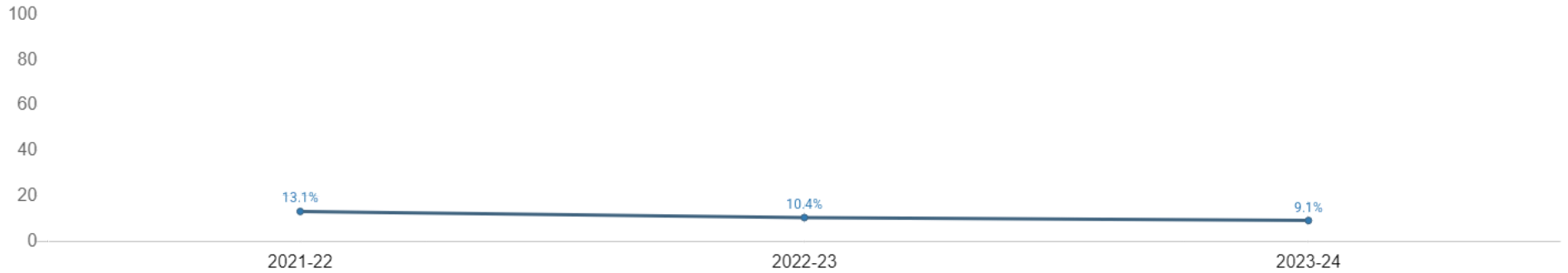

Climate and Environment

Student absences provide important information about a school's culture and climate. Research shows that absences impact a student's ability to succeed in school. The NJDOE used input from stakeholders to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.

Chronic Absenteeism Trends

This table shows the number and percentage of students in grades K-12 both overall and by student group who were chronically absent during the school year. The ESSA Target: State Average for Grades Served column is the target used for ESSA accountability purposes. It reflects the statewide average for students in the grades offered by the district. The last column shows whether the rate for each student group was above the state average ("Not Met") or less than or equal to the state average ("Met").

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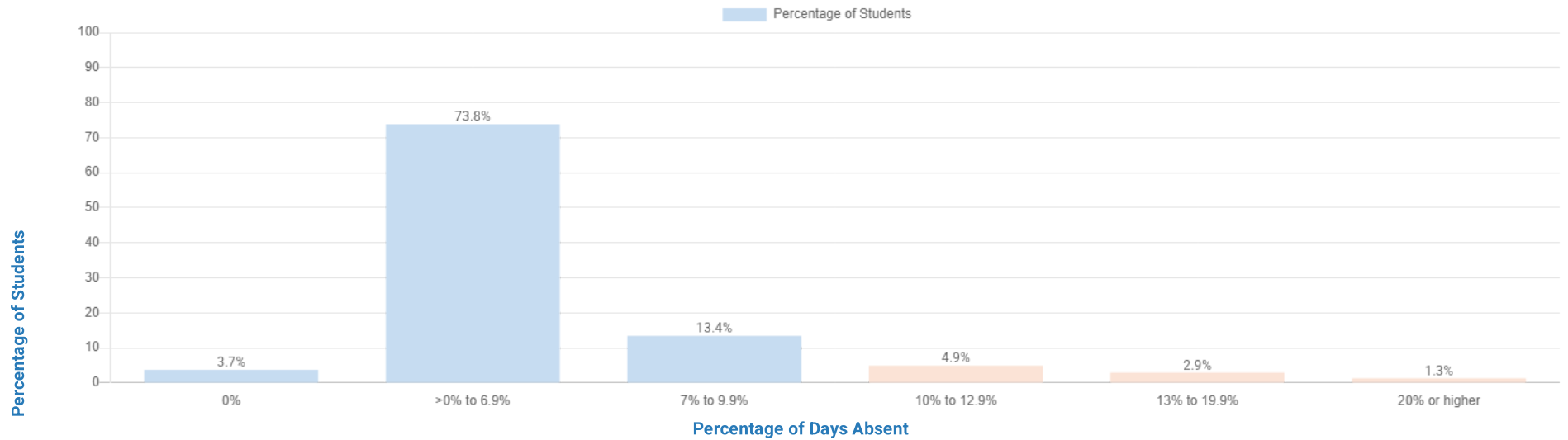

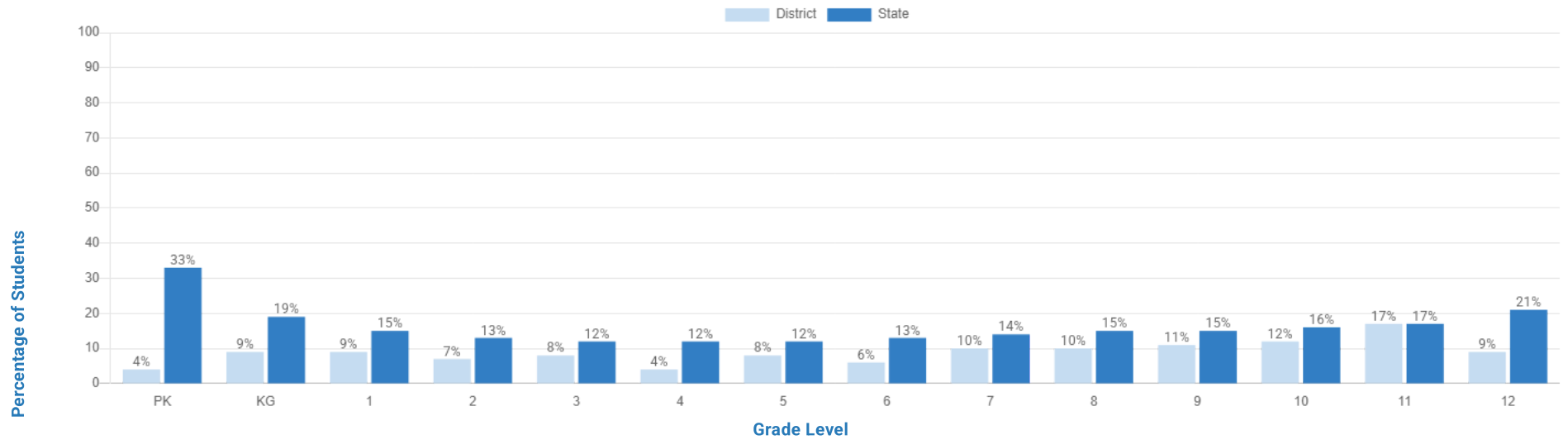


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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

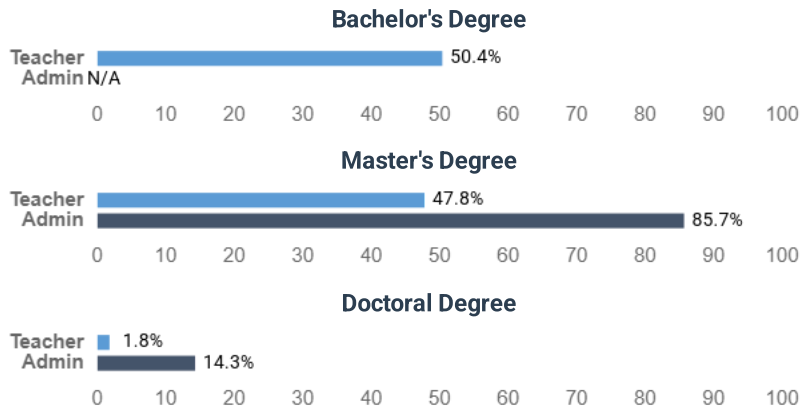

Our district is dedicated to a culture of learning and continuous improvement, providing every child a high quality, creative, innovative, challenging education, in a magnet system of integrated schools that represent a strong, diverse and vibrant community of learners. The district will cultivate and support our students to become high academic achievers, curious and creative thinkers, and socially adept young people who are prepared for college, careers, and livelihoods in the 21st century.



Awards, Recognition, Accomplishments:

Pioneer magnet concept offering choices of schools with themes such as Global Studies, Science & Technology, Innovation Education, Montessori, University, STEM, Environmental Science and Gifted & Talented. Distinctions include: Quality NJ Governor's Award for Performance Excellence, a US Dept. of Ed. Distinction as one of six exemplary magnet programs nationwide, High School ranking in the top 100 public high schools by NJ Monthly and top, 1,000 schools nationally by Newsweek. Niche.com recently named the 200 public schools in New Jersey with the "Best Teachers," placing four Montclair schools on their list: Bradford, Charles H. Bullock, Watchung elementary schools and Buzz Aldrin Middle School. Other individual highlights include: Hillside Elementary, Glenfield Middle and Montclair High School named Model Schools for the Arts by the New Jersey Arts Education Partnership. Charles H. Bullock and Edgemont achieved Sustainable Jersey for Schools certification.



Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

District curricula and high school syllabi are aligned to the New Jersey Student Learning Standards. While the basic curriculum is the same, each school offers special programs consistent with its own magnet theme. At the middle and high school levels, students may enroll in elective courses at the high school, students can participate in small learning communities and traditional programs. District curricula was recently created and updated, including the introduction of a new elementary math program, Go Math! Nearly 45 high school students received the distinguished state recognition of earning the NJ Seal of Biliteracy in various world languages.

We have a total of 31 varsity sports; 66 total including freshmen, JV, and varsity. Fall: Gymnastics, Football, Cross Country, Field Hockey, Boys/Girls Soccer, Cheerleading, Girls Volleyball, Girls Tennis. Winter: Boys/Girls Basketball, Wrestling, Ice Hockey, Indoor Track, Swimming, Bowling, Fencing, Cheerleading. Spring: Boys/Girls Lacrosse, Softball, Baseball, Track & Field, Crew, Boys Volleyball, Boys Tennis, Golf. In 2017, the crew teams became the 1st public school teams to win Garden State Scholastic Championship varsity titles. Athletes have earned State titles in: Field Hockey, Girls' Soccer, Fencing & Swimming; County Titles: Girls' Soccer, X Country, Golf; Conference Titles: X Country, Girls' Soccer, Bowling (Girls), Ice Hockey. Several coaches have been awarded coach of the year honors at the conference and county levels. Athletes are recruited annually to Div. 1 & 3 colleges/universities.



Clubs and Activities:

Each of our elementary and middle schools offer a variety of clubs and activities from the arts to athletics. Montclair High School offers more than 100 clubs, including community service, salsa dancing, bridge, Ultimate Frisbee, robotics, literacy magazine and more.



Staff and Professional Learning:

MPS is committed to hiring diverse and talented staff. The district welcomed more than 66 new staff members for the 2024-2025 school year. Staff Professional Development workshops throughout the year feature internal and external guest speakers and facilitators. Faculty members have opportunities to receive training within field of expertise and subject matter concentration. All Montclair staff underwent Culturally Responsive training. Through dialogue, reflection and role playing, the workshop challenges staff to analyze the structures of power and privilege that hinder social equity and prepares them to be effective organizers for justice. Comprehensive Restorative Justice training has been implemented districtwide which teaches integrated methods to address conflict through reflection, reconciliation and accountability where harm has occurred.

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Postsecondary Information:

Nearly ninety percent of graduates matriculate at post-secondary institutions of higher learning, including at Ivy League universities and highly competitive schools.



Student Supports and Services:

MPS is committed to providing educational programs and services to support meaningful educational progress for each student with special needs. ESL classes facilitating fluency in reading, writing and speaking, are offered from beginning to advanced levels. 504 plans are provided at all schools. A committee, chaired by principal/designee, reviews a student's eligibility, based on an analysis of condition/s, and when applicable, develops a plan and provides accommodations for programming and services. Positive interactions being critical to students' development, MPS continues to expand its Restorative Justice Initiative throughout the majority of the schools. MPS is also committed to the mental health and well-being of all students, offering counseling support at schools along with workshops and services for families.



Parent and Community Involvement:

PTAs sponsor in/out of school activities and MPS enjoys a strong partnership with the school committees. The Special Education Parent Advisory Council, a parent volunteer group, works toward improving special education services. The Montclair Fund for Educational Excellence, a local education fund, annually awards \$200K to the district. School Action Teams for Partnerships bring stakeholders together at each school to plan initiatives. The district is supported by a number of community organizations and institutions committed to helping Montclair students succeed. MPS welcomes and encourages parents/guardians in our diverse community to become active participants in the education of our students.

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Other Information:

Unique to Montclair is its integrated magnet system, offering flexible educational choice provided there is space available and that a balance of children from various economic zones is maintained. The entire township is the "neighborhood" for our students. The district cultivates partnerships with Montclair State University, the Montclair Art Museum, and other local institutions and organizations, which expands the resources offered to our teachers and students. STEM education offered districtwide including the use of 3D printers. In addition, the District has achieved a 1 to 1 deployment of chrome books for students. Montclair Academic Dual Enrollment (MADE) program for MHS students interested in pursuing STEM courses has been implemented in conjunction with Montclair State University.
